## NINTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

#### Department of Michigan, G. A. R.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN, G. A. R., GRAND RAPIDS, MICH., March 16, 1887.

The Ninth Annual Encampment of the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at Redmond Hall, Grand Rapids, Mich., at 8 o'clock P. M., and was called to order by Department Commander John Northwood.

The Encampment was opened with prayer by Department Chaplain Chester D. Berry, as follows :

Let us unite in prayer: Almighty and Eternal Commander, our Father, Creator, and Protector, Guide and Benefactor, humbly and reverently do we come into Thy presence, feeling to render thanksgiving and praise that during the toils, the cares and the trials of another year we are come to this happy moment. The Department having been declared organized and ready for business, the Department Commander read his Annual Address, which was as follows :-

> HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, Grand Rapids, March 16th, 1887.

COMBADES:—The Ninth Annual Encampment of the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, have met in this beautiful city of Grand Rapids, and I greet you as the representatives and a part of that army of patriots who responded to the call of our common country when the dark clouds of rebellion hovered near. That army of citizen soldiers who have accomplished very much toward the advancement of our civilization, and have established the fact of equal rights of all men before the law. And I further greet you as the representatives of an organization which to-day is standing out in bold relief before the American people as one which is thoroughly imbued with the principles which it inculcates—Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

At your Eighth Annual Encampment held at Jackson, Michigan, you placed upon me the high honor and distinction of representing you as your Department Commander for the ensuing Encampment year. Then, as now, I consider it one of the most exalted positions that men can bestow upon their fellow man, and as 1 esteem it in that light I am exceedingly grateful for the honors bestowed upon me. How well I have honored the office, I leave to your judgment. But I regret to say that my time has been limited, and that it was impossible for me to give the attention to the Order that it should have had. However, I can congratulate you that the Order has not lost its influence for good results among the people where our comradeship exists. Its membership is steadly on the increase, as is evidenced by the representation in this Encampment.

Since our last Encampment the ever moving hand ot time has erased another year from the calendar of our lives, and very many of our Comrades have answered the last roll call, and have passed over the beautiful river to be mustered into that Grand Army above; where our God is the Supreme Commander.

While we are permitted through a kind Providence to assemble together once more in the interest of our much beloved Organization to review our labors of the past, and to deliberate upon such measures, and to enact such laws as to us shall seem best calculated to promote the firm establishment of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, While the sterner duties of our Organization call us thus together annually, seriously and thoughtfully to legislate for the good of our own institutions, there are friendships gathered here, and pleasures experienced, upon which the mind will dwell with peculiar fondness long after this occasion shall have passed away.

Then standing as we are to-day upon the threshold of another year in Grand Army work, let us pause to confess our gratitude for the manifold favors and blessings which we have received at the hands of Him whose goodness and watchful care has protected us all our days, and whose all powerful arm has sustained and prospered our affiliation through the years of its existence and usefulness.

Let us unite in earnest, heart-felt thanksgiving to the ever-living God, for his goodness to us in the past, and reverently invoke His guidance during the labors of the present session of our Encampment, so that our deliberations may be conducted in harmony and love, and our warmest discussions be tempered with that charity, mildness, courtesy and forbearance which are among the peculiar characteristics of all well organized bodies and true comrades.

I now submit a report of my official acts for your consideration, and, if merited, your approval.

#### REPORTS.

I invite your attention to the Reports of the Staff Officers of the Department, and I ask your consideration of the details thereof.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

On December 31, 1886; the total number of Posts organized in the Department was 368; of this number six were dropped; one never mustered; seven suspended; six charters surrendered; total twenty; leaving 248 Posts in good etanding, with a membership of 19,226.

During the present administration to date there has been 28 new Posts organized, which makes a total of 379 Posts, with a total membership of 19,453 Comrades in good standing.

#### FINANCE.

The Assistant Quartermaster-General, Comrade Ira H. Wilder, has discharged the duties of his office in a faithful and intelligent manner. The books of his office are subject to inspection, where a complete record of the financial affairs of the Department can be found.

There came into his hands, upon assuming the duties of his present term of office, the sum of \$4,181.47. From this amount has been paid the expenses of printing the Proceedings of the Department Encampment, held at Jackson, Michigan, April 21st and 22d, 1886, \$339.90. Also, voted by the Department, at Jackson, for the relief of Comrade John C. Failing \$100.00. At the last Department Encampment, the sum of \$50.00 was, by resolution, ordered paid to each of the delegates who were in attendance at the National Encampment, to be held at San Francisco, California. Thus an expense of \$1,653.50 was incurred by the Department, which sum has been paid.

#### THE ALGER FUND.

At a meeting of the Council of Administration, held at Headquarters of the Department, Nov. 26th, 1886, it was resolved by the Council that, masmuch as many of the suspensions for non-payment of dues were not the result of poverty of the Comrades—but the contrary, heedlessness and loss of interest in the Order—that the fund so generously donated to this Department by Comrade R. A. Alger at the last Encampment, could not, in justice to the donor, be applied as he intended it should be; therefore, it was thought best not to use any portion of the fund; but to report the full sum, viz. : \$500.00 back to this Encampment as not expended, which sum is now in the hands of the Assistant Quartermaster General.

The small balance of cash on hand at the close of this Department year is owing to the fact that it has only embraced the period of three quarters —while that of my predecessor covered five quarters.

#### INSPECTION.

I am under lasting obligation to the Department Inspector, Comrade Norm G. Ccoper, for the very efficient and soldierly manner in which he has discharged the duties of his important office. His report is of much value to every Post in the Department; and I invite its earnest perusal by every Comrade.

#### OFFICIAL VISITS.

I have made as many official visits as my time would permit. I have been invited to be present with the Comrades at more than one Post on the same date. I have devoted nearly all my time, when not engaged in other official duties, and yet I find that I could not comply with all the invitations received.

I cannot express myself in words for the kindness which has been extended to me by the Comrades wherever I have met them. My visits have always been pleasant, and will be held by me in grateful remembrance.

#### RELIEF FUND.

According to the quarterly reports from the different Posts of this Department, there has been raised and distributed to the families of our needy Comrades, and to the afflicted of our Order, the sum of \$5,168.67.

#### WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

This valuable auxiliary to the G. A. R., the Woman's Relief Corps, is worthy of our countenance and encouragement, and it has done us good service under the efficient management of Mrs. Mary E. Hinds, Department President, and I hope and trust that the Comrades of this Department will continue to recognize the very valuable services of this auxiliary.

#### GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUCLIC.

#### SONS OF VETERANS.

It gives me great pleasure to report to you that sons of our veteran soldiers are stepping to the music of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, and that they are organizing in this Department for the sole purpose of carrying forward the objects for which their sires so nobly fought and died. I esteem their objects worthy of your consideration, and hope that the Comrades of this Department will aid the sons in advancing their very worthy objects, viz. "True Allegiance to the Covernment of the United States of America, a respect for, and fidelity to the Constitution and Laws. and opposition to any system or power that in any manner tends to impair the efficiency and permanancy of our National Union.

I know of no better way by which our National unity can be preserved intact, than to encourage the sons of veterans of the War of the Rebellion to organize and carry forward the Starry Banner—the Emblem of "Liberty and Equal Rights,"—and maintain it in its present high and exalted position. The Michigan Division Sons of Veterans is at present under the command of CoI. Marvin E. Hall, Hillsdale, Mich., a very efficient young man, to whom I feel under obligations for kindnesses and words of good cheer for the Comrades of this Department.

#### NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

The National Eucampment convened at San Francisco, California, August 4th, 5th, and 6th, 1886, the entertainment by the Comrades of the Pacific Slope was magnificent, and surpassed the most sanguine expectations. The Department was represented by its full compliment of delegates. The Next National Encampment will meet at St. Louis, Mo., September 29th, 30th and October 1st, 1887, and I hope to see a full attendance of Comrades that may be chosen as delegates to represent this Department in that Encampment.

#### SOLDIERS' HOME.

The question of a Soldiers' Home in Michigan has been fully settled, and the people of the state have erected a most beautiful and magnificent edifice where our dependent and afflicted Comrades can find a home. It has been my pleasure to visit the home (before its dedication,) at that time the inmates were kept at different places in the City of Grand Rapids. Through the kindness of the Board of Management the Grand Army of the Republic was invited through its representatives to perform the dedicatory services which was to take place on the 30th December, 1886. Accordingly at the appointed time your Department Commander with a portion of his field and Staff Officers, (and where a vacancy existed details were made) with the assistance of Custer Post No. 5, and Champlin Post No. 29, of Grand Rapids, proceeded to dedicate the Home according to the solemn rites of our erganization. The inmates of the several places in the city where they had found temporary homes took immediate possession of their new home, and by the courtesy of the Board of Managers through me, you

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are invited to visit the ———— Home and see for yourselves that your more unfortunate Comrades are well cared for by the magnanimity of the loyal and generous people of this commonwealth. I refer you more particularly to the report of the committee appointed by my worthy predecessor in pursuance of a resolution passed at the last Encampment to visit the Soldiers' Home, consisting of Comrades B. F. Graves, Post No. 45; Allan B. Morse, Post No. 211; Geo. M. Buck, Post No. 79.

#### BATTLE FIELD OE GETTYSBURG.

In pursuance of a resolution passed at the last Encampment which was presented by Comrade Hawes Post No. 17, and reads as follows : "Resolved, That this Department in session do hereby request the members of the coming Legislature to make an appropriation of ten thousand dollars to erect a suitable tablet or monument to designate the position of each Michigan command, on the battle ground of Gettysburg, as all other Northern states having organizations there have done." This resolution has been forwarded to the State Legislature through the Assistant Adjutant General's office and they have been requested to take action thereon.

