

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FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC HELD AT FLINT, MICHIGAN, JUNE 21, 22 AND 23, 1921.

The Forty-third Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was called to order by the Department Commander, Henry Spaulding, in the Hotal Durant, at Flint, on Tuesday, June 21st, 1921, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Department Commander: Please come to order. This is a meeting of the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic; this is an open meeting and we will first listen to the address of welcome from the acting

Mayor of the City.

Mr Long: Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen: It is customary at the opening of every convention to have an address of welcome by an officer of the City. In the absence of the Mayor, he has asked me to substitute for him today. He has picked a very poor speaker. I will say that the City of Flint, through its Mayor, through its Council members, through its various institutions, heartily welcome you to the City and if you fail to have a good time it is your own fault. Several committees have labored to prepare a program of entertainment for you which we hope will meet with your approval and as the years go by we hope you will look back at these few days as one of the bright spots in your life. I believe the police have been informed to let you boys run wild at will and they will overlook everything you do, and in the name of the Commonwealth of the City of Flint I extend to you a cordial and hearty welcome.

Department Commander: Is Mr. Holler here, the Secretary of the Board of Commerce? Comrades and Members of this meeting, I present to you Comrade Holler, Secretary of the Board of Commerce of this city, who will

make a few remarks.

Mr Holler: At the very outset I want to say friends it is a privilege and an honor to be with you today. For the first time in the history of Flint we are honored in having the greatest convention that has ever come to the City of Flint and, representing the citizens of Flint, I want to extend the heartfelt greeting and welcome of every man, woman and child in the city. There is a story told that during the Civil War General Sherman issued instructions to all soldiers that there would be no foraging, that they could take no chickens, etc. One night General Sherman came through camp and he found a soldier with a large bag in his hand. The General said "What have you in that bag, sir?" He said "I have two geese" and Sherman said, "Don't you know there were instructions issued that there was to be no foraging?" He said, "Yes sir, but I caught these geese because they are traitors." And Sherman said, "How could geese be traitors?" And he said, "Well General, I caught these geese hissing at the American Flag and during the war we allow no one to hiss at the flag."

I am voicing the sentiments of a population of one hundred twenty-five



thousand people here when I say we owe a debt of gratitude to you folks that we can never repay. (Applause). Have you ever stopped to think of it that years and years after the Civil War there was an increasing love, admiration and respect for you folks? Do you ever stop to think that we realize more and more each day the wonderful things you did to preserve the Nation? We know what it meant for you men to leave your fathers, mothers, sisters and brothers and go into war; we know something of what it meant to leave your homes, society and business and go to fight for the stars and stripes, and I want to tell you that a grateful American people over one hundred and ten million strong, take off their hat today to the Grand Army of the Republic folks and we say God Bless you, for everything we love and cherish today is built on a foundation made by you years and years (Applause.) I am so strongly stirred by the feelings I have toward you people, and as I go among the business men and women of this country I find this same spirit reflected in them, I feel that we can never show you our love and respect for what you did for us and our boys and girls of this generation and the boys and girls of coming generations will always love and reverence you. The victories you won, the wonderful way in which you upheld the stars and stripes through every conflict, all these things are written indelibly in the hearts and minds of the people of this country; stirred into the souls of every person is the love we have for you folks for what you did for us. I just want to say that as we look back words are inadequate to express our appreciation for what you have done.

Now there are just a few things that we want to remember from day to day. You taught us a lesson in the Civil War; America had difficulties that threatened the Nation; we didn't know whether the Nation would be preserved, we didn't know whether the principle of Democracy would be carried out, we didn't know what the future of the Nation would be but along come these men, young men of purpose and ambition, young men with a spirit of service, men who had the love of mother in their hearts, that went out and during the Civil War you men did so many wonderful things that I want to tell you that your record will never be duplicated by any people or Nation. (Applause.) I bring these sentiments to you from the citizenship of Flint because the City of Flint has demonstrated in the Civil War and Spanish-American War and in the last war we sent five thousand young men in the World War so that when I say you have the affection and gratitude of our people I mean 100% patriots. Books have never been written that could tell of the heroism of you men and your comrades who died, and today it is a sacred privilege to just pay homage to the men of the past who made America of the present and whose spirit living on and on after you die will make the future of this great country of ours sacred and enduring. In Flint here we have a great love as you have in Detroit and every other city, for the stars and stripes.

Every person in the city wants to pay their respect to you. The red in the stars and stripes represent the blood of the people who gave their lives. Have you ever stopped to think that America has never gone to war for commercial gain; America has never gone to war because she was ambitious to get gain. That is why we love and worship the flag and cooperate with our Government. When we asked China to pay an indemnity for the damage she had done to us, then America to show that the white in the stars and stripes was pure returned to China nineteen millions of that money saying we went into the war in order that we could do your country good; we are returning this money because we did not go to war for money. America



has never gone to war for money or never will go for money. And what has that nineteen million dollars done? Every year two thousand young Chinese men go to college patterned after, fashioned after the United States of America. (Applause.) In the Phillipine War we returned the fifteen million dollars indemnity saying we don't want your fifteen million but we want you to use it for your schools. Then in the Mexican War we got an indemnity of fourteen millions. Did we keep it? We returned it and said use it for the benefit of Mexico. Now the blue field with the myriad of stars represent the faithfulness and loyalty of every man, woman and child; we have some enemies we know, but I want to tell you if the present generation can catch the spirit of the Civil War Veterans any enemies will be crushed and America will be saved. (Applause.) If we can catch the spirit of you men in this age and generation we need have no fear for the future of the Country and the Flag which we love so well. The blue stands for loyalty and devotion. So in conclusion I want to say this: Now America appreciates all you have done; America cannot express it in words; America feels its love is something strong, full of power; the love we have for the veterans of the Civil War is such that it is stronger than anything else. Every year you have had your encampment some of the dearest comrades you have had passed away. Death is not a thing to be especially afraid of; death is just going from one period to another period. Every one of you old veterans are going toward the setting sun and you are turning around to the young men of America and saying "Young men living today we of the Civil War pass on to you this country bigger and better than when we found it. Then when you go toward the crest of the hill we want you to turn around and pass it better to the next generation than when we presented it to you' and as you go in the presence of Almighty God I am sure as He meets each one personally, as you go before the King of Kings I am quite certain as He looks you in the eye He is going to say "Well done good and faithful servants" and He will pass you on to your reward. We are glad you came to Flint. God bless you. Have a good time; we want to show you our reverence and love, to make you want to stay here. I thank you very much.

Commander: I remember well twenty odd years ago when our Department Encampment was held here in Flint; I was here and the citizens did all they could to make it pleasant for us. I feel that we owe to the City of Flint a debt of gratitude. When the invitation was extended a year ago at Port Huron to come to Flint my hands both went up; Flint is in the State of Michigan and I heartily voted for it and I am glad we came here I remember many of your active members of the Grand Army among them was Judge Long. I saw him at Saginaw when he was elected as Department Commander and I came here with him and the reception they gave him here was a good one and, men of the Grand Army of the Republic Judge Long was a veteran of the Civil War and a man who had the interest of the ex-soldiers at heart all who knew him know that is so. And gentlemen, I thank you and accept the cordial greetings you have extended to the Grand Army and I speak as of the Grand Army that they thank you and accept

your welcome. Now comrades this meeting is closed.

Mr. Holler: There is one announcement I have to make. You will be very glad to know that beginning tomorrow at three o'clock they are going to take the veterans and all who are attending the convention out to Flint Park free of charge, and if you want cars Friday we will be glad to furnish them at that time.

Commander: I hope you will take advantage of that invitation. Now



those who are not members of the Grand Army will please retire. Let the delegates and past commanders occupy these front seats. The Past Department Commanders will take seats on the platform and Commander in Chief I will ask your take a retire and the platform.

Chief I will ask you take a seat on the platform.

Comrade Rabb: I have an announcement to make. I want to say this comrades; those railroad tickets that you have got street car tickets were secured from the D. U. R. I didn't get enough to go around. I got another thousand coming tonight. They are to be used by the comrades who are rooming away from here to have to ride down here. I wanted to just say I didn't have enough to go around. I only had two thousand and I will have another thousand tonight and the committee will have them in the morning. That's all.

Commander: Comrades you will come to order. Officer of the Day are

the approaches to this Encampment properly guarded?

Officer of the Day: They are?

Commander: Officer of the Day see that the doors are closed and your guards on duty. Are all present members of the Grand Army of the Republic and entitled to seats in this encampment?

Officer of the Day: The National Countersign.

Commander: All delegates must have the badge. The members of the Grand Army not delegates will be seated back of the delegates. Chaplain Palmer will you take a seat here please?

Officer of the Day: All present are members of the Grand Army of the

Republic.

Commander: Comrades, once more we have assembled in Encampment at our annual meeting. We meet in Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, and may all our hearts unite as one in sustaining the great objects of our Association. Parade rest. Chaplain Palmer invoke the Divine Blessing.

(Divine Blessing invoked by Chaplain Palmer.)

Commander: I declare the Forty-third Department Encampment of the Department of Michigan now open in due form for the transaction of any business that may be lawfully brought before it. The first will be the calling of roll; you will listen.



Commander in Chief: I would not. Go on with your encampment. Department Commander: Senior Vice Commander, take this chair please. Department Commander: Senior Vice Commander and Comrades, I have made a report, in a way an address, as follows: (Address read.)

ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER

Lansing, Mich., June 21st, 1921.

