FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

HELD AT JACKSON, MICHIGAN, JUNE 9, 10 AND 11, 1926

Jackson, Michigan, June 9, 1926, 1:30 P. M.

The Forty-eighth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was called to order by the Department Commander, John Seel, at the Masonic Temple, Jackson, Michigan, on Wednesday, June 9, 1926, at 1:30 o'clock P. M.

Department Commander: Now, Comrades, kindly come to order. We would like to have all the Past Department Commanders come upon the platform. In the absence of the Chaplain I ask the assembly to rise and sing "America."

We have with us Captain Sparks, the Chief of the Committee in charge of the arrangements to care for us while we are in the City of Jackson. Mr. Sparks will speak to you.

A short welcoming address was given by Captain Sparks, after which

Captain Sparks withdrew and the business meeting went on.

Commander: The Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, meets for the transaction of such business as should regularly come before it. We meet in Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty. The Chaplain will now invoke the blessing of our Heavenly Father.

Prayer by the Chaplain.

Commander: This Department is now opened in regular form. The rules governing the National Encampment will be the rules governing this Encampment, if there are no objections. I hear no objections. The roll call will now be taken by the Assistant Adjutant General, Chapin.

Part of the roll was taken.

Comrade Spaulding: Department Commander, there being a quorum present, I move that the further calling of the roll be dispensed with.

Motion supported and carried, and the calling of the roll was discontinued. Department Commander: I have the pleasure of now introducing to you the Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Comrade Janes.

Comrade Janes: Present Commander and officers and Comrades of the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic. I wish to introduce myself as the representative of the Commander in chief of our order. Owing to the fact that the conflicting of dates prevented him from attending here, which he regretted very much, he wishes me to carry to the Department his kindest thoughts and wishes. I only regret that he is not present, that he might be able to see the comrades gathered here and that he might be able to feel to a greater extent the work of the G. A. R., and also to speak to you in regard to the matter of pensions, in which you are all interested. Owing to conflicting dates on previous occasions, I represented him at the Boston National Encampment, held at Boston, Massachusetts, and also at the New Hampshire Encampment, held in Concord, when I spent a week in the East



with many comrades of different departments. I find that our Army is fast diminishing. Massachusetts, one of the strongest departments years ago, is fast diminishing, as are the departments of both Michigan and New Hampshire. The Grand Army of the Republic as an organization is fast losing its strength, and it is only a matter of a few years when it will cease to exist. This means a diminishing not only of the number, but a diminishing of the receipts and supports of the organization, and the question arises, are you going to give up, or are you going to put shoulder to shoulder and keep the Grand Army of the Republic alive? I saw by the Quarter-Master General's report that the amount of funds on hand at this time would simply meet expenses of the present meeting here. Now this means, that in the coming two or three years we must go out of existence, or the funds must be furnished by increasing the per capita tax in order to keep it alive. I find that to be true in the Department of New Hampshire, but they are backed as we are by good allied organizations, such as the Woman's Relief Corps, Daughters of Veterans, and others, who have put forth every effort to help the Department to maintain itself, and in the Department of New Hampshire the Daughters of Veterans came forward and presented checks at campfire to help the Department of New Hampshire maintain itself. In Massachusetts our good Daughters of Veterans held an encampment at which I was present, and where they made arrangements to pay all the dues of the Grand Army of the Republic in the State of Massachusetts, and they went to their assistance further recently and presented a check of \$800 toward meeting the expenses. We have gotten to the point in Michigan where, if we must keep our membership, we shall have to call for help financially to keep our organization in existence.

