**FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT
DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN
GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC
HELD AT DETROIT, MICHIGAN, JUNE 14, 15 AND 16, 1922.**

The Forty-fourth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was called to order by the Department Commander, J. J. Holmes, in the Blue Room of the Hotel Tuller, Detroit, Michigan, at 2:00 P. M., Wednesday, June 14, 1922.

Department Commander introduced acting Mayor John Lodge, who gave an address of welcome to the Veterans in behalf of the citizens of Detroit, Mayor Couzens being confined in the hospital through illness. Mr. Lodge stated that he was a member of a local organization when the Great Encampment of 1882 convened, and that the people honored all grand-children and children of the Veterans; that he was also a member of the Great Encampment of 1892; again of the encampment of 1915, the National Convention and that while on his way this afternoon to this Encampment, he was met by a Veteran who said to him that the city had changed. Yes, it has changed, but the hearts of the people are just as loyal and warm and have not changed from 1882, '91, 1915—then why should there be a change in this warm welcome, except that this welcome may be greater? It is a welcome that this city owes to the Grand Army of the Republic. If this were a walled city with gates, as the Chief Executive of the City, and Acting Officer, I would present the gates of the city to the veterans—but thank God, we have no walls to keep out people. I say that this welcome will be one that you may remember so long as you live, and may this city be a memory in your hearts. It gives me great pleasure to have said these few words to you, Commander of the Department of Michigan, Ladies and Gentlemen.

Department Commander thanked Acting Mayor Lodge for his hearty welcome extended in behalf of the city, to the Encampment.

Honorable Geo. A. Walters was introduced, being Secretary of the Police Department; stating that he thought the reason he was sent to give this little talk and one of welcome was, that "these young fellows here, needed somebody from the Police Department to keep them from coming out; everybody in Detroit is much impressed and all extend their heartiest greetings and welcome, for the sacrifices you have made." Stated that Abraham Lincoln referred back to the time when on this American Continent there was born a new nation; that all men are born equal; and then later to perpetuate that liberty and the right to life and pursuit of happiness is for all; and that after four years of agony there was again sent forth a messenger to express thanks that this country is doubly repaid in freedom—that splendid foundation so essential to a free country. We have gone on year after year and the prosperity and success that has resulted therefrom dates back to the achievements of you men here today, and to you, we are everlastingly grateful, and we can say, that we most thoroughly and heartily appreciate your presence here in our City, and anything that this little old police department can do

to make your stay here a pleasant one, we will be glad to do. I appreciate this brief few moments standing here before you, and assure you again how welcome you are in our city.

Department Commander: Thanked Mr. Geo. A. Walters for his kind words of welcome, and then announced that all who were not Delegates to the Encampment absent themselves from the room. It was finally conceded that the hall or room was, through some mistake, taken by the Encampment, gentlemen, whereas it really should be occupied by the Ladies' Relief Corps, hence the Comrades took possession of the Blue Room just across the hall, and continued their session, as follows:

Commander Holmes: Called meeting to order in the Blue Room. Commander asked the Comrades if they had any objection to the Press Reporters being in the room, whereupon it was made a motion and carried, they be admitted or allowed to remain in.

Commander: Comrades you will come to order. Officer of the Day are the approaches to this Encampment properly guarded?

Officer of the Day: They are.

Commander: Officer of the Day see that the doors are closed and your guards on duty. Are all present members of the Grand Army of the Republic and entitled to seats in this encampment?

Officer of the Day: The National Countersign.

Commander: All delegates must have the badge. The members of the Grand Army not delegates will be seated back of the delegates. Chaplain Palmer will you take a seat here please?

Officer of the Day: All present are members of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Commander: Comrades, once more we have assembled in Encampment at our annual meeting. We meet in Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, and may all our hearts unite as one in sustaining the great objects of our Association. Parade rest. Chaplain Palmer invoke the Divine Blessing.

(Divine Blessing invoked by Chaplain Palmer.)

Commander: I declare the Forty-fourth Department Encampment of the Department of Michigan now open in due form for the transaction of any business that may be lawfully brought before it. The first will be the calling of roll; you will listen.

Report or Commander's Address is as follows:

To the Department of Michigan, G. A. R.:

Much credit is due them in their devotion to our needy comrades, their widows and children. Earle, and her staff of officers, for their loyalty and support given, as well as 10,336 worthy members of our noble auxiliary. I desire at this time, to assure the President and members of the Woman's Relief Corps that we fully appreciate their work and their patriotic devotion to the Grand Army of the Republic.

