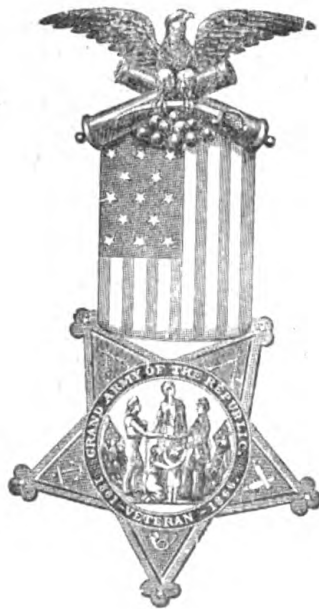

FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

HELD AT PORT HURON, MICHIGAN, JUNE 9, 10 AND 11, 1920.

The Forty-second Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was called to order by the Department Commander, Edwin F. Lamb, in the Majestic Theater, at Port Huron, on Wednesday, June 9th, 1920, at two o'clock in the afternoon.

Department Commander: Comrades and friends, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you Mr. John V. French, Mayor of the City of Port Huron.

Mayor French: Ladies and Gentlemen, it always gives me pleasure to welcome an old soldier of 1861 to 1865 to our city and that pleasure is multiplied many times today in my privilege to welcome the delegates of this Encampment to our city.

I will not take up much of your time, because the day is warm, and you may not all be as comfortable as you otherwise would be. I wish to assure you that the city officials will do all in their power to help you to enjoy your stay with us. We feel very proud of the fact that we have a city that has everything a convention city should have. We have the purest air in the world; water that is pure and good to drink, good to ride on, and good to bathe in; Beautiful parks, in which you will be welcome to enjoy yourselves, and you will find our people kind, generous and hospitable. I am not going to present you with the keys of the city—there is no key. Just walk in and enjoy yourselves and by so doing you will please us. Our latch string is always on the outside. We are glad to receive our friends and your friends from all over the state. I hope this Encampment will be the best your organization has ever had. Again, on behalf of the citizens of Port Huron I bid you welcome. (Applause)

Department Commander: I also have the pleasure of introducing Mr. Robert P. Anderson, representing the Chamber of Commerce.

Robert P. Anderson: Department Commander, Ladies and Gentlemen: The Chamber of Commerce of Port Huron were somewhat unfortunate today in not having one of their talkative members at hand to address you. Perhaps you will be glad to know that such is the case. They tell the story of a couple of gentlemen who were traveling through the country who stopped at a restaurant for refreshments. When they were seated at the table they were waited on by a chinaman. The meal was good and their hostess was a very charming American woman. After they had partaken of their refreshments they commented on the excellence of the meal to the lady, and expressed surprise that it had been prepared and served by a chinaman, and asked her how it was that so nice a woman had to rely on a chinaman. Why, she said, he is my husband. Your husband! how is it that a comely woman like you should be married to a chinaman. Why, she said, that's nothing, I have a sister who is married to a Scotchman. (Laughter)

I have had only about five minutes notice of my assignment to the pleasant task of welcoming you on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce. While you are in the city our building is at your service.

We have a city here which has great possibilities. It is so situated that its future growth and development is assured. While we are proud of our homes, of our schools, of our play grounds and our parks; yet we also are justly proud of our manufacturing industries and our commercial and industrial development. We extend to you a most hearty welcome and trust that your stay among us will be enjoyable to you and beneficial in every way. There was formerly on our streets the motto "You'll Like Port Huron," and I feel sure that when you go away you will endorse that motto and say we were justified in using it. Enjoy yourselves one and all and be sure that when you return, as undoubtedly you will, you will all be welcome to our city. I thank you. (Applause)

Department Commander: Mr. Mayor, and Mr. Anderson, in behalf of the Grand Army of the Republic I wish to convey to you the appreciation of our delegates of your kind words. You see before you today what remains of the Department of Michigan. When we met in your beautiful city eight years ago we were then greater in numbers and younger in years. Time must tell the tale and the time will come when the Grand Army of the Republic will be few in numbers.

The boys of 1861 to 1865 claim that we made the United States, to a great extent, the foremost nation in the world, because we saved the Union, undivided. While brother fought against brother and neighbor fought against neighbor in '61 to '65, at Appomatox under that great leader General Grant, when that unconditional surrender was made all those differences were laid aside.

As you well know, in 1898 when the call to arms came, the sons of the men who wore the blue and the sons of the men who wore the gray went side by side to carry forward the great principles for which the boys of '61, their fathers, fought for.

Again you have in your city here today another participant, under that starry flag of ours. It has grown wonderfully since '61. At that time we had 34 states, previous to the secession. Now we have the broad lands from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from the Gulf of Mexico to the Canadian border, with 48 states linked together, the greatest country that God permits his sun to shine upon; one in freedom, in unity and the reliever of distress.

Again I thank you, gentlemen of Port Huron, for your hearty and cordial welcome, in behalf of the Grand Army of the Republic. (Applause)

Now, comrades and ladies, Past Department Commander W. O. Lee has a word to say to you and to him we are responsible for being in the Tunnel City of today.

Past Department Commander Lee: I simply wish to make an announcement and that is that tonight in this hall will be the Childrens Camp Fire. It seems to have gone out that this Camp Fire was gotten up for some special organization. No organization has anything to do with regards to getting it up except the children and tonight we are going to put on this platform the most beautiful display of children's intelligence and of patriotism that has ever been conceived, not only in the city of Port Huron but in the State of Michigan. We extend a cordial invitation to be present.

Department Commander: Now, those who are not members of the Grand Army of the Republic will kindly retire and we will go on with our regular business.

Officer of the Day, this is a regular meeting of the Department of Michigan of the Grand Army of the Republic, are the approaches to this Encampment properly guarded?

Officer of the Day: They are. All present are entitled to remain.

Department Commander: We have with us reporters for the newspapers and if there is no objection they will be permitted to take notes of the encampment. I hear no objection and they will be permitted to enter.

Comrades, once more we have assembled for the transaction of such business as may properly come before this Encampment. We meet in fraternity, charity and loyalty. May all our hearts unite as one in sustaining the great principles of the Order. The Chaplain will invoke the Divine blessing.

Chaplain: Almighty and Blessed God, may we feel that Thou art very near to us as we meet together in this Encampment. It is very easy to go back in our minds to the days of long ago. It is proper that we rejoice in beholding a country that is large and prosperous and where everybody can worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience. For this we render Thee thanks and we devoutly pray that we who remain, we who still linger in the Grand Army of the Republic may know more fully and heartily today the significance of comradeship than we have ever known in our lives before.

Then as we look around and behold the fading away and the thinning of our ranks may we think of the significance and know by experience the joys of the comradeship in the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Oh, God, we thank Thee for the comforts we have and we devoutly pray that we may use them and that they may be used by the people who are permitted to enjoy them, in a proper way. We feel that they are in a sense the result of our activities in arms in the days of long ago.

Now, we earnestly pray Thy blessing to rest upon the homes that are lonely, upon the homes of those who sent their boys, the "Old Boys" to our Encampment last year, who cannot come this year. God bless those who sorrow. God bless us in our efforts to help them. And Lord bless every attempt made to comfort, relieve, sustain and cherish the old soldier in his last years.

We ask Thy blessing to rest upon the Soldiers Home; to rest upon our land, our country, and pray that Thou wilt direct the same patriotic spirit in our land that actuated us in the days of long ago. May that spirit obtain today and may our country be led out into glorious prosperity and be a blessing of the world and all the nations of the world. Hear us while we pray, and direct us in the proceedings of this Encampment and its deliberations in all we say and do. And Our Father, when our work on earth is ended and we are mustered out, may it be to be mustered into the glories of Your Kingdom above. We ask it in the name of Christ, our Redeemer. Amen.

Department Commander: Now, I declare the 42nd Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic open in due form. The Assistant Adjutant General will call the roll.

Department Commander: The rules governing the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will govern us unless there is objection. I hear no objection.

The Senior Vice Department Commander will please take the chair.

(Senior Vice Department Commander Keating presiding)

Department Commander Lamb then presented his address, as follows:

(Address read)

ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

Port Huron, June 9, 1920.

To the Department of Michigan Grand Army of the Republic.

My Dear Comrades:—Time in its ever onward flight has brought us together in this, our forty-second annual Encampment and it becomes my duty as well as pleasure to at this time give you an account of my stewardship as your Department Commander.

One year ago by your unanimous vote I was elected to care for the interests of this Department and I have at all times tried to carry out the trust which you imposed in me, and will at this time briefly take up the work for the year.

You all well know that the day has passed when we can look for additions to our ranks, but year by year the number is growing less, our advanced age and the feebleness of many of those who took part in the great struggle which we had is bound to reduce our ranks and it is a very sad thought, to me, at least, that in a few years the Grand Army of the Republic will only live in the memory of those we leave behind, and we shall have to hope that they will live up to the great ideals for which we fought, one country and one flag.

About all that can be done now is to encourage the Posts and in that way keep up an interest, many of our comrades are getting most too feeble to attend the meetings of their Post, for that reason many of the Posts hold their meetings in the afternoon in place of in the evening; I think this is a fine idea.

I have visited quite a number of the Posts and Corps and at all have had a cordial welcome. It does one good to look in the face and grasp the hand of a comrade. During the year I have traveled nearly three thousand five hundred miles in the interest of the order, this has been an expense of only \$78.14 to the Department, whatever more it has cost I have paid myself as I knew that the treasury of the Department was very low and I felt that it must be taken care of.

THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

Those of you who were at the National Encampment at Columbus, Ohio, know what a grand time we had there. The citizens of Columbus were ready to do everything possible to make our stay there enjoyable. Michigan was well represented, both in the Grand Army and all of the other organizations.

PENSIONS.

We surely should not forget the very liberal pension legislation which has been bestowed upon us by the Act of May 1st. I think that you will agree with me that we are greatly indebted to Congressman Fuller for the introduction of the bill as well as for the work he did to push the bill that it might

become a law. Our thanks are also due to our own Comrade Gardner and Comrade John McElroy for the part they took in this matter. This Act will be of very great assistance to many deserving comrades and also to the widows of those who have answered the last roll call.

Since last we met two of our comrades who have been very active in all of our work have passed to the great beyond. I refer to Past Commander Samuel J. Lawrence and Griffin Lewis, who has been our official bugler for many years. I hope that the Committee on Resolutions will take proper action in this matter.

THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

Too much praise cannot be given this band of noble women who are always loyal and working for the interests of the Grand Army at all times. I know that but for what they do many of the Posts would disband. But the Relief Corps steps in and encourages the comrades to go forward with the work for which we are organized. They also visit the schools and churches and have given many flags and in that way are teachers of patriotism at all times. I am of the opinion that many of the comrades are not giving this band of loyal hard working women the full measure of credit due them.

