




WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON 2:30 o'clock

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS TO THE OFFICERS AND COMRADES OF

MICHIGAN GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

COMRADES:

We have reached the fifty-first milestone in the life of this Department. The Comrades who are left, are one year's march nearer the haven, which we are all destined to enter in God's good time. When the Western Hills obscure life's sun for us, may we rest secure in the promise of the dawn of a never ending day.

Comrades, one year ago you elected me your Commander, which I assure you I deem one of the greatest honors to which any man may attain. For this you have my most sincere thanks. I fully realized the weight of responsibility, I assumed in accepting this gavel, and I pledged my very best efforts to the interest of our noble organization. If I have failed in reaching the high standard of your hopes, I implore you not to ascribe it to a lack of devotion to the ideals and aspirations for which the Grand Army stands, but rather to my inability to give the administration of its affairs more time.

The year has been filled with responsibility, but the recollection that throughout all, you have given me your loyal support without which any measure of success I may have achieved, would have been impossible, is comforting indeed.

The duties of Department Commander have materially changed in the past few years. But little remains for him to do now but to use his efforts to encourage and inspire the aged Comrades with increased zeal for the final struggle in fostering and upholding the principles for which we have wrought for nearly three quarters of a century. The effort to rebuild any part of the G. A. R. is useless at this late day.

I have received many invitations and have accepted, so far as possible the calls to meet with the patriotic gatherings, using these opportunities to say something favorable for our Order. More particularly the Junior Societies. The first of these meetings I had the pleasure of attending soon after being installed as Department Commander, was the Allegan County Soldiers and Sailors Reunion at Scott Lake, where I was called upon to address the meeting. I have been the recipient of many other invitations to attend special meetings throughout the Department which I was unable to attend on account of business at home that needed my attention.



FINANCE

The report of the Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General in detail will convince you that economy has been my rule in the conduct of the affairs of the Department.

SOLDIERS' HOME

I made one official visit to the Home this year and was much gratified at the general conditions existing there. I was very courteously received by Col. Campbell, Major Ingraham, Captain John Stronach and Chaplain I. H. Riddick,—officers of the Home. The visit was made without previous announcement to the authorities of the Home, hence there was no entertainment planned. I enjoyed the visit and fully appreciated the courtesy shown me on this occasion.

AUXILIARIES AND ALLIED ORDERS

The Woman's Relief Corps has been most active during the past year. They are doing a wonderful work, not only for the Grand Army, but they are contributing their efforts and influence in all channels of Patriotism for the public good wherever they can consistently do so. And I wish to acknowledge the helpful service accorded us by the Department President, Minnie Mead Chadderdon, and her staff. Ladies, to you the Grand Army is deeply indebted, and as Comrades we appreciate the splendid work that you are doing.

To the Sons of Veterans, their Auxiliary and Daughters of Veterans of the Civil War, we owe much to you. Soon upon your shoulders the mantle of your fathers must fall. And through you our work must be perpetuated, and we have an abiding faith that you will be faithful to the trust. We desire, also to express our appreciation for all the favors received from Mrs. Cora B. Parkhurst, Department President of the Ladies of the G. A. R. and to the Daughters of the G. A. R. for their faithful patriotic devotion to our community of interest.

To the U. S. W. V. our Comrades of the later days, the Veterans of the World War and all allied Societies, we thank you for the interest you have manifested in all patriotic work and we hope these fraternal ties that bind us together will always remain as close as they have in the past. And to you all I desire to express my sincere thanks for your loyalty and devotion.

IMPROVEMENTS

Pursuant to instructions by the 1928 encampment held at Kalamazoo, we have ordered a frame to be placed in the Grand Army Headquarters at the Capitol, which will contain the photos of all past Department Commanders from the first one to the last one. The work is nearly completed and will soon be in its place.

I am pleased to announce that I believe I have been instrumental in obtaining through an Act of the Legislature, an appropriation from the State, of fourteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1450.00) for our use in defraying our Departmental expenses. Adding to this amount the five



hundred dollars we were previously allowed by the State, makes a total of nineteen hundred and fifty dollars. (\$1950.00). Our thanks are due Senator Gansser of Bay City for his efforts in bringing about this enactment.

NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT

With our Department, I attended the National Encampment at Denver, Colorado, September 15 to 23, 1928. Denver is a beautiful city with its fine salubrious air, situated 5,000 feet above sea level. This was a very enjoyable occasion for all who were privileged to attend and participate in this memorable event. There were twenty voting members present from this department and we had a very harmonious convention.

Our journey over those wide regions, where once the buffalo ranged and the wolf sentinelled the passing night, was a very fascinating experience.