Now, in the matter of pensions, I was referred to you by the Commanderin-Chief to talk to you on that point. I have been in touch with the progress of pension bills in Washington during the past few years. As you know, bills have been placed before both houses of Congress toward the increasing of the pensions to the Civil War Veterans and the widows of the Civil War Veterans, and we feel that if we cannot get the whole thing, that a portion of it would help. The bill placed as reported in the Senate provides the following: That all Civil War Veterans shall be increased to \$72 per month. Their widows, or those who married previous to June 27, 1905, and have reached the age of seventy-five years and upwards, shall be increased from thirty dollars to forty dollars each month. For those who have not reached seventy-five years no increase was granted. The Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Senate referred the matter as to the cost to the Secretary of the Interior, and he referred it to the Commissioner of Pensions. The report to the Chairman of the Finance Committee was this: That on April 30, 1926, there were 110,000 survivors of the Civil War receiving a pension. That 56,686 were drawing \$72 a month under the Act of 1920, and that there were 52,624 who were drawing \$50 a month. There were 222,582 widows of Civil War veterans upon the pension roll at that time. Now he says this: that by increasing the 52,686 it would involve the sum of about thirteen millions of dollars. The bill also provides that a Civil War soldier, who is in constant need of attention or aid from others shall be increased from \$72 to \$90 a month, and so he reported that he estimates that 20% of the 56,686 would be raised to \$90 a month, and this would increase the expenditures between two and three million dollars. In other words, it would make the increase to Civil War veterans fifteen millions of dollars, but he says that if all the 56,686 that are on the rolls are increased it would mean that approxi-



mately twenty-four millions of dollars would need to be expended annually. There are 222,582 widows, 142,582 of whom are seventy-five years and over, and they would be increased \$10 a month, which would make fifteen millions of dollars, and with the 20% of the soldiers drawing only \$72 a month and were entitled to \$90 a month, it would make an expenditure over and above what we are now receiving of some thirty millions of dollars, but as the 56,686 should be advanced to \$90, this would mean an amount to be expended of \$36,642,000, approximately. That is the cost of our bill. It was sent before the President and he says this amount is not in keeping with the present financial policies. Are we going to get it? We have passed by and over it for some time, and it does not look encouraging. The Committee in charge is now in Washington, but I cannot see how it is possible that it would pass considering the way previous bills have been received, and knowing that the president is adverse to the measure, there are those at the head in both houses of congress who do not want to go contrary to the president's belief and will not permit the bill to be acted upon. That is my view of the matter. I noticed that they signed the bill for public buildings which extends over a period of five years, one-fifth to be expended each year. What will be the number of Civil War Veterans five years from now? I venture to say that the probability of having our pensions increased looks very unfavorable at this time. I am glad to be here, my comrades, and thank you for the honor you bestowed upon me at the last Michigan Encampment in selecting me as Senior Vice Commander in Chief. I am the surviving Senior Vice Commander in Chief; all those there have been before me have passed on to the other world. I hope to see you all put your shoulder to the wheel and keep the organization together as long as there is a sufficient number to maintain it, if we will be adding a little more to our dues in order to do so, and with our auxiliaries and allied women's organizations, who are so kind, and who will come forward to aid us when they come to find out the financial condition in which we exist. I am going to visit the allied orders right after this, as the Commander in Chief desires, and I am going to press that matter in order that we may maintain the Grand Army of Michigan. I am glad to be with you, and although I cannot remain to participate in your business meeting, as I am going to visit the various organizations, I trust that I may be here to help greet the officers of the coming year.

Comrade Spaulding: I move that a rising vote of thanks be extended to the Senior Vice Commander in Chief for the very able address that he has given us, and that we also extend the thanks of this Department to the Commander in Chief.

Motion supported and carried, and a rising vote of thanks was given.

Department Commander: The next order of business is the report of the Department Commander. I will ask the Senior Vice Department Commander to take the chair.

In the absence of the Senior Vice Department Commander the Junior Vice Department Commander, Josiah Creque, Post No. 48, took the chair.