THE LADIES OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

This is another organization which though not as large in numbers as the W. R. C. are doing earnest noble work, ever working on the true and high ideals of loyalty and love for the flag.

THE SONS AND DAUGHTERS OF VETERANS.

These two societies are also right in line with the Grand Army and its allied organizations towards helping to keep the memories of their fathers and what they fought for, the true principals of freedom and love of country.

THE DAUGHTERS OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

These young and noble women have seemed to take up a somewhat different line of work from any of the other organizations, while not as many in number as some of the others they certainly deserve notice for what they are doing, especially among the children in teaching them to at all times respect and observe those great tenets for which we fought.

CASE OF URIAH H. LAZELL.

Now comrades it becomes my duty to make a report to you something that to me is a very unpleasant matter. I refer to the case of Comrade Uriah H. Lazell, late Assistant Quartermaster General. Comrade Lazell as you know was appointed to that office by Comrade Howard at Saginaw and at once took over the office of Assistant Quartermaster General for this Department. His books show the following transactions during the year from June 1918 to June 1919. viz.

The next week after the Encampment at Traverse City I went to Lansing to consult with Comrade Spaulding and also to see that the amount due the Department from Comrade Lazell was turned over to my Assistant Quartermaster General, Albert Dunham. We all met at the Department Headquarters and Comrade Lazell turned over \$4,200.00 which was the amount on deposit with the Standard Savings & Loan Association, of Detroit and a check for \$15.70 leaving a balance in his hands of \$279.39. When I asked him why he did not turn over the full amount he said that he did not have it, that there must be some mistake made by the Bank in which he had his deposit and that he would have it looked into. This he had done by a friend of his who got the same result as above given. I made two trips to Lansing to try and get this matter adjusted but could not get any further settlement from Lazell. I found that Comrade Lazell was bonded in the Aetna Casualty & Surety Company of Hartford, Connecticut, and I at once notified them of the defalcation by Comrade Lazell, they replied that they would look the matter up and report to me, but it was a long time before I received any word from them.

I called a meeting of the Council of Administration and we met at Columbus during the National Encampment. I was ordered to get a Certified Public Accountant to go over the books of the Assistant Adjutant General and the Assistant Quartermaster General and if he found that the accounts were correct and that Comrade Lazell was indebted to this Department, that I was to take the matter up again with the Bonding Company and if they refused to pay the amount due I was to commence suit against the said Bonding Company. I employed the Certified Public Accountant and after going over all books, receipts and vouchers he found that Comrade Lazell was indebted to this Department in the sum of \$279.39. I went to Lansing again January 27 and saw the Agent of the Bonding Company and they refused to settle, saying that they were not liable. I then commenced suit in the Wayne County Circuit Court for the amount due. The case came on for trial May 26th and lasted two and one-half days. The books, receipts and vouchers were introduced and agreed with the statement herein given, showing that Comrade Lazell owed this Department \$279.39. Notwithstanding this showing the Judge instructed the jury to render a verdict of "No cause of action," holding that the Bonding Company were not liable under the bond given. We have therefore lost not only the \$279.39 which was held by Comrade Lazell but also the cost of having the books audited and the cost of the suit. Right here allow me to say that we are greatly indebted to Mr. Arthur R. Hicks, of Detroit, who was our attorney, for he did not make any charge

for his services in the matter. I have submitted this matter to you and it is for this Department to say what further action they will take, if any, to recover the money due this Department as shown by the books of our late Assistant Quartermaster General.

All correspondence together with the finding of the Court are submitted herewith and will be referred to the committee on this address.

BONDING COMPANIES.

I deem it my duty at this time to call your attention to the Bonding Companies. We have for several years been buying a surety bond from the Aetna Casualty & Surety Company of Hartford, Conn. having confidence in them, supposing if for any reason the person they bonded failed to account for the fund of this Department they would be responsible for the amount of shortage, but we have now learned that they are willing to take our money in payment of the bond, but when a liability occurs they refuse to make good on the ground that their bond is not given for that purpose. So I say to each and all of you that if you have occasion to procure a surety bond be sure that it reads to cover defalcations or shortages of any kind on the part of the person so bonded.

I also at this time bring to your notice something which to me seems to be of very great importance to this Department, viz. the membership and financial condition.

In view of the above standing of the Department I wish to make the following recommendations.

First: That the offices of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster be consolidated.

Second: That the entire salary of the consolidated offices shall not exceed nine hundred dollars a year, this to include the compiling of the Journal and all other work pertaining to the offices.

Third: That the Department Commander shall not be allowed over one hundred dollars a year for traveling expenses.

I wish at this time to extend to Assistant Adjutant General Henry Spaulding and Assistant Quartermaster General Albert Dunham my sincere thanks for the very able manner in which they have conducted the affairs of their offices and I also wish to call your attention to the fact that Comrade Dunham has performed the duties of his office free of charge to the Department.

I also wish to thank the other members of my official family, they have all been willing to do what they could towards the best interests of this Department.

My comrades I wish to thank you one and all for the confidence you placed in me, one year ago and I hope that I have merited your expectations. I certainly am glad to meet so many of you here today in the Tunnel City and trust that you may all be spared to attend many more meetings of this Department. As you return to your homes with pleasant memories of this Encampment may it inspire you with renewed devotion to the great principles which we all stand and work for. There never was a time in the existence of the United States when it needed the true principles of patriotism taught more than it does at this time.

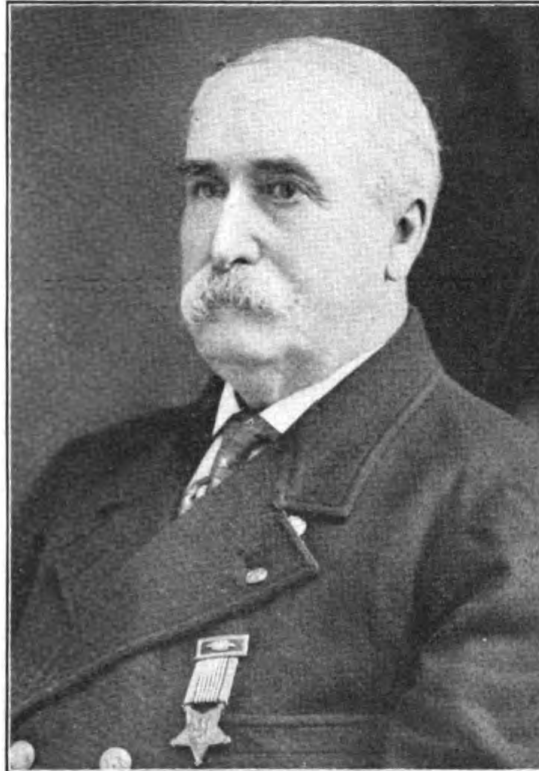

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Comrades of G. A. R. Department of Michigan.

A celebrated divine said, "The world is my parish." In some sense the Department of Michigan G. A. R. is the parish of the Department Chaplain, and this is the time and place for his report as to what he knows of matters in his line of work throughout the department, and to make suggestions "for the good of the order," as well as to report tabulations of Post Chaplains. It will not surprise you when I report that no marked increase has occurred in our numbers, and that a marked decrease shows up very clearly. Really we are waning, but for all that the grip of an old Comrade was never quite so hearty as now, nor has ever the letters G. A. R. shone as brightly as now. G. A. R. somehow warms and inspires, while H. C. of L. depresses. Really comradeship never was so fully known as by the civil war veterans, and never was so full of significance as it is now. Comradeship, is a ship with a history, and seems now between two other ships, namely, citizenship, and christian fellowship. Many Comrades have been mustered out, finally, and many knew of changes—promotion from citizenship and comradeship into christian fellowship. It's a privilege. The Chaplain says, come, Christ says "Come and we all want to hear, "come ye blessed," at last.

Just now, the Legion is "dressing on the center" and we are naturally holding an honorable place in the background, but much interested.

Our report is not all in. Indeed, only a small per cent. have reported, and so the real status of the Department cannot be seen by the reports. We comrades, in a general way, are modestly resting by the side of the road, while the World's war veterans pass along. In a recent address by Corporal Tanner,—which it was my privilege to hear,—this pathetic remark was often made, "what there is left of us." But "what there is left of us" have great joy in seeing a saved great country. But here is the numerical report:

The reports are not complete, as many have not reported; 58 only reported.

850 attended sabbath memorial services.

1,264 attended memorial day services.

217 cemeteries were decorated and

11,543 graves—about enough for six regiments—were decorated.

9,531 children assisted at these services.

It is, we believe, worth while to ask at our Post and Corps meetings, if at times a meeting of a public nature may not be held at which a chaplain may preach or lecture to G. A. R. and allied societies, and at which meetings the public may be invited. This is suggested by one of our excellent ladies, Mrs. Morey, of Wellsville, Lenawee County, to give out flowers to living old veterans, on Memorial day as well as placing flowers on comrades graves. We commend this.

Comrade Janes: I have no report to weary you with. As Judge Advocate of this Department I did not have a thing referred to me for decision and

hence I have not had any decisions to make and my report is that the Department seems to be in harmonious fellowship and comradeship and in good condition. We are to be congratulated that we old fellows have got down to where we enjoy real comradeship and companionship in our days. That is all the report I have to make.

Assistant Adjutant General: It always pleases me to hear Comrade Janes talk to the boys. It used to do me good about the 4th of March, June, September and December to get a little slip of paper with his name attached to it, to give me a little something to live on. I move that the verbal report of the Judge Advocate be accepted and adopted without reference.

The motion being supported was adopted unanimously.

Department Commander: Now listen to the report of the Chief Mustering Officer.

Comrade Seel: Your Chief Mustering Officer is in the same condition as some of these other comrades who did not have anything to do. There was just one little matter that was referred to me by our Assistant Adjutant General and that was the matter of a difference between the Commander of Kilpatrick Post No. 39, and the Quartermaster General, and the Assistant Adjutant General asked me to go up there and see if I could get that straightened out. I did so and got the matter straightened out and at the same time that I was up there they asked me to install the newly elected officers which I did.

That is my report. And Department Commander and Comrade Spaulding I want to thank you for thus appointing me to that office. It is certainly an honor to be appointed to that office. It is certainly an honor to be appointed or elected to any office in this Grand Army of the Republic. I thank you.

Department Commander: If there is no objection the report will be received and spread upon the minutes. Hearing no objection it is so received.

We will now listen to the report of Comrade Gilbert, Patriotic Instructor.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR'S REPORT.

Bay City, Mich., June 9, 1920.

Commander and Comrades of the Department of Michigan G. A. R.:

I assure you it is a great pleasure to meet you this lovely day in this beautiful city Port Huron where we are being so nicely entertained by its loyal citizens.