Comrades: At the Forty-second Annual Encampment, one year ago you selected me as your Department Commander, I entered upon the administration of the office with some misgivings. My predecessors were Comrades who had distinguished themselves in military and in civil life. Several had achieved national reputation, and each had been active and prominent not only in Grand Army circles, but in the affairs of this commonwealth of Michigan. To follow such a coterie of officials, and to succeed, would require my best efforts, and to meet the expection of my Comrades was highly improbable, but I have done the best I could.

I have enjoyed the work, I have visited 23 Posts, and 5 battalion meetings, and have met many of the 'Old-boys' in their home camps, I have been received everywhere, not only with respect and consideration but with that cordiality and Comradeship that is comforting and cheering to a visiting official.

I find, for the greater part, our Comrades, "dwell together in harmony" but there are a few Posts in which bickerings and contentions exist. This is unfortunate, and should not occur, Friendship, charity, loyalty are the three cardinal tenets of our Order. The friendship that binds us together as Comrades, the charity that is not easily provoked, and the loyalty that should enable us to overlook and forgive each other's weaknesses and foibles in our devotion to the Order that is so dear to us all.

In some localities there are two Posts where only one should exist. Both Posts are weak. One might be vigorous, if they united. My Comrades, settle your differences, draw closer together as age advances, and let no internal dissensions mar the harmony that should cement us as Brothers. Honest differences of opinion will arise, but remember that a majority rules and that the perpetuity of our Order is of greater importance than any personal grieveance.

MEMORIAL DAY

This day was very generally observed by the Posts in our Department General Orders issued from National Headquarters concerning its observance was supplemented by an order from our Headquarters and sent to every Post in this Department.



The thirtieth day of May is preeminently The Old Soldiers Day. It is a sacred day to us, and we are grieved to see that, by the thoughtless and by the younger generation, it is so commonly given to games, sports and public amusement. THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS

To this organization, our noble Auxiliary the Grand Army owes a debt of gratitude beyond computation. But for the Woman's Relief Corps, that has been so helpful to us in every way, very many of our Posts that are active and prosperous would have lapsed and surrendered their charters long ago. I see no reason why the Woman's Relief Corps should not exist as a perpetual organization long after the Grand Army of the Republic has become but a part of history, and the last soldier of the civil war lives only in the memory. My thanks are due and are hereby extended to Mrs. Ida F. Davidson, Department President, for the interest she has manifested in our work, and for her efforts to make this year a successful one for the Grand Army of the Republic, always ready to whisper words of cheer to the Old Boys. She has been a great help to me during the year. I do appreciate it, and my wish is that my successor may have as true and loyal a helpmate as has been my pleasure for the past year.

TO THE LADIES OF THE G. A. R. AND ALLIED ORGANIZATIONS

I have only words of praise and thanks to offer for the noble work and interest you have taken in our Order during the past year, each one doing their mite to promote the happiness and comfort of the "OLD BOYS."

Your kind acts and deeds will never be forgotten by the Ex-Soldiers.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I deem it my duty as Department Commander to offer the following: FIRST: That the salary of the Assistant Adjutant and Assistant Quartermaster General be raised to Nine Hundred Dollars per year, this to cover the work of both offices. My reason for this is that \$800.00 is a very small salary, then the Woman's Relief Corps of Michigan, by a resolution donate to the Department of Michigan G. A. R. \$200.00 per year. I believe half of this should go to the Adjutant, and the other half to the General Fund.

Second: That as the National Encampment has increased the per capita tax to thribble the amount it has been, and it took effect the first of last July, therefore, I recommend that the per capita tax of this Department be increased to Fifty cents per annum, payable twenty-five cents in June, and twenty-five cents in December each year, and that the same go into effect July first, 1921.

CONCLUSION

In closing I hereby express my sincere gratitude to the several officers of this Department for their loyalty to me, and for the fidelity with which each has discharged his duty. It has been extremely gratifying and pleas-



ing to me that I have at all times received the cordial support of every official, but especially am I indebted to the Assistant Adjutant General, Albert Dunham, for the kindness extended to me during the past year. If any measure of success has attended the past year's work, it is due, in a large degree, to the loyalty and efficiency of the official staff, to whom, as individuals, I extend my thanks.

My Comrades, I shall hand the gavel of the Department Commander to my successor with some regret, yet with pleasure, and wish for him the same loyal support during his year, that has been mine for the past year.

May this Order continue until the last member of the last Post responds to the call of the Great Commander, and when some kind hand has placed the floral wreath upon his resting place, then, and not till then may "FINIS" be written to the history of the Grand Army of the Republic.


Department Commander: Comrades you have heard the report what will you do with it?

Chaplain Palmer: I think I ought to say a work before I begin to read this report. I suppose some of us remember the Encampment here twenty






ROBERT LEBARRON. Medical Director, Department of Michigan.

years ago. I lived in the City of Adrian and the Encampment news we received made us very sad. I refer to the accident of Major Buckingham and Mrs. Applegate and her sister when they and the Major's daughter were all killed. I can't help speaking of that.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

The Chaplain's report to the State Department G. A. R., is made up largely from reports of chaplain's answers to seventeen questions concerning observance of Memorial Day.

Chief among these are these: Was the speaker a veteran, or the son of a veteran? How many graves were decorated? How many school children were present? These reports show that only two veterans gave addresses on Memorial Day.

Number attending Sabbath memorial service, 1,293.

Number attending Memorial Day services, 1,570.

Number of graves decorated, 21,283.

Number school children attending Memorial Day service, 976.

Besides giving a tabulated answer to the questions, it is presumable that that the Chaplain may report as to how the old boys who survive are doing.

Memorial Day is observed with interest, but not as much general interest as a few years ago. The Civil War, its history and even its survivors seems a way back memory. The World's War is more real to many, because it is more recent. Newspapers speak of war veterans, and almost always mean the survivors of the Worlds War. But the Civil War veteran, with many "unfit for duty" and all feeling the infirmities of age, is yet in evidence, and his life tells for good in honor, morals, and religion. But the picture of the Grand Army of the Republic, as we now look at its thinning ranks, its slow step, with dullness of sight and hearing, is a sight both pathetic and glorious. It is seen and keenly felt on Memorial Days as school children march briskly in parade, and the Legion men's firm and elastic step is noticed. Ah, these parades are a trial and a joy. They need modifying, at least, if not a discontinuance. It has been said, "whenever two or three Americans meet together there let a speech be made." It would seem that wherever a few old veterans meet, there let a parade be formed.

Though a "fast fading fraternity," the old boys are not in pessimistic perils, but with well balanced optimism, feel that really the country was never as safe as now, and he feels, too, that our country's safety is the safety valve of the world. His grip is emphatic with Comrade and Post, and he thinks he knows the full meaning of the word, veteran. He feels that citizenship, comradeship and christian fellowship, never meant as much as now. Praise God, many an old veteran knows well of christian fellowship. He appreciates as never before, the Woman's Relief Corps. What hearty help they give. Heavens benediction be upon them. He appreciates his pension. It is a glory for him to look around on a saved united country. It's glorious for him to live and feel as he looks on "Old Glory" that he helped to make "Old Glory" glorious. He looks backward, then forward, and says in his heart, "when the roll is called up yonder, I'll be there."

- W. V. and Auxiliary, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and their Auxiliaries. Also D. A. R.
- 14. Describe in a few lines the observance of Memorial Day in the schools. Patriotic exercises in a great majority of the schools consisting of music and recitations. Also many teachers as well as children attend memorial service and help decorate graves.



- 15. How many flags have been supplied to schools the past year? Yes.
- 16. Has Lincoln's Gettysburg address been placed prominently in school buildings? Yes.
- 17. Are prizes given to pupils of High Schools for patriotic essays? In a few schools.

- 19. Did the Governor of the State recognize Flag Day by proclamation? Yes.
- 20. Estimate cost of carrying on the work this year, \$2,857.00.
- 21. Has the State Superintendent of Public Instruction been requested to furnish flags and Manuals of Patriotism for schools? No What reply? No.

Patriotic Instructor: I would like to say just at this time we have a few schools that are not enumerated in this list, 497 Parochial Schools with a scholarship of 70,284. There has been one report received that states "Nothing done." The officers of the School Board voted last spring, I think it says, or last year to not assist the schools financially or otherwise in Decoration Day matters. I received two reports this morning from two different Posts which makes just 50 reports I have received from the Department. A great majority of the whole number are not such as I can report on that is not to make an intelligent or favorable report. Quite a number of them says "We have turned over our Patriotic exercises as Decoration Day, etc., to the W. R. C.'s, to the Spanish American War Boys in other cases. One Comrade notified me there wasn't anything doing particularly; they turned their Decoration Day work all over to the Constable. A very great majority of them you see are not in a position or condition to make a report of any kind. Another one I received said that the World War Veterans are looking after these Patroitic matters because as you know we are not able to look after the matters as we once did, but all they care is playing baseball, fist fights and having a hell of a time. A good many of the reports show that the teachers do not take much interest in Patriotic matters in our schools in Michigan. I would like to say to you I didn't intend to burden you but the needs for Patriotic activity are urgent. As far as I can learn most of you have done quite well. The ignorant foreign born element we have in many places and the vast amount of illiterates among our own people makes it harder for us. Where we find that School Boards are hiring teachers that do not care whether the flag is raised or not and that give you to understand that they do not care for that work, we better get after them and shut them off entirely as they are a menace to civilization.

Department Commander: Comrades you have heard the report of our Department Patriotic Instructor, what will you do with it?

Comrade D. J. Wilson, Post 48: I move that the report be adopted as read. Seconded and carried.

Department Commander: The next in order will be the report of the Chief Mustering Officer. He is on duty with the Committee on Credentials, we will waive that and the report of the Department Inspector is called for.