Department Commander John Seel then read his report as follows:

To the Officers and Members of the Forty-Eighth Annual Encampment of

the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic:

Comrades: At our Forty-Seventh Annual Encampment, held one year ago at Port Huron, Michigan, you elected me unanimously to the high and honorable position of Department Commander. And now and again I wish to thank you one and all for the confidence you placed in me. I have enjoyed the work, I have visited many Posts and a number of Battalion meetings, and



I have met many of the old boys in their home Camps. I have been received everywhere, not only with respect and consideration, but with that cordiality and comradeship that is comforting and cheering to a visiting official. I wish I could have done more, but on account of my health I had to disappoint some of our Posts and Auxiliaries, and a number of times I received invitations to attend meetings of two Societies on the same date, when I had to disappoint one of them. As a rule I find our comrades enjoying themselves. Am only sorry that so many have given up their charter in the last three years. Unless these Comrades wish to join another Post they should hang on their charter as long as there are three members left. About all that can be done now is to encourage the posts, and in that way keep up the interest. Many of our Comrades are getting most too feeble to attend the meetings of their Posts, and for that reason many of the Posts hold their meetings in the afternoon in place of the evening. I think this is a fine idea.

MEMORIAL DAY

This day was very generally observed by the few Comrades who are left and able to attend, and with the aid of our Sons and Auxiliaries and the young comrades. General orders issued from National Headquarters concerning its observance were supplemented by an order from our headquarters and sent to every Post in this Department; every Grand Army man, our sons and daughters, our lady societies, and the Spanish and World War Comrades are all anxious that not one grave of our departed Comrades shall be left undecorated with Flag and Flowers on Memorial Day.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS

Too much praise cannot be given this band of noble women, who are always loyal, and are working for the interest of the Grand Army at all times. I wish to especially thank Mrs. Prudence Bowman, President of the Woman's Relief Corps, for her encouragement and inspiration given me as Department Commander as well as to all the Comrades of the Department of Michigan. I desire at this time to assure the President and members of the Woman's Relief Corps that we fully appreciate their work and their patriotic devotion to the Grand Army of the Republic.

LADIES OF THE G. A. R.

This is a band of loyal women formed for the same purpose as the Woman's Relief Corps, and are doing a great work. We, the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, appreciate their efforts in our behalf. May they be faithful to their trust and continue in their good work.

There are the Daughters of Veterans and the Daughters of the G. A. R. We do not forget the great work these ladies are doing. They are mindful of their fathers and grandfathers, in sickness as well as in health they minister unto them.

SONS OF UNION VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR

Comrades, these boys are our own flesh and blood. They will carry forward this patriotic work after we have answered the last roll call. In many cities and villages where they have camps they take the lead on Memorial Day in placing the flags and flowers on the graves of our departed Comrades. Invite our sons to your meetings.



THE SPANISH WAR SOLDIERS

These Comrades are coming to the front and are a great help in assisting us in carrying on the patriotic work on Decoration Day. Let us encourage these comrades who so nobly took up the work where we laid it down. Let us ever remember the hardships these men of the Spanish War endured while fighting for the honor of a great nation, and for the uplift of a downtrodden people.

THE WORLD WAR SOLDIER

All praise to these Comrades who obeyed the President's call when our country's honor was at stake. They went forth like men, courageously, and risked their lives even across the deep blue sea. I wish to again urge our members to encourage these young comrades of the World War in the work which they are taking up, not only on Memorial Day, but to uphold the great principles of our Country for which all these wars were fought.

THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT

The 59th National Encampment, held in Grand Rapids last September, was one of the most enjoyable reunions we have ever attended. All who wore the bronze button and badges of the Allied Organizations had free transportation on the street cars, and the citizens were ready to do every thing possible to make our stay pleasant. I was justly proud of being Commander of the Department of Michigan, and leading our Division headed by the Michigan Fife and Drum Corps, followed by a large number of Comrades from Michigan. The National Encampment for 1926 will be held in the city of Des Moines, Iowa, September 19 to 25, 1926. We have secured the same railroad rates as last year—being one fare for the round trip.

THE SOLDIERS' HOME

I visited the Soldiers' Home a number of times. Last Spring I was there and was conducted all over the premises, into every room, and found them in a clean and sanitary condition. I was in the storerooms, in the dining room, in the kitchen, in the hospital, in the ladies' annex, in fact in every room in all the buildings on the grounds. I will say too much praise cannot be bestowed on the Commandant, Colonel McGurrin, and in fact all the officers of the Home; and also the Board of Managers are to be congratulated for the fine system prevailing at the Home.