I have received only twenty-one reports from Post Patriotic Instructors in this department.

16 reports show we have in their jurisdiction 433 public schools.

3 reports show they presented 29 flags to school societies and churches.

1 report shows they presented 500 flags to school children.

6 reports show they expended \$660.00 for Decoration and Memorial exercises.

14 reports do not show any expenditures.

20 reports do not shown any flags given to children.

As near as I can get to positive figures we have about 9,000 public school buildings in this Department of Michigan.

90,153 children attending public schools.

497 parochial schools.

74,284 children attending said schools.

Trusting you will overlook my inefficiency in this line of work and forgive me for not making a more complete and intelligent report.

Assistant Adjutant General: I move that the report be received and adopted as read, without reference.

The motion being supported was adopted unanimously.

A Comrade: The City of Detroit has been liberal with us this year, they gave us \$800.00 for the purpose of using it for Memorial Day. We have over 3,000 graves spread over a distance of 15 miles. We go out Woodward Avenue, Grand River, Fort street and even out into the King's Dominions and decorate some of the graves over there and every year there is more work to do. The City of Detroit is always ready to help us. We have, I think it is, 28 societies joined in a joint Memorial Committee doing this work. The women take care of decorating the graves and the school children, as a rule, furnish the flowers. I am glad to hear this report it is very gratifying to me I assure you.

Comrade Rabb: I want to go the Comrade one better. The City of Flint appropriated this present year \$600.00 for us to use for Memorial purposes. That is better than Detroit. Detroit has 1,000,000 population, we have 100,000. We have adopted this system in our city. The outlying cemeteries are 6 and 8 miles away; we have turned those over to the Sabbath schools of the nearest churches. Our very efficient chairman of the Cemetery Committee has made those arrangements, and the Catholic Cemetery has been taken care of by the Catholic church. I merely want to say this, Commander, to inform you that Detroit is not the only city in Michigan which takes care of the decorations.

Comrade Parker: We have a little suburb of Detroit which is a good deal smaller than Flint which can discount both Flint and Detroit, and that is the little village of Royal Oak, with less than 6,000 inhabitants and ten miles from Detroit. It appropriated \$500.00 for that purpose. But I did not rise to brag but there is one suggestion I want to make which we carry out at Royal Oak. You all know it is part of our ritual that a mound be prepared as representing the unknown graves of those who fell or died during the war of the Rebellion. Now, in Royal Oak we take pains to ascertain whose graves that mound represented and I gave an address giving the names—and I knew everyone of them by the way before they were called to the army, and I gave a history so far as I could give it of each one of those soldiers whose graves were unknown. Now, I beg of you and I wish all of you so far as it is possible to do it would collect those names and prepare records of them and have them read Decoration Day and everytime the ceremony takes place to give a description and if possible finally memorize those names upon a tablet to be erected by the citizens or by subscription of the children who take part in those ceremonies.

Comrade Stevens: I am very glad I do not live in Detroit, Flint or Royal Oak, but I am glad I live in a little town of less than 2,500 in Lenawee county, Tecumseh. The Board of Supervisors on Decoration Day appropriated for the Grand Army use to buy floral tributes for the soldiers buried, \$75. The corporation authorities gave us \$50. Now, you can compute whether that is in accordance with Detroit's proportion or Flint's proportion or Royal

Oak's proportion. The man who stands on the floor the last time has got the best chance.

Comrade Gilbert: After hearing my report read and then listening to the remarks of these comrades you must think I am seriously affected with inefficiency. I want to say to you I make my reports from the reports I receive from the Posts and the Post Patriotic Instructors. I was not notified by report or otherwise of the receipt of any money in Detroit, Flint, Royal Oak or others, therefore it is not my fault that it was not in the report.

Comrade Brown, Sanborn Post: If you have all got through bragging, I want to call your attention to the fact that in Port Huron, we decorated seven cemeteries and it costs no one except the women of the Relief Corps and the Grand Army of the Republic a cent.

Comrade Chase: We have a little post in Belding numbering 35. The greatest number we have ever had in any one year since our organization was 55. For years we decorated the graves in 15 different cemeteries; two of them have been taken care of by another town and we now decorate the graves in 11 different cemeteries, having over 200 graves to be taken care of. On Decoration Day, our committees accompanied by the Women's Relief Corps Camp of the Sons of Veterans, and Daughters of Veterans and American Legion decorated the graves according to the ritual in four different cemeteries. And I want to say that Belding is the smallest city in the State of Michigan that has the whole five organizations.

Comrade Parker: A word of explanation. Royal Oak has no Post at all. There are six or seven old soldiers of the war of '61 to '65 in that town, but we have a Memorial Society that has been organized by myself and a few others and that Memorial Society has until this year taken over the decoration of all the graves in the cemeteries in that township and they are quite numerous. This year we turned over the Catholic exercises so far as they were able to do it, aside from our ritual exercises to the American Legion and they did splendidly. In places where there are no Posts I would urge that Memorial societies be formed, if possible. Consider that and think it over and take it back home with you and see if anything of that kind can be done.

Comrade Chase: I would like to know who has told the best story.

Comrade Keating: I hope those comrades who are so energetic and ambitious and full of enthusiasm about what their little villages have done on Memorial Day, will go home and use some of that energy instructing the posts at home to report to the Department Patriotic Instructor along these lines.

Chaplain Palmer: I hope that those who have spoken so eloquently on this subject will when they go home remind others that it would be a very proper thing to report to the Department Chaplain about how they are doing, so he can make an intelligent report when he comes next time.

Comrade Petit: There has always been a question with our comrades about who was going to take care of Memorial Day. We find that our Comrades from Royal Oak have got that started and I hope it will be kept up. I move you, comrades, that the decision be given to Royal Oak.

Department Commander: Now, I wish to make an announcement at this time. Immediately after adjournment there will be several automobiles to take us for a ride. I want you all to enjoy that ride and show our appreciation of our welcome here by patronizing the automobiles, which they so kindly furnish.

I also wish to announce that tomorrow morning before we go on the parade,

which is at ten o'clock, under our Chief of Staff, Major Chase, I want you to be there promptly not later than twenty minutes before ten because there is a photographer who is going to take our pictures.

Now, don't forget the Camp Fire. Tomorrow our Commander in Chief will be here arriving at 12,45 and I will appoint a committee to take care of him while he is in the city. I will appoint as such committee, Past Commander in Chief Washington Gardner and Past Department Commander Louis Kanitz.

You will now listen to the report of the Committee on the Soldiers Home. (Report read)

REPORT OF SOLDIERS HOME COMMITTEE.

To Edwin F. Lamb, Department Commander of Michigan, G. A. R.

Dear Comrade:—Your Committee appointed to visit the Soldiers Home submit the following report:

The chairman called the Meeting for April 7th 1920, Comrades Cannon and Spaulding were present, Comrade Kanitz not being in the State, Department Commander Lamb also met with the Committee, and appointed Comrade E. B. Fenton who was present to take the place of Comrade Kanitz on the committee.

The Committee reported to the Commandant Col. McGurrin the object of their visit, he received us very cordially and volunteered to escort us through the buildings and grounds, which we accepted, and we have only words of praise for the condition in which we found everything both inside and out, great credit is due the management, and the members seem to appreciate what is being done for them, many have a better home than ever before.

Dr. Grube the Surgeon in charge escorted us through the Hospital and we found things in a clean and sanitary condition, and that all could be done to relieve the sick and distressed, but to get a good idea of what the Comrades are receiving and the treatment tendered them you must see it to know it, we have nothing but praise to find on any point in the institution.

The Board of Managers showed us Courtesies in a way that we appreciated and we do say we do not believe there is an institution in the State conducted as well in every way as is the Michigan Soldiers Home.

THE WOMEN'S BUILDING.

Through the kindness of Jennie L. Pond the Matron of the Annex, we were shown through the building, we have this to say it seemed as if there was a place for every thing and every thing was in its place, the painters were at work in some parts of the building which made some muss, aside from that every thing was neat and Sanitary, and not a member seemed dissatisfied in the least all stand by the Matron and strong at that. There was in the building 107, in hospital 90, out on furlough 71, total 268, the average age is above 75 years, and they seem to be a happy family, and we cannot help saying that great credit is due to the Matron Jennie L. Pond, for the management of affairs in the Annex.

Department Commander: Now, I think the Assistant Adjutant General has an announcement to make.

Assistant Adjutant General: I announce the following Committees to visit and extend greetings of the Grand Army of the Republic to the other organizations.

To the Auxiliary to the Spanish War Veterans: Henry Spaulding, Post 20, E. C. Anthony, Post 300, Thomas B. Fouch, Post 145.

George H. Keating, Post 67, William O. Lee, Post 98.

Comrade Gilbert: I move you that we adjourn until tomorrow afternoon at 1.30.

The motion prevailed.

SECOND DAY.

Thursday, June 10, 1920.

Department Commander: Comrades you will please come to order. This is an adjourned meeting of the 42nd Annual Encampment of the Department of Michigan. The Chaplain will invoke the Divine blessing.

Chaplain: Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, come very near us, we beseech Thee as we meet together to transact our business pertaining to our organization. In all that we do may we feel and know that Thou art near us and present with us now as Thou were in the days of trial long ago. God be with us now in the days of thoughtfulness and of prosperity. Bless us and bless our deliberations today. Guide us all the way through and may we all muster in at the coming of Thy dear Son on High at last, for Christ's sake. Amen.

Department Commander: Officer of the day. Are there any comrades present or others who should not remain.

Officer of the Day: All present are entitled to remain.

Department Commander: There is a Committee from the Spanish War Veterans at the door. If there is no objection they will be admitted. I will appoint Comrades Past Commander Cannon and Comrade Bryant to escort them to the platform.

The Committee retired and escorted the visiting committee to the platform where they were received by the delegate rising and saluting.

Department Commander: Comrades, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you Comrade Ravens who brings greetings from those who picked up the flag after we had hung it up and showed to the Spanish and to the American people that the United States was still alive and ready to do business. (Applause)

Charles E. Ravens: Comrades, and comrades is a word applied only to soldiers, not only to the soldiers of the olden days but also to the soldiers of the recent war. When your war of '61 to '65 was finished there was little thought of us ever having another war in this country. Our army consisted of about 25,000 men; just a handful. Naturally the United States was always ready to tackle anything that came along. Spain, of course, was a very small country to interfere with at that time, especially such a great, big giant of a country as we were. The peaceful conditions in this country did not warrant a great big army at that time so Spain got a little bit fresh, like other countries have done to their sorrow. They blew up the "Maine," and that became then the watchword "Remember the Maine." You all know how well it was remembered. It did not take very long. Our war was just a pink tea affair compared with what you comrades have gone through. There was no comparison. But when the boys went away in 1898 they did not realize what war was, but when we got back and remembering what we had gone through and had seen in our short war, we can surely say with Sherman "War is Hell."