Department Inspector: Commander and Comrades: This is another



one of those cases where there has been nothing to do. I do not know that I have had a report from the Department Commander or a request in any shape or form to inspect any of the Posts. It must be that they are doing their work. That will be my report that the Posts of the Department of Michigan are doing their work correctly and according to the ritual.

A Comrade: I move that the report be accepted and adopted. Seconded and carried.

Department Commander: I wish to say right here that several years ago the question of inspecting Posts was brought up in our Encampment and it was left a local matter with the Posts in the State and it is left with the Post to have inspection or not and it has been so ordered that unless they

ask for an inspection or unless they find through reports that inspection was needed that it has been dispensed with. The report is accepted and adopted.

Comrades, we have a Committee from the Auxiliary of the Spanish War Veterans waiting to bring greetings in to us. Comrades Fenton, Strong and Bryant will you act as a Committee to escort these ladies here? (Committee escorted to platform) Comrades this is a Committee with greetings from the Auxiliary of the Spanish War Veterans. Salute. (Salute given) Comrades, I have the pleasure of introducing to you Mrs. Nabottany who will give you a few words of greeting.

Mrs. Nabottany: I was sent by our convention to bring greetings to this body of men and I was much pleased to think they allowed me to come and bring you greetings from our convention. I am sure our hearts are all with the Old Soldiers. Night or day we love our Old Comrades and we always try and to do what we can for them, so I present you this badge from my

Auxiliary and wish you all success.

Department Commander: Sister McIntosh.

Mrs. McIntosh: Comrades I am glad to be with you this afternoon and there are some faces I know, and Sister Nabottany isn't the only one who loves the old soldiers; I love them too.

Department Commander: I now introduce to you Sister Rabens, who

will give you a few words.

Mrs. Rabens: I think our time is very short. This is my first year here. I am certainly pleased to see so many of you here and hope you will live to come to many, many more years.

Department Commander: Sisters, I am glad you are here, and as a token of our appreciation allow me to present you with our badge so you will re-

member the time you are having with the "old boys."

I think our reports are all in with the exception of the Chief Mustering Officer. I wish to say there has been no work for that officer for the past year. We have had no new posts, we have lost some, and our Chief Mustering Officer is a worker, a good man and a good Comrade of the Grand Army and if there are no objections we will waive a report from him as he is very busy. There seems to be none therefore we will waive his report.

Officer of the Day: Commander, a delegation from the Spanish War

Veterans wish to be admitted.

Department Commander: Admit them. I will appoint the same committee to escort them in. (Delegation admitted)

Department Commander: Comrades, I introduce to you these Veterans of the Spanish War and they come to us with greetings. As their fathers we will now listen to a few remarks.

Mr. Starkey: It isn't my intention to take but a very few minutes because I could take hours if necessary to express what the Spanish War Vet-



erans would like to say to this gathering. I will say I had the great honor of my father being a member of Co. H. of the Michigan Calvary. When the trouble came in 1898 I would have been an unworthy son of a worthy father if I had not gone. I have the great honor of expressing our love and loyalty to the soldiers of 1861-65.

Capt. McCoombs, Detroit: Comrades: (I will call you Comrades because I hope in this great country of ours that we are all Comrades) I wish to say that the example you set in '65 was not lost in '98 by your sons and citizens. (Applause) The spirit that you gentlemen showed upon those great scenes of that historic time has never been lost since that time by your descendants. I want to thank as much as I can in behalf of the Spanish War Veterans the God of our Country who gave us such men as you to preserve our Country, and present you with this hope that you may be with us for years to come. As Comrade Starkey said we are worthy sons of worthy fathers and grand-fathers. My grand-father served in the Revolutionary War, my father in the Civil War and I served in the Spanish-American and through the war in France. Why was I that kind of a man? Because I had a grand-father and a father men like you that put me where I was. I take great pleasure in presenting to you Comrades, our little token of esteem. (Presents bouquet).

Department Commander: Comrade I accept this little token with the same kindness and feeling that I know it is given and Comrades all I can do is to give you one of our little souvenirs of this gathering. (Pins badge on each member of the committee).

Department Commander: Comrades, we have a committee to report. We are through with the officers reports. The committee appointed to visit the Soldiers' Home. If they are ready we will now hear their report. (Report read as follows):

REPORT OF SOLDIERS HOME COMMITTEE

Department Commander Henry Spaulding:

This appointment as you well know, came to me unexpectedly but with high appreciation of your courtesy, I would that some other Comrade had been chosen, but as a true soldier, I learned to obey my superiors, and therefore to the best of my ability, I will make the following report of our visit to the Soldiers' Home at Grand Rapids, May 4th and 5th, 1921.

On May 4th the committee met at the depot, at Grand Rapids, whence we were driven to the home of Mrs. Anna Stevens and Mrs. Emma Stevens, nieces of your humble servant. There we met by Col. McGurrin and he piloted us through the spacious grounds and cemetery, where there lies buried 2,160 of those who sacrificed their lives that this nation might live, and 195 soldiers widows, and I felt like saying: "They repose and in sleep yet how different from customary slumber, for the impact of life is absent and the brain has ceased its function; therefore let us shed our mutual tears at their parting, but let us take full happiness and comfort for having known them. Let us resolve as we meditate upon their virtues, that when the Bugle sounds for our lifelight to go out, we may be ready to say, 'Here, Lord, I am ready to obey your command,' therefore we who are left behind can only say, Comrades farewell.'

The beauties of nature had unfolded in the spacious, where the caretaker had flower beds groomed, and spread in splendid array, denoting great tribute to this nation, dear to the State of Michigan, and the Soldiers' Home



at Grand Rapids. Next we visited the splendid and well kept Greenhouse, where the florist had every conceivable plant and vine, Geranium foliage with all shades to beautify the Home grounds, and please the eye of thousands of admirers. Then came the inspection of the Home, where we were escorted by the Surgeon, Dr. Grube, through the several wards of the hospital.

Out of the many inmates there all seemed happy and contented, having

the best care, every spot and place was in the pink of neatness.

Clean bedding, well ventilated apartments, hot and cold water for all purposes a thorough inspection of the blind Comrades was heart-rendering, but like heroes all was contented. Then came the inspection of the feebleminded Comrades, who had lost all physical power (aye, worse than death), and all that human heart and hands could do for them was promptly administered. The noon-hour had nearly arrived and we was escorted to the spacious dining room and kitchen by the Commandant, where we saw a large delegation of Comrades file in, and each took their place and each enjoyed a hearty meal. During our visit and inspections, but one complaint was mentioned, that was, Comrades clamored for brown gravy with their meat and potatoes, instead of butter; while that was the best any creamery could produce; yet, brown gravy was preferred, and they got it. We were then shown through the official offices, where very efficient clerical help was busy at work. Col. McGurrin gave me the following Memo. Numbers of members, 714 men, 277 women. Inspection of officers every Saturday of all departments, and anything found necessary had immediate attention.

We have religious services in Concert Hall on Sunday and Wednesday evening conducted by Rev. Delphos R. Berry, and Catholic services and funerals are held in the Chapel in the G. A. Building. A Postoffice is located

here for the convenience of the members.

On account of lack of room in the Women's Building some of the women are quartered in the hospital, mostly, all who need medical attention and we have 83 women and 81 men, all of the men are bunk patients who need constant care by their competent nurses. All meals are provided for them by the Home, well served, and spotlessly clean. Col. McGurrin says we hope to have a new power plant soon, as the present equipment has been in use for about 23 years and its present condition is really dangerous.

The men enjoy themselves in the bungalow or card-rooms, and a moving picture show, they have once a week, and on certain occasions the show is given to the patients in the hospital in the afternoon. The Surgeon, Dr. Grube, makes a call at each of the buildings to take care of those who may

need attention.

On May 4th and 5th, the members of the Board of Control were in session, and we were all escorted to the spacious dining hall of the Commandant, and there a splendid banquet was spread by the Commandant's wife and maids, that could not be out-done by the White House caterers of Washington, D. C.

No word has yet been said about the Ladies' Annex, but the fact that the Matron, Mrs. Jennie L. Pond, sets a living example before the State of Michigan for efficiency and ability in conducting her housework in the care and responsibility of 277 old widows, some of the age of 96 or 98, commends itself, and needs no word of comment from the committee.

This committee can but speak in the highest terms of the Home, and the courtesy given by the Board of Managers, and the Officers of the Home. And we highly commend the Board of Managers for the very able manner

they conduct their work, and the interest they take in the Home.



The Officers of the Home, for conducting the best managed State Institution there is in Michigan, and the personal care they take of the members of the Home.

And especially the Matron, Mrs. Jennie L. Pond, for her able management her motherly care of the 277 widows in the Annex.

H. W. STEVENS. J. J. HOLMES, Committee."

Department Commander: Comrades you have heard the report of the committee to visit the Soldiers' Home. There hasn't been any too much said in that report. The Board of Managers of that Home are Civil War Veterans, a majority of them, and I want to say that the Spanish War Veterans, that are on that Board are willing to give the full control practically to the members of the Civil War on that Board and there is no contention. You have heard the report what will you do?

M. D. Richardson, Post No. 444: I move the report be accepted and adopted, and placed on file. Also that a vote of thanks be given to Comrade Stevens for the very able report which he read. Seconded and carried.

Department Commander: Are there any other committees that are

ready to report? We have no other officers.

D. J. Wilson, Post 48 of Jackson: As chairman of the Council of Administration I wish to report that we have examined the report of the Quartermaster and find it absolutely correct and I want to take this opportunity to congratulate this department for having such an able officer.

H. W. Stevens: I move that the report be accepted and adopted. Sec-

onded and carried.