PENSIONS

Your Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant General prepared letters and sent them, one to each Senator and one to each Representative in Congress, urging them to favor the bill recommended by the Commanders in-Chief, John B. Inman, and the Grand Army Pension Committee. Your Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant General prepared likewise letters to the Senators and Representatives in Congress, protesting against the resolution of the so-called Lee Mansion, to make of the same a shrine in eulogy of General Lee, and sent the letters to the Senators and Representatives at Washington, D. C.



FINANCES

You will, by the Assistant Quartermaster General's report note that our finances are on the downward trend.

Your Department Commander has paid nearly all his traveling expenses out of his own pocket, and so far reimbursed the Department \$65.00, and on account of this condition I will recommend that the Assistant Adjutant and Assistant Quartermaster General's salary be reduced from \$800 to \$600.

CONCLUSION

In closing, I hereby express my sincere gratitude to the officers of this Department for their loyalty to me, and for the fidelity with which each has discharged his duty. It has been extremely gratifying and pleasing to me that I have at all times received the cordial support of every officer, but especially am I indebted to the Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General, Comrade H. A. Chapin, for the kindness extended to me during the past year.

Comrades, I thank you all.

Department Commander: I wanted to recommend an additional per capita tax for this Department from 25c to 50c per year, and would have done it, but I did not think it was policy for me to do it, because some years ago I came before the Grand Army of the Republic and at that time it was voted down. Now, Comrades, we pay 5c per member twice a year to the National Encampment; that leaves us the measly sum of 15c per member to cover our expenses. Is it right?

Junior Vice Department Commander: I sincerely thank you for such a report as this. Many times have I heard reports from our Commanders. but never in my history with the Grand Army have I heard as fine a report as has come before us from our Department Commander, Comrade Seel. Now, Comrade, I see where you have gone into the details of this matter, at least into the the different posts, have seen the losses of these posts, and there have been losses of posts simply because the post had too many rules and regulations at their meetings. If they had left out some of the rules and regulations instead of depending on the Relief Corps and others to do their work for them, they would have remained in their position as a post until the very last man. Now, I thank you again, Comrade, for referring to all of these different organizations, especially to the Veterans of Foreign Wars who are doing so much for the Grand Army. They are not only assisting us in the burial of comrades, but they are asking some of us to become honorary members of their posts, and in fact, some of us have become honorary members of their posts, and all of them seem glad to have us. fine lot of boys in our post here. I thank you, Comrade.







Now I would suggest that the different posts pay the whole per capita tax at one time. That is, June 30th. It would make no difference in the amount that is paid, but it will assist the Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General in keeping his records.

Commander: Do you make that as a motion?

Comrade Chase: I will make that suggestion as a motion.

Commander: You have heard the motion as made by Comrade Chase.

Supported by Spaulding.

Comrade Chapin: As the present per capita tax is paid 50% at one time, either in December, January, February, as the case may be, but that leaves one-half to be paid in June. Sometimes they forget that June payment. It makes quite a lot of collecting from the different posts to get that last payment in, and I want to say that I am heartily in favor and very glad if that motion would be adopted.

Commander: Are you ready for the question?

Comrade Brown: I want to make an amendment to that motion. That this be paid on the last day of December of each year.

Commander: If you will let that suggestion as made by Comrade Chase go through it will make a great deal less work for the Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General. Most posts can handle this per capita tax at the

middle of the year better than they can at the end of the year.

Comrade Brown: I do not see that it would make a great amount of difference. We are now paying them in December and on the last day of the month. We used to pay it always the last of the month in December. In late years we have paid it the 1st of July and the 1st or 2nd of January. No matter what month we pay it, we must pay the same per capita tax. The last day of the year winds up the year. In late years we have paid in June, and then paid the same without any notification the last day of December. Now, I am suggesting that we want to consider a little which way would be the best way, the way that will give the least trouble.

Comrade Chase: As I understand it, the payment of our per capita tax to the National Encampment comes in June. Now, if it is all paid at that time it is very much to our benefit, and of benefit to our Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General, and very much to our credit that we have the money on hand to pay that per capita tax, and if it is paid at that time we have no

trouble coming the last of December.