#### BOOKS, PAPERS AND RECORDS.

The books, papers and records of this department are fast becoming of value, not only to the members of the order, but to the public at large. The Memorial Records now owned by so many Posts together with their Post Records, will in time be passed over to Department Headquarters for safe keeping, and at a distant day it is thought that the State of Michigan will become the custodian of all the property of the Grand Army of the Republic of this Department, it was therefore thought best by your council of administration to procure a fire proof safe, and in pursuance of their resolution I have caused the purchase of one adapted to our use which is now at Department Headquarters, at an expense of \$160.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

I recommend a change in the mode of inspection of the Posts of this Department, and I refer you to the plan as recommended by the Department Inspector in his report to the Assistant Adjutant General and urge you to adopt it. I further recommend that each Post of this Department provide itself with one copy of Beath's Blue Book, that many questions which the Department Commander is called upon to decide, may be settled in the Post Rooms by reference to the Blue Book.

#### COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION.

As the law now stands the Department Commander can convene the Council of Administration at any time when he deems it necessary. I therefore recommend that there shall be a stated meeting of the Council of Administration, held at some time during the month of September in each year, for the purpose of auditing accounts against the Department to date of meeting, and otherwise to look after the working interest of the Depart-

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ment. I further recommend that the Assistant Adjutant General be required by resolution of this Encampment to provide suitable blank forms to be forwarded to the Adjutants of Posts for the purpose of collecting the names, company, and regiment, or command to which the members of their Posts belonged, also the names of all ex-soldiers who are not members of the Grand Army of the Republic, but who reside within a reasonable distance of the Post, together with the post office address of each Comrade and ex-soldier ; that the Post Adjutants be required to forward the same after they have completed the lists to the Assistant Adjutant General ; that the same be compiled under his direction into states, Regiments and Commands, and published in book form at the expense of the Department ; that after publication of this Department Roster they be placed on sale at Department Headquarters at such a price as will cover all expenses made by the Department for compiling and publishing the same.

#### THANKS.

My thanks are due to the Comrades throughout the Department, for the uniform courtesy and kindness shown me during my term of office. I desire also to express my thanks to Chester D. Berry Department Chaplain; Ira H. Wilder, Assistant Quartermaster General; Norm G. Cooper, Department Inspector; S. B. Daboll, Judge Advocate; C. O. Jennison, Chief Mustering Officer, for their efficiency in the discharge of their official duties; and to Comrade C. V. R. Pond, committee on transportation, for the very able manner in which he arranged the trip for this Department to attend the 20th National Encampment at San Francisco, Cal., and to Comrades Chas. D. Long, O. A. Janes, Henry S. Dean, J. S. Farrar, Rush J. Shank, M. A. Merrifield, for kind words of counsel and advice.

I cannot close this portion of my report without referring to the faithful and zealous services rendered the Department by my Assistant Adjutant General, Oscar F. Lochhead; and I desire to tender my special thanks to him for his prompt, thoughtful and incalculable assistance during my administration.

#### CONCLUSION.

Now from this record of official business and the details of our closing year, let us in conclusion turn to some reflections which have forced themselves upon my mind. As I stood by your election to this official position, and equally drawn by my own love for the Comrades of this order, it could not be expected that I should notice, unmoved, the tendencies which prevail among us. Impressions have forced themselves upon my mind and heart which may well find expression here. I remember well in 1866 the origin of our noble order. I remember the grand principles upon which its foundation rested and the exalted sentiments which formed its cement, true and loyal to these, a band of Comrades has made our history a record of glory, our Post and general meetings the communions of joyous fraternity.

Comrades that was a grand and noble beginning. Those were days of joy, when the hearts warmed and vitalized from the great spirit of our

Order, Comrades came together to plan and work for the great common good. As I call to mind the workings of individual Posts, I am constrained to feel that some other influence is forcing itself upon us.

With the grandest professions of fraternity, we oftimes forget to be fraternal. Professing to dedicate ourselves and our Posts to the culture of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, we too often convert our opportunities into occasions for self-aggrandizement and petty schemes. Instead of being warmed by the practice of the teachings of the cardinal virtues of our Order—whose rays may penetrate to the center of the Post-Rooms of this Department--we yield ourselves to passions of strife and dissensions.

I have noticed the tendency upon the part of some Comrades to yield to the influence which a political life offers; they so far forget their duty as Comrades that they have solicited the aid of sister Posts to support at the polls some of their favored Comrades. This is entirely wrong, and contrary to our laws, and the spirit of our Order. God forbid that I shall live to see this noble Order of ours founder in the sea of strife and discord, or be wrecked upon the cold, rugged and heartless rocks of politics.

We have the warning of many kindred organizations which have erred, in cultivating too much the spirit of controversy, selfishness and disinterestdeness in the rights of others, above the social and the fraternal. We have as well the warnings of our former Comrades who have caused to be enacted such wholesome laws as are sufficient for our guidance.

If we fail, therefore, it will not be for lack of work to do. It will not be for lack of sound principles upon which to build. It will rather be because we fail to throw over the details of our work—the glow of fervid hearts, and cease to lend to human life the united force of helpful hands. When opportunity has offered I have advised our Posts and Comrades to cultivate the great aims for which the Grand Army of the Republic was founded, believing as I do that in the earnest pursuit of this aim lies our enduring strength.

It becomes us to remember that the spirit of Comradeship among us, is of far greater value than stringent and extensive enactments, or sharp and correcting orders, and that, if held together by the principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty—simple rules are sufficient for our government.

And now, my Comrades permit me, in a few hours at most, to return to you the duties and responsibilities with which you invested me at your last Department Encampment.

I thank you for your confidence, and the high honor conferred upon me. I have served the interest of this Order with an honest purpose, and with such ability as I possessed.

For my official errors I ask only the charity which should be extended to a faithful intent.

My only desire is that this official mantle may descend upon future leaders who shall conduct this great Comradship to a greater success. But we must remember that no magic in a leader's voice or presence can supply the forces, which are held only in the faithful hearts and hands of a united Comradeship.

Forgetting our folies of the past, let us address ourselves to the new tasks of the present, remembering only the grand lessons of experience, and the noble words of hope and cheer that come to us from the founders of our order. May the choicest blessings of Heaven attend us in all our work, and may the Father of all teach us in years to come, as he has in His mercy preserved our lives to the present time.

There has been received and mailed from the "Assistant Adjutant General's Office" to date, (mailing list 600), 15 General Orders, 7 Circular Orders ders from National Headquarters; 16 General Orders, 7 Circular Orders and 2 Chaplain Circulars from Department Headquarters; 6,250 blank quarterly reports, 750 election reports, 600 credentials, 450 blank Quartermaster bonds, 1,200 postal receipts for per capita tax, 205 notices to delinquent Posts, 525 National Encampment Proceedings 1885 and '86, 1075 Department Encampment Proceedings 1885 and '86, 1075 Department Encampment Proceedings 1885 and '86, 1,072 packages supplies, 350 Posts reports returned for correction, issued 191 Special Orders, 106 special dispensations, mailed 385 countersigns, have written 2,500 letters (of which I have copies), besides the many endorsements upon reports and communications received, to be forwarded, the whole aggregating over 65,000 pieces of matter, making the work in the office very laborious ; have also issued 55 transfer cards to members of disbanded Posts.

Having so many quarterly reports of Posts returned for correction, shows plainly that not enough care is taken on the part of Post Commanders, Adjutants, and Quartermasters in making them out; it causes much trouble and delay and prevents the promptly forwarding the Department reports to National Headquarters. I have been obliged to ask of the National Department an extension of time to forward my reports in order not to be obliged to report so many delinquent Posts and to avoid the Department being reported as delinquent. General Order No. 9, National Department (par. 2), requires the reports of the Departments in by the 20th day after the close of a quarter, which will necessitate the reporting many Posts of this Department as delinquents unless the officers are more prompt than they heretofore have been.

#### SUSPENDED MEMBERS.

Some action should be taken in the matter of suspended and dropped members. By referring to the tables of this report it will show 1,963 members remaining suspended, and that 611 have been dropped from the rolls since April 1, 1886. There are many on our rolls who highly prize their membership, but circumstances prevent their meeting regularly with their Posts, more especially in the upper country districts. Being absent from Post meetings, soon places them in arrears, they are suspended, finally dropped (many times these suspensions are caused by the members not being properly notified of their arrears for dues by the Post Quartermaster.) Many of the suspended comrades referred to perhaps cannot take an active interest personally in the Post, and do not wish to lose their membership. Each Post by appointing good delinquent committees can do very effective work and bring back into line those that are worthy.

Death during the year has taken away 154 of our comrades; our death rate is increasing; many names we well remember; we remember them as men who won enviable and honorable distinction both in the War of the Rebellion and in the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic. Let us strive to equal them. Let us resolve to be true to the organization they so loved and honored and remain steadfast and devoted members.

In my opinion in some localities the work of recruiting does not receive the attention in the Posts that it should. It is the duty of every honorably discharged and worthy soldier to unite with the G. A. R. in the work in which it is engaged; yet it is true that they do not do so. I would recommend that in every Post a recruiting committee be appointed whose duty it shall be to secure as far as possible the names, residence and service of any old soldier or sailor in the community not a member, conspicuously display the list in the Post room, calling the attention of the Comrades thereto. Systematic, energetic, and a determined effort on the part of the Comrades in this direction, will not only add to our membership, but will make the musters interesting and greatly increase the interests of the Comrades.

In the selection of Post Officers the present year, I am convinced that greater care has been taken by the Comrades. Some, however, judging from communications received, are utterly incompetent to fill the positions in which they have been placed. With officers that are inefficient a Post cannot hope to prosper. All interest is lost in a Post when the meetings cease to be entertaining, and those to whose keeping the welfare of the Post was confided, too often prove its ruin. It is the duty of a Post Commander to thoroughly familiarize himself with the Rules and Regulations, By-Laws of their Post, and orders from National and Department Headquarters. It is his duty to forward the reports of his Post to Department Headquarters at the close of each quarter, and there can be no good reason why any Post properly officered should ever be delinquent. All reports can easily be made out and forwarded in ten days. Delinquency causes much trouble and expense and is a manifest injustice to Post Officers who properly perform their duty, and an injustice to the Comrades who elected them to the position of Commander.