We thoroughly appreciate the honor of being permitted to co-operate with you in all these Encampments. Nothing gives us more pleasure and we sincerely hope and trust that as long as we are still on earth we will be with you it does not seem that there is such a great difference between our ages, but still, one of these days we will be like you are and as your ranks diminish considerably faster than ours, we will stand ready to take up the burden when the time comes. You have established Memorial day and we will keep it up and it is going to be our Memorial day as well as yours. When the day shall come we cannot escort the G. A. R. on Memorial Day it will be a sad day for us. I thank you.

Commander Lamb: There is another Comrade here, Comrade Duff.

Dr. William J. Duff: Comrades, I am a son of a veteran and of a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. My father, Lieutenant George Duff was always a constant and a good man.

We extend to you the felicitations of the citizens of Port Huron to you. As stated by my comrade, it will be a sad day when we cannot turn out together on Memorial Day but at that time, those who are left alive will remember that you made it the day it is and not only we, but our sons will congregate and place flags on the graves of those immortal heroes. You had a hard road to go, we know that. I am old enough to know what you have gone through. I can remember on the 16th day of August, 1861 when I was a little Tad watching my father saying good-bye to us and having him kiss me and saying good-bye. When he went into the service we never saw him again until he came home an invalid on account of his wound. My mother was a yankee of yankees. I will never forget when he came home that night from his work and said "Kit, I have enlisted." Why, she jumped up and threw her arms around his neck and said "Now, George Duff I love you more than ever." That is the kind of stuff the boys of '61 were made of and their wives were of that self same breed. I have always flattered myself I come from a good stock. I was afraid I would never have an opportunity to pay for my birth-right but the time came in 1898 and I took advantage

of it. I have a boy coming along; he looks at his grandfather's sword and at his father's bayonet and he will be ready to carry one or the other when occasion demands it.

I hope you will be long spared to us. There is nothing handsomer in this world than that old uniform of blue you wore. It is always an emblem of something that will stand permanently in history, equal rights and freedom to all. I thank you.

Department Commander: We want to present you with a badge, and we ask you to carry back to your department the kindly wishes and best regards of the "old boys" of the Grand Army of the Republic. They made it possible that you might live in an undivided country; one country and one flag.

Dr. Duff: And one language.

(Committee retired)

Officer of the Day: Department Commander, a delegation from the Women's Relief Corps is in waiting.

Department Commander: We will appoint Comrades Janes, Ives and Strong as a committee to conduct them to the platform.

Comrade Janes: Department Commander, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you the President of the Woman's Relief Corps and her associates how have come to pay their respects to the Grand Army of the Republic on which they are the Auxiliary.

Department Commander: Comrades, salute. Now, I told you to get down here in front where you could hear and I know that this band of co-workers with us have brought us a cheerful word and it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you my associate for the year, Mrs. Rheinfrank, Department President of that noble band of the Woman's Relief Corps. (Applause)

Mrs. Rheinfrank: Department Commander Lamb and Comrades. This is the first time I have ever had the honor and pleasure of bringing greetings to the Grand Army of the Republic. I certainly could ask for nothing greater and will you believe me when I tell you that I believe I am prouder this moment than I was when I was elected and installed Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps. The Woman's Relief Corps is second only to the Grand Army of the Republic and yet I feel because of the fact that I come here to bring you the greetings of your auxiliary it is still a prouder moment. I want to assure you that never did a president have a better Commander than the Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, this year. Never once did Commander Lamb fail me. Sometimes I have called on him when the circumstances were not all pleasure, but he has been right there, always ready with every assistance and with his wise counsel. I can never express what he has meant to me during this last year.

Now, I just bring Commander Lamb a slight report of the Department President's work and bring it to the Grand Army:

Department Commander: Now, it also gives me pleasure to introduce to you one who perhaps needs no introduction, Mrs. Violet Fraser, past department president.

Mrs. Fraser: It is said there is no tie so sacred, so sincere as that which binds all the hearts of the Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic together. We are proud to know that we are your auxiliary; faithful and true have we been to you, and loyal have you been to us. We have tried to be all that the word "auxiliary" means and that is a helper. We have stood by your side for 37 years and Oh! what a pleasure it has been to work with you and for you.

Commander, flowers are the blessing of God and typical of his love. They are typical of ours, and with them goes the assurance that the Woman's Relief Corps will stand faithfully by you always and when the last one of you shall have gone away we shall see that you memory is kept sacred. I thank you. (Applause)

Department Commander: We have a lot of talent here this afternoon and it gives me pleasure to introduce to you Mrs. Kate M. Radner, Past Department President.

Mrs. Radner: Once before I stood before our "Boys" and the Commander was unacquainted with Kate M. Rzdnell, and I think he mumbled over the introduction very much as the Commander has today but I am happy to say that I know many of you. I know the record of the Grand Army and I certainly appreciate all that the Grand Army has done for us and what it means in the past and the intermediate to this day. The present granduer and greatness of the United States is attributed to your work in '61 to '65.

It is a pleasure to look into your faces, and although we miss many we used to see, yet their memory is ever with us. Thirty-three years is quite a record for attending conventions and that record has been mine. I attended the

second convention of the Woman's Relief Corps in Michigan and I have been in attendance many times since so I am very happy to look into your faces. While you have grown in years I hope and pray that the shadow that may be made by your passing from us may never be less but only grow brighter and stronger. I thank you. (Applause)

Department Commander: Comrades it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you Mrs. Emma A. Bailey, Past Department President.

Mrs. Bailey: It certainly gives me great pleasure to come here once more and greet you. It is always a pleasure for me. I cannot get up and talk like some of the rest of these ladies. I was known as a worker but not as an eloquent speaker when I was in the work. I am very glad to come here today to this Encampment as Department Commander Lamb belongs to us. I have had the pleasure of working with him in a great many ways and he is a man who is not afraid to ask you for what he wants and every once in a while when he would remember of something I had been doing or had not done he would say "Well, when are you going to get my flag; I have asked you for a flag two or three times. I have got the money to pay for that flag, why don't you get it for me." Finally I said "If you will keep quiet and let me alone I will give you a flag some of these days when you are not looking for it." So Commander, I present you with this flag. (Applause)

Department Commander: These boys all love the flag but there are none of them love it better than I.

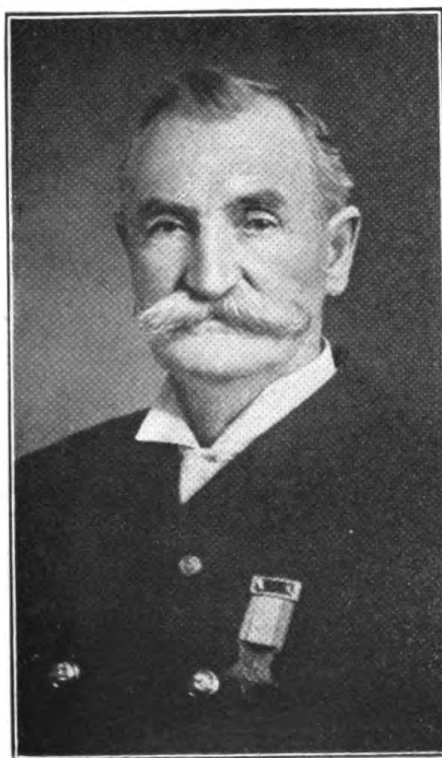
Mrs. Bailey: Nor I.

So I have been following Daddy around to all the conventions and encampments ever since and I have tried my best to look after him in a proper manner and I think that you will all agree with me that he has done remarkably well this last year. (Laughter and applause) It was impossible for his son to be with him at this time so I came along as a substitute. The Doctor never gets a chance to talk at home so I have to do all the talking and it gives me great pleasure to present not only to our Commander but to the Grand Army of the Republic these flowers from the son and daughter of the Commander (Applause)

Department Commander: I wish I had words to express my thanks to the Woman's Relief Corps for the great work that they have done and are still doing. I dare say many of you do not know or realize how many sleepless nights, how many weary days they have worked to relieve distress,

visit the sick and bury the dead. Never is a comrade laid out in the City of Detroit but a flag, similar to this that has been given to me today, is placed upon his breast by some of the noble women of this organization. It is a great work they are doing and may God spare them for many years and may they perpetuate and keep alive the great principles for which we fought, fraternity, charity and loyalty. Fraternity to all mankind, charity to all and above all loyalty to the flag and to the United States of America. (Applause)

Comrade Petit: I move you as an expression of our appreciation of the work of the W. R. C. we give them a rising vote of thanks and three cheers for the ladies.

Department Commander: Comrades, you have heard the motion. All in favor of the motion will please rise.

Motion carried unanimously, and three cheers given with a will.

Officer of the Day: There is a Committee in waiting from the Sons of Veterans.

Department Commander: I will appoint Comrades Lee, Stevens and Davidson as a committee to escort the boys to the platform.

Delegation escorted to platform.

Department Commander: These are our successors in office, the Sons of Veterans of this state. I have pleasure in presenting to you Mr. Hartzog.

Mr. Hartzog: We are not intending to do a great deal of speaking; we are going to make it very short today as we have a lot of business and we know you are in like circumstances. I have been the official speaker, you all know, for five or six years in succession so you all know my voice and my face. It seems to me gentlemen as I look into your faces and listen to the speeches made a while ago, it seems to me I am more impressed than ever before in my life with the wonderfulness of this body. The western hemisphere has never seen and will never see again such a body of men as were the defenders of our nation. It certainly gives me great pleasure to bring the greetings of the Sons of Veterans of Michigan and tell you that we are once more wheeled about on the upward way. We have been having a pretty hard time. It has been my pleasure to visit all the camps of the state except four, and the secretary visited those four and they are receiving members now and during the past 6 months have received more than at any time in the four year and it now looks better and the light is breaking. It is with great pleasure I report this to you. (Applause)

Department Commander: Now, we have Comrade Henderson of this department. We would like to hear from him.

Comrade Henderson: I was with Brother Hartzog at Traverse City when we met a year ago. He has done good work during the past year and he has presented you with our greetings and that is sufficient for me to say.

Department Commander: Now, comrades, we are going to hear from a Buckeye, Comrade Youngman, Past Division Commander of Ohio. (Applause.)

Mr. Youngman: Well, Boys, I didn't expect to come here and talk to you but I want to tell you that the Buckeye State is still on the move. They are just as good as you are here in Michigan in looking after the interests of the organization and upholding the principles of this great nation. Now, I feel highly honored because this is the first time, as a Son of a Veteran I have appeared before a body of the bravest men that ever marched beneath one flag. (Applause)

Department Commander: Comrades I am going to vacate the chair a few minutes in favor of my Senior Vice Commander.