Commander: Comrades, you have heard the question. All those in favor say "Aye." Those opposed, "Nay."

Motion is carried.

Commander: Comrades, we have a delegation at the door. They shall be admitted.

Delegation entered.



Commander: Comrades, salute. Comrades, I have the honor of intro-

ducing to you the Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Mrs. Haberling: Comrades, it is a great pleasure to stand before you this afternoon and say that we are so happy to be here, and that we will strive to cheer your declining years would this perpetuate your memory. Some of your members have left us, and to their memory we present with our greatest respect these flowers, and with them the love of the Daughters of the G. A. R. Commander, may we be allowed to present you with a badge.

Commander: Mrs. Haberling, I am sure that I express the sentiment of our comrades in extending to you our sincere thanks for appearing before us with your kind gifts and greetings and I assure you, Mrs. Haberling, that we appreciate the work which the Daughters of the G. A. R. are doing. I

thank you.

Delegation withdrew.

Officer of the Day: A delegation of American Legion Auxiliary are at the door and wish admittance with greetings.

Commander: Admit them.

Delegation enters.

Commander: Comrades, I have the honor of introducing the American

Legion Auxiliary. Comrades, salute.

Mrs. Butler: Commander, Comrades, I am glad of this opportunity to present this beautiful basket of flowers to you at this convention. I am a lady of the G. A. R. and the Relief Corps, and I was chosen from the American Legion Auxiliary to carry to this encampment the wishes that all would have a very enjoyable meeting while in this city. I thank you.

Comrade Spaulding: I wish to say that we appreciate the good work that you are doing and have done for the benefit of the ex-soldiers of the Civil War. Not only to the soldiers, but also to the widows and other allied organizations, and we thank you for this visit, and hope that you will con-

tinue your work and receive our thanks in the future.

Delegation withdrew.

Officer of the Day: Commander, a delegation of Spanish War Veterans is at the door and wishes admittance.

Commander: A delegation of Spanish War Veterans shall now be admitted.

Delegation enters.

Commander: Comrades, salute! I now have the pleasure of introducing to you some of our Comrades of the Spanish-American War. Colonel McGurrin, of the United Spanish War Veterans.

Col. McGurrin: I am presenting to you the greetings of the Spanish American War Veterans, and I am going to introduce to you Mr. Kilstrom, who is my boss, and who will now speak to you.

Mr. Kilstrom: The Spanish-American War Veterans wish to express their appreciation of the great work for which your organization was founded. President sent her courtesy badge to you.

Commander: Senior Vice-President of the Ladies of the G. A. R., it certainly gives me pleasure to have you with us here this afternoon, and I thank you for the courtesies that are given us as soldiers of the G. A. R. I know what fine work the Ladies of the G. A. R. are doing all over this state of ours, and we certainly appreciate your presence here this afternoon. I wish to thank you very much for these presents. I am not able to tell the comrades what tokens these packages contain, but later on they will probably find out.

Delegation withdrew.

Commander: I will appoint Comrade Raab to carry the greetings of this Department to the Spanish-American War Auxiliary.

Officer of the Day: Commander, I wish to present the Auxiliary to the Sons of Veterans.

Commander: Mrs. Cornell. Comrades, salute.

Mrs. Cornell: It gives me great pleasure to come to your convention from the Sons of Veterans Auxiliary. They send their greetings to you and wish for you a most successful convention. We are in session, and are having a most wonderful time, and do all that we can for you, and I am glad to come here. My father was a soldier of the Civil War, and he entered into the ranks of the Grand Army up in Heaven forty-six years ago, and I am proud that my father was a veteran of the Civil War. Our president and her convention send to you these flowers with her love, and, Commander, I was told to give you a kiss from her. (Commander was presented with a kiss.) Commander: Comrades, the Battle Creek delegation asked me down at the Hotel if they might have their matter presented here by their delegation as soon as possible, and also just now, when I was outside, one of those gentlemen asked me if they could not present their delegation so that they could get back home.