Department Commander: Now Comrades what further business is there? We haven't appointed very many committees; we have much work to do. The business seems to be slipping along not any too fast to suit me. Remember this is our first day; tomorrow is our second day; we will have our meeting at nine o'clock a.m.; in the afternoon will be the parade at 1:30. Now if we get through with the work tomorrow as well as we have today we will be alright. Is it your wish to have the meeting tomorrow after the parade?

Chorus of voices: No.

Department Commander: If there are no objections when we adjourn we will adjourn until nine o'clock tomorrow morning and continue our meeting until the noon hour, twelve o'clock, or if we get through before that we can quit before, and then when we adjourn tomorrow at noon we adjourn until nine o'clock Thursday morning when comes our election of officers and location for our next meeting. Now then Comrades it seems to me when we have outsiders, when we have company or Comrades from other localities that we ought to hear from them. Our Commander-in-Chief is a talker and a worker, and I know you will all like him, I always have. I have voted for him several times and sometimes I have not. Comrade Ketchum, will you favor us with a few remarks?

National Commander, Comrade Ketchum: Department Commander, if I understood your announcement it was that whenever any man desires to address the Commander or the Encampment he should give his name, his location and his Post; in compliance with that suggestion I am William A. Ketchum of George H. Thomas Post No. 17, Department of Indiana, at Indianapolis, and I likewise have the honor of being the Commander-in-



Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic. I listened with interest to the report of your Judge Advocate of this Department. It has been my privilege to serve as Judge Advocate General under four different Commandersin-Chief. I have heard many whispers of discontent from some Departments and in some instances they have reached the stage of a growl, but in all the years of my service of Judge Advocate General I never had a whisper of trouble from the Department of Michigan. Now as I sit on the platform here (if you will sit down I can talk better). Now, as I sit on the platform here and look into the faces of these boys on which accomplishment, thought, consideration and achievement have graven such deep lines, I feel the joy that comes with the glory of accomplishment and achievement and yet of sadness because there will return to us never again the tender grace of a day that is dead.

Before coming here I had my Adjutant General give me an authentic list of the Grand Army of the Republic as it stood on the 31st of December last. There were twelve Departments that contained in the aggregate only 1644 men. There was only one Department that contained a membership of ten thousand, and in the whole 44 Departments there are today less than 94,000 members in good standing. When I think of what we had when we met in Boston in 1890, when I think how these few diminished members represent the two million and a half of men who in the heyday of their youth responded to their country's call, my thoughts go back to the beautiful lines that Miles O'Reilly wrote upon the occasion of the return of his regiment after three years of war.

"Three years ago we raised our hands to heaven

And on the rolls of muster our names were thirty-seven."

And so today while there are only 125,000 of the two million and a half that came to the rescue of their country we can have in our hearts the knowledge that we saved the land and made it free. (Applause) We saved the land, not simply for ourselves but for the world, for the world now knows that if we had failed from '61 to '65 when the battle for freedom and liberty and the rights of the people was being fought on the fields of France no man could tell what the result would be, but when the sons and the sons' sons of the fathers swept over the ocean the war was won and the boys of '61 saved the world.

Department Commander: Commander-in-Chief Ketchum, in behalf of the Department of Michigan I wish to thank you for your visit to us and the many kind words in your address. Take with you the good wishes of the Department of Michigan to your home and to your State; also to the National Headquarters.

Now, Comrades a motion to adjourn is in order.

A Comrade: I move that we adjourn until tomorrow morning at nine o'clock. Seconded and carried.

TUESDAY EVENING, JUNE 21st, 1921

Reception to the Department Commanders and Department Officers of the G. A. R. and W. R. C., at Hotel Durant.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 22nd AT 9 A. M.

Meeting opened with Department Commander Spaulding presiding.

Department Commander: Comrades, you will come to order. This is an adjourned meeting of the 43rd Encampment, Grand Army of the Re-



public. Officer of the Day are the approaches to this Encampment properly guarded?

Officer of the Day: They are.

Department Commander: Are all members entitled to a seat in this Encampment?

Officer of the Day: I think they are. Do you want the countersign taken up?

Department Commander: You are satisfied they are?

Officer of the Day: I am.

Department Commander: It isn't necessary to go through it.

Chaplain, invoke the Divine Blessing. (Divine Blessing invoked by De-

partment Chaplain Horace Palmer).

Department Commander: I now declare this Encampment duly open for the transaction of business. We will use the order of business as adopted by the National Encampment unless there are objections. There being none we will use the same rules as we have had. Comrade Raab wants to make a little announcement.

Mr. Raab: I want to say to you Comrades, and spread the news to everybody that you see that has come here on steam road they have got to have their tickets stamped to go back. Tell them not to wait until they take the train because there will be such a rush they may not be able to do it. The managers of the railroads have requested that the members who have these tickets get them stamped before train time. If they aren't stamped they are no good. I also want to announce that the excursion cars that will be furnished by the D. U. R. to the Lake out here will be run right to the lake. They put down a temporary track. The road don't run within a number of blocks of the lake but they have put down a temporary track right to the lake. The manager told me to announce that this morning.

E. A. Jennings, Post No. 145, Flint: I would like to make an announcement that the Spanish War Veterans invite all Comrades and their ladies to a military ball to be held here this evening. They are all welcome.

Commander of Post No. 48 of Jackson: One of our delegates fell practically paralyzed today and I want to get Comrade Nichols appointed in his place.

Department Commander: Of whom? Commander of Post 48: The delegate.

Department Commander: Is the Commander of the Post here?

Commander of Post No. 48: I am the Commander. Department Commander: Take care of that yourself.

Comrades, I will appoint committees to carry greetings to the different organizations. The first will be the Woman's Relief Corps. Comrades L. A. L. Gilbert, John Davidson and myself.

Ladies of the G. A. R.: Fli Strong, S. H. Blakeley, Dean LeBanty.

Sons of Veterans: George H. Freeland, Nick Brown, Fred Shipp.

Daughters of Veterans: William O. Lee, H. W. Stevens.

Daughters of the G. A. R.: Stone, Blakeley and C. H. Stevens. Spanish War Veterans: E. B. Fenton, L. H. Ives, L. Moshier.

Auxiliaries, Spanish War Veterans: Horace Palmer, F. L. Manning, E. S. Post.

These committees should get to work at once. Remember we have no meeting this afternoon and the other organizations I presume will not either so do your visiting this morning and have it settled.

Comrades just one little matter. Now Comrade Ives will meet Comrade



Fenton. Comrade Moshier if you don't get three go with two. I want to call your attention to the fact that the election will take place tomorrow forenoon not today. We are entitled to 13 delegates this year and one delegate-at-large and an equal number of alternates to the National Encampment and you think it over and if you want to change the plan of election of delegates have it understood. You will elect 13 delegates; that means one to each district, and then one at large. The one at large if you observe the rules we have had, will be elected by the Encampment and then there will be a roll call of districts and a caucus held by the delegates of each district and they nominate someone for a delegate and alternate from that district and report here and then the Encampment confirms their nomination but if you want to change it think it over and be ready to bring in any change you want to make before the election takes place.

W.G. Miner, Post No. 132: I would like to ask if an alternate will be elect-

ed to the delegate-at-large.

Department Commander: Not at this time; they will do that tomorrow morning. The rule as we have adopted them would have to be suspended to bring about any election until tomorrow morning. The business of the Encampment must be completed before you proceed to the election. Now. Comrades, what is your further pleasure? Let us do what we have got to do. It is going to be awful warm this afternoon for the parade and let everybody get out that can for the parade. I understand the line of march with the countermarch is less than a mile. It is from here to Fourth Street with the countermarch back.

Comrades, there seems to be nothing doing; no committees to report, and we can select the place for our next meeting if there are no objections. I will take that matter up. I hear no objections. Now then, we will receive

invitations for the next Department Encampment.

Comrade James of Detroit: Commander, inasmuch as that matter can be brought up now I have an invitation from Detroit for the next Department Encampment in 1922. I read you the invitation that you may see the character of it. I would like to say that last Saturday the Secretary of the Convention League called on me at my home and gave me these invitations to be presented to this Encampment. I had no opportunity to confer whatever with the Posts of Detroit in regard to their wish in that regard but since I have arrived here I have talked with the representatives from the various Posts there and they all concur in the invitation that is extended by the City and its organizations. (Invitations follow).

Department Commander: Comrades allow me to introduce to you the National President of the Ladies of the G. A. R. and the Chairman, Mrs. Hamilton. Salute.



"FLINT, MICHIGAN, June 22, 1921.

To the Department of Encampment of Michigan G. A. R.:

Your committee appointed on the report of Department Commander Henry Spaulding, hereby submit the following:

We commend Comrade Spaulding for his untiring devotion and labor in the continuous work in the interests of the G. A. R. during the past year.

We heartily approve of his recommendation that the salary of the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General be raised to \$900.00 per year, and that it be the salary for both offices, because \$800.00 is an inadequate salary for both offices.

The Woman's Relief Corps donate to the Department of Michigan \$200.00 per year. We concur in the recommendation of Department Commander Spaulding that \$100.00 of this fund go to the Assistant Adjutant General

and the other half to the Department.

Second: That as the National Encampment has increased the per capita tax to three times the amount it has been which will be in effect July 1st. We concur in the recommendation of Department Commander Spaulding that the per capita tax of this Department be raised to 50 cents per annum, to be paid 25 cents in June and 25 cents in December.

We recommend that the usual Past Department Commander's Badge with the usual design substantially be procured by the Council of Administration,



and presented to Comrade Spaulding, as a lasting recognition of his valuable services during the past year.