(Senior Vice Commander Keating presiding)

Officer of the Day: Commander, there is a committee in waiting from the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Senior Vice Commander: They will be escorted to the platform, Comrade Lee will look after them.

The Committee was then escorted to the platform.

Senior Vice Commander: It gives me great pleasure to introduce to you Mrs. Comerford, Past Department Commander of the Ladies of the Grand Army.

Mrs. Comerford: Commander, Officers and Comrades, it gives me pleasure to bring to you the greetings of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, the mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of your Comrades. We wish you a very happy and prosperous convention and hope that you may all be here with us another year. I thank you.

Senior Vice Commander: I now have the pleasure of introducing to you Mrs. Sauer:

Mrs. Sauer: I am a little bit more frightened this time than I was the first speech I ever made. The wife of one of the members of our Post died and I was asked if I would go security for the funeral and I told him I would. I was chairman of the relief, and when the time came for me to turn my books in the bill was not paid and I went to the Quartermaster and I asked the Quartermaster if he would sanction that bill. I put a little slip in, there was \$14.00 and \$10.00 and the old gentleman had promised he would pay when he got his next pension payment. When the time came I went to this Quartermaster and I said I wonder if the Post would give me a little money on that, I begged half of it. He said that is all right you come down in about fifteen minutes and we will open the meeting and I will call you in. I said I never spoke before a lot of men. Well, he said if you don't want to go alone my wife will go with you. His wife was a very quiet woman and she wouldn't talk loud for fear of making a noise but I thought she was better than nothing and I wanted that seven dollars and when the time came I walked up to the comrade and I saw that he kept looking back and there were two men followed us with guns. The other lady knew all about it but I didn't and I kept watching those men with the guns, and that took all the vim out of me and I didn't know whether I could talk or not. Finally I asked for that money. He said we will take action when you retire and it didn't take me long to retire. And then they sent me a bill of the \$14.00 and I begged seven and I found I had three more to beg and the man could have his ten dollars for pension and he got it but two months after that I went into our Congressman's office, he was doing a little pension work and he said, "Did you see that account in the paper about the old veteran marrying a young woman." I said "Yes I did, but," I said "I ain't going to promise to bury that wife, I buried the other one but it was too hard work."

(Laughter and applause)

Mrs. Goodrich: Civil War Veterans, I consider it an honor to address you and I have a message for you. I do not think any one in the world could be prouder of you than I was this morning when you boys marched down the street and proclaimed to all who saw you were still the staunch supporters of that flag for which you fought, that emblem of liberty, the flag of the free. May it float over you always and be with you at the last. (Applause)

Upon motion a rising vote was tendered the committee from the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Comrade Lee: Commander, I have great pleasure in introducing to you the National President of the Daughters of Veterans, Miss Yingling of Cleveland, Ohio.

Senior Vice Commander: It gives me pleasure to greet you and present you to my Comrades. Comrades, permit me to present to you Miss Yingling, National President of the Daughters of Veterans. Also Miss Florence Dickerson, Past Department President.

Miss Yingling: I am more than pleased to accompany Miss Florence Dickerson, Past Department President of Michigan, and bring to you the greetings not only from the Department of Michigan but from the Daughters of Veterans from all of the States. From the dear Union that you boys have saved. Comrades, as your daughters, and as your children we honor you and revere you and it shall always be our aim to perpetuate your memory. There is only one Grand Army of the Republic, and that is our daddies. And so Comrades as I am passing from one state to the other I bring to you this message Give us your girls, give us your daughters and your grand daughters and your great grand daughters, urge them to join our orders while you are with us for in that way we shall have a living monument of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Now, I know you are very busy in your meeting and you have had many others here so I am not going to take up any more of your time but just extend to you the loving greetings from the daughters of Veterans and may you be long spared to us. I thank you. But before retiring, however, I wish to present you as a greeting from the Michigan Department these flowers. Again I thank you.

Miss Dickerson: Comrades, it is with pleasure I come this afternoon with our National President and as the time is getting late and not being a speaker I will say but little. I have visited the Grand Army at your conventions a great many times and been on Committees from the Relief Corps and from the Daughters and I can see that the ranks are growing thinner. There was a time when every seat on this lower floor would be filled with delegates and I am glad and proud to be able to help to perpetuate the honor of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Committee retire.

Comrade Lee: Commander, I wish to present to you a delegation from the Ladies of the Spanish War Auxiliary, Mrs. Percival, Mrs. Nash and Mrs. Fisher.

Senior Vice Commander: Comrades it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you the Ladies Auxiliary of the Spanish War Veterans, Mrs. Percival, Mrs. Nash and Mrs. Fisher.

Mrs. Percival: When I arrived back from my lunch at noon the first thing that greeted me when I opened the door was the announcement that I had been delegated to carry greetings to the G. A. R. and I will assure you that my heart swelled with pride because of the fact that you are all very dear to me. We, as an organization, in Detroit have made the G. A. R. honorary members of our Order and I am proud and glad to see them in our club room. I would like to present this little badge to your Commander. I thank you for your welcome and assure you we bring to you the love and esteem of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Spanish War Veterans (Applause)

Mrs. Nash: I was also delegated as one to come with greetings here this

afternoon. I met you in Traverse City last year and I am pleased to meet you here today. (Applause)

Senior Vice Commander: Ladies, we are delighted to have you with us and we extend to you a cordial invitation to call again.

Ladies retire.

Senior Vice Commander: Are there any committees ready to report?

Comrade Richardson: The Committee on the report of the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General is ready to report. The chairman is absent but as second on the Committee I am to make the report.

We report that we have the same under consideration and wish to make a verbal report that we have found that everything is all correct.

I move the adoption of the report.

The question being taken the report was adopted.

Senior Vice Commander: Is there any other business to come before this body this afternoon?

Comrade Strong, Post 79: I understand that the laws of the Department make no provision for the Department Commander's expenses during the past year. He has, however, had his expenses paid to him and I now move that this encampment endorse those expenses, \$100.00 or slightly less so that it can be squared up on the books.

Comrade Gilbert, Post 67: I support the motion.

Senior Vice Commander: You have heard the motion relative to the expenses of the Department Commander. Are you ready for the question?

Comrade Janes: If you will refer back to two years ago the Council of Administration are authorized to pay the Department Commander's expenses to a sum not to exceed \$150.00. I was on that Committee as well as others and we threshed that out and it was authorized up to that amount so I do not think that this motion is necessary at this time. It was settled two years ago.

Senior Vice Commander: That matter was settled two years ago. There is no further question about that, Comrades.

Officer of the Day: While waiting for the National Commander, would it not be a good idea to have an intermission. The boys are a little restless.

Senior Vice Commander: If there is no objection I will declare a recess of ten minutes.

Comrade Jennings: Before taking a recess I have a matter I would like to present to the Comrades.

Senior Vice Commander: All right, proceed.

Comrade Jennings: I hold in my hands two telegrams that I received from Flint since I arrived in Port Huron. One of them reads like this: "E. A. Jennings, Hotel Harrington, Port Huron Michigan. The City of Flint cordially invites the Grand Army Encampment to hold their next convention in our city. Will do everything possible to make your stay pleasant. (Signed) E. W. Atwood, Mayor." The other one is from the Board of Commerce. "Flint, the wonder city of America invites the Grand Army Encampment to hold their 1921 meeting in our city. You will not only have a pleasant three days conference but an unusually interesting experience. Flint never fails to do things properly. We invite your convention to our city and expect to have you come."

I wish to say to you, in addition to this, Crapo Post heartily joins in this invitation. If you come to Flint you will come to one of the most progressive cities in the country. You will come to a city filled with the most hospitable

people on earth and you will come to a city where we can line up one thousand automobiles in an hour's notice, that have never been used in any parade. There are many other reasons why we want you next year. It will be the 25th anniversary of the time we had it before. It will have been a quarter of a century since you were last with us. At that time we had about 12,000 people; next year we will have at least 125,000 people.

I say to you on behalf of the people of Flint and on behalf of Crapo Post, we want you to come and visit us next year. If you do we will show you what we can do for you. (Applause)

(Department Commander Lamb, presiding)

Department Commander: The communications will be received and we will take the matter up tomorrow morning. What is your further pleasure?

Officer of the Day: The Commander in Chief is in waiting.

(Commander-in-Chief Hall entered, escorted by Past Commander Washington Gardner, and Past Department Commander Kanitz)

Department Commander: I am glad to welcome you to "Michigan, MY Michigan." Comrades, salute your Commander-in-Chief Daniel M. Hall.

Commander-in-Chief Hall: Department Commander and Past Commander-in-Chief Gardner and Comrades of the Grand Army, they say it is better late than never. I am mighty late in getting here I know, but I came on a train that got in Detroit four hours late—if it had been any more I would have said so. I got breakfast at half past ten so you see I am not to blame for being late. When you have two encampments four hundred miles apart, holding meetings at the same time, it is pretty hard to make both of them.

I am glad to be with you, Comrades. I am just going to extend to you my greetings and the greetings of one hundred thousand Grand Army men I have visited since I started out and then I will give you a more extended talk tonight I am just going to give you a little plain talk and tell you what I have done and where I have been and the condition of the Grand Army in the country and what kind of rates we have got for the next encampment. I guess I will tell you that now. Before the roads were taken over by the owners, while visiting the Railroad Administration, I could get nothing out of them. They said they were on their death bed, and may be it was just as well they were. Then I took up the question of rates with the President of the Passenger Association about ten days ago, I got word from Mr. C. M. Board of New York City, Chairman of the Trunk lines in reference to the matter. He has been arguing all the while that the roads could not afford it. Well, I told them if they could afford to give the Confederate Veterans, who tried to destroy the country, a rate of a cent a mile, which they had just done, they certainly should be able to give the same rate to the men who saved the nation. They couldn't get around that argument and he came back with the answer he would give us the one cent a mile rate for the actual miles travelled. Now, I have given them my word that this privilege will not be abused. It has been reported to the railroads that it was abused last year, not by you, but more especially by people in the Pacific coast states. Now, when they use the words "members of the family" that means those of your immediate family that are living in the same house under the same roof. I had Comrades come to see me last fall and say they wanted a certificate for a daughter. I said to one Comrade, your daughter lives here in Columbus, you do not have to travel. Oh, he said, she lives in the northwest and I want to send it to her. I said, no, she has left your place

and she is married and while she is your daughter she is not a member of your family now. I wouldn't do it.

Now, Comrades, there is no audience in the world I like to meet so well as my Comrades. The best part of the Encampment and the best part of the reunions is looking the Comrades in the face and shaking them by the hands and before I leave this city I want to shake the hand of every one of you. I will talk to you again later. I agreed to visit the Ladies organizations this afternoon and so I am only going to stay here a few minutes and I hope you will excuse me for the present. (Applause)

Comrade Rabb: Unless there is other business before the encampment why not call the roll of districts and distribute the blanks for the district caucus.