This organization composed of wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of veterans of the Civil War, is formed for the same purpose as the Woman's Relief Corps. The Daughters organization are a part of our family. These faithful and earnest workers are ever thoughtful and mindful of their fathers, teaching the love of country, devotion to the flag, and by carrying flowers to sick comrades, they prove their devotion to us. May Heaven's choicest blessings be upon them.

DAUGHTERS OF THE G. A. R.

This organization is composed of and made up of only our daughters and grand-daughters and their daughters, and are earnestly working for and looking after the welfare and best interest of all G. A. R. Veterans.

While their Fortresses are not numerous, still they are having a healthy and prosperous growth and any and every comrade can always depend on them for help and assistance, when required, and I wish them every success.

SONS OF VETERANS

The Sons of Veterans are pledged to continue our work along the lines laid down by our own organization. It is our sons we must look to and lean most heavily upon from this time on. We can trust our sons to take up the patriotic work as we lay it down. Let us give them encouragement and stand by them always.

SOLDIERS' HOME

I have only visited the Home once during my term of office. Having been a member of the Board to fill vacancy, gave me a better chance to know how well the work of the Home is carried on. I have only words of praise for the Board of Managers. Everything needful for their care, food and clothing, is permitted. I am sure the Committee will so find the conditions, and will so appear in their report. I wish to say a word for the matron of the Ladies' Annex, Jennie L. Pond. She loves her work and its members love her. The Woman's Relief Corps and other allied bodies add pleasure and comfort to its comrades, or members. Entertainments and many bodily comforts are given them. I am sure all is done in a loving and loyal spirit.

Those of you who attended the 55th National Encampment at Indianapolis, Indiana, the second time realize Indianapolis did a big thing to entertain the National Encampment twice in succession. She received us with open arms and many comrades were entertained in private homes, free of charge. All who wore the bronze button and badges of the allied organizations had free transportation on the street cars, and the citizens were ready to do everything possible to make our stay there enjoyable. I was justly proud of being Commander of the Department of Michigan, and leading our division headed by our Michigan Fife and Drum Corps followed by many comrades from Michigan, my Michigan.

I had hoped one year ago, when elected to this office, that my Commander might detail me to assist him in some of his duties during the year, that I might prove to my Comrades by deeds and not words, my appreciation of the honor they conferred upon me at that time. There is no order that I would be so proud to belong to as the Grand Army of the Republic. Long after we, as individuals, will have been forgotten, the name of the Grand Army of the Republic will go on down the avenues of time, honored and revered by all liberty loving people.

It was my pleasure on December 12th, to attend a Reception and Banquet given by Fairbanks Post, to the Department Officers, and we had a most enjoyable time.

The pleasant memory of the past year, as having been officially connected with the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, will remain with me, as long as life shall last.

I wish to extend to Commander Holmes and to Assistant Q. M. General Spaulding, my sincere thanks for the kind and courteous treatment I have received from them during the year, and also to all my comrades for the honor conferred upon me in electing me to this office and to assure them that I am ready and willing at all times, to serve the Order to the best of my ability.

A Comrade: Next year we hope the Encampment will not be held the same week of Flag Day, as many of the comrades want to be on hand in their home cities for that Day.

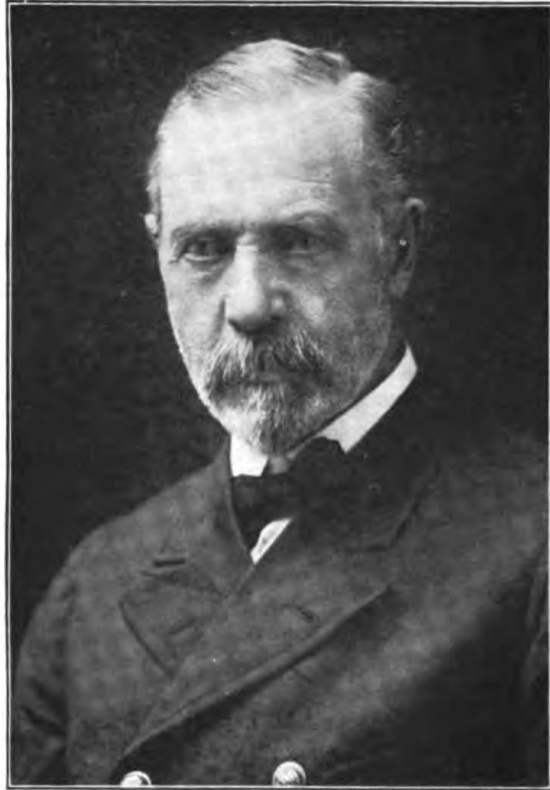
Some of the officers of the Department being unable to attend until tomorrow or next day, and their reports will be read by themselves or if unable to be present by someone else.

THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 15th, 1922.

Forty-fourth Annual Encampment Meeting Opened: Called to order by Department Commander Holmes, Presiding, who stated this is an adjourned meeting of the Forty-fourth Encampment, Grand Army of

the Republic. Asked Officer of the Day if the approaches to the Encampment were properly guarded. Officer of the Day answered that they were. All members entitled to a seat in this encampment.

Chaplain invoked the Divine Blessing, Rev. Horace Palmer. Prayer was followed by singing "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

Department Commander: I now declare this Encampment duly open for the transaction of business. We will use the order of business as adopted by the National Encampment, unless there are objections.

Report by Commander Crandall.

Moved that the Rule be waived and report be accepted and adopted as read:

A correction was made in the wording of Report of Soldiers' Home Committee, wherein the word "inmate" was stricken out and the word, "Comrade" or "Member" supplied, as every comrade is a "member" and not an "inmate."

June 8th, 1922.

Comrades: As we meet and greet, real patriotism seems to light up our faces, yet a sadness touches our meeting as certainly as joy, because many a comrade has died during the past year, but I am not to report as to deaths, but particularly as to how Memorial Sunday and Decoration Day were observed. For, "What Meaneth This?" It is focusing the public mind for a time on a time that tried men's souls in the awful sacrifice of the Civil War, that a nation might live.

This report is, of course, made up from the reports of Past Chaplains. It is a matter of regret that only 72 have reported and some of these reports are not clear as to the work done and some of them are written with a lead pencil and are difficult to decipher, but they show that the days were generally observed with interest, though complaints are made that ball playing, and horse racing, marred the reflection of not a few.

The reports show that 250 comrades attended Sunday Memorial services and 285 comrades attended Decoration Day services but figures do not fully show it all. Behold the old boys of '61 and '65 and then the quick stepping Spanish American and the World's War soldiers, and the interested public, and especially the school children, and preacher on Sunday, and the orator on Tuesday. It seems that only three veterans spoke on Decoration Day! "Our fathers, where are they?" Only one veteran preacher preached on Memorial Sunday! Modestly! Yes, but it was the Department Chaplain who is now Chaplain of the Soldier's Home. It was at the Home that he preached and his text was Dan. 11-40, "And at the time of the end shall be the king of the south push at him; and the king of the north shall come against him like a whirlwind."

The "veterans" now mean in the newspaper world the World War survivors, "Their name is Legion"—loyal Legion. We do them honor, and we, because "*past veterans*" or "*Civil War Veterans*."

In some cases the memorial work has been turned over to the Legion and has worked well. In other cases it is not clear that it has worked so well. Amalgamation as to these different kinds of veterans will require patient care. The solemn funeral service of Memorial Day must be considered, "lest we forget." It is right for us who wear the bronze button to talk of what our deceased comrades with us did, think of it amid flags and fragrant flowers. It is no vain glory, nor is it a "dim

past," but a very distinct past, but it becomes us also to think of what the *country is doing for us*.

Two matters only as to this will be mentioned, Pensions and Soldiers' Homes. The pension was by us not thought of during the War. It was slow in coming, so slow that many a deserving comrade did not live to get it, yet it has been and now is a great help. Let us be thankful for it. The Soldiers' Homes, so often unfairly criticised, are a great blessing, especially is ours here in Michigan. Too much cannot be said in its praise. This includes the work and management of the Woman's Annex also. The work of the Woman's Relief Corps is much appreciated by the G. A. R. and a deeper fraternal soldierly feeling is more in evidence than ever before, and there is a growing regard also for the work of the church, and many a comrade has learned to be a "good soldier of Jesus Christ."

In the Soldiers' Home cemetery where over two thousand old soldiers are buried, on Decoration Day an interesting, solemn service was held, and as the Chaplain read the prescribed prayer it was attentively listened to and at its close many said "Amen." The closing part of the prayer is as follows: "Continue, we pray Thee, the memory of the dead, strengthen, we pray Thee, hearts of the living, bless, we pray Thee, our whole people, that it may be a nation whose God is the Lord, deepen and ennoble that faith which shall make the Grand Army of the Republic the color guard of the nation's patriotism and our country now and forever, the land of the free and the home of the brave. And to the end that all this for which we pray may be wrought out in us. Effectually grant, O God, that by Thy grace we may be enlisted in the great army of the redeemed, under Jesus, the Captain of our Salvation."