Comrade Spaulding: Department Commander, I move that we take an informal recess for the purpose of entertaining these visitors.

Motion supported and carried.

Battle Creek delegation, consisting of Messrs. Gibson, Thorne and Ames entered.



Mr. Ames: Comrades, my remarks are going to be very few. I am over here for one purpose, the same purpose that you are—to have a good time. What I primarily want is to see you assemble in Battle Creek again in convention in 1927, and the City of Battle Creek voices this desire. In the event that the Mayor of our city could not be here, he sent his right hand man, the President of the Chamber of Commerce. I passed some cards around as an invitation to have your 1927 convention in Battle Creek. This was a good bona fide offer, and we promise you that you would have a good time in our city next year.

Mr. Thorn: I am here in behalf of Battle Creek. We would like to see you in Battle Creek. We have plenty of Bran, and if you come to Battle Creek next year we will assure you that we will give you all the health foods you can eat. And there are other things that we would like to have you have. The Mayor said to me, "If you can get the old boys to come to Battle Creek we will surely show them a good time." Our speech maker is the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and he will now speak to you. We welcome

you to Battle Creek if you so decide to come. Thank you.

John I. Gibson: Gentlemen, I am usually taken for a Scotchman, but that is a mistake. There are two things I am proud of; one is that I was

born in Ireland, and the other that I left it as soon as I could.

They sometimes ask if I am an American citizen. I have been naturalized twice, and so am a double naturalized American citizen. You were there nine years ago, and one of the Irishmen told me yesterday, "We came here to Battle Creek nine years ago, and the members of the G. A. R. were with us and were certainly used fine." We have all the big food factories and can give you all the health foods you want. We think the Sanatorium can be considered. If any of you fellows are taken ill we can take you there. You want to see the boys you are training to perpetuate your memory. The Michigan C. M. T. C. This is one cause that the people of the United States do not appreciate as much as they should, and this is the thing that you men should endeavor to encourage. The manufacturers and business men and the Chamber of Commerce will unite in giving you the best convention the G. A. R. ever had. I thank you.

The delegation retired.

Commander: I take pleasure in introducing to you Mr. Booth, of Benton Harbor. He is a member of the Spanish War Veterans.

Mr. Booth: Comrades, I want to talk to you just the way I would talk to you on the streets of Benton Harbor, and I want to welcome you there next year. We have everything in the world to offer you, and we are going to offer it all to you free. It is not going to cost you anything. The common fault with conventions is that they don't have enough entertainment. We are ready to give you all the entertainment that you want, and will keep you busy from the Tuesday of the convention until Saturday noon. We have hotel accommodations to take care of you all. We take care of two and onehalf million people from Chicago each summer. Those hotels are not so full at this time of the year. We have over two thousand hotel rooms. There is no other town anywhere near its size that can offer this. If you make a reservation in Benton Harbor you can be assured your room will be assigned to you when you get there. The House of David has four bands, and they have assured us that they will open their park to the veterans for the full time of the convention. They will bring their big band in from the road. Base ball games will be given for your pleasure. I think I will let Mr. Banyan tell you of the many other advantages that we have. I thank you.



Mr. Banyan: Commander, friends—I have a very tender feeling in my heart today for the survivors of that blue clad host which as young men, proud and courageous, gave all that they had upon the battlefield of the rebellion and brought back these stars and stripes unstained and unsullied without one star or stripe razed by the rude hand of rebellion. May your days be long in the land, free from want and trouble. May you enjoy a continued happiness embraced in beautiful living to the completion of the years of a life filled with honorable services. And may these boys, these sons of yours, who fought so valiantly in Cuba, be a continued prop to your declining years, that they may receive the full reward of those who keep the commandments, not the least of which is "Honor thy Father and thy Mother, that thy days may be long in the land which the Lord, thy God, giveth thee." Now, the Lord has given us a very beautiful land in Michigan. For Michigan is the finest state in the Union. Its soldiers have always been numbered among the greatest, the records of their bravery and their achievements is written upon simple granite tablets in distant battlefields of the Republic. We recall the terrible dangers of '61, of 1918, of '98 and 1917. The courage and valor of Gettysburg, of San Juan Hill, of Chateau Thierry and in the Argonne Forest, just as they carried the advance to the top of Lookout Mountain.