There cities rise where once, only the lone Tepee stood, and all that vast region has been transformed into "a land of milk and honey." And as we journeyed westward, the question naturally occurred to me, who were the pioneers of this wonderful achievement? And the answer came very readily. The men who accomplished this enormous task, were the men who had recently been relieved from the army at the close of the Civil War. And I take great pride in the thought.

Those leaders in industry, prosperous merchants and extensive farmers who now occupy that vast area are the lineal descendants of the Veterans of the Civil War.

When they again became citizens some changed their uniform for garbs of toil, while others, more fortunate have become Representatives, Senators, Governors and Presidents. In foreign lands these Comrades of the Civil War have illustrated the dignity and glory of this Republic, both in public and private stations.

And as we journeyed through this splendid domain, dotted with beautiful hamlets and towns, this idea occurred to me, that the veterans of the Civil War should be commended, not only for saving the Union, but that they should be given the title of Empire builders. That some have fallen by the way, is true, but the countless majority have been worthy of American citizenship and in fields of thought, labor, daring and genius they have ranked with the foremost of this illustrious country. They have in-wrought the things for which they strove during the Civil War, with the very fiber of the government and the fabric of the Age.

MEMORIAL DAY

This day, I believe was fittingly observed by our Nation laying aside all commercial activities and uniting in paying tribute to our Heroic dead. Flowers covered the graves in the great white cities where sleep our fallen Heroes, nor were those who rest beneath the waves and unmarked graves forgotten.



IN MEMORIAM

Death, with silent tread has invaded our official family and removed from our circle the following named Comrades:

Comrade Frank R. Chase, Past Dept. Commander, died at his home in Smyrna, December 24, 1928. He served as Lieut. in B 25 Mich. Infantry and was promoted and finally discharged as Brevet Major Jan. 1st, 1868. He was an active Comrade of the Grand Army and we will miss him in our councils.

Comrade Capt. William Barrett, Junior Vice Dept. Commander elected June 8, 1928, died at his home in Bay City Feb. 15, 1929. He first served in the navy and later joined the 10th Conn. Infantry from which he was discharged at the close of the war.

Comrade Hiram A. Chapin, died April 21, 1929 at his home in Lansing. At the time of his death he was serving his fourth term as Ass't. Adjt. and Quartermaster General of this department. He was an efficient officer and faithful Comrade. He enlisted in the 30th Mich. Infantry and served to the end of the war. Buried at Paw Paw April 24th, 1929.

Comrade George S. Farrar, died April 22nd, 1929. He served his country in the Navy, U. S. Ship Forest Rose, discharged June 23, 1865. At the time of his death he was a member of the Soldiers Home board.

We know not whither we are bound, Faith teachers us that life is birth, The gateway to a fairer ground Than ever we have found on earth.

Yet none returns to lead the way, Or strengthens us in time of doubt, As passengers on shore we stay, Until our ship is ordered out.

I have been extremely fortunate in finding an efficient Comrade to take the office of Ass't. Adjt. and Quartermaster General to succeed the late Comrade Chapin, in Comrade Albert Dunham. He has taken over this work at the most trying time in our official term. By his efficient services, aided by Ida F. Davidson, a very able and affable secretary, the work has gone through without a break for which I feel greatly indebted to both.

IN CLOSING

Comrades, no greater honor can ever come to me than that which I have received at your hands.

I have done my best to serve the Department. It is for you to render the verdict. On Friday I surrender to him who will be elected my successor, the gavel and authority placed in my hands at Kalamazoo, and again take my place in the ranks as a Comrade, to work with added zeal in the interests of our Grand Army.

Again I thank you for the honor which has been mine. For the many evidences of your kindness and esteem and for the cordial and generous support accorded me.



And when the business of this Encampment is completed, may we all feel that We, the *Men* of 1928 and 1929 have not marred the fine record for patriotism and good citizenship made by the *Boys* of the sixties.

Department Commander and Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic: I have the honor of making the following report for the year from June 1928 to June 1929.

It gives me pleasure today to greet many of those for whom, as your Chaplain, I have prayed to God that He would bless, granting you grace and strength for your daily need. You are old men; all, with few exceptions, have passed the eightieth milestone. But remembering the years of '61 to '65, and the engagement of the large membership of the G. A. R. posts of the years gone by, still repeat the words "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty" with remarkable vigor.

As I have read my daily paper, very often I have read the passing of an old veteran to his eternal reward. This has called forth my truest sympathy for the bereaved friends. In the soldiers home again and again religious services have been held and the honor due has been bestowed, the firing squad taps have been sounded for the comrade dead. Still we all rejoice that so many yet live to enjoy the blessing of our great and united country.