#### IN CONCLUSION.

I acknowledge my indebtedness to many Comrades throughout the Department for favors received and courtesies extended, and hereby return my sincere thanks. To the members of your Staff and those with whom I have been associated at Department Headquarters, I am indebted for valuable assistance. They have always been found ready and willing to aid and desirous of advancing the interests of the Department and the Order.

You, as Department Commander, conferred on me honor which an I highly appreciated, and I hope that the high honor you conferred and great confidence you reposed in me, has been fully justified by my fidelity. I shall always remember with pleasure the encouragement and many acts of kindness received at your hands, and hope that the fraternal feelings that bound us together so closely the past year, may continue.

#### IRA H. WILDER, Ass't Q. M. Gen.

On motion of Comrade C. J. Stephens, Post 38, the report was referred to a committee of three.

Comrade Todd, Post 71-

Department Commander—I am not in favor of that report. For one thing, there are many things that he puts in as "general expense." I think that should be itemized. And when he speaks of officers' salaries, I want to know what the officers' salaries are. I think we have a right to know. The Department Commander—

I would say that is what the reference is for.

Committees were appointed by the Department Commander, as follows: On Assistant Adjutant General's Report—Comrades H. S. Dean, Post 137; W. F. Atkinson, Post 17; G. M. Devlin, Post 48. On Assistant Quartermaster General's Report—Comrades S. B. Daboll, Post 156; E. P. Allen, Post 180; C. S. Gilbert, Post 205.

Comrade Atkinson, Post 17, moved that a thousand copies of the report of the Assistant Quartermaster General be printed in time for circulation among the delegates to-morrow morning.

Comrade Little, Post 90-

I desire to say this, that I have no objection, but shall be entirely willing to incur any expense whatever for the information and the benefit of the comrades here; but when we have referred that report to a committee, who will report in detail if they do their duty, what is the necessity for us incurring this expense of printing? I am opposed to it. (Applause.)

The motion to print was lost.

Comrade Brown, Post 279, moved to reconsider the vote by which it was ordered that 500 copies of the Assistant Adjutant General's report be printed. The motion prevailed, whereupon the question was upon the motion to print 500 copies of the report.

Comrade Atkinson, Post 17-

It seems to me that we ought at some encampment to have these reports, and I think that this is a good time to commence. We listen to it; about half the encampment hears what the Assistant Adjutant General reads. We refer to a committee. It is brought in and read off hurriedly, and the encampment is called upon to vote upon an expenditure of large sums of money without really knowing anything about it. As I listen to the Assistant Adjutant General's report and recommendations, it seems to me we are spending a great deal of money for nothing, and it seems to me that we do it because the encampment never understands when it is asked to vote on recommendations. If we go to a little expense, every comrade will know to-morrow morning for himself whether he should approve or disapprove of this report, and we won't have to take the judgment of a committee. It seems to me that we ought at this time to go to this expense for our information, because we have got to form some plan to cut down expenses.

#### Past Department Commander Janes-

I cannot see any use in the publication of the Adjutant General's report. It is lengthy. It consists of a recapitulation of the standing of the Grand Army in this state each quarter; of the ports lost; of the loss and gain of membership; and no expenditure of money. In that report he says he has received the per capita tax, and he says he has turned it over to the Assistant Quartermaster General. By checking his books together with the books of the Assistant Quartermaster General, that committee will ascertain whether he has. And I cannot see what real use it will be for this encampment to spend the money which will be necessary to print that lengthy report for us at this time. Within 30 days that report should be printed with the Journal, and sent to every post. (Applause.) We will not be any better informed about it. The committee will look over these recommendations and make their report upon them. Those recommendations can be read by the committee, so that every member of the encampment will know what they are and vote upon them; and I cannot see why we should deplete our treasury by printing that report now, when it will be of no practical use to us.

Comrade Sharp, Post 135, moved that the motion to print be tabled. (Not seconded.) Assistant Quartermaster General Wilder-

Comrades, I want to speak just a moment. It was a neglect of mine that I didn't speak of what I knew when I was reading my report. My report shows a very small amount of money on hand at this time. A year ago, at the last encampment we had five quarters in the year, which left us with \$3,181.41 on hand at the end of five quarters. During this last year of the department, we have only had three quarters. The next two quarters, if they give us as much as during the same period last year, would give us nearly the same amount of money—that is, at the end of two quarters hence we will have the same amount of money that we had a year ago. That is the reason why there is perhaps a feeling that we are spending a larger amount of money on hand at this time; and you see that it is only for three quarters. And this year you had a larger expenditure for the National Encampment than last year.

Comrade Atkinson, Post 17, moved as a substitute that the Department officers be authorized to furnish to the newspapers copies of their reports for publication. The substitute prevailed, and it was so ordered.

The Inspector General's report was then presented and read, and on motion of Comrade Williams, Post 142, referred to a committee of three. The Department Commander appointed as said committee Comrades Janes, Post 6; Hampton, Post 17; and Little, Post 90. The report was as fol lows:

STUBGIS, MICHIGAN, March 10, 1887.

TO O. F. LOCHHEAD,

Assistant Adjutant General :

COMRADE :

Much to my surprise I was appointed Inspector of this Department in April, 1886, and was immediately notified to prepare for the inspection of Posts up to and including March 31st, to be reported to the National Encampment at San Francisco. My consolidated report was as follows: Number of Posts in good standing 351; number of Posts inspected 299; number of members in good standing 18,113. I very much regretted that 52 Posts were not inspected, and I found it necessary to visit headquarters and secure from the books of the Assistant Adjutant General many facts and figures to finish my report. I deemed it of great consequence to the Department of Michigan that our State should show a complete history of its work so that credit should be given for the earnest labor performed in building up our loved Department. I am glad to know that the report added to the admirable standing of Michigan, and I have no cause to regret the extra effort I gave to its compilation. The National Encampment at that session ordered that one annual inspection should be made each year to close with the year, and General Orders No. 6, from the National Department, ordered such inspection to be made during the months of



January and February. The full report attached shows the standing of our Department at the close of the year 1886.

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Original from UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN It would hardly seem possible that 146 Commanders of Posts would be so careless as to neglect such a positive order for inspection. I give the facts. You can draw your own conclusions. Again it was necessary for me to go to Flint and examine records of the Assistant Quartermaster General and Assistant Adjutant General, and this report is as complete as it can be made.

I have written 337 personal letters to Assistant Inspectors and Commanders during the last nine months. In most of them asking for information in order that I might correct mistakes in reports, and urging inspectors to use their influence to better the condition of their respective Posts. In most of the reports the per capita tax was wrong. The blanks are printed so they mislead and it is natural that this error should occur. Question No. 14, blank H, is meant to give the per capita tax of each member of the Post, but in my opinion the question should read, "Amount charged to members for quarterly dues." Then there could be no doubt as to the answer needed. I recommend this change and other changes in our form "H," and trust that when new blanks are printed the Adjutant General will see fit to make them more full and explicit. Many Posts have no relief fund but are contributing liberally and getting no credit as a Post. Rules and regulations say there shall be a relief fund and I sincerely hope that every Post will obey the rule. All contributions by Posts and Comrades should be reported to the Department in order that Michigan shall show by its works the loving kindness displayed by the members of the G. A. R. for unfortunate soldiers and their families in our midst. Officers and members should uniform and equip themselves as it adds largely to the interest and value of our organization. Poor Comrades can usually buy blue suits about as cheep as any other clothing, and it is very gratifying to see the pride displayed by our fellow citizens when they see Posts marching proudly on Memorial Day and other public occasions, dressed in the color we all admire and cherish for its associations. Wear the blue. Every Post should have eight muskets for post duty and funeral occasions. The Posts will find it pleasant and useful to arm themselves with canes as many of our comtades are unable to carry a musket and make even a short march. Canes are very useful and a high perfection of drill can be maintained with them with little fatigue. I have been asked many times for copies of bylaws, and by request of the A. A. G., I inform you that every Post should supply themselves with plenty of the rules and regulations so that every comrade may have a copy, and one or two pages of by-laws can easily be pasted in and thus completely cover all that is usually needed in that line. I am under obligations to my prompt assistants for the kind manner in , which they have received my suggestions and for the pleasant intercourse we enjoyed. The method of inspection is wrong, and in my recommendations you will find my ideas expressed in short form. My predecessor, Comrade C. G. Hampton, is entitled to credit for his labors in our behalf, and his good work made it easier for me to push Michigan a little further

to the front. Posts are fast organizing Relief Funds. Comrades are wearing the blue with pride. Many voluntary contributions for relief are being reported to the Post Quatermasters, and I hope that every dollar paid out in this manner will be hereafter reported to Department Headquarters in the usual manner. Camp-fires, socials and open meetings are being held with wonderful success and they inspire great enthusiasm in the communities where they occur. It was a great pleasure to me to attend the reunions of the Southwestern Association at Kalamazoo, the Southeastern Association at Hillsdale, the Northeastern Association at Flint, the Veteran Society at Three Rivers, and numerous camp-fires and socials reunions and inspections, and enjoy the kind greetings of comrades.

## INSPECTOR'S RECOMMENDATIONS.

First. That every Post Commander recommend an Assistant Inspector annually, said inspector to report to and be under the direction of a Supervising Inspector, if one is appointed in his district, otherwise his reports to go to the Department Inspector.

Second. That Supervising Inspectors be appointed in every county if deemed advisable by the Department Commander, Department Inspector and Assistant Adjutant General. Said Supervising Inspectors to be recommended by the Department Inspector and appointed by the Commander.

Third. That Supervising Inspectors be called together annually if deemed advisable, in each congressional district where they reside, by the Department Inspector for instruction and counsel. And Post Inspectors be called together by the Supervising Inspector for instruction without cost to the Department.

Fourth. That Supervising Inspectors be paid their necessary expenses when they meet together by order of the Department Inspector or are detailed for special work.

I am under obligations to Commander Northwood for the kind manner in which he has at all times helped me to do my duty and for his cheerful words of approval. Also to Assistant Adjutant General Lochhead for his great assistance and the pains taken by him to teach me the duties of my office. Without his aid my labors would have been unsuccessful.