> Here's to the Blue of the wind swept North, When they meet on the fields of France, May the Spirit of Grant be over them all As the Sons of the North advance.

Here's to the Gray of the sun-kissed South, When they meet on the Fields of France, May the Spirit of Lee be over them all As the Sons of the South advance.

Here's to the Blue and the Gray as one, When they meet on the Fields of France, May the Spirit of God be over them all As the Sons of the Flag advance.

We are all Sons of the Flag and of our common country and of Michigan. From the advance of General George Custer, Michigan will always be the first to advance, the last to retreat or surrender. Michigan is famous, indeed, for other things besides the bravery of our soldiers. There are blossoms of surpassing beauty. Michigan has resources. Resources more vast and bountiful than these other states, and in addition she has an inexhaustible supply of sand and water. We have the alfalfa fields, the blue grass of the valley. Now that in general about Michigan in particular. Down in the southwestern section of the state is one of the finest, one of the most beautiful, one of the most fertile sections of country that nature ever made. From blossom time, from May to July, throughout the month of June thousands and thousands of visitors come from Ohio, and Illinois, and from the interior of Michigan to see the peach, the pear, the apple, and the plum blossoms, which grow in lesser abundance in the interior of Michigan. Now, if you will come to Berrien county over M-11, M-17, the Michigan Central R. R., the Pere Marquette R. R., three interurbans, four bus lines, you may see for yourself this very beautiful country. The two leading cities of Berrien County are St. Joseph and Benton Harbor. St. Joseph, the City of Chimes. It is a city of ten thousand people upon the breast of old Lake Michigan, where you can watch the "Sails that disappear." Benton Harbor is a community of twenty thousand people. St. Joseph and Benton Harbor have a spiritual background. We have a special offer from the House of David for



you to come out and enjoy their amusement park free. Gentlemen, in behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, in behalf of the City Council, in behalf of our citizens, we extend to the members of the G. A. R. and allied organizations, our sincere and cordial invitation to come to Benton Harbor, and we assure you that we will have the Fountain of Perpetual Youth.

Commander: These other three men will kindly rise so that the comrades may know you. Mr. Floberg, Mr. English and Mr. Parsons. Mr. Parsons

has a few remarks to make.

Mr. Parsons: After the beautiful speech you have had from our post-master, Mr. Banyan, it is not up to me to say anything in addition to this. We wish to say that we have a nice beach on the water side, capable of entertaining any number of people, and an armory which will seat 2,500 people, and if you will come over there we will try and give you a good time. I thank you.

Delegation retired.

Commander: Comrades, we are now in formal session.

Comrade Ives: Commander, I move that we accept the invitation to go to Benton Harbor. (Supported.)

Comrade Raab: Commander, I move that we go to Battle Creek. (Supported.)

Comrade Grant: I move that we vote these questions by ballot.

Dear Comrade:—Your committee appointed to visit the Soldiers' Home

submits the following report:

The Chairman called the meeting for April 1926. State Department Commander Seel also met with the Committee. The Committee reported to Commandant Col. McGurrin the object of their visit. He received us very cordially, and volunteered to escort us through the buildings and grounds, which we accepted, and we have only words of praise for the condition in which we found everything both inside and outside. Great credit is due the management, and the members seemed to appreciate what was being done for them. Many have a better home than ever before. The surgeon in charge escorted us through the hospital, and we found things in a clean and sanitary condition, and all that could be done was done to relieve the sick and distressed, but to get a good idea of what the comrades are receiving and the treatment tendered them, you must see it to know it. We have nothing but praise to find on any point in the institution. The Board of Managers showed us courtesies in a way that we appreciated, and we do say we do not believe there is an institution in the state conducted as well in every way as is the Michigan Soldiers' Home.

The Women's Building.