Eli Strong, Post 79, Kalamazoo: Filed protest about persons unthinkingly referring to this gathering as a Convention, as it should be called an Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. This is an Encampment, and not a Convention.

Member of Post No. 1: Added to the protest against the use of Decoration Day as termed by the Chaplain and many other comrades of the department, as it is properly and officially called Memorial Day, and I always notice and feel hurt when some unthinking and unknowing speaker refers to it as Decoration Day. It is Memorial Day, and so authorized.

Commander Spaulding read a letter received from O. A. Janes, stating he would be here on Friday morning, at which time he will make his report.

Judge Advocate's Report read.

Dear Sir and Comrade:

During the year the Department Commander has submitted to me but one matter requiring my opinion thereon, as follows:

Complaint of Post Commander, W. M. Soder, against E. W. Hollingsworth, Post No. 210, of Albion, Michigan:

STATEMENT OF FACTS

Past Post Commander Soder, alleges that certain premises were conveyed to E. W. Hollingsworth, Post No. 210, by a Trust Deed, to be used and occupied by the Post for the use of the members of the Post, and when the Post disbands, the property to be sold by the Trustees in Trust, their successors or assigns, and the proceeds therefrom, should be applied in the construction and erection of a Monument for and in Commemoration of the soldiers and sailors of the Civil War of 1861 to 1865.

That the Post is occupying said premises and rents same to other organizations other than the G. A. R. and allied Orders of the Grand Army for a consideration, and in some instances, free; he contending that the Trustees of the Post have no right to so rent or lease the premises during the existence of the Post.

He also alleges that the Trustees have declined to qualify or give bonds saying that it is not necessary, and are renting the building and using the money derived therefrom, for other purposes than for Post Expenses. It is also alleged that the Finance Committee does not make a report to the Post, but that the auditing committee makes a report, which the Commander of the Post holds is all that is necessary.

He further alleges that there is Three Hundred Dollars rent money in the hands of the Post Quartermaster, and that a Resolution was adopted by the Post, that hereafter all members of the Post be exempt from paying dues, and that such dues be paid from the rent fund. This action of the Post is claimed by him to be illegal.

OPINION

First: If there is no provision in the Conveyance of the property to the Post, prohibiting the renting or leasing of the premises to other organizations, the Trustees, by vote of the Post, may rent and lease the same, for a rental consideration, to other organizations other than the G. A. R. and may give permission for occupying same rent free.

The moneys received for such rentals to be paid to the Quartermaster of the Post to be accounted for and disbursed by him upon a vote of the Post.

The Trustees cannot rent or lease the premises independent of the action of the Post, authorizing such renting or leasing.

Second: A Finance Committee's duties is to audit bills presented against the Post, and an Auditing Committee to audit the books of the Quartermaster, and other officers charged with the funds of the Post. A Finance Committee may be dispensed with, and such duties performed by an Auditing Committee.

If the By-Laws of the Post provides for the appointment of both Committees, requiring such Committees to make a report to the Post, then it is the duty of each committee to make such reports.

Third: Section 1, Article VII, Chapter V, of the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic, provide, "that Trustees of Posts or Relief Funds may be required by the Post to give bonds in an amount to be fixed by the Post, for the faithful discharge of the duties of their office."

If the Post has not required bonds to be given by its Trustees, then the Trustees are exempt from giving bonds, but if required by the Post, in an amount fixed by the Post, then in order to qualify as Trustee, they must give the required bond. The Trustees have no right or authority to expend any of the funds belonging to the Post. All expenditures of the moneys or funds must be made by the Quartermaster of the Post by direction of the Post.

Fourth: If the Post has sufficient funds on hand and a yearly revenue to meet all expenses of the Post without requiring its members to pay dues, it is admissible and proper to exempt the members from the payment of dues to the Post.

READ REPORT ON SOLDIERS' HOME COMMITTEE

Department Commander, J. J. Holmes:

This appointment, as you know, came to me unexpectedly, but with high appreciation of your courtesy. I would that some other comrade had been chosen; but as a true soldier, I learned to obey my superiors, and therefore, to the best of my ability, I will make the following report on our visit to the Soldiers' Home at Grand Rapids, May 3rd, 4th, 1922.