My labor as Inspector is ended—its fruits are with you. Many days of hard work have been given free of cost to the Department, and I hope it has been of benefit to our noble order, and in conclusion Comrades, let us all be persistent in our zeal, loving in our fraternity, liberal in our relief constant in our loyalty, so that this department may stand as a glorious reminder of heroic deeds accomplished, and a Nation's freedom established.

The report of the Department Chaplain was then presented and read. It was as follows:

# DEPARTMENT COMMANDER:

COMRADE :- In accordance with the usage of the G. A. R., I present the report of Decoration Services held in the Department May 31st, 1886, as far as reported to me.

There were 334 Posts in good standing at that time; 304 Posts have reported. leaving 30 Posts that have failed to report, namely: Posts 31, 53, 86, 102, 106 112, 128, 130, 147, 148, 162, 170, 184, 192, 218, 221, 224, 225, 226, 206, 232, 243, 260, 271, 286, 318, 321, 329, 332, 342. There is a great misunderstanding in the duty of reporting these exercises. Many thinking it the duty of the Chaplain, others, the duty of the Adjutant, while others get it *right* and the *Commander* does the reporting.

I am happy to report a growing interest in this G. A. R. holy day which soon bids fair to outstrip all other National days. The citizens generally have manifested a deeper love for their country's defenders and have exhibited it by closing their places of business and attending the services of the occasion.

Comrades. let us remember that the future historians of the G. A. R. work depends largely upon our records, the honor of our Order upon our faithfulness to our principles, and the glory of our Nation upon our zeal in honoring those who counted not their lives dear unto themselves when their country stood in danger. May our zeal lead us to remember that day set apart for Memorial Services, and may we heartily engage in its duties, *then*, may we faithfully record the same in the archives of our Posts for future generations and forward a report to Department Headquarters for the present generation.

I will give you a comparative report for the years 1885 and 1886. Comrade Chaplain Gibbs in his report, page 50, Journal of Proceedings, Eighth Annual Encampment, reports :

I would recommend that when the Department Commander issues his order for Memorial Services, as is customary, that he call the attention of Posts and Post Commanders to the items to be reported but not send the blanks for the reports as heretofore until *after* the service has taken place. The reason for this is, many of the Comrades receiving the blanks in advance lay them aside and forget all about them, when if they were sent after the service they could be made out in a minute and probably would be mailed in the return mail. I issued Chaplain's Circular No. 2, to urge the Commanders to report and then succeeded in only obtaining in all 163 reports. I then wrote to every delinquent Post Commander and sent special word, after that, by comrades whenever I could, consequently am able to report as favorable as I am.

I would also recommend that comrades report the estimated attendance of citizens and the interest manifested.

I am happy to report an increasing interest among the citizens in the past year.

It is also a part of my duty to compile and report to you the roll of our noble dead for the year just closing.

Comrades, I wish to impress upon your minds the *truth* "We are passing away." Since last we met one hundred and ten of our number in Michigan have passed from life's battle field to the silent camping ground. Their battles are o'er, their work is done. How true and valliantly they fought, how faithfully they toiled, the Captain knows, we leave the result with him.

Let us remember that his approval or disapproval of *our* works depends upon our fidelity to his cause, which is the cause of humanity, in using the opportunities for good that come to our hand and our obedience to his orders. May we be so faithful and true that in the grand review we may have a glorious part.

I would remember with gratitude the courtesies received from Department Headquarters while in the discharge of my duties as Chaplain, and from the comrades whom I have met around the camp fire and in my travels.

With heartfelt thanks to our Supreme Commander for his gracious care in the years that are gone and with a heart beating high and true to the principles of our order, I return to you the office given me a year ago.

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RECORD OF POSTS OBSERVING MEMORIAL DAY, 1866.

Original from UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN Comrade Kirk W. Noyes, Post 31-

I find in the report of the Department Chaplain that Post 31, of which I was the Post Commander last year, is reported delinquent in its report. I wish to say that the blank was received from the Chaplain, the Adjutant made out the report, brought it to me, I signed it, and the Adjutant informed me that he mailed it. Subsequently, some time after that, there was a new blank came, I turned it over to the Adjutant, and he said he had made the report. Then in January, after the new officers were installed, my successor came to me and said there was an inquiry about the report of Memorial Services held at our Post. I looked up the Adjutant to be sure that he had mailed it, knowing that I sighed it, and he stated that he had mailed it. The new Adjutant then wrote to the Department Chaplain requesting a blank; that he would make out another one. I am informed by the Post Commander, Spicer, to my right, that no reply was received to that request. I would say for the benefit of the Chaplain, whom I admire for his report, that he has done his duty thoroughly and well: that our Post held Memorial Services, as we always do, and there was a general turn-out of the people of the county, and we decorated the graves of our comrade dead throughout the whole region within our reach, as we always do. (Applause.)

Comrade George E. Tracy, Post 221-

I wish to say to the Department Chaplain that Bradley Post 221 observed Decoration Services two years ago and one year ago, and I made out those blank reports myself, and mailed them, and it seems the mail has miscarried both ways; I never received the special letter that he wrote. But the reports were certainly made out; I mailed them myself. If it be of any benefit at all, I can duplicate that report, as I remember the circumstances very well—and I will do so cheerfully.

The Department Chaplain—

Let me say for the information of the comrades that some of the best men that we have got in the state have stepped up to me within the past two days and said, "Chaplain, I reported, and I know it." I will tell you: Post 109, Coldwater, right close to me. The Commander said he made it out and sent it at once. I did send to Broadhead Post, No. 31, Paw Paw, and I did receive a communication, and I did send the blank since I received the communication. There is a miscarriage in some way in the mails. There is not a single Post that has not reported to me but what I have sent from one to two and three letters. I was determined, if possible, that every Post in Michigan should report, if I could make them. Comrade Roscoe, Post 47—

I say that my Post sent a report; to my certain knowledge we made out two reports. (Laughter.)

On motion of Comrade Reynolds, Post 109, the report of the Department Chaplain was referred to a committee of three. The Department Commander appointed as such committee Comrades Dunham, Post 48; Shanafelt, Poet 72 Ripley, Post 183. The report of the Judge Advocate was presented, and on motion of Comrade Parker, Post 171, referred to a committee of three. The Department Commander appointed as such committee Comrades Reynolds, Post 109; Smith, Post 205; Brown, Post 294.

To John Northwood, Department Commander :

I beg leave to submit the following report of my duties for the past year. There have been submitted to me the proceedings in 11 court martials. In eight of which the Comrades have been dishonorably discharged, one reprimanded, and in two cases I recommended that the proceedings be quashed because there was no evidence of service of notice on the accused Comrades.

DECISIONS.

Senior Vice Commander has been absent from ten meetings and has removed to Kansas. Can we declare office vacant and proceed to an election?

Answer. Yes. The National Department at Portland so amended the Rules.

IN THE MATTER OF RULING OF COMMANDER OF POST.

Relief having been received for a Comrade from the Department, the Commander ordered the election of three trustees of the relief fund.

This was correct according to Sec. 3, Article 6, Rules and Regulations.

The Comrades so elected were notified to appear, be installed, and give bonds. This they did not do. The Commander ordered their removal and orders were issued as to disposition of the fund. A motion was made to pay certain bills for medical attendance, &c.

The Commander holds the motion out of order and refuses to put it. The funds were still in the hands of the Quartermaster.

Held that the motion was in order. The money being in the hands of the Post Quartermaster was subject to the order of the Post and could only be paid out by the order of the Post, whether in his hands or the hands of the Rehef Committee. Sec. 10, Article 8, Chapter 2, expressly subjects all the funds to the authority of the Post, subject only to the rule that relief funds must be used for relief purposes. Section 9, Article 8, Chapter 2, applies only to Post property, leases, &c.

A member came into a Post intoxicated and used abusive language to officers and members. Instead of charges being preferred, a court of inquiry was asked for and there was a long proceeding somewhat resembling a trial. After this a motion was made that he apoligize to the Post and an attempt made to expel the Comrade because he would not apologize.

Held illegal. Under our rules no penalty can be imposed except by preferring charges and a court martial.

A Post purchased a hall and made an assessment on the members to pay for a balance left due. A Comrade applies for a transfer card, paying all dues, but refusing to pay the balance of assessment for purchasing hall. Held that he was entitled to his card. The rules providing that any Comrade in good standing who has paid all dues, *shall* be granted a card.

I find at the outset that many Posts seemed to have no idea of the necessity of serving notice of the charges and the time of hearing upon a Comrade against whom charges have been preferred. I have prepared a short set of rules and form of proof by notice of the charges and time of hearing which may be obtained of the A. A. General. I recommend that each Post procure a copy of the Blue Book for use in the Post. The very few cases of charges preferred and court martials ordered in a total membership of 20,000, is an evidence that the members of the order are peaceable law abiding citizens and that the letters F. C. and L. stand for something.

I return my thanks for the courtesy always extended by yourself as Department Commander, and to the Assistant Adjutant General for assistance which has much simplified and lightened my labors.

Comrade B. F. Graves, Post 45, presented and read the report of the Committee on the Soldiers' Home. The report was as follows :

TO HON. JOHN NORTHWOOD DEPARTMENT COMMANDER :

The Committee appointed at the Eighth Annual Encampment, held at Jackson, in April last, to whom was referred the duty of visiting the Soldiers' Home and reporting thereon, made a report dated November 1, 1886, and published as Circular Order No. 7, to which your committee refer for matters not otherwise contained in this report.

On the 15th day of March inst., Comrade E. P. Allen was detailed by Department Commander as a member of said committee in the place of Comrade A. B. Morse, detained at home. Comrade B. F. Graves, chairman of the committee, together with Comrade Allen (Comrade Buck not being present,) visited the Home on the 16th day of March, inst., spending the day there, and beg leave to submit the following report of their observations and conclusions :

We found the inmates happily housed in the magnificent building which is an honor to the State of Michigan, and most admirably adapted to the use intended. We conversed with nearly or quite every inmate of the Home, including the sick in the hospital. We found the universal sentiment to be one of entire satisfaction. The testimony was a unit as to the good care and kindness of the commandant and his subordinates, and the wholesome food furnished. We inspected the cuinary department and dining room, saw and sampled the food and pronounce it excellent. The only regrets we heard were by men who had families, who mourned that they had to be separated from them, but admitted that no other course was practicable. We were more than pleased at the cleanliness and good order maintained by the inmates, and the dicipline maintained among themselves and entirely voluntary, is a dmirable. We believe that a vast majority of the inmates realize that the honor of the soldiers and the success of the ex-

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periment of a Home rest largely upon them, and we believe they are so conducting themselves as to merit the confidence of the people.