I move the acceptance and adoption of this report. Seconded and carried. Department Commander: Comrades, I thank you for the kind words which have been said. I have done nothing only my duty or what I considered my duty when I was installed in this office a year ago and if I have done any good I am only too proud to acknowledge it and glad that I have done it. I want to say to you Comrades that at the camp-fire last evening I received a little communication from the Woman's Relief Corps, a certified check to the amount of \$200.00 as their donation and help to this Department for the nex year. Now, I think as little as we can do is to give them a rising vote of thanks and those that are in favor of that rise to your feet. (All stood.) It is the unanimous vote of this Encampment that a vote of thanks be extended to the Woman's Relief Corps for this kind act. Comrades, once in a while things happen that kind of touch me a little. This came to me as a surprise over at the Majestic last evening when the Department President, Mrs. Davison, was called to the platform to make a few remarks. She came out and addressed the audience, turned to me and called my name and took my hands. We are not paupers but it is true to say we are along in years and there are not so many of us that are well fixed with this world's goods. It helps out this Department and the kindness of this Committee and the voting of increase of salary and the raising of the per capita tax, this helps out all along the line. I shall report to the Woman's Relief Corps the result of your acceptance of this donation. We do not take it as a donation, we are not paupers, we did not ask for it, but they gave it to us and we will accept it and use it. Comrade Richardson will you take the chair? I am going out for a little visit.

Comrade Raab: I want to say Comrades, I just received another thousand tickets from the D. U. R. to be used by the Comrades and the ladies. They are in possession of the Committee on Credentials. Those of you who have not got any of these tickets yet call on the boys and get them and the ladies of the G. A. R. and the Woman's Relief Corps are also entitled to these tickets. That makes three thousand the D. U. R. has given to us. The D. U. R. is supposed to be a souless corporation but they are using us pretty well in Flint.

Department Senior Vice Commander Richardson: What is the further will of the Encampment, Comrades?

William O. Lee, Past Department Commander: I presume that nearly every Comrade in this hall is aware of the fact that at the beginning of the Legislature in January, I presented a bill to make Memorial Day a sacred day to get rid of baseball, dances, horse races, circuses and picture shows on that one day. The bill went before the committee and I interviewed that committee three different times and I am ashamed to make this report but on that committee were three members from the City of Detroit, three members there that liked patriotism but played politics and the American Legion of Detroit objected to that bill because it interferred with their amusement on Memorial Day, and I couldn't get that bill out of the committee. I asked the committee to report it out without recommendation, I asked them to report it out adversely, and they refused to do so and then I stated I



would ask to have it released from the committee's hands. That was among the impossibilities to take from the committee a bill. You realize the fact that the one hundred men on that floor are on from three to five committees and there seems to be a feeling that if a bill is taken from one committee to another it is a disgrace. And so I called for the release of that bill from that committee. And then I asked for an aye and nay vote and I want to say to you Comrades that I accomplished what has never been accomplished on that floor before that I got 12 votes in favor of taking that bill from the committee and all the rest voted against it. But now that one hundred representatives from the State of Michigan are on record and 88 of them are on record as voting against Memorial Day and making it a sacred day. And God permitting me to live and my constituents permitting me to return to Lansing, I will present a bill, and I appeal to you men to help me, that will make one day of the 365 of each year a sacred day to the memory of the dead. I thank you.

E. C. Cannon, Post No. 16: Being very much in favor of making Memorial Day sacred, doing away with these plays and baseball and horse races and all that, I move you that a resolution be adopted like this: That we stand in favor of making Memorial Day a sacred day. Seconded and carried.

Henry W. Stevens: We have had a little experience down at Post No. 140 at Tecumseh in regard to this desecrating of Memorial Day. We were afraid we were getting too old to take all the responsibility of Decoration Day so it was decided to turn it over to the Legion and of course we expected it would be carried on as it had been heretofore and make it as sacred as it possibly could be but to our astonishment baseball and other amusements made it a day of sports, and now I am at a standstill what to do. I honor Comrade Lee for the position he took in the Legislature, it just suits me, and I believe in the first Post organized in Illinois when Logan was made Depart-

ment Commander he said it should be a sacred day.

Comrade Storr of Ionia: I am heartily in favor of making Memorial Day a sacred day. We got in line about 22 members of the old Grand Army, we held our Memorial Services at the Methodist Church and a strange thing happened at that time. As I took up the paper that morning I read it was to be the grand opening of the Golf Club to get ready for dancing in the evening. I said all the death and suffering of those men who didn't wait to be drafted into the service but went singing "We are coming Father Abraham" was to be desecrated. The tears are hardly dried of the mothers and fathers for the sons who died overseas when we see that the day was to be desecrated by the Golf Club opening. The Grand Army of the Republic should be men of stamina. We are. The rebels were wrong and eternally wrong. We left the school as boys some of us sixty years ago. I remember the 8th Michigan Regiment whose headquarters were in Flint, Col. Fenton was the Commander. I will say for the thirty members left in the Ionia Post that we took those flags in our own hands in remembrance of our Comrades, we marched to the graves and saw that Old Glory was placed on the grave of every fallen soldier. You men know what you suffered. You men that rallied round the flag in the 60's and '61 and then came home to the State of Michigan poor boys with you Thirteen and Sixteen dollars a month. Among those men we put two of them on the Supreme Bench, Judge Long and Judge Morse, both army veterans. Let us by all means keep the day

L. H. Ives, Past Department Commander, Member of Post No. 441: I am very glad to say that I never lost an opportunity to try and impress upon



the people that Memorial Day was not a holiday compared with the Fourth of July. That it was a sacred day in fact the Nations funeral day. I have often said to children "you would not think of burying your mother or father in the forenoon and go to a dance or ball game in the afternoon". I know some old Comrades have gone with others outside and enjoyed these pleaures on that day. I have thought since perhaps if Mr. Lee had had a word from every Post in Michigan the act of the legislature would have been different than what it was. A few days after the bill was defeated I saw Col. Gansser. He told me "I shall be down to Lansing next winter and I shall see what I can do to kelp about it.

William G. Miner, Post No. 132: I want to say just a word about turning over the Memorial Day exercises to the new organizations. Two years ago we signed a resolution against the desecration of Memorial Day. The Legion had already been planning for a big dance and baseball was to be played. I was a member of a committee to invite the Legion to go as our escort in the parade. We have the custom of having our services at the cemetery; they escorted us to the cemetery and back to the church and they hurried off down town with our colors. The next year I was on committee to invite them and we told them we wanted to follow our flag into the church. So the next year there were 17 Legion boys in line on Decoration Day and 8 of them went into the church with our flag, the rest went down town and

got ready to go to the ball game.

Comrade Warner, George H. Thomas Post No. 14: I want to say for one in behalf of George H. Thomas Post that I am most heartily in accord with the resolution. I hope that every soldier, every man, woman and child in the State of Michigan I wish would endorse that resolution. I want to relate to you just a little thing that occurred in a city in Arkansas on the 29th day of last May. I attended a Memorial service and I want to say that I got mad that day, I am mad now at what I heard. A man claiming to be a good American man delivered an address and he gave the Spanish-American War Comrades all due credit, he gave the World's War all due credit and they had a very nice service and all the rest of his discourse was in behalf of the Confederate Soldiers. He told the young men that they were the men who saved this country; that made this country what it was; "You don't know what a debt of gratitude" he says "we owe the Confederate Army." He never only once referred to the Federal Army and then he referred to them as a band of robbers.

Comrade Rabb, Post No. 145, Flint: I am in favor of this resolution. The Comrade spoke about a circumstance down south. Yesterday I read in the Free Press a letter written by a Virginian, who said he was a true American; he was right. This party referred to a monument that had been recently erected in Alabama in memory of Wilkes Booth who killed Abe Lincoln. What do you think of that Comrades, that our Government would allow any place to erect such a monument. Boys I tell you we got to fight them yet, not only the South but the North. I tell you Comrades, this country isn't all 100 per cent American by a good deal. Now the boys of the World War in twenty years from now will feel different from what they do now. They will remember their buddies buried across and they will revere their memory.

Department Commander: Comrades, you have heard the resolution: all who have heard that resolution signify by a rising vote. (All rise) It is unanimously adopted.



Comrade Lee: Now it is up to you when that bill comes up again to see to it.

Officer of the Day: Daughters of the G. A. R. to be presented.

Department Commander: I will-appoint Comrades Anthony E. C. Cannon and A. W. Haskins to escort them in. (Committee escorted in)

Department Commander: Comrades, the Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic are sending us greetings. Salute. (Boquet presented to

the Commander)

Department Commander: In behalf of the Department I will thank them for this beautiful bouquet from the Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic. I will introduce to you Mrs. Reeling, Senior Vice Commander of the State Department who will convey to you the greetings of the Daughters of the G. A. R.

Mrs. Reeling: I come with greetings to you all from the Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic. There are no body of men that are honored any more than you 'Boys' are by we Daughters and we hope that as long as any of you are alive some one of we Daughters will be with you to greet

you.

Mrs. Buckley, Junior Vice Commander: This is my first Encampment; we are recently organized and I just felt it was a wonderful honor on me to

be appointed to convey the greetings. I thank you very much.

Mrs. Perry, National Chaplain of the Daughters of the G. A. R.: Comrades, I am pleased to be with you today. This is my first chance to meet with you. We are proud of you and you are our fathers, we are your daughters, and as long as one of you remain we are going to be with you and support you and do everything we can for you and we are proud as daughters to be able to represent our body as Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic. Of course, we are young and are not recognized but we hope to be and we know we have the right name. Our fathers are proud of the name and we are proud of it. We love the order and we love the cause; that is why we are here.

Department Commander: Ladies, convey to your order the greetings of the G. A. R.'s. I give you a medal, not for its intrinsic value, but for the Daughters of the G. A. R.