Department Commander: That is just what I want to do, if I can find the blanks here.

Comrade Janes: It seems to me, Commander, unless there are other invitations coming in for a place to hold our next encampment we might as well finish that this afternoon and not put everything off until tomorrow when we have got the election of officers and reports of committees and all those things that will keep you busy.

Senior Vice Commander Keating presented the invitation of Bay City.

Comrade Chase: I understand that Grand Rapids is very anxious to have us come there next year and their invitation will be here tomorrow..

Department Commander: Now, I am going to call the roll by districts and give out a certificate here. It is for each district to elect a delegate and an alternate to go to Atlantic City I have just one favor to ask of you, in behalf of my successor in office, and that is, do not elect anybody that will not go to Atlantic City. Now, it was a great pleasure to me, as Department Commander of Michigan, to meet at Columbus every delegate that you elected here at your meeting last year. Now, we will call the roll.

The roll of districts was called and the blanks distributed.

Officer of the Day: The Daughters of the Grand Army are here with greetings.

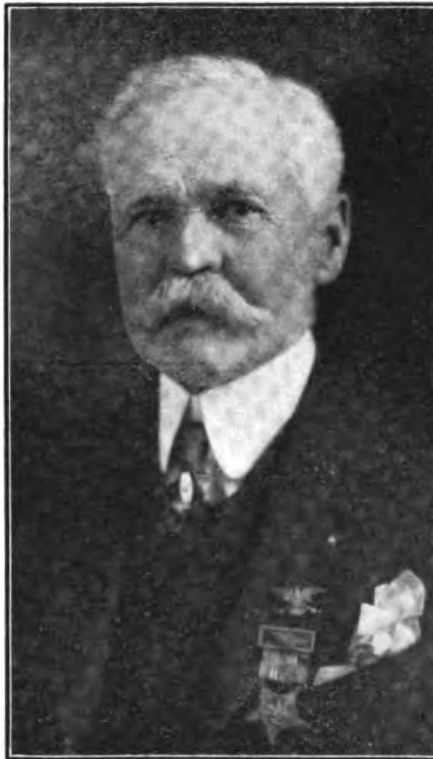
Department Commander: I will appoint Comrades Bartlett Rabb and Petit as a committee to escort the delegation.

The Committee were escorted to the platform and introduced.

Mrs. Robinson: The Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic extend to you our greetings and extend our sincere love and loyalty to you. We want you to feel that we are back of you in any way we can be of assistance. That is what we are organized for and we are also organized for one more splendid thing and that is to perpetuate the name of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Mrs. Nye: Comrades, I am pleased to meet you all. We extend our greetings sincerely to you and we hope that you may all live to see our Order become a large order. Now it is small and we are sorry for it.

Mrs. Lamb: I am very glad to address you as a Daughter of the Grand Army of the Republic. I am proud to belong to the mother organization the W. R. C. and I cannot help but feel just a little more pride to think that I am a blood tie to one of the men who fought for "Old Glory." One of my chief aspirations and one of my aims is the improving of the Order to which I belong, the Daughters of the G. A. R. so as to perpetuate your name. The day is coming, and may it be far away, when the last man will have gone over yonder, and as the Daughters of the American Revolution are

perpetuating the name of their fathers, some, as Daughters of the G. A. R. intend and will perpetuate your memory. (Applause)

On motion an adjournment was taken until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

THIRD DAY.

June 11, 1920, 9 o'clock a. m.

The Encampment was called to order by the Department Commander, pursuant to adjournment taken.

Department Commander: The Chaplain will invoke the Divine blessing.

Chaplain Holmes: Almighty God, come very near to us as we meet in this session of this Encampment. Help us to carefully consider the interests that are brought before us. Help us that everything may be done as it should be done and then may we remember that the eye of God is upon us and may we remember that the people about us are looking with interest upon what we are doing. God bless this encampment and bless us as we go out from here and may we feel as we go that we have done that which will be profitable. We have had our hearts brought in very close union together while here and above all things, our Father, help us, to think as becometh soldiers. Help us to think as becometh soldiers of the highest ideals. Help us in all our goings. God be with us and direct us and guide us in all we do and may we at last be admitted to Thy Kingdom on high. For Christ's sake, Amen.

Department Commander: Are there any committees ready to report? What is your pleasure, Comrades? We will take up the question of selecting a place for the next Encampment. There is an invitation here on the table from the city of Flint and one also from Bay City.

Comrade Stevens: If there are no other invitations to be presented, I move that the next Encampment be held at the city of Flint.

The motion was supported.

Department Commander: It has been moved and supported that the Encampment for 1921 be held in the city of Flint. Are you ready for the question.

The question was taken and the motion adopted.

A Comrade: I move we take up the matter of the delegate at large and proceed to election; delegate at large and alternate.

The question was taken and adopted.

Comrade Payne, Post 17, presented the name of CHARLES A. BARTLETT, Post 17.

Comrade Stevens: I move you, if there is no other candidate present for delegate at large, that the Assistant Adjutant General be instructed to cast the vote of this Encampment for Charles A. Bartlett as delegate at large.

The motion was supported.

The question was taken and unanimously adopted and the Assistant Adjutant General cast the vote as directed for Charles A. Bartlett as delegate at large.

Department Commander: The next in order is Alternate.

The name of EMORY MORSE, Post 32, was presented as alternate.

On motion the Assistant Adjutant General was instructed to cast the vote of the Encampment for Comrade Emory Morse as alternate, and the vote was so cast.

Department Commander: Now, we will elect delegates from each district.

Assistant Adjutant General: District No. 1 has nominated Comrade Alvin L. Sawyer, of Post 17 for delegate. For alternate Comrade Uriah Gould, Post 384.

District No. 2, for delegate Comrade Dean LaBanta; for alternate Comrade Thomas Nichols, Post 48.

District No. 3, delegate, David Walkinsbaw, Post 166. Alternate, J. J. Holmes, Post 111.

District No. 4, delegate, W. A. Preston, Post 21; alternate, Samuel P. Hartshorn, Post 57.

District No. 5, delegate Abram Eddy, Post 395; alternate John Pomeroy, Post 62.

District No. 6, delegate. Thomas B. Fouch, Post 145; alternate John A. Wardell, Post 42.

District No. 7, delegate A. L. Bryant, Post 255; alternate, A. A. Haskell, Post 98.

District No. 8, delegate Oliver T. Mosher, Post 90; alternate, Frank M. Freer, Post 91.

District No. 9, delegate A. J. Teed, Post 444; alternate, M. G. Averill, Post 7.

District No. 10, delegate Hiram Russell, Post 67; alternate Gideon Bailey, Post 16.

District No. 11, delegate John G. Berry, Post 263; alternate Gideon Bailey, Post 16.

District No. 12, delegate James A. Trout; alternate David Speer, Post 100.

District No. 13, Thomas Payne, delegate Thomas Payne, Post 17; alternate Allen H. Cady, Post 17.

On motion of Assistant Adjutant General Spaulding the names read as delegates and alternates were elected by the Encampment.

Assistant Adjutant General: Now, we are entitled to three more delegates and alternates, to be selected by the Encampment.

Comrade Mosher, Post 90, presented the name of John P. Schwann, of Saginaw.

Comrade Bryant presented the name of L. A. L. Gilbert of Post 67.

Comrade C. W. Lung, Post 100, was placed in nomination.

Comrade John H. Donaldson was also nominated.

Comrade Davy: I move that the three names first mentioned by declared elected.

The motion was supported and unanimously adopted.

Department Commander: Now the next in order is the selecting of the three alternates.

Comrade Lecroix, Post 216, presented the name of John H. Donaldson of Post 216.

Comrade Davey presented the name of B. C. Brainard, Post 433.

Comrade John Davidson, Post 42, was placed in nomination.

Department Commander: Are there any further nominations? If not I declare nominations closed and the three Comrades named are declared elected as alternates.

Now, what is your further pleasure.

Comrade Crocker, Post 48: Having had quite a lot of experience in making arrangements for the Encampment for the state of Michigan and knowing

the work there is to be done I take this occasion to make a motion that a rising vote of thanks be extended to Comrade Lee and his Post for the splendid entertainment he has furnished us.

Comrade Fouch: I wish to make an amendment to that motion, that the rising vote of thanks be also extended to the officials and citizens of Port Huron.

Comrade Crocker: I will accept that amendment and wish also to include in it the Woman's Relief Corps.

Department Commander: The motion is presented that a rising vote of thanks be extended to Past Department Commander Lee, and his Post, and to the Woman's Relief Corps for the excellent entertainment they have given us.

The motion was unanimously carried.

Comrade Fouch: Also that a vote of thanks be extended to the mayor and common council, Chamber of Commerce and the citizens of Port Huron for their very excellent manner in which they have entertained us.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Comrade Haskell, Post 98: Is it in order now to have the election of officers?

Department Commander: No, it has always been the custom to hear the report of the Committee on Commander's report and the Committee on Resolutions previous to the election of officers.

Now, we will take a recess of fifteen minutes and wait for the Committee.

Recess of 15 minutes.

Department Commander: You will now come to order. I hold in my hand a check calling for \$272.00 given us by that great helper of ours, the Woman's Relief Corps. The check was made payable to my order and I turned it over to your Assistant Quartermaster General. It goes into the General Fund to help to pay the general expenses of the Encampment.

Comrade Chase, Post 126: I move you that we individually thank the Woman's Relief Corps for their expression of their love and affection in this handsome offer they have made us for our benefit.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Commander-in-Chief Hall entered the hall.

Comrade Rabb: I move that the Boy Scouts of the city of Port Huron be given a rising vote of thanks.

The motion was adopted unanimously.

Department Commander: On this beautiful morning, and in this beautiful city, I know you want to hear from your Commander-in-Chief.

Commander-in-Chief Hall: I do not know what I can say to you. You know the story of the preacher who rose to give an address after several other orators had spoken. After he had arisen he said "What shall I say to you?" A little urchin in the back part of the room says, "Say Amen and sit down." However I haven't heard any of you say that to me yet. We have shaken hands with most of you and had a jolly good time. We have told stories until we pretty near believe them ourselves. You remember the story of the minister who was going down the street one day and he turned around and saw a lot of little boys sitting on the curb, one of them was holding a string around his neck. The minister said, "Boys, what are you doing?" "Well, sir we are trying to see which one can tell the biggest lie and the boy who does tell the biggest lie will get the dog." "Well," the preacher says, "That is bad, it is wrong to tell lies. Do you know where boys go to who

tell lies?" and he gave them a good lecture, and he said, "Boys, I never told a lie in my life." The boys says "Here, Mister, take the dog." (Laughter)

As I told the ladies in their convention I just came from, there is nothing in the world we look forward to with any more pleasure than we do these Encampments. We count the months, we count the weeks and days when we will get together again. Of course we miss those who have dropped out from time to time. They say we are going one by one. It is much faster than that, Comrades. We miss them when we get together, but we are going to remain optimistic and when we get together we will have a good time. I believe we enjoy better health and live longer if we meet together and exchange our experiences and enjoy ourselves. There are no two of us who saw any fight just the same, and it is worth while to hear each other's experiences. They tell about us swapping lies. I am ready to believe anything that any of you tell me in regard to your army service. I believe it is so and I believe it is true.