It is notorious that abuses have been inflicted upon some of the inmates before their removal to the present Home. A Legislative committee has thoroughly investigated the whole matter, and from the testimony taken before it, we conclude,

First. That said abuses were the work of hired nurses when the soldiers were scattered about in different places in the city of Grand Rapids, making it impossible for them to be under the immediate eye of the commandant.

, And secondly, that said nurses were promptly dismissed as soon as their wickedness became known to him. We are satisfied that at present there is no just cause of complaint for want of attention and kindness, and that there is no complaint.

We regret to find that the sick are compelled to be kept in the same building with the other inmates, in rooms not adapted to hospital purposes, where the patients are necessarily disturbed by the movements of the large number of men in the corridors.

We find the number of inmates at the present date to be 300, classified as follows :

In conclusion your committee recommend :

First. That the Comrades urge upon the members of the legislature to vote for an appropriation to build a first-class, well equipped hospital, entirely separate from the main building. This hospital should be no temporary affair, but a well constructed building, adapted to the purpose to the end that the dying days of the old soldier should be as pleasant and easy as possible.

Second. That the Comrades by letters and otherwise urge the legislature to pass a law prohibiting under severe penalties the sale of liquors within one mile of the Home. Third. That the officers of this Department see to it that the officials of Kent County and the Home cause a legal investigation of the alleged cruelty of the nurse Downs and bring him to trial therefor.

Fourth. Your committee recommend that the Department Commander be instructed to appoint annually a committee of three Comrades whose duty it shall be to visit the Home from time to time, investigate its work and report their observations and conclusions at the Annual Encampment.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

I was not present when the committee visited the Home on the 16th of March, but concur in the recommendations of the committee.

GEO. M. BUCK.

Comrade Radcliff, Post 47, moved that the report be placed on file. Comrade Atkinson, Post 17—

May I ask a question of the committee ? I would like to ask the committee if they could tell us what caused the infernal smell that was all over that building to-day ?

Comrade Allen, Post 180-

We can explain that. In the first place, they have no root cellar there. Their vegetables are all kept in the basement. It is not the fault of the manager of the Home; they have applied to the legislature for an appropriation to build a root cellar. The smell that the Comrade speaks of was painfully evident to my own olfactory, but the reason is one that we believe cannot be remedied at the present time; I became satisfied of that. That is a state institution, and the only way you can get rid of that malarious smell and atmosphere caused by the roots, is by the Comrades asking members of the legislature, and insisting upon it, that they give that grand institution accommodations. I wish to say further, that this Soldiers' Home is a home that needs the eye, and the ear, and the heart of every soldier in the state, and that we can do no better service to our Comrades and to the state than to keep an intelligent supervision—unofficial—over that kind of an institution, and bring to bear influences such as we can equitably bring upon the legislature to see to it that all that is necessary to make those men comfortable shall be done for them; and in so doing we are simply paying a debt that we entered into by getting them to go to the war.

Comrade Thompson, Post 3-

This root business don't satisfy me. I know that there were some farmers up at the Home to-day, and if there was one of them ever smelled a root, it was a different one than we had up there.

Comrade Parker, Post 17, moved that the report be given to the papers for publication, and lie upon the table.

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Comrade Daboll, Post 156, moved as an amendment that the report be placed on file, and given to the press for publication. The amendment was accepted, and the motion thus amended prevailed.

Comrade Daboll moved that the election of officers be made the special order for 10 o'clock to-morrow forenoon.

Past Department Commander Janes moved to amend by fixing the hour at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The amendment was carried, and the motion as amended prevailed. So that the election of officers was fixed as a special order for 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

At this time Commander-in-Chief Lucius Fairchild entered the Encampment, and amid cheers and loud applause, was introduced to the Comrades.

Commander-in-Chief Fairchild-

Commander and Comrades :— I have been railroaded into your presence, without having an instant to collect my thoughts and fortunately for you, they are scattered along the line between here and Detroit, and I cannot detain you but for a moment.

I am very glad to be here to-night. Commander—very glad to find the Comrades of Michigan so industrious as to sit in business meeting after 10 o'clock at night on the first night. I think you will complete all your business before adjournment, if you keep on. (Laughter.)

It has been my fortune, Comrades, to attend many Department Encampments since we returned from San Francisco, and I am very glad to stand here before you, and to speak to you from personal knowledge, and say that the Grand Army of the Republic is in just as good condition as it ever was; that the Comrades everywhere are zealous and earnest in their work; that the Comrades everywhere love the order just as well to-day as they have loved it in the years past; and that the Comrades everywhere seem determined that the Grand Army of the Republic shall be a Grand Army of the Republic so long as any one of the present members shall exist on this earth. (Great applause.)

And if you will let me say one word. Commander, standing here now in the presence of the representative men of this Department : I find throughout the country as you find here in Michigan, that there is a constant dropping away from our rolls for non-payment of dues—the same trouble everywhere. There are three classes of men, Comrades, who are falling away from us. First, there is the good Grand Army man, who is simply careless, and needs speaking to, and will pay his dues. Speak to him two or three times ; he is worth saving, because he is a good man—simply mattentive ; that is all. There is another class to whom a dollar or two dollars is a large sum of money, and they really oftentimes have to pinch the flour barrel to pay their debts : remit their dues, boys, and keep them in. (Applause.) Never let the good man fall out of the order because he is a poor man; never ! There is another class, a class that you have seen, and I have seen—we have all seen them in every Department in the United

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States-men who have joined the Grand Army of the Republic, and are not good Grand Army men, and never were; the men who hope to help their · business a little bit by being a member of our order. They hoped that would help them to be constable, perhaps, of the town. (Laughter and applause); or noped that some selfish benefit might come to them. You know the class of men : you have seen them, I have seen them in my own Post at home. My advice to you Comrades, is, that when that sort of a man falls away and fails to pay his dues, let him go, and never invite him back again. We are better off without them. Tell them "good bye, and good riddance to the Grand Army." The bad man we don't want. The good Grand Army man is a man who ought not to hope to benefit himself. A real, genuine Grand Army man hopes to benefit some poor disabled Comrade. (Applause.) And the Grand Army man that has not that first, last, and all the time in his mind is not a good Grand Army man, and we are better off without him. (Applause.) We may be fewer in numbers. but we will be greater in strength, because we know it will be better. It is late, Comrades; if you will excuse me, I will say no more to-night. (Voices: "Go on." There are so many things to talk about, and men fall out of the usual rut sometimes, and in talking there is sometimes no end to some old soldier's gabble. If you will excuse me to-night, I will see you again tomorrow

A Comrade-

I think most of us would be willing to spare the Grand Commander an hour.

The Commander-in-Chief-

The Grand Commander, as you call him, hasn't an hour's speech in him. I live in a state where we time men when they get up to talk to us, talk them down when they talk too long; therefore I will see you again tomorrow night. (Cheers)

The Encampment adjourned until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

#### SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

## THURSDAY, March 17, 1887.

The Encampment opened in due form with prayer by the Department Chaplain :

Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, we thank Thee that once more through Thy guiding care we are permitted to assemble for the transaction of business. We pray that now, as we are convening, may all malice, and enmity, and evil speaking and feelings be stricken from our hearts. Help us to remember that upon our words, and acts to day depends in a great measure the honor of our order and the glory of our country. And may we so speak and so act that we may receive from the Great Commander the welcome applaudit of "Well done." Guide us and strengthen us for every duty that lies before us. May we be true and faithful to the interests of

Original from UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN our Comrades who are less fortunate than ourselves, and may we at last join the glorious Grand Army above, where Thou, O God, art the Supreme Commander. Amen.

On motion of Comrade Hines, Post 37, the calling of the roll of Encampment was dispensed with.

The Assistant Adjutant General, from the Committee on Credentials, reported for that committee that the Comrades upon the Roll of the Encampment upon the preceeding pages of this report were the members of the Encampment. The report was adopted, and the committee discharged.

Comrade Curtiss, Post 172, presented the report of the Committee on Department Commander's Address, which was as follows :

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH., March 18, 1887.

TO THE OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE NINTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT DE-PARTMENT OF MICHIGAN, G. A. R. :

Your committee to whom was referred the Annual Address of the Department Commander, respectfully submit the following report :

The various questions considered in the address have been so practically and eloquently presented, as to leave little room to add any to its timely suggestions.

The fraternal and patriotic sentiments so beautifully expressed find a hearty response in our hearts.

The Grand Army of the State of Michigan has been most fortunate in the choice of a Department Commander, and we most heartily congratulate him and the order throughout the state upon the signal success of the administration now drawing to a close.

As a token of our appreciation of the efficiency, fidelity and ability with which Commander Northwood has discharged the arduous duties of his high office, we most respectfully recommend that the Encampment direct the incoming administration to purchase a suitable badge to be presented to Commander Northwood, and that the sum of thirty-five dollars be appropriated for that purpose.

We fully approve the action of the administration in purchasing a safe for the protection of the books and records of this Department.

As the question of the proper inspection of Posts will come before this Encampment more properly upon the report of the Department Inspector, your committee make no recommendation thereto.

Your committee fully concur with the recommendation that each Post in this Department provide themselves with a copy of Beath's Blue Book.

Your committee also most respectfully concur in the recommendation that there shall be a stated meeting of the Council of Administration, held at some time in the month of September in each year for the purpose of auditing accounts against the Department to date of meeting and otherwise to look after the working interests of the Department, and would respectfully suggest that the first Tuesday of September be designated as that day.