It was on May 3rd, we went to the Home, and there we were met by Col. McGarrin, who escorted us through the Home, where we found everything for the comfort and convenience of our comrades. The men can enjoy themselves in the bungalow or card rooms, and a moving picture show they have once a week, and on certain occasions the show is given to the patients in the hospital in the afternoon. They have religious services in Concert Hall on Sunday and Wednesday. Funerals are held in the A. C. Building. The Chaplain of the Home is the Rev. J. J. Wm. Palmer, and the committee called at his bungalow and he gave them a royal greeting; the comrades are very much attached to their Chaplain and speak in the highest terms for his conscientious work. The Home also has a Postoffice for the convenience of the members.

The noon hour had hardly arrived, when we were escorted into the spacious dining room and kitchen by the Commandant, where we saw a large delegation of comrades file in and each took his place and enjoyed a hearty meal.

On the 4th, we went to the Hospital where he met Surgeon Dr. Grube, and he escorted us through the several wards. Out of the many comrades, they all seemed happy and contented, having the best of care; every spot and place was spotlessly clean; clean bedding; well ventilated apartments; hot and cold water for all purposes. A thorough inspection of blind comrades was heart-rending. But like heroes, all were contented.

Then came the inspection of the feeble-minded comrades who had lost all physical powers. But all was done for their comfort that could be done.

During our visit and inspection, we did not hear a complaint. We certainly have a fine set of officers there, and also a fine lot of comrades.

Col. McGurrin gave me the following memo: Number of comrades there now, 425; but 600 wintered there. 189 ladies in the annex; the last winter there were 276. At present there are 110 comrades in the hospital and 89 ladies. In the unfortunate ward, there are 20 comrades, and 12 ladies. In the hospital there are 15 ladies (nurses) and 46 other employees.

Next, we visited the annex, where we were met by Mrs. Jennie Pond and escorted through. This Committee can but speak in the highest terms of the Home and the courtesy given by the Board of Managers, and of the officers of the Home. And we highly commend the Board of Managers for the very able manner in which they conduct their work, and the interest they take in their Home. The officers of the Home, for conducting the best managed state institution there is in Michigan, and the personal care they take of the comrades of the Home; and

especially the matron, Mrs. Jennie L. Pond, for her able management and her motherly care of the 189 widows in the annex.

R., daughters, sisters and mothers, and the Commander and all the comrades greeted them. The National President of the Ladies of the G. A. R. was introduced. The Commander, J. J. Holmes was presented with a box of cigars on retiring from office, by the Ladies of the G. A. R. The ladies introduced were as follows: Mrs. Peterson, Delegate G. A. R.; Mrs. Waite, Delegate G. A. R.

The ladies were presented with badges by the Comrades and escorted out by the committee.

Committee selected to meet Ladies of W. R. C. in the annex.

Comrade F. L. Manning, of Jackson, Post 48, made some remarks as follows:

At a joint meeting of the Sons and Daughters of the G. A. R. in Jackson last Winter, which was given for the benefit of the G. A. R., I was requested to say a few words. I said to them, "I don't like your name." They said, all over the hall, "Neither do we," and asked me to suggest a name that I thought would be alright. I suggest this one—Sons and Daughters of the Union War, 1861-1865. For the benefit of you comrades, if you do not know just the name they are under now, I will say, it has no standing; it gives them no individuality; it takes in everything to which the name Veteran can be applied—they say they have been insulted many times by people saying, "Veterans of Who?" "Who are you sons or daughters of?" "Those who wore the Gray?" Told a story of a young man wishing to join the "Sons of Veterans." Some said he could not. Said he was just as loyal an American, just as good an American, but your father was not a Veteran of the Civil War. He said, "Hell, no, my father was a Veteran of the Old Fire Department, first one ever organized in this City;" every order to which the word "Veteran" can be applied. You see the positions your sons and your daughters are in, and they feel it keenly. They have asked me scores and scores of times if I would present their case before their fathers here at this Encampment. The right name is their inheritance, from you, their fathers. It is all the inheritance they will get. They asked me, as I say, to present this matter to you. They want your endorsement to change their name, and reorganize under the new one. They want Michigan to be the banner state to take it to Des Moines, Iowa. If they can go to them and say, the old boys of Michigan want this, they will win there at the National; they have received many letters all over the state and with sincerest expressions, "we are with you"—

"SONS AND DAUGHTERS OF THE UNION VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR—1861-'65"

My heart is in this. I believe it is due from us, their fathers, to give them this name, they have asked for. I am now asking for the vote. Your Worthy Commander has made me Chairman of the Committee that

waits on the Sons and Daughters, and won't you let me take it to them, that you endorse that name? Yes. They can thank you for it when they come before you. Moved, Commander, that we take a vote as to that.