Officer of the Day: Daughters of Veterans are waiting to be presented.

Department Commander: I will appoint the same committee to escort the Daughters of Veterans in. (Committee escorted in)

Department Commander: I have the pleasure of introducing to you the

National Alliance of the Daughters of Veterans. Salute.

Mrs. K. I. Hadley, of Jackson: Commander and Comrades, I have begged the privilege from the organization to which I belong of coming to see you "Boys" for this reason: My father was a charter member of Col. Stevensons Post No. 2, organized in Springfield, Illinois in 1866. It is the thing of which I am proudest of anything that has ever befallen me in my life that I am a daughter of a veteran and the daughter of one of the charter members of that Post. My father was present at the organization of the Post in Decatur and today in their Post room the old Charter which was issued before you became National is hanging on the wall with my father's name on it so I begged the privilege of coming and looking in your faces. I am a daughter, a widow and a mother of a soldier and to you my heart goes out. Every time I see you I want to take my hat off and especially these "Boys" with the red neckties. My husband was on the frontier for sometime and he was a personal friend of General Custer. Having been on



the frontier myself I realize more than some of these eastern people do what that meant, and so I am proud to bring the greetings of the Daughters of Veterans and this bouquet as a slight token of our love for you and as long as there is an old soldier my heart beats for you and all of my sisters join in their love to each and every one. God bless you.

Mrs. Vanwert: I do not think I can add anything to what our sister has just said but it is a great pleasure to be here this morning and also when I saw Henry Spaulding come in the door I was glad, he is from my home town,

and I want to pin my badge on him.

Mrs. Glasgow of Grand Rapids: Comrades, Fathers: We are indeed the proudest organization I was going to say, meeting in Flint, and I almost believe we are. I see some faces I have seen in convention before; I see some faces from home. I am sure that every one of you feel the love we carry in our hearts for you. I thank you.

Department Commander: You will convey back to your Department the

greetings of the G. A. R. which bid you God speed.

Officer of the Day: Commander, the Auxiliary of the Sons of Veterans

to be presented.

Department Commander: I will appoint the same committee to escort them in. (Delegation escorted in) Salute the Auxiliary of the Sons of Veterans.

Mrs. Piper: I think so much of you old soldiers for my father was an old soldier and we are ready to do all we can for we love them so. We are here to extend greetings from the Sons of Veterans, Camp No. 2 of South Haven.

Mrs. Merkle: I am very glad to be here with you and extend the greetings from our Auxiliary for my father was also an old soldier and I am not

very much of a speaker.

Department Commander: I wish to say besides sending the greetings back by the G. A. R. that there is a movement on foot for a better observance of Memorial Day and I believe it is for you to start out in that line and see if you cannot assist us old veterans to have one sacred day out of the 365. I return your greetings from our Order.

Comrades don't forget our parade at 1:30 city time, that will be 12:30 railroad time. It is the desire of the people here that as many as can turn out in that parade and let us try to do it. What is the further will, Comrades?

David Wilkingshaw: I wonder whether we do our cuty. In Marshall where I live they don't play any ball or go to any dance that day. Our Sons of Veterans take care of that. I think if we all worked like that there wouldn't be so much of that.

Department Commander: I have my impression that if we would turn this over to the Sons of Veterans instead of the Legion we have more control

with the Sons of Veterans than the Legion.

Mr. T. A. Willett, Post No. 145, Flint: We have got the best Memorial arrangement in the City of Flint that they have got in the world. This last year and every year we have been trying to do it a little better. Now when the Memorial services are going on we haven't got a lot of other things going on. This year the World's War Boys joined in with us and we had one of the grandest parades I ever saw in my life. Everything that was possible to be done was done even to putting steps in a bus, a couple of young folks taking you by the arm and helping you up and sitting you down and if you have got any World War Boys where you live don't slight them in any shape or manner but say "See here boys, you have got to do what we did 50 or 60



years ago." We have it in our schools, little kids 6 or 7 years old carrying flags, loyal, just as loyal as we were when we took off our clothes to put on the blue. I have seen men picked up and set in the car by young men, so just go right home now and say to the young men, to the schools, your mothers and sisters and daughters, what you heard an old soldier say in Flint today.

A Comrade: I move that we adjourn. Seconded.

Department Commander: It has been moved and seconded that we adjourn. (Vote taken and motion carried.) (Adjourned to Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.)

THURSDAY MORNING JUNE 22nd, 9 A. M.

(Meeting called to order by Department Commander, Henry Spaulding.) Department Commander: Comrades we are about to re-open this Encampment. Officer of the Day are the approaches to this Encampment duy guarded?

Officer of the Day: They are.

Department Commander: Are those present entitled to a seat in this Encampment?

Officer of the Day: Commander, I think they are all of them.

Department Commander: You are saitsfied they are?

Officer of the Day: Yes sir.

Department Commander: The Chaplain will invoke the Divine Blessing. (Divine Blessing invoked by the Department Chaplain, Horace Palmer as follows):

"Almight God come near us and be with us as we meet in this Encampment. We thank you for the privilege of greeting one another so many years after the conflict in which we were engaged. As we meet and perhaps meet for the last session of this Encampment may we think and act and conscientiously do all things we do. Help us to be cheering and helping and in our declining years may we feel that we have not only the Comrades grip but the One who saves from sin. Lord direct us and guide us. Bless the officers who are going and out those coming in. And when our work is ended may we enter the glories of your Kingdom forever. We ask it all in the name of Christ, our Redeemer, Amen."

Department Commander: Comrades, the Encampment is now open for

the transaction of any business that may come before it.

Comrade L. A. L. Gilbert: My attention has been called by a number of Comrades present concerning the action that was taken on the report of the committee who had in charge the report of the Department Commander at our first session, that part of it concerning the raising of the salary of the Assistant Adjutant General and Quartermaster General and the raising of the dues and per capita tax. Now in the best interests of this organization I believe it policy that we understand this matter better. I therefore move you that we reconsider that ballot that was taken yesterday morning on the adoption of that resolution. Seconded.

Department Commander: Comrades you have heard the motion of Comrade Gilbert regarding the reconsideration of the resolution which was

passed vesterday. Are there any remarks?

Comrade Fred Shipp, Post No. 42, Lansing: What was the resolution

that was passed yesterday morning?

Department Commander: The resolution was on the adoption of the recommendation made by the Department Commander, the raising of the



Adjutant General's salary \$100.00 a year and the raising of the per capita tax to fifty cents a year and it was adopted, there was no opposition to it.

This is for a reconsideration. Are you ready for the question?

Comrade L. A. L. Gilbert, Post No. 67, Bay City: I believe that a majority of the members present did not understand what they were voting on. I believe that because so many have spoken concerning it. Therefore I thought it wisest that we have a chance so that they will all be satisfied. I believe that at this stage of the game we are paying all the salary we can afford to pay. I believe that we are paying as much per capita tax as we can afford to pay. I believe that we have a fund in our hands today that will serve us for many years to come with what we get from the Relief Corps. Therefore, I deem it advisable that you give us a chance to talk this matter over and vote on it intelligently.

Department Commander: Comrades, it has been explained to you now and the motion to reconsider is now in order. If there are no further remarks make it manifest by saying "Aye". Opposed "Nay". Comrades, I want you all to vote. We will take this over again. All in favor say "I". Opposed to it "No". The resolution is reconsidered; it is now before you.

Officer of the Day: We have a delegation here of children.

Department Commander: We will receive the children. Comrades. Lee, Bryant and Gilbert are appointed a committee to escort the children in.

Mrs. Hart: Department Commander and Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic: It has been my pleasure for a number of years to greet you and we have told you so many years about our children we thought this year we would bring them with us and let you see for yourselves. These children are doing a great work and we are trying to teach them all patriotism. They are doing for these Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic relief work of all kinds, cheering work. When they are sick, at all times when we think they need our assistance, and this is our captain and we want you to hear a few words from her.

Mrs. Anderson, Captain: Department Commander, Comrades: As captain of the Abraham Lincoln Picket Children of Detroit I greet you. This is the first opportunity we have had to meet with you but we hope it will not be the last and that we will be able to be with you for a great many years. We wish to present to you this bouquet of flowers as a token of our love. reverence and respect.

Mrs. Chopp: Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic you are the men who fought those cruel battles that made a record for yourselves, for

the G. A. R. of America are the greatest men on earth.

Department Commander: You are not sorry that you admitted this delegation out of order a little are you? I didn't know what was coming, I didn't know who they were but I am glad they are here the remarks made by them are very interesting and appropriate for this occasion. I thank you for this bouquet. I accept it in the name of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty and for the benefit of the Grand Army of the Republic.

(A song was then sung by the children)

W. G. Miner, Post No. 132: I move you we give the children of the G. A.

R. three old fashioned cheers. Seconded and carried. (Cheers)

Department Commander: Children of the G, A. R. I haven't words to express our appreciation for the kindness in visiting us and the interest you are taking in our order. Accept this little souvenir, our delegate badge; I thank you again for your attendance. Comrades salute.



Officer of the Day: Commander, we have Washington Gardner back there and I can't bear to see him back there.

Department Commander: Bring him up here I want him on the platform. Comrade Gardner come forward.

Washington Gardner: Commander your command has been obeyed.

Department Commander: Comrades, there is a motion before the Encampment. We will hold that motion a moment to hear from Comrade Cannon in regard to a matter that ought to have been taken up early this morning.

E. C. Cannon: I move that this telegram be sent to Comrade Lamb who is sick in Detroit.

"To Edwin F. Lamb, Detroit, Michigan.