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Your committee have given careful consideration to the recommendation of the Commander providing for a compilation and publication of a roster of the soldiers and sailors of this state, through the Adjutants of the various Posts, and find that while the proposition has many valuable and meritorious features, yet owing to the fact that many of our Comrades frequently change the place of their residence, such compilation could have very little permanent value, not sufficient 12 our opinion to offset the great expense of its publication.

Undoubtedly the Commander followed the suggestions and wishes of many Comrades in this recommendation, but your committee is of the opinion that the Comrades have not thought either of the expense or length of time necessary to complete such a roster. This roster is now in effect and in the pension office in Washington, and is kept in such a manner as to secure its permancy, therefore your committee most respectfully report against the same.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

JAS. B. F. CURTIS, M. A. MERRIFIELD. W. W. COOK.

On motion of Comrade Allen, Post 108, the report of the committee was accepted and adopted, and the committee discharged.

Comrade Watkins, Post 5, moved that a committee of three be appointed to report to this Encampment some paper published in this state to be designated as the official organ of the Grand Army of the Republic. Comrade Ryan, Post 7, raised the point of order that the motion was not in order for the reason that the Encampment was engaged upon a regular order of business, namely, the hearing and consideration of reports of committees. The chair held the point to be well taken, and the motion was declared out of order.

Comrade Dunham, Post 48, presented and read the report of the Committee on Department Chaplain's Report. The report was as follows :

TO THE DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN G. A. R. :

Your committee to whom was referred the report of the Department Chaplain, would respectfully report that they have examined the same and that in their judgment he has given faithful attention to the duties of his office, and we recommend that the report be printed in the Department Proceedings, and that we endorse his recommendations.

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Original from UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN Comrade H. S. Dean, Post 137, presented the report of the Committee on the report of the Assistant Adjutant General. It was as follows:

COMRADE JOHN NORTHWOOD, COMMANDER DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN, G. A. R. :

The committee to whom was referred the report of the Assistant Adjutant General, Comrade O. F. Lochhead, submit the following report ;

We have examined the records of his office and find them very complete, neatly and accurately kept.

Your committee concur in the recommendations made in the report, relative to the appointment of Post Recruiting Committees.

The records as kept by Assistant Adjutant General Lochhead, not only show the healthy condition of this Department, but also the care and skill which he has brought to the discharge of the duties of this office.

Comrade Brockway moved that the substance of the report be accepted and adopted—Comrade Dean having given the substance and not having read all of the report.

#### Comrade Parker, Post 17-

There is a question involved in the Assistant Adjutant General's report and in the report of the committee that I think ought to be brought to the attention of the Encampment, and to do that I will ask the committee or the Assistant Adjutant General—I am not particular which answers whether or not all of the records of this Encampment are in his possession ; if not, where are they ?

Assistant Adjutant General Lochhead-

I hardly understand what the Comrade is getting at. What records do you mean?

#### Comrade Parker-

The records of the Encampments of the Department of the State of Michigan, Grand Army. I have understood that the past records of this Department are to a certain extent missing—lost—and if so, I think it is the duty of this Encampment to consider that question, and to take such measures, and recommend the taking of such measures, or place the thing in such position that measures will be taken—

## Comrade Ryan, Post 7-

It seems to me this is not the time to raise that question while this motion is before the Encampment—bring it up at another time.

The Department Commander-

I am disposed to give the Comrades great latitude.

Assistant Adjutant General Lochhead-

I would say, from Post No. 2 up to 100 the original muster rolls are not in the Assistant Adjutant General's office. In order to get the back records of those numbers—I have to write to each Post to get them to find the name; it has been very troublesome throughout. I have thought sometimes of having the Commander issue an order calling upon the Posts to send in the names of members of the Posts up to a certain date, so I could get the names of the members of the different Posts from 1 up to 40 on file.

The Department Commander-

I desire to say for the benefit of this Comrade that this administration is reporting its doings; we know nothing about the doings of other administrations. If the Comrade desires to find out just how the records stand previous to this administration at the Adjutant General's office, he had better go to headquarters.

Comrade Parker-

I am going to headquarters now. If I understand it is simply this: that this administration hasn't possession of any of the records of previous administrations, but only of its own?

Assistant Aujutant General Lochhead-

Don't understand me in that way. I say when I took possession of the office the former muster rolls up to 1884 were missing. That is before we had any regular Encampment proceedings. Before that time, in moving the Department from place to place these records got lost. In order to get the names of members we have to write to the Posts to get the original muster rolls.

Comrade Parker-

This question is altogether too important to be neglected any longer. It clearly appears from the fact stated by the Assistant Adjutant General that there are records or have been records of this Department that are not pow existing—that are lost. I would move as an amendment to the report that a committee be appointed upon the preservation of the records of this Department; and when that motion is put, or when it is stated by the chair, I would like to say a word or two in relation to it, because I think there is some way by which those records can be put in a position to be better preserved than being toted around the country.

Comrade Chester, Post 17, raised the point of order that the amendment was not germain to the original motion, which was to adopt the report of a committee.

The Department Commander-

The amendment was not seconded. If it had been, I should decide that the point of order was well taken.

After discussion as to the form of the motion, and a motion, which was defeated, to have the report of the committee re-read, the motion was amended so as to call for the adoption of the report of the committee; and in that form it was carried.



Comrade Thorp, Post 26, presented and read the report of the committee on the report of the Chief Mustering Officer. The report was as follows:

Comrade Daboll, Post 156-

I have here the report of the committee on Assistant Quartermaster General's report. In connection I think I ought to read, as it is evident from some discussion here of a want of understanding by the Comrades, a report made yesterday by the Council of Administration upon this same report—one that by the by-laws and by the duties of this council, they have to make to the Department Commander. As I was also chairman of that committee, I would ask the privilege of reading in connection with this report the report made to the Council of Administration yesterday by the subcommittee appointed to make that report. It is as follows :

TO JOHN NORTHWOOD, DEPARTMENT COMMANDER :

The accounts of Comrade Ira H. Wilder, Assistant Quartermaster General, were presented to the Council of Administration at their meeting March 16th, 1887. The undersigned who were appointed a committee for that purpose carefully examined all of the accounts in detail, comparing them with the receipted bills and requisitions of the Department Commander. We found them all correct, and hereby express our commendation of the very accurate and intelligent manner in which he has kept the accounts and records of his office.

Your committee to whom was referred the report of Comrade Ira H. Wilder, Assistant Quartermaster General, respectfully report that they have examined the accounts, requisitions and receipts of the said officer, and that the same are correct, and we recommend the adoption of the said report.

Comrade Daboll-

I will say further in justice to Comrade Wilder, that this matter may be thoroughly understood, that at the meeting of the Council of Administration yesterday, the Department Commander presiding, and some seven or eight members being present, every account that has been made, every requisition that has been made by the Department Commander, the bills and the receipts as paid out, with the vouchers, were presented by the Assistant Adjutant General. The committee of three whose names I have read and who have made this report, went through this entire list of bills from beginning to end, and saw that every entry. down to even bills of 40 cents, had the proper requisition, the proper receipt, the proper approval of the Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant General, and the Assistant Quartermaster General, and checked them all over from beginning to end—that is, the books and accounts, and found them correct to a penny. (Applause.)

Comrade Ryan, Post 7, moved that the report be accepted and adopted, and the committee discharged.

Comrade Grabull, Post 83, criticised the item for postage, stationery, telegraphing and expressage (from six to eight hundred dollars) as being in his opinion exhorbitant, and called for an itemized statement of those items.

Comrade Daboll said that as chairman of the committee he knew he was expressing the wishes of Comrade Wilder when he said that he wanted the fullest investigation. The Quartermaster General had no authority over the expenditures; it was his duty to see that the vouchers were correct in amount, properly approved, etc., and then he had no recourse but to pay them, no matter what was their amount. And all there was for the committee to do was to see that the Assistant Quartermaster General had faithfully and honestly performed that duty; and the committee were assured that he had.

The Department Commander-

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I desire to say in this connection that the Assistant Quartermaster General pays out no money except on requisition signed by your Department Commander, and I will say that I have used extra caution to see that I have signed no vouchers except the expense was absolutely necessary. I will state in connection with this, as the Comrade has mentioned telegrabing; you all remember that this Department had to go to California last summer, which required a great deal of telegraphing. I want the Comrades to understand this, that it is no small job to take this Department

such a long journey. There has necessarily got to be a large amount of telegraphing. The Comrades who went there expected their healquarters to provide all the necessary and all the needed accommodations along the line while en route, for such a long trip. Necessarily I had to use the telegraph from place to place. It was necessary to telegraph ahead for meals as we had but a short time in which to stop for them. And the arrangements for headquarters at San Francisco. Those who went there know it was a very heavy job; it cost a good deal of money. You may remember that when this Department went to Portland, Maine, that a portion of the headquarters—the Committee on Transportation—went ahead and made all these arrangements—went personally, while we used the telegraph. It cost over \$900 to take this Department to Portland, a trip of about two days and two nights, while it cost this year to take a trip of eight days and eight nights only \$1,600. (Applause.) I think if the Comrades consider what it means to take such a Department as this upon such a long trip, and carry it through as Michigan desires it to go through, they will understand better about the expense of telegraphing and postage.

Comrade Rutherford, Post 26, wanted to know of what the item of \$1,200, called general expense account, consisted.

Comrade Daboll said that he could give the larger items of that account, the others running down as low as 25 cents. They were : Extra pay to O. F. Lochhead, A. A. G., voted at last Encampment, \$300; donated to Comrade Failing, \$100; badge to Past Department Commander Long, \$35; stenographer last Encampment, \$69.80; rent Department Headquarters at Flint, \$100; for Headquarters at Jackson, \$37.50; expenses of Department Commander at San Francisco, \$112.15; the total of these items being \$754.20.

Comrade Rutherford said the trouble seemed to be that there were no bills. Here was nearly \$200 of Department Headquarter expenses at San Francisco; what the Comrades desire to know, was what became of that money.