You know they tell of three fellows who were in the World war, one of them lost an arm, the other lost a leg, and the other was badly shot up. They were talking it over about what they were going to do when they got back on this side of the ocean. The fellow who lost the leg said he was going to play football. The fellow who lost the arm was going into baseball and the fellow who was badly wounded and crippled hadn't said anything. They asked him and said, "What are you going to do." "Well", he said, "I am going home and I am going over to the store and sit on a soap box in front of the store practicing a long time and try to see if I can tell as big lies as those old Grand Army fellows do."

I am glad I am here, Comrades. As I told you yesterday it is a hard task to attend two Encampments when they are over four hundred miles apart and held at the same time. I want to assure you that while I have received a hearty welcome at other Encampments I have received just as good and perhaps a little more hearty welcome right here in Port Huron. I believe I feel more at home right here. I feel as if I was among my own Comrades and of course I am.

Now, Comrades, are you going to Atlantic City? When that Convention is called to order I expect to look into the faces of all of you. Those who are not delegates will have seats in this Convention, not with the delegates, perhaps, but we expect to have a big Convention. I do not worry very much but I have been a little anxious about it. With a three cent a mile rate, war tax, hotel bills to pay, I was afraid we would not have a very big Encampment, away off on the Atlantic coast. So I have worked hard to get the rates down and you do not know how much satisfaction it is to me to know that the rates are down to a cent a mile, and we can go so cheap, and there are but few who cannot afford to go.

Department Commander: Now, we have not heard a word from Past Commander in Chief Gardner. We want to hear from him.

Past Commander-in-Chief Washington Gardner: Comrades I was Commander of this Department thirty-two years ago. The day I was elected there were 1800 ballots cast, and here we are today. We are here to carry on the work that was so dear to those men.

Perhaps I ought to say something to you about pension matters and tell you something about what little part I may have had in it. No one who has not been through the experience of framing a bill to meet, as far as possible, so many people of different conditions, different requirements, and I can say in all candor, different merits from the personal service point of view. It

is just a year ago this month since we were busily engaged at this work on the bank of the Potomac, working out, as best we could the details of a bill we hoped might become a law. First, we thought we would put in the service clause and it was so written that a man who served three years or more should get the maximum pension; the man who served two years would get less and the man who served one year would get less and the same with the man who served six months. The bill was tentatively drawn in that way. Then we had the maimed soldiers. We had no trouble about the widows of our soldiers nor the army nurses, but the maimed soldiers gave us a great deal of trouble to adjust the rate. A man with an arm off, a man with a leg off, a man who had been terribly bruised and battered up on the battle line. Their rates had been adjusted specifically for years. They came demanding an increase. They did not come to the Grand Army of the Republic, but undertook to get it through their own organization. They had failed up to that time in getting a general bill advancing the specific rate.

Now, the Committee was trying to decide it so far as the soldiers were concerned that age was the only basis on which we could make a just rate of pension. I am seventy-five and I went into the war at sixteen years of age, I served over three years. I have borne the weight of my body on one leg, wherever I speak and I save it wherever I can. I suffer every hour from that wound when I am on my feet, and yet we decided that a man who never had been out of the State of Michigan, for instance, who never saw a confederate in arms who did not know service, so to speak, should be put on exactly the same equality as myself. But you say that is not just. Now, a bill was framed on this line. It costs just as much for a man who is 75 or more years of age for food, for clothing for fuel, for doctor's bills as it does any other, whatever the length of service. So that we said the men are all on the same equality when it comes to the necessities of life and we will put the bill on the basis of age, leaving out service. The Committee agreed unanimously on that so the minimum was fixed at \$50.00 a month. Every man who served ninety days, whether wounded or not, whether sick or otherwise, gets \$50.00 a month and then additional rates in proportion to his necessities. Our good Past Commander was getting \$40.00 a month, with five wounds upon his body, who went from captain of his company to major general of his division, he got \$40.00 a month. Today he gets \$50.00 and if application is made and his physical and mental condition is such, he will get \$75.00.

Now, there are many of the Comrades back in the shadow of life and along the highway over which we have come, are in such condition that they will get \$60.00, \$70.00 and \$75.00 and others may get even more in special cases, but the minimum is \$50.00 a month.

Now, as to the maimed soldier. Here is Colonel Janes, I have known him from a boy in school. He is Janes to me; colonel to you. He is second in length of service of any of our Past Department Commanders. When I first knew him I sat beside him in school. He wore a kid glove on one hand and I came from the farm and had hardly got the barnyard off my shoes yet. Of course that was before he was married. By and by he took off his kid gloves, and with it part of the hand and arm. He is the same old boy now he was then but he gets only ten dollars for the loss of that arm. How many of you would agree even now to have your arm cut off or shot off, and his was cut off twice after being shot, for ten dollars a month over the other fellow.

Now that is unjust from one point of view, and the Committee realized

that, but they said what can we do. We fix the basis on these other men on the equality or necessity. Now, it did not give Colonel Janes any more. It does not cost him any more for clothes, except that he wears better clothes, than it does for me. Since the country has gone dry it does not cost him any more for drinks (laughter) than it does me, and so all along the line.

You cannot frame a bill affecting hundreds and thousands of men each varying one from the other, and make it exactly equitable to every man. It is an impossibility. The committee did the best they could and have done that. Now, it is one thing to frame a bill and another thing to get it through Congress. The maimed soldier bill had been lying there knocking at the door of Congress for years and you know our history when it comes to crossing these men who sit here. It has been my fortune to be associated with a considerable number of former Commander-in-Chiefs looking after pension legislation. While they have all done faithful work, no man has done better or been more thorough or more constant than our present Commander-in-Chief, in securing pension legislation. (Applause)

Now, with all its defects we are thankful that we have it and we are grateful that the widows have secured so much. I hope our ladies will be spared for many years but when that dreaded day come, it would be comforting to you and to me and to all our friends to know that we left something in our name because of our service, to the wife who has stood by us through the years of our lives. (Applause)

Comrades, complain all you may, but take your pension while you can get it and be thankful. Oh, what a government and what a nation! You, sir, the Commander-in-Chief, for eleven, twelve and thirteen dollars a month marched by day and by night, in sunshine and storm, taking your lives in your hands and fought out the issue and conquered. Today, in the evening of life the government comes and tells you we will give you three times as much for doing nothing as we gave you fifty years ago for doing everything. Now, Comrades, I like the spirit of your Commander-in-Chief who wants to keep from having the blues. The past is sacred, the present is with us; let us make the most of life. Be joyous and happy and yonder is the river and we will not be afraid to cross and mingle with our Comrades, with Lincoln, Grant, Sherman, Sheridan and Logan, and the Mighty Host up there. We need not be afraid to go. I thank you. (Applause)

Department Commander: We will hear the report of the Committee on Department Commander's address, Comrade Janes.

(Report read)

Port Huron, Mich., June 11, 1920.

To the Department Encampment G. A. R. of Michigan.

Your Committee on the report of the Department Commander begs leave to report as follows:

First—That we commend the Department Commander in his zeal, interest and devotion to the work pertaining to the duties of his office during the year.

Second—The matter referred to in his report appertaining to the late Assistant Quartermaster, General Comrade Uriah H. Lazelle, we report that we have considered the same, but owing to the limited time at our disposal during the meeting of this Encampment, and not having access to all the books, papers, and other evidences of the receipts and expenditures

of the funds of the Department during the year to ascertain the discrepancy that is alleged to exist, we are unable to arrive at a definite adjustment of the matters involved in the investigation at this time, and ask for further time to make the investigation with authority to go to Lansing, and confer with both the A. A. G. and A. Q. M. G. where all papers, books and records involved in the case can be produced to make an amicable adjustment of the whole subject matter and report to the incoming council of administration.

Third—We concur in the recommendation of the Department Commander that the offices of the Assistant Adjutant General, Assistant Quartermaster General be consolidated as has been done in several Departments, and that the Department Commander comply with such action in making these appointments.

Fourth—That the Compensation to be received for such services be fixed at the sum of eight hundred (\$800.00) dollars per year, this to include the compiling of the Journal and all work pertaining to the offices.

Fifth—We recommend that the usual Past Department Commander's Badge with the same design be procured by the Council of Administration and presented to Commander Lamb, in recognition of his valuable services during the year.

Comrade Janes, I move the adoption of the report; the question was taken and the report unanimously adopted.

First—That Arthur P. Hicks, Attorney at Law for the Department in the case against the Aetna Bonding Company, sureties for Past Assistant Quartermaster General, Uriah H. Lazelle, who gave his services gratuitously, be tendered the thanks of the Department.

Second—That Comrade Albert Dunham who served the Department faithfully and efficiently as Assistant Quartermaster General, during the past year and who declines to receive any remuneration, be tendered a rising vote of thanks for the performance of such service.

Third: That Comrade Griffin Lewis whose genial personality and enjoyable service as bugler has many times cheered his comrades at the State National Encampment, has passed from the living. For him taps have sounded here, but we trust and believe that he has already heard the reveille of Eternal life on the other shore. We shall miss him at future Encampments and we respectfully tender to the members of his family the sympathy of this Department.

Fourth—About the time of our last State Encampment, Comrade Samuel J. Lawrence, a Past Commander of this Department, after a somewhat lingering illness, passed from the ranks of the living. Comrade Lawrence's record as a soldier in his youth was inconspicuous but highly creditable. In civil life he attained as State Senator to honorable distinction. His long and faithful service of an important appointive office, filled his later years with usefulness. As Department Commander he is gratefully remembered. We miss him in this our annual gathering. We recommend that the Assistant Adjutant General be instructed to send copy of this resolution to his widow and children.

Resolved, that the thanks of the Encampment are due and are hereby tendered by the city officials and citizens of Port Huron, for the admirable arrangement made and the reception given to our Comrades of the Department. Nothing seems to have been left undone that would add to the cordiality of our reception, or to our comfort during our sojourn. Port Huron will long be remembered as one of the pleasantest of our State Encampments.

We feel we would be derelict in our duty if we did not make mention of our appreciation of the tireless efforts of Comrade William O. Lee, who worked out successfully the many details that have helped to make this Encampment here a success.