Through the kindness of the matron of the annex we were shown through the building. We have this to say. It seems as if there was a place for everything and everything was in its place. Everything was neat and sanitary, and not a member seemed dissatisfied in the least. All liked the matron. The average age is about seventy-five years, and they seemed to be a happy family. Great credit is due the matron of affairs in the annex.

Comrade Richardson: I make no report as Patriotic Instructor for two reasons. One was that I was physically unable to do so, and the other was the scarcity of reports that have come in to date. I have spoken to the Commander and made arrangements with the stenographer to make a report and forward it so that it may be placed in the Journal.

Chaplain Gardner: I have completed the business that you trusted to me, and I want to express my gratitude to you for being allowed to visit the greatest women in America today. The women who have kept alive the memory of those old days. When you meet a lady who is a member of that great organization, you have met the man who won the war. No great monuments mark the resting place of those who gave their lives to this great cause, but in the hearts of each we remember the places where we laid them, wrapped them in the blanket, laid them down to rest with their God. We want to keep those moments sacred. I know the well-springs have never been fastened so that they do not leak a little when we think of the old boys and where they lie. But their memory still lives in the history of the war just



as our memory will live in their glorious achievement. That is the greatest war in history. A battle line fifteen hundred miles long and a thousand miles deep, and those terrible battles in which we lost 65,000 of our comrades, 3,015 of whom still lie in those cities of the dead. The government offered to send these men back home again, as they did in France, and when I think of the war how can you blame me for thinking that you are the best men that ever God made, and so you can simply say that "Our Nation Might Live." And when we meet those Women of the Relief Corps may our hearts throb with joy. They have never forgotten us, and may God forget us if we forget those men who gave their lives in sacrifice.

Comrade Spaulding: With the permission of the Department Commander and of the Comrades, I have a little matter that I want to present here. With the report of our Chaplain as to his visit to the Relief Corps, I think it is an appropriate time to bring this matter. At the Department Encampment of the Relief Corps yesterday they endorsed and presented their Department President for the position of National President of the Woman's Relief Corps, and I think it is no more than appropriate that we should simply concur in that for Michigan, and I have this motion to make:

I move that this Encampment in session concur in the action of the Department of the Woman's Relief Corps in endorsing Mrs. Prudence Bowman, the present Department Commander, for the position of National President of the Woman's Relief Corps. (Motion supported and carried by a rising vote.)

Commander: I wish to say that Mrs. Bowman, president of the Woman's Relief Corps, one of the greatest organizations of ladies today, is a great worker, and she is worthy of what you would have her. 

Memorial Day this year falls on Sunday, May 30th. As has been our custom we will observe Monday, May 31st. Let all words and deeds on this day show devotion to our comrades, love for our country, and gratitude to Almighty God, for the blessings that have come to us as a reunited people. Let all people hold this day sacred to the dead that one day of the year may be a sacred day.

XIII. Originally set apart as the day upon which the survivors of the war for the Union should mark with flags and strew with flowers the graves of their



comrades who had fallen by their side on the field of honor. While each succeeding year has diminished the number of those survivors yet living, it has added to the numbers of the defenders of the Union to whom this honor should be paid, until now of the two millions of brave men who returned to their homes from the scene of strife, a mere handful remains. To these who yet survive the duty and privilege of Memorial Day becomes more sacred and impressive.

XIV. To assist in this service has come the welcome aid of our Sons and Daughters, and many auxiliary organizations who ask the privilege of sharing in this honor. This assistance should be gladly accepted. Let the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, and the soldiers of all wars, be earnestly invited to participate in these exercises, to the end especially that when the Veterans of the Sixties are no longer here to do this work, others may be ready to carry on the same patriotic service into the future. It is expected that a part of the service of Memorial Day should be read the General Order No. 11 of General John A. Logan, Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic in 1868, then establishing the observance of this day, and also the address of President Lincoln delivered at Gettysburg, Nov. 19th, 1863.

XV. Every Post and Grand Army man should attend Divine Worship Sunday before Decoration Day in some church. Call on the minister, acquaint him with your petition, and he will gladly extend an invitation to have your Post and Auxiliary present. Sunday, May 30th, will be Memorial Sunday this year.