#### The Department Commander-

I would say for the benefit of Comrade Rutherford, that he was desirous as well as I to have the dignity of this Department and of this state maintained when it went to California. (Applause.) I did not propose to engage a second-class place for Headquarters. I tried to maintain the dignity of the Grand Army of the Republic while there, and also of Headquarters, by causing them to be established at the Grand Hotel. The expenses can be itemized by going to the vouchers, but they are so voluminous that they are condensed here in the form of a report. I assure the Comrades that there has not been one dollar of the money of this Department expended unnecessarily.

Comrade Daboll said the receipts were in the hands of the committee, if anybody desired to go over them. Comrade Rutherford-

I fear that the Department Commander supposes that I desire to criticise; not that. In conversation with the Comrades around me, and from what I have heard, it seems to me that in this and in all other reports of this character—perhaps not what has been, but what may be done in the future—an itemized account should be presented of the moneys expended. No attempt was made by me to criticise, nor to advocate for a single moment that the dignity of our great state should not be maintained on all occasions.

The report of the committee was adopted, and the committee discharged.

Comrade Reynolds, Post 109, presented the report of the committee on the Judge Advocate's report. The report was accepted and adopted, and the committee discharged. The report was as follows :

COMMANDER AND COMRADES DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN, G. A. R.;

A majority of your committee to whom was referred the report of the Judge Advocate, report that they have carefully examined the same, believe his rulings to be correct, and recommend the report be approved and adopted.

The report of the Committee on Soldiers' Home was called up by Comrade Allen, Post 180. It was discovered that the report had been given to the newspapers for publication, and not having been returned, after some discussion, the report was informally laid over.

Comrade Soule, Post 75, offered the following resolution :

Resolved, By the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, in Encampment assembled on the 17th day of March, 1887, that the Sevators and Members of Congress from this state be, and they hereby are, requested to exert themselves to secure the enactment and final passage of such a pension law as shall relieve all honorably discharged Union soldiers and sailors of the War of the Rebellion who are in needy circumstance and unable to earn their subsistence, and the widows and young children of those deceased. And that the Commander and Assistant Adjutant General of the Department be, and they are hereby, instructed to furnish duly certified copies of this resolution to such Senators and Members of Congress at or about the time of the assembling of the next Congress.

Past Department Commander Shanks made the point of order that the resolution was contrary to the rules of the National Encampment, which forbade Posts or Departments petitioning Congress with regard to pensions. The chair held the point of order to be well taken.

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The report of the Committee on Soldiers' Home, on motion of Comrade Hines, Post 37, was taken up and adopted.

Comrade Soule, Post 75, offered the following resolution in lieu of the one declared out of order :

Resolved, By the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic in Encampment assembled on the 17th day of March, 1887, that the National Encampment of G. A. R. request of the Members of Congress of the United States to exect themselves to secure the enactment and final passage of such a pension law as shall relieve all honcrably discharged Union soldiers and sailors of the War of the Rebellion who are in needy circumstances and unable to earn their subsistence, and the widows and young children of the deceased. And that the Commander and Assistant Adjutant General of this Department be, and they hereby are instructed to furnish duly certified copies of this resolution to such National Encampment, at or before the time of the assembly of the next Congress.

Pending the discussion of this resolution a recess was taken to P. M., at which time the special order, being the election of officers, was taken up on motion of Comrade Brockway, Post 210.

Comrade Manley, Post 137, moved that the presentation speeches be limited to three minutes.

Comrade Merrifield, Post 88, moved to amend by limiting the presentation speeches to three minutes, and the speeches seconding nominations to one minute.

The amendment was accepted by Comrade Manley, and as thus amended, the motion of Comrade Manley prevailed.

Comrades Babcock, Post 45; Wiley, Post 205; Heath, Post 211; Berry Post 263; Kingsbury, Post 7; Stone, Post 89; and Rottiers, Post 190, were appointed tellers.

Comrade H. S. Dean, Post 137, nominated for Department Commander Comrade Washington Gardner, Pomeroy Post No. 48.

Past Department Commander Janes nominated for the same position Comrade B. F. Graves, of Woodbury Post No. 45.

Comrade Brown, of Post 294, nominated Comrade L. G. Rutherford of Post 26.

Comrade Daboll, Post 156, presented the name of Comrade C. O. Jennison, of Post 83.

Comrade Eveland, Post 193, presented the name of Comrade Norm G. Cooper, Post —.

Comrade Grabill, Post 83. seconded the nomination of Comrade Jennison. Comrade Parsons, Post 120, seconded the nomination of Comrade, Gardner. Comrade Lever, Post 133, seconded the nomination of Comrade Rutherford. Past Department Commander Pierce likewise seconded the nomination of Comrade Rutherford, and so did Past Department Commander McReynolds and Past Department Commander Shank. Comrade Smith, Post 205, supported the nomination of Comrade Jennison, and so likewise did Comrade Kidd, Post 211. Comrades Humphrey and Wightman seconded the nomination of Comrade Graves. Comrades Little, Post 90; Muma, Post 145: Noyes, Post 31, seconded the nomination of Comrade Rutherford. Comrade Williams. Post 48, seconded the nomination of Comrade Gardner.

The nominations having been closed, the Encampment proceeded to ballot, and pending the counting of the vote candidates were placed in nomination for Senior Vice Commander.

Their admirable report shows zeal in the performance of their duty, and we give them the hearty thanks of this Department.

Past Department Commander Janes presented the following report of the committee on the Inspector General's Report, which was adopted :

TO THE DEPARTMENT ENCAMPMENT, G. A. R. :

Your committee to whom was referred the report of the Department Inspector, beg leave to report that it has reviewed the report of that officer and commend him for his zeal and good work for the Department; that his report shows that he has performed his duties faithfully and is entitled to the thanks of this Encampment for the able and efficient manner he has discharged those duties. We regret to learn that 146 Posts have failed to report any inspection of such Posts during the past year. This should be remedied and if the fault is because of the present system of inspection, then some other method of inspection should be adopted.

Your committee are of the opinion that district inspection, composed of three or four Posts in each district, would prove more beneficial to the order than the present method of having an Assistant Inspector for each Post. The district method of inspection was in force for two years prior to the last Encampment, but as it was thought to be too expensive the Encampment at its last session, decided to return to the present system of an Assistant Inspector from each Post.

The recommendation of the Inspector to have a Supervisory Inspector for each Congressional District, has been considered by your committee, and because of the additional expense to the Department, your committee do not recommend the adoption of his recommendations at this time, but would suggest that the Commander and Inspector of this Department consider the matter of inspection and report to the next Encampment some method of inspection that will be more efficient than the present system, and at the same time be as economical as possible.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The resolution as amended would then read :

R., in Encampment assembled, on the 17th day of March, 1887, that the National Encampment Grand Army of the Republic of the United States be, and it is hereby, requested to exert itself to secure the enactment and final passage of such a judicious law as shall give a service pension to all Union soldiers and sailors of the War of the Rebellion, and a pension to the widows and young children of those deceased; and that the Commander and Assistant Adjutant General of this Department be, and they are hereby, ordered and instructed to furnish a certified copy of this resolution to the National Encampment at or before the time of the assembling of the next Encampment.

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The amendment was adopted, and the resolution as amended prevailed.

Comrade Williams, Post 48, moved that a committee of three be appointed, to report in 20 minutes, to fix a place for holding the next Encampment. The motion prevailed, and the chair appointed as such sommittee Comrades Rottiers, Post 190; Stone, Post 39; and Williams, Post 48.

Comrade Cooper presented the following communication, which, on motion, was laid on the table :

#### COMRADES :--

I respectfully request to announce to the delegates that the management of the Cyclorama of the "Battle of Atlanta" will at any and all times make special efforts to entertain G. A. R. men, who visit our great war scene, and to state further that if Posts desire to get up excursions to Detroit, to see the Cyclorama, we will assist them all in our power, to secure dates and terms from the railroads, that will be advantageous to all concerned.

I beg to suggest that such excursions when properly arranged may be of pecuniary benefit to the Posts managing them.

#### MEMORIAL DAY.

I. As the highest proof of its loyalty to the memory of the Comrades who sleep in hallowed graves, the Grand Army of the Republic has established the solemn and beautiful service of Memorial Day. In compliance with the Rules and Regulations, the 30th day of May is fixed for its observance. "When such day occurs on Sunday the succeeding day shall be observed, except where by legal enactment the preceding day is made a legal holiday, when such day shall be observed."

II. The 30th day of May next falls on Sunday; in accordance with our Rules and Regulations, and by legal enactment of this State, Monday the 31st day of May next, will be the time fixed in this Department for its observance.

III. The Department Commander calls upon Posts to see to it in their respective localities, that the last resting place of each Union Soldier, Sailor, or Marine, is fittingly decorated. Mark each grave with the National Colors for the protection of which they so nobly gave their lives, and let the green turf be brightened and perfumed with beautiful flowers.

IV. Wherever practicable, public exercises in commemoration of the dead should be held at some central point. Let a fraternal invitation be extended to the loyal ladies of the Woman's Belief Corps, Sons of Veterans, and to the people of each community to participate in the ceremonies; and it is requested that each Post in the Department arrange for Memorial Service, and attend in a body in full uniform, on Sunday, May 30th, proximo. And as we reverently engage in the service of the hour, let us invoke the Divine favor upon our Order, in its work, as manifested in the practical illustration of the principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

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V. It is hoped that Posts in this Department will make their arrangements and conduct their exercises in a manner befitting the occasion. Frivolity and amusement such as characterizes the Fourth of July should be discountenanced.

M., said Belle Boyd sent for the committee having the matter of arrangements for the Post in charge, and informed them that she would be unable to secure the Troubadours for the performance as they had left her and she could not induce them to return, the time being too late to recall the bills and tickets sold on her representation ; and,

WHEREAS, Said Belle Boyd received the \$25.00 as agreed upon by the committee, they sympathising with her in her supposed disappointment; and,

WHEREAS, Said Belle Boyd during her stay in the village conducted herself in a manner unbecoming a lady and calling out the unfavorable comments of our citizens; and,

WHEREAS, After thoroughly investigating the story she told concerning her expecting the Troubadours to assist her in her performance, the committee has every reason to believe that she did not expect them, and that she wilfully made a misrepresentation for the purpose of inducing said Committee to engage her, said Troubadours having been left by her at Cassopolis, Mich. over three weeks before her engagement by said committee, in a destitute condition, not having received their pay, although she had money and could have paid them had she chosen to do so; and,

WAEREAS, In appears from reports made from other towns in which she has performed, that she is wholly unreliable and unworthy of the confidence of G. A. R. Posts : therefore, be it

Resolved, By A. Lincoln Post No. 19, Department of Michigan G. A. R., that the said Belle Boyd shall be exposed as far as lies in our power, so that she will not in the future impose upon the G. A. R., and that a copy of this resolution and statement as herein set forth, be forwarded to Headquarters of the Department to be used as it may deem necessary.