The Grand Army of the Republic in Encampment assembled, sincerely regrets that illness has enforced your absence from our midts and extend our good wishes and hope for your speedy recovery. Adopted by rising vote.

E. C. Cannon."

E. C. Cannon: I move this be adopted by the rising vote of the Encampment and sent to Comrade Lamb. Seconded.

Department Commander: Now Comrades, we will hold that motion for a minute or two. We have with us one of our old—not old—I will take that back; but one of our first Past Department Commanders; also Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic and we are always ready to give him a hearty hand shake and this Encampment would not do their duty if they did not recognize him this morning. I therefore call on Comrade

Washington Gardner to give a few remarks.

Washington Gardner: Commander and Comrades: I certainly am glad to be with you in this session of the annual Encampment. I was sorry not to be able to be here at the beginning and to stay through to the end. Next month it will be sixty years since the battle of Bull Run when the war broke out. We boys thought a man sixty years old was an old man but sixty years ago we were old enough to be soldiers; how do you suppose we look now to these young people who look through the same kind of eyes we did sixty and seventy years ago. Time has borne us along so quietly through many eventful years that our lives cover one of the most important periods I think in the world's history and we were permitted to share in one of the great events of that history. I noticed last week I think it was that we have 220,000 soldiers of the Civil War left. We had over twenty-three hundred thousand enlistments, as shown by the War Department. So that three out of every ten has passed over so that we are in sense a remnant of that great army and yet as I look into your faces this morning it does not seem possible that sixty years has passed since many of us enlisted in that conflict. We are old men it is true but we hope we got some time yet. I have been asked a number of times since I came here about pensions; that leads me to say I want to thank the Comrades here and those who be here when you see them for what you did to influence President Harding to appoint the present Pension Commissioner. I was informed this morning by the best informed Commander in the state on that question that there were only two Comrades in all the Department of Michigan who did not hold up both hands and say to President Harding "We would like to have one of our 'Boys' appointed Pension Commissioner so I want to thank you sincerely



for that. A delegation of thirty Congressmen I learned a few days ago, waited on the President immediately after his election having a Spanish War candidate for Pension Commissioner; he heard them patiently, the different spokesmen, then he said "Gentlemen I would like to comply with your wishes but I am going to appoint a Civil War Veteran Pension Commissioner." and in order that they might understand he said 'His name is Gardner from Michigan.'' It will be my duty, if I live and have my health, to perform the duty to the best of my ability. It is a mans job I have found out already. 850 employes expending \$260,000,000.00 a year. We have passed the peak of our numbers by 500,000 to be exact we are about 530,000 less now than we were when we reached the highest number on the pension roll and yet pensions today are costing the Government more than at any time in our history. We have not only the Civil War Veterans, the Spanish War Veterans, the Mexican War Veterans and their widows and the widows of the War of 1812 and the Indian Wars, together well over \$250,000,000 a vast sum of money. Congress as you know has been exceedingly liberal it seems to me in the matter of pensions with Civil War Veterans as you know the minimum now is \$50.00 a month and the maximum \$72.00. The question has been asked many times "Are we going to get any more?" I don't know. I am mighty glad we are getting what we do. I remember when we used to shoot at the Johnies three days at a time and we got \$13.00 a month for doing it. Now we can settle on the banks of the river and fish or whittle and get \$50.00 a menth for that. I lots rather fish or whittle than to fight the Johnies. I don't know what the future is; a great many of our men are 80 years and over, feeble, some less than that. The office is going to be liberal in the construction of the ailments of these aged and decrepit men. They are not here; the flower of the Michigan men are here the old men, the feeble men are back home, they couldn't come and they are the men that the pension bureau seeks to be liberal to. The question is asked "Will it ever be \$72.00 a month?" I don't know. It is for Congress and not for the Pension Bureau to decide. There is a good deal of agitation and I heard one very responsible man say he thought that when men reached 80 years of age they ought to get the maximum. Of course, that would not take many in here this morning for we are the "Boys." The ladies are getting \$30.00 a month; if the soldiers get \$72.00 they will probably get \$50.00. I had a talk recently with one of the high officials of one of the Houses and he declared they would not be able to make any advancement this year. Now, with regard to the time of payments. A Bill has been reported out by the committee on Invalid Pensions unanimously reported, favoring the payment every thirty days instead of every ninety days as is now. Only the men paid from the pension Bureau are left who get ninety day payment. The World War Veterans and many others and all the civil employes are receiving their pay every thirty days, some of them every two weeks, and it is thought by many there we ought to have out pay every thirty days. Whether it will be adopted this year I don't know but I am inclinded to think before this Congress adjourns, I mean while this Congress lives, it will be nearly two years before we have a new Congress, that that will become the law. That is only my own opinion. Now I don't want to take your time further than this to say that if you don't get prompt responses to your communications, and we get about 400 a day from different parts of the country, just write in the second time and raise a rumpus and we will do the very best we can to serve you. 1 thank you.

Department Commander: Comrades, I think we are well pleased by



holding this motion. Now, Comrades the motion was to reconsider a resolution which was passed yesterday and it has carried. The resolution is now

before you for action.

Comrade Chase, Post No. 126: There are two propositions in the review of this resolution. First take up the question of the increase of salary for the Assistant Adjutant General and Quartermaster General \$100.00. The Assistant Adjutant General and the Commander know more about the worth of that work than any other one of us. Now let us take up that proposition separately and if it is voted that that salary should be increased and you feel it should not be taken from the general fund let us vote that it be taken from the other fund but let us pay the men who do our work a decent sort of salary. Now, second, take up the proposition of the per capita tax. Now, Comrades, do you understand that the National Council of Administration passed at the National Encampment at Indianapolis a resolution raising the per capita tax? Now, we have been paying only 25 cents a year. We paid that when we got \$12.00 a month. We paid that when we got \$25.00 a month and now we are kicking because they want another quarter and we are getting \$50.00 a month. We aren't doing ourselves justice. Let us pass a resolution that the increase be paid from our common fund.

O. A. Janes: I am fully in accord with the action of this Encampment vesterday stated by Comrade Chase. At Port Huron, one year ago the office of the Assistant Adjutant General and that of Assistant Quartermaster General was consolidated and so whoever is Assistant Adjutant General is also Assistant Quartermaster General and must perform all those duties. The salary was fixed at \$800.00. Prior to that the Assistant Quartermaster General was getting \$50.00 a month, and in addition to that this Encampment was paying for the compiling of the Journal. Now, all that is incorporated in this salary of \$900.00 a year, to compile the Journal without extra compensation. And I think the man is entitled at least to \$900.00 at this time. The high cost of living has not been reduced yet. You couldn't get a person to perform the duties of a simple clerk unless you paid at least \$100.00 a month and if it was one that was versed in financial matters we had to pay from \$1,400.00 to \$1,500.00 a year so don't let us be niggardly and require our Comrade to perform the duties of both offices for less than \$900.00 a year. So I say in regard to the per capita tax. That matter was largely discussed at Indianapolis. I happened to be on the committee recommending it. From the showing made the per capita tax was inadequate to pay the expenses of the National body so that increase was imposed on the various Departments. Now let us make it fifty cents a year from each Comrade to pay to his Post. It is only an addition of twenty-five cents. You have got to put it through and we don't want to have our finances depleted to that extent that we have to go out and beg for help. Let us pay our way so I say I am opposed to the rejection of that action taken yesterday that the per capita tax shall be fifty cents a year instead of twenty-five from your Post to the Department.

Comrade Frashier, Post No. 70: In conference with many members of the small Posts throughout the State I object to the raising of the per capita tax. As the Comrade stated when we were drawing \$30.00, there were a thousand members at that time to pay the 25 cents, where there are not a hundred now. They can get now a dollars worth for a dollar. The poor Comrades and the poor Posts through the State have time a to live now.

Comrade Storr, Post No. 211: I think this question is not what we would like to do but what we can do. Take the Post at Ionia which in its best



days contained 335 members today it contains 34 members and the Ionia Post couldn't exist today if it was not for the Woman's Relief Corps. We have a hall in Ionia for which we are paying \$100.00 a month. The overseas boys came back and said "We will buy your furniture, we will rent the hall, we will give you the use of that hall." The result was that they bought our furniture, broke up in a row and left us without a home. There was a society in Ionia, the Knights of Pythias, that said "We have built the most beautiful hall in Ionia; come and occupy it." And we have a home until the last member is laid to rest. A majority of the Grand Army men are struggling, many of them are living on their \$600.00 a year. Now Comrade Gardner remarked that there were probably few men 80 years old in this hall. I have passed 80 years. We must not lose the best organization in Michigan.

Comrade Cannon: I am surprised that you took our report up this morning. We have a fund of \$600.00 to pay your per capita tax with. We cannot possibly live long enough to use that \$600.00. There was no other way to get along only to pay the fifty cents that the National Encampment want us to pay and we took this all into consideration. I was surprised when I come in here and found you had taken this up. The Woman's Relief Corps gave us \$200.00 and they expect to give us \$200.00 a year. This Comrade from Detroit won't starve nor go to the poorhouse but there is no other way for us to do but to ray the fifty cents and some of us are willing to pay it and those of you who don't want to pay it the Woman's Relief Corps will pay the rest.

Comrade O. A. Janes: We have been on a committee that has been investigating. The Woman's Relief Corps took up a silver offering; they gave between six and seven hundred dollars that Posts that were delinquent in the payment of their dues should not be suspended from the Department. The principal is over six hundred dollars and the interest has paid the delinquent dues. Now that is what the Relief Corps has done and so none of you need feel that you are unable to pay fifty cents a year per capita tax.