Comrade Rabb, Post 145: I agree about names of the Sons and Daughters of the Veterans—it is right, there should be some other name. We should have a name that would designate what war it was. I think the name Comrade Manning proposes is alright, only it is too long.

Comrade Brown, Post No. 98, Port Huron: The point is well taken.

Mr. Manning: I wish every father and every Union Comrade would get on his feet and give a rising vote as to the new name—it would afford me great pleasure to take this news to yours and your daughters. I will state the motion: The name that I propose was, "Sons or Daughters of the Union Veterans of the Civil War, 1861 to 1865."

It is all passed. The motion put and carried unanimously.

Motion seconded. That the G. A. R. Dept. donate the sum of \$150.00 to help defray expenses for drum corps to go to Des Moines.

The motion was put and carried.

Motion made that the sum of \$25.00 be appropriated by this department to pay young lady stenographer at Flint for work at last encampment. The motion was withdrawn. The City of Flint was supposed to compensate the stenographer. They can settle.

Communication from Post 370 read.

Communication read by Comrade Spaulding regarding Honorary or Associate Members.

Comrade Davey of Post No. 17: There is a law already on the books, allowing all G. A. R. Posts to take in Honorary Members or Associate Members. The law provides that every post can have a class of Associate Members. The difference between Associate and Honorary is, they have to make their application and then they become an Associate Member of Post so and so. Their admission is \$10.00. Their dues are \$10.00 per year.

Comrade: That is not the case here in Detroit. They take them in here at \$1, \$2, \$3 or \$4. They can attend the meeting, but have no voice in vote.

Honorary Members at Flint paid us \$530.00 last year—pretty good in helping defray our expenses. They cannot attend our meetings and have a vote in the transaction of any business, but they may be admitted by the Commander calling an informal recess.

Comrade Penton, Post 84, Member of Detroit Post: We have quite a large Associate Membership. None of them at our meetings in so far as I know—and I don't think they are allowed in the meetings. They are turned outside and the door locked.

It is an insult to the State of Michigan that a Bill cannot be taken out of the hands of these men, when it goes into hands of men in the Legislature and its turned down. Every vote is recorded and on record in Lansing. In Wayne County and the City of Detroit you have two members on that committee—two of them, I understand, want to go to Congress this Fall from Wayne County. Are you going to send them,

or keep them home. Watch G. Oliver Frick, when he comes up for Congress—then you will know how to vote.

Commander Holmes: What Comrade from the 4th District has the credentials? Comrade handed credentials to Commander Spaulding.

First of all, however, I have desired to visit those that rarely ever saw a Commander-in-Chief, and as they have received him, I have felt that they have received him not for himself, but as a representative of the whole Grand Army—and to those veterans who certified those great years, I wish to say that I have been most hospitably received, and it makes my heart swell with gratitude, and now nearly at the last, I find myself here where I began, out at the Fort where I began—no one ever dreamed of such a city—what has God wrought during these 60 years—for the part we have had in it, we all thank God. Let us take courage and go on to the end, God bless you.

The Commander-in-Chief was received most wonderfully and many thanked him and shook hands and wished him the best. He was presented with a token, being a handsome badge, which he wore as he was retiring from the room. A wonderful man.

It is with profound sorrow that the death of Past Department Commander Edwin F. Lamb is here announced. He fought a good fight, he finished his course, he kept his faith, and has gone to his reward.

Comrade Lamb was born in Braintree, Vermont, May 3rd, 1843, enlisted Nov. 27th, 1861, in Co. G, 8th Vermont Inft., which was assigned to the Army of the Gulf, and was the first to take an active part in the capture of New Orleans. Commander Lamb was severely wounded through the knee, from which he never recovered, and was finally discharged on account of said wound. He came to Michigan in 1868, residing in Mt. Morris until 1890, when they moved to Flint. In 1895 they moved to Detroit. Comrade Lamb was an active worker in the Grand Army and was elected Department Commander at Traverse City in June, 1919. He died in Detroit, his home city, July 19th, 1921.

He is survived by a son, Dr. GERALD E. LAMB, of Farwell, Mich.

His family can look with pride on the record of his noble life; his comrades and all others can remember him as a loyal, patriotic soldier, citizen and friend.