CIRCTLAR ) No. 1.

The Committee on Transportation to the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held at San Francisco, appointed by the Department Commander, have made the following arrangements, which are hereby adopted as the plan of this Department, and an earnest invitation is extended to all members of the G. A. R., the Women's Relief Corps, and Sons of Veterans, as well as all residents of Michigan coming within the permission of railroad companies as set forth im the circular herewith printed, to join in making the Michigan party a large and enjoyable one.

Headquarters will be established at the Sherman House, Chicago, on the 22d of July, where all wishing to go with the Michigan party may report, purchase tickets, be assigned to sleeping car berths, and given such information as may be essential.

A special train made up and appropriately trimmed for the Mechigan delegation and friends, will leave Chicago on Friday, July 23d, via Chicago and Rock Island Railway about noon, reaching Kansas City on Saturday, and thence via the Atchison. Topeka and Santa Fe Rout to San Francisco, running through without change of coaches. This train will run from Kansas City upon a special time card so arranged as to afford an opportunity for sight seeing not accorded to the usual travel. In addition to the views of mountain scenery, there will be a stop at Los Vegas and the Hot Springs, and at Santa Fe (the oldest American city), of sufficient length to enable a reasonable visit. One day will be spent at San Diego, the extreme southern poirt in California on the Pacific Coast. One day will be given to the party at Los Angeles to visit the orange groves and vineyards, and the remainder of the trip is so arranged as to give a full view of the celebrated Tehachapi pass by daylight, reaching San Francisco on the afternoon of July 31st.

The railroad fare from Chicago to San Francisco via the Rock Island and Santa Fe route will be the same as by any other line, \$62.50 for the round trip. The return route may be by any of the trans-continental lines, within the time specified in the circular printed below, the choice to be made before leaving Kansas City. Should there be any break in the above rates, by competing roads, the same will be met to the advantage of the Michigan party.

Pullman Sleeping Coaches, will, as is customary, charge extra for berths. As these coaches will be the principal part of the train, and the demand for them from various States is already great, it is essential that all who intend to go with the Michigan party should secure quarters by addressing Comrade C. V. R. Pond, Committee on Transportation, at Quincey, Michigan, at an early date. This is absolutely essential, as only as many coaches will be secured as are necessary to accommodate those engaging berth before July 10.

Excursion Tickets will be sold for the use of members of the Grand Army of the Republic and Women's Relief Corps, kindred organizations, uniformed military bodies, and all old soldiers, including families and female relatives. Persons belonging to families, as herein mentioned, and female relatives, must be accompanied and identified by members of one of the classes named. Members of the G. A. R. must present certificates of membership, signed by the Adjutant or Commander of the Post to which they belong, and similar certificates must be presented by members of the other classes named.

Tickets will be placed on sale thirty days prior to the date of opening of the Encampment, and must be used through to San Francisco before the date of such opening.

Tickets must be used for return passage to the Association's eastern termilals within eighty-five days from the date of opening of the Encampment, and will not be good for return passage previous to the date of such opening.

Return tickets will be extended for sixty days longer on payment of \$25 additional in San Francisco.

Thekets will be honored only when presented with a certificate of membership described above, and will be issued by lines of this Association only. Eastern roads, may, however, issue exchange orders or coupons, to be exchanged by Association lines for excursion tickets; the route west of Association's terminals to be designated by the passenger when the exchange is made. The entire proportion accruing west of such terminals to be reported to the road on which the order is drawn.

The rate upon such tickets will be \$50 from the Association's eastern terminals, viz., Council Bluffs, Iowa; Omaha, Neb.; Pacific Junction, Iowa; Atchinson and Leavenworth, Kan.; Kansas City and Nevada, Mo.; Mincola and Houston, Texas; to San Francisco and return, which will be arbitrary. Tickets may be issued at this rate to go West by any route composed wholly of lines in this Association over which the sale of single trip tickets to San Francisco is authorized. and to return by the same or by any other route composed wholly of lines in this Association, to the same or to any other of the eastern terminals named above. Parties desiring an exchange of tickets for return passage after arrival at San Francisco will be required to pay \$10 additional for such exchange.

Parties desiring to return from San Francisco via Portland, Oregon, an I the Northern Pacific to St. Paul, or by the Oregon Short Line and Union Pacific to the Missouri River, can have return tickets issued accordingly by payment of \$12.50 when tickets are exchanged, this amount being a special rate made by the Oregon Railway & Navigation Co. for steamer passage from San Francisco to Portland. If exchange for return via Portland is made at San Francisco or Portland, \$10 must be paid in addition to the \$12.50 provided for above. If holders of G. A. R. excursion tickets desire to go from San Francisco to Portland and return to San Francisco, the steamer line will charge \$25 for the round trip. The steamer rates herein quoted include berths and meals.

Only 150 pounds of baggage will be carried free on G. A. R. excursion tickets.

Headquarters reception room for this Department will be established at the Grand Hotel in San Francisco, on the evening of July 31st, upon arrival.

The following information as to hotel accommodations in San Francisco, is published by the local committee of that city, and is given here for the government of all who intend to visit the coast :

Applicants should endeavor to give us an accurate idea of the accommodations they desire—whether at Hotels or Private Residences - with or without board.

Hotel prices range from \$3.50 to \$5.00 per day, (or higher with extra choice apartments) at such houses as the "Palace," "Baldwin," "Grand," or "Occidental," down to about \$1.00 or \$1.25 at other respectable houses. Lodgings may be had at all prices from 25c. for a night's lodging, up to \$2.00 or \$3.00 per day in fashionable Lodging Houses or Private Dwellings. Good meals can be obtained at Restaurants at from 25c. to 50c.

The Committee will spare no effort to have every one located comfortably and to their entire satisfaction, but those who apply early, stating clearly what they want, will have the best chance of securing it.

We also desire, as a matter of more importance, that you will request such Comrades or parties as have positively decided on coming, to forward applications for quarters as soon as their plans are sufficiently matured, using substantially the following form :

CIRCULAR ORDER, No. 7.

I. At the Eighth Annual Encampment of this Department, held at Jackson, the following resolution relative to the Soldiers' Home was adopted :

"Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Commander of this Department, whose duty it shall be to visit at various times each year, the Michigan Soldiers' Home, at Grand Rapids, and report to the Department Commander anything of interest in regard to the Home, its management and the care given its inmates."

Herewith find Report of Committee :

TO HON. JOHN NORTHWOOD, DEPARTMENT COMMANDER, DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN G. A. R. :

The Committee appointed at the last Department Encampment held at Jackson in April, 1886, to whom was intrusted the duty of visiting the Soldiers' Home at Grand Rapids, at various times during the year, and to report to the Department Commander anything of interest in regard to the Home, its management and the care given its inmates, desire to report that on the third day of June, 1886, they visited the Home at Grand Rapids without giving the managers thereof any previous notice, and found that since its organization and up to June 1, 1886, there had been received 332 men, but that the average attendance during the previous winter was 277. In the spring of 1886 a Board of Surgeons was employed, and those who were found able to obtain their living by manual labor were honorably discharged and transportation furnished them to their former homes. Previous to our visit eight had been discharged for disorderly conduct.



At the time your Committee visited the Home the Board of Managers was using five buildings in the city of Grand Rapids and one building on the premises lately purchased by the State, for a Soldiers' Home. 'These inmates were quartered as follows :

The American Home, on Canal street, was used as a Hospital, and contained at that time all those totally disabled, about 67 in number. These were under the care of a competent surgeon, assisted by a sufficient number of nurses. Your committee visited all these buildings and carefully inspected the quarters, bedding, &c. While these quarters in many cases were small and occupied by too large a number, yet they were uniformely clean with good beds and a good supply of bedding, and the best quarters the managers could provide under the circumstances.

The Hospital was provided with necessary medicines, and the inmates were being cared for as well as could be expected under the present circumstances, and all were especially pleased with the management of this part of the institution. The cleanliness and ventilation of the rooms and the evident kindly care given the inmates formed a pleasant and strong contrast to what might have been the condition of these invalids and sufferers if left to the poor houses or even some of the homes in our State.

Your Committee took the pains to talk with the inmates of the Home separate and apart from the managers or the officers, and found from such conversation that they were well satisfied with the general management, and uniformly spoke with praise of the kind treatment and watchful care received by them from the officers of the Home.

While visiting Nelson Wood, at the Soldiers' Home site, your Committee partook of the noon meal prepared by the inmates, and found that they were provided with good, wholesome, plain food in abundance.

The managers have provided such general rules and regulations for the admission, control and governing the members of the Home and their comfort and welfare which appears to be salutary and effective, but too lenghty to be herein transcribed.

Under the rules those able to do so are required to perform light police duties, but aside from this no other duties are imposed and they are allowed the privileges of the city, only required to be in their quarters at 8 P. M.

The members are welcome to attend the several churches in the city, and the good citizens of Grand Rapids have furnished their quarters with abundance of good reading matter.

The State has purchased a beautiful site two and one half miles north of the city overlooking Grand river containing 132 acres of land, and have about completed thereon a building of brick and stone 258 feet long three and one-half stories above the basement, at an expense of \$100,000 exclusive of the land.

Your Committee were well satisfied with the general management of the Home, and are of the opinion that the managers are doing all that can be expected under the circumstances for the comfort and welfare of the old veterans, and when the new Home is completed, if the present good management is continued, Michigan will have well performed her duty towards her defenders.