Your Committee recommend that Comrade William A. Ketcham of Indiana be indorsed as Michigan's choice for Commander-in-Chief at the Encampment to be held in Atlantic City in September next. We feel that Comrade Ketcham's long and faithful service for the order entitles him to this recognition.

This resolution was discussed by Comrade L. A. L. Gilbert, who favored its adoption, and Comrades, Parker, Cannon, Rabb, Phillips, Gardner and others.

On motion the majority report of the Committee was adopted and the resolution was voted down.

Past Commander in Chief Gardner then presented the balance of the report, which on motion was unanimously adopted.

Department Commander: Are there any other resolutions? If not, then the next order of business is the election of officers.

The first nomination is for the office of Department Commander. The Assistant Adjutant General will call the roll by Districts.

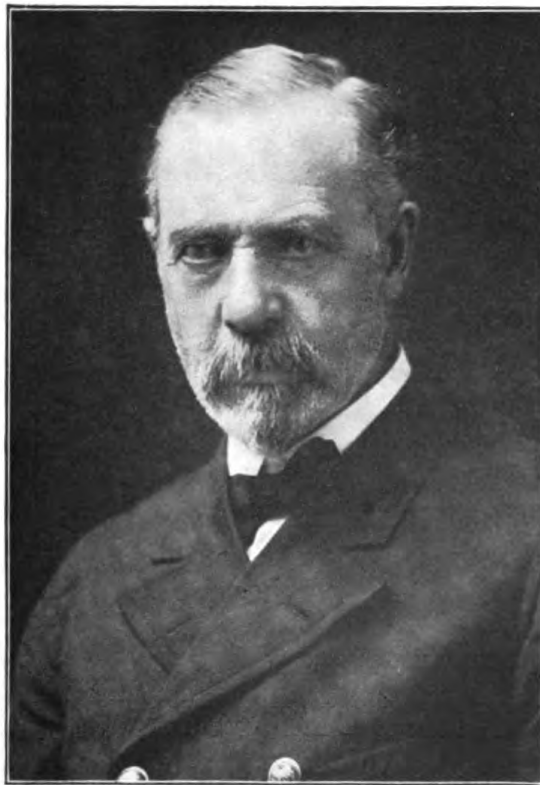
On roll call, Comrade Janes of District No. 1 presented the name of Henry Spaulding.

Comrade Janes: There being only one candidate, the others having withdrawn, I therefore move that the rules be suspended and that the Assistant Quartermaster General be instructed to cast the vote for Henry Spaulding for Department Commander.

The question was taken and the motion prevailed. The Assistant Quartermaster General then cast the vote of the Encampment for Henry Spaulding, for Department Commander for the ensuing year.

Department Commander: Are there any other nominations? If not. I hope the Assistant Adjutant General will be instructed to cast the ballot.

Comrade Ives: I make such a motion.

The question was taken and the motion prevailed; the ballot was so cast and the several Comrades declared duly elected to the Council of Administration for the ensuing year.

Comrade Davey, Teller: We are ready to report on the election of Junior Vice Commander.

Total number of votes cast 62, necessary to choice 32 of which Comrade Poste received 52, Comrade Seal 10.

Comrade Seal: I move that the vote for Junior Vice Commander be made unanimous, and that Comrade Poste be elected as Junior Vice Commander unanimously.

The question was taken and the motion prevailed, and Comrade Poste was declared elected unanimously.

Is there any more business to come before this Encampment? If not, I will declare it closed.

Whereupon, the Forty-second Annual Encampment, Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic was closed.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN. GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

CAPITOL BUILDING, LANSING, MICH., November 3, 1919.

General Orders No. 3, Series 1919-20.

1. The 53rd National Encampment at Columbus, Ohio, was one grand success. Comrades from Michigan were out in numbers, about 300, and most of them took part in the parade, and but few in automobiles. The W. R. C. L. of G. A. R., D. of V., D. of G. A. R., S. of V., and their Auxiliary were also well represented, and the Department of Michigan made a very creditable appearance upon the citizens of Columbus, for which I thank them all.

Columbus was out with an open hand of welcome to all. The Hotel Chittenden was Michigan's Headquarters, and we made no mistake in selecting this Hotel. They are entitled to great credit and thanks for the attention shown us while we were with them.

2. At the opening of the Encampment on Thursday morning, every delegate from Michigan answered to roll call (which was a record breaker) and they looked after the interest of our Department during the session.

Comrade James D. Bell, of the Department of New York, was elected Commander-in-Chief, without opposition, and Atlantic City, New Jersey, was selected as the place of meeting of the Fifty-fourth Annual Encampment in 1920.

3. According to our rules and regulations the election of Post officers for the year 1920 must be held at the first stated meeting in December, 1919. The Comrades are urged to attend that meeting and to elect such of their number to the various offices as will accept and loyally perform the duties thereof.

Representatives and alternates to the Forty-second Annual Encampment of this Department to be held in Port Huron, Mich., in June, 1920, date to be fixed later, are elected at the same time as the Post officers. Each Post is entitled to one representative and one alternate for every 25 members or major fraction thereof. Every Post, however small its membership, is entitled to one representative and one alternate.

All Past Post Commanders, in good standing, also the Senior and Junior Vice Commanders for the current year, are entitled to seats and votes in the Encampment and should not be elected as representatives. Blanks for report of officers, elected, also Credential blanks, and a Quartermaster's blank Bond is enclosed with this order and sent to each Post in this Department. It is the duty of the Adjutant to see that these blanks are properly filled out and sent to these Headquarters immediately after the election, and they are specially requested to give the names of all Past Post Commanders in good standing, on the Credential blank plainly written; also the delegates and alternates, that none may be left out who are entitled to a seat and vote in the Encampment.

The blank forms A and B, for reports of Adjutants and Quartermasters, will be sent out to the Posts about December 1st, also the Death roll blanks. The special attention of these officers is called to the important duty of carefully and promptly preparing and forwarding these reports after the last meeting in December. They are reminded that these cover the whole year 1919, as the National Encampment abolished the semi-annual report.

Adjutants will, therefore, report all gains and losses from January 1st, 1919, instead of June 30th. It is also to be borne in mind that all additions to the membership are to be reported by name, with record of service, as are all losses, with cause and date of same. Many reports received in the past have been faulty in this respect. The list of officers on the first page of the report are those elected for 1919, and not the newly elected ones for 1920.

The Quartermaster should see to it that his report of receipts and disbursements, with cash on hand, should balance. Sometimes it is mighty difficult for the Assistant Quartermaster General to understand very much about the financial condition of the Post, after a careful study of the reports. Please remember, Comrade Quartermaster, that all the blank spaces are supposed to be filled.

Promptness in making and forwarding these reports is specially important as the Assistant General must report to the National Headquarters early in January. They should be prepared at the last meeting in December, as the business of the year has been finished, and forward at once to Department Headquarters with remittance of $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents for each member in good standing at the time of making this report. The per capita tax is 25 cents per annum, payable $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents in June but no reports, on the basis of the December report, and $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents in December reports.

As the annual inspection of Posts is optional law, there will be none ordered unless requested by Posts or deemed advisable.

4. Comrades, your Department Commander would like to have each one of you see if there is not some one or more of the "Old Boys" who are not

members of the Grand Army, and get them to unite with us, for it is well said "That in union there is strength." We need them, and they need our assistance; don't let an ex-soldier remain outside of our Order if you can help it.

6. Comrades, this is probably the last General Orders that will be issued in 1919, and we wish each and every one a Merry Christmas and a happy New Year, and may you all have many happy returns of those Holidays.

Again it becomes our sad duty to announce the passing away of another Past Department Commander.

Comrade Samuel J. Lawrence died at his home in Detroit, Michigan, Monday, July 28th, 1919, aged 70 years and 11 months. He enlisted August 31st, 1864, at the age of 16 years, in Company D, Fourth Michigan Infantry, and was discharged May 26th, 1866, at Houston, Texas.

He was elected Department Commander at Holland, Mich., in June, 1910. He was always active in Grand Army work, and this Department will miss his ever jolly presence, his untiring work and valuable council at our annual meetings. He was a member of Detroit Post, No. 384, of Detroit, Mich.

It is with profound regret that we announce the sudden death of our Commander-in-Chief, James D. Bell, at his home in Brooklyn, N. Y., Nov. 1st, 1919.

Your Department Commander is proud of the record of the Grand Army of the Republic of Michigan, and wishes all the members to know that he appreciates their efforts throughout the year in maintaining the high standing which this Department enjoys today.

A guard of four Comrades will be detailed by the officer of the day for duty during the Encampment.

The Encampment will assemble Wednesday, June 9th, at two o'clock p. m., Convention hall, City Opera House.

These headquarters will be closed Monday, June 7th, and reopen Monday, June 14th. Posts wishing supplies will make their requisition not later than May 31st.

MEMORIAL DAY.

National General Orders No. 5 concerning the observance of this day has been sent to every Post in the State.

As the 30th day of May falls on Sunday this year, Memorial Day services

will be observed the following day, Monday, May 31st, and Memorial Sunday, May 23rd.

Following the course of former years, therefore, the Michigan Department of the G. A. R. will observe Monday, as Memorial Day, and our Comrades, allied organizations, the school children, and citizens of our great State, are urged to devote the day to those sacred rites with which we have been wont to mark the 30th day of May each year.

Let business stay its hand and pleasure quiet its call for this National Sabbath.

The Gettysburg Address of Abraham Lincoln, and the Memorial order of General Logan form part of the order of the day, and have been sent to the Posts.

Comrades, the call for our services has never been more pressing than now. More graves of our fallen Comrades with their beautiful flags will wait our coming, more flowers will lie on the green silent earth, and the hearts of the nation will pay tribute to the national heroes of '61 to '65.

Post Chaplains and Post Patriotic Instructors are requested to make reports at once after the services of the day and enclose in self-addressed envelopes and mail at once, that the Department officers may be able to make their reports to the Encampment.

FLAG DAY.

Don't forget that June 14th is Flag Day, let every Comrade unfold Old Glory to the gentle breezes, not alone because his patriotism prompts the act, but as an example to our sons and grandsons of the later wars, showing them that our devotion to the Flag has not diminished with the lapse of years.

Your Department Commander avails himself of the option granted by the National Encampment, and dispenses with the annual inspection of Posts, but any Post desiring to hold an inspection can do so, naming an inspector, and he will be detailed from these headquarters.

To Adjutants and Quartermasters of Posts, the amended law provides that your reports be made annually now instead of semi-annually. They are to be made in December, and covering the full year.

But the per capita tax is to be paid semi-annually, in the months of June and December, the June tax is on the basis of the December report. Comrades be prompt with your remittances, don't let a Post in Michigan be in arrears on the first day of July, 1920.