A Comrade of Post No. 79 of Kalamazoo: I am heartily opposed to this increase of per capita tax. We have had nearly 600 members and we can name 75 or 80 today who pay per capita tax. I think it is an injustice to ask men to do it. In Orcutt Post we had 59 or 60 men incapacaitated. I am in my 84 year and I am living on less than \$600.00 a year. I say Comrades vote it down.

Officer of the Day: Doctor Grooby of Grand Rapids, wishes to come and sing for you.

Department Commander: Admit him.

Comrade Barney, Post No. 145, Flint: Perhaps it may not be in good taste for me to talk upon this question as you have the convention in our city. The curse of our nation today is raising salaries when things are coming down. I want to say to you that Gov. Crapo Post, No. 145 are living on the charity of the people of Flint. Just as sure as you allow even the present salaries to continue it will be the ruination of this land.

Francis Tindell, Post No. 395: Comrades I am opposed to it and I will tell you why. We have got a nice little Post and we had a nice mother. When our mother was alive she took care of us, took care of the Comrades that couldn't pay. Today we have got Comrades that can't pay a cent. Now do you want those poor Comrades to have their per capita tax raised twenty-five cents more? Is it right? We were brothers in the war is it proper and right that we should come here and vote a burden on the Comrades



that can't pay? Is that justice? Is that loyalty and friendship? I say Comrades vote her down.

W. A. Preston, Post 121: I don't know as I can favor this matter as put before this Convention. The increase of this thing and that thing and the decerase of the Grand Army of the Republic; there are hundreds of Posts in the country today that have from four to fifteen members. You say they are getting \$50.00 a month; that is very true but they don't pay any per capital tax now or should we go to work and pay that per capita tax with the decreasing number of our Posts. Now, gentlemen, I am opposed to this increase.

Commander of Post No. 79 of Kalamazoo: Now, Comrades, Department Commander, I submit to you this one proposition that it is poor business for us to be raising salaries when the general expenses of living is going down. Everything that I can think of is cheaper than a couple of years ago except rents and fuel. It may not be that this increase of salary of \$100.00 would amount to very much to us but it is poor policy for us to raise

salaries when every one else are decreasing them.

Commander U. S. Grant Post, Bay City: I have heard a great deal of fuss made about this raise of twenty-five cents a year in our per capita tax. Now a great many of you are bringing the thing up about the reduction of living. If you could pay twenty-five cents ten years or fifteen years ago when your wages were about half of what they are today, when your pension wasn't one dollar where it is five today, and when your membership of the State of Michigan was twenty thousand instead of four thousand, now why shouldn't you raise twenty-five cents? Can't you afford it? What is twenty-five cents a year? Suppose you didn't earn a cent outside of your pension; can't you live on \$50.00 a month? There isn't any question but what you could pay one dollar better than you could pay twenty-five cents ten years ago. The idea of making a fuss about twenty-five cents a year. In a year from now you will have a thousand less to pay, five hundred less anyway to pay towards sustaining the headquarters. I can't see where the objections can come in.

Department Commander: I want to say just a word here; I was the one who offered this recommendation and let me tell you the facts. Two years ago this Department was paying the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General \$1,100.00 a year and they consolidated the two Offices and reduced it to \$800.00 and the recommendation as to the per capita tax we are as a Department obliged to pay ten per cent or pay the difference; they raised that per capita tax three times. Our per capita tax last June was \$81.00 and in December we paid \$200.00; there's the point. That is all.

Comrades, the question is called for. We will take the vote. You have all heard the resolution are you going to take this single or as it was? There is no question raised as to that.

O. A. Janes, Detroit: I move that the question be divided. Seconded and carried.

Department Commander: The question will be taken on the first recommendation as to the raising of the salary of the Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General. Those in favor of that resolution make it manifest by saying 'I'. Contrary by saying 'No'. We will take a rising vote. Those in favor of that resolution make it manifest by arising vote. Yes, 69; No, 103.

The next will be on the question of raising of the per capita tax. Those



in favor will make it manifest by saying "I". Contrary by saying "No." The "I's" seem to have it.

Audience: Rising vote.

Department Commander: The vote will be taken on the second recommendation the raising of the per capita tax to fifty cents per year. Now then all in favor of that make it manifest by saying "I". Contrary by saying "No". The chair is unable to decide; we will take a rising vote. As I said before and I wish you would pay attention to it, I want every Comrade to vote, it is your duty. Those in favor of that will rise to your feet and be counted. Those not in favor rise. The motion is lost.

We are now to vote on the report of this committee as amended. All those in favor of that will make it manifest by saying "I". Contrary "No". The "I's" have it.

Comrade Janes: Commander and Comrades, the report I am going to read to you now is from a committee appointed one year ago at Pt. Huron and as you look at the record that committee was unable to come to any definite conclusion and had to leave to visit Lansing during the ad interim and investigate the matter at night and arrive at some conclusion here. We made the investigation there and adjourned to Flint where we have held three sessions all night long so that that committee has not had much opportunity to accept the hospitality of Flint.

Report follows

'To the Department Encampment of the G. A. R., June 23, 1921:

Your committee appointed by Edwin F. Lamb, Department Commander, at Port Huron, Michigan a year ago to investigate the alleged discrepency of \$279.30 in the report of Comrade Uriah H. Lazelle, former Assistant Quartermaster General of this Department, report that after such investigation at Port Huron as we were able to make, your committee was granted authority to go to Lansing and confer with both the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General where they could have access to all the books, papers and reports involved in the case in order to make amicable adjustment of the discrepancy reported.

Two of your committee met at the office of the Assistant Adjutant General at Lansing on May 27th last and there were present both Comrades Lazelle and Spaulding and we were assisted in the tabulation of accounts by Comrade Chapin. Unable to conclude our investigation at that time, we adjourned to meet here in Flint during this encampment and after going into the matter quite extensively, your committee have come to the following conclusions:

First, that all of the moneys that were received by Comrade Lazelle acting in his capacity as Assistant Quartermaster General was accounted for by him and disbursed by him in his capacity as such officer in a lawful manner, that none of it was converted to his own use.

Furthermore, it is our firm conviction that the apparent discrepancy in the report that was alleged to have existed between the Assistant Adjutant General and the Assistant Quartermaster General we believe was a mere matter of bookkeeping and irregularity or mistake in the charging of the accounts and that there is nothing in this case which would tend to show any act on the part of either Comrade Lazelle or Comrade Spaulding as being



dishonest and that the Department is not injured in a ny way, that all moneys have been faithfully accounted for.

Respectfully submitted in F. C. & L., O. A. JANES, E. C. CANNON, RAYMOND A. PARKER, Committee."

Comrade Janes: I move the adoption of the report. Seconded.

Senior Vice Commander: All in favor signify by saying "I". Contrary "No." The "I's" have it.

erous gift of free tickets which individually we fully appreciate.

3rd. That especial thanks be tendered to the owners and drivers of automobiles which saved many of us exhausting walks from meeting places to lodgings.

4th. That especial thanks be tendered to the Boy Scouts for their effi-

cient and thoughtful service.

Officer of the Day: A delegation from the Woman's Relief Corps waiting. Department Commander: Comrades Janes, Cannon and Lee I will

appoint you as a committee to escort them in.

Comrade Janes: Commander and Comrades, I present to you Mrs. Torrey, Past President of the Relief Corps sent by the Relief Corps to extend the greetings of the Relief Corps. Past President Mrs. Johnson, the Commander's wife and Mrs. Bryant.

Department Commander: Comrades remain standing just a moment.

General Orders No. 4, Series 1920-21.

1—The Forty-Third Annual Encampment of the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, will be held in the City of Flint, Mich., on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, June 21, 22 and 23, 1921.

Headquarters will be at the Durant Hotel. The business meetings will be held in the Auditorium of the Hotel.

2—Comrade M. C. Barney, Commander of Gov. Crapo Post, No. 145, of Flint, has made the following details to act as officers during the Encampment: Officer of the Day, William R. Pratt, of Post 145; Officer of the Guard Amander Ruby, of Post 145; Chief Marshal for Parade, Fred Aldrich.

The Officer of the Day will Detail a sufficient number of Comrades to act as Guards during the sessions of the Encampment.

Commander Barney will select a committee to look after and have charge of the Registration; also select a suitable place for Registration.

They will report to the Assistant Adjutant General, at Department Head-quarters, Tuesday, the 21st, at nine o'clock a. m., for duty.

- 4—The Council of Administration will meet in Headquarters Room, on the morning of the 21st, at 9:30 sharp, to audit the books of the Assistant Quartermaster General, and transact such other business as may properly come before them.
- 5—Blanks for the reports of Post Chaplain and Post Patriotic Instructor will accompany these Orders; also self addressed envelopes for the return of said reports to Department Chaplain and Patriotic Instructor. These reports should be made out immediately after Memorial Day. It is the wish of the Department Commander that every Post in the Department be prompt in this work and not a Post be reported delinquent.

TO THE ADJUTANTS AND QUARTERMASTERS.

No reports are to be made in June, but the Semi-Annual per capita is due on the last regular meeting in June, on the basis of the December report. A few Posts are delinquent now. MEMORIAL SUNDAY.

Patriotic sessions should be held in public schools on Friday, May 27th, and Comrades detailed to visit the schools on that day, who should seek to impress upon the minds of the scholars love of country, respect for the Flag, and a veneration for the men who saved them both to posterity.

General Logan's first Memorial Day Order No. 11, with "Lincoln's"

Gettysburg Address, should be read at all Memorial Day exercises.

Special attention is called to Senate Bill No. 79, File No. 68, as passed by the Fifty-first Legislature, Session of 1921, entitled "An Act to authorize townships, cities and villages to appropriate money to defray the expenses of the proper observance of Memorial or Decoration Day."