Memorial Sunday and Decoration were generally observed this year and were of special interest, though the memberships of posts were small. The ministers of the state invited the surviving members to church, and autos were provided for their convenience. Able and patriotic sermons were delivered.

Decoration day was most enthusiastically and appropriately observed. Members of the several posts were greatly honored and tenderly treated. Extensive parades were formed, headed by brass bands, various military and civil organizations, followed by Civil War Vets in autos.

At the Soldiers' Home Col. Campbell ordered all members of the Home, able to do so, to form in line and march to the cemetery where Logan Post observed the usual service, after which we proceeded to the grove where we listened to an eloquent address delivered by Chaplain Doern, of the 126th regiment, in honor to the soldiers, sailors and widows to the number of 2774 who rest in their grassy mound and our glorious flag floats over them.



Saginaw, Mich., June 4, 1929

Department Commander—

I have received reports from only 6 posts so far since last year, viz:

June 19, 1928, C. J. Dickinson Post No. 6, Hillsdale. January 6, 1929, C. J. Bassett Post, No. 56, Allegan. January 9, 1929, Gov. Crapo Post No. 145, Flint. January 10, 1929, Saginaw Post No. 38, Saginaw. February 19, Charles T. Foster Post 42, Lansing. June 4, 1929, Carpenter Post No. 180, Ypsilanti.

These reports, though far from being complete, indicate some effort towards patriotic work—or at least an undying interest; at the same time they disclose a pathetic condition not to be surprised at—among men eighty four years old or more.

The Comrades are willing where the flesh is weak—as one comrade writes, "as we have lost our Commander, officer of the day, chaplain and patriotic instructor, since February by death, our post is badly crippled as we have no other members to fill their places. Only three or four surviving members are able to attend post meetings."

This condition is, undoubtedly typical of posts throughout the Department. The services of Relief Corps or wives and daughters are depended upon in many cases to make such reports as are made.

Department Commander: I have the pleasure of introducing to you Comrade Cogswell and Comrade McMurtre.

Comrade Cogswell: Commander and Comrades of my father, I bring to you the love and greetings of the Sons of Veterans—your sons and grandsons. We are proud of our heritage and the example of splendid citizenship which you have exemplified since the close of the Civil War. You have kept ever before the rising generation

Comrade McMurtre: Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, I deem it a great honor to again be chosen by the Sons of Veterans to bring to you our hearty greetings. My father was a member of the 16th Michigan Infantry and were he living he would be 100 years old. May this be one of the most enjoyable encampments you have ever attended.

Badges were exchanged, Department Commander thanked the Sons, and they retired.

Officer of the Day escorted the comrades to the outpost and presented Past Department Commander Lewis, of the Sons of Veterans.

Department Commander: Comrades, I am pleased to present Past Department Commander Lewis, of the Sons of Veterans, who will address us at this time.

Comrade Lewis: Comrades of the Grand Army, I am pleased to be with you today and to present to you a subject which is very near and dear to my heart. When our Commander was in Detroit some weeks ago I made a suggestion which we talked over and he thinks very highly of it. This suggestion is that any son of a Grand Army of the Republic comrade, whether they are a member of the Sons of Veterans or not, be admitted to the meetings of the Grand Army. To do this it would be necessary to have special form of blanks, to be adopted later, under the name of the Grand Army of the Republic, giving the name, address, post, etc. This will serve as a record for the Sons of Veterans to help them carry on after their fathers have passed on. I believe that the sons would then take their dads to the meetings as they would be interested in the organization. If they were admitted they could come to the meetings and their fathers would come with them. You need their young



blood to carry on, and this is a good way in which to get them interested. I wish to make the resolution to admit them. If successful you know what that means.

A general discussion followed: It was finally moved by Comrade Petrie, supported by Comrade Bailey, that the delegates to the National Convention be instructed to use their influence to have a similar resolution passed by their convention.

Officer of the Day presented City Manager, George Lusk and Mrs. Brahman, of Bay City, who extended greetings from the city.

I have been requested to sing "The Sword of Bunker Hill" and with it I will tell Homer's story—Homer was attending a meeting and just as it was to be dismissed a request was sent up asking Homer to sing the Sword of Bunker Hill. Homer sang it and after the meeting was dismissed and he was walking toward the door an old lady stopped him saying, "I had heard so much about you and about you singing that song I just had to request it and now that I've heard you sing it—I am ready to die."

In closing I wish to say that I am proud I can say that I had a son who served in the World War.

They were escorted from the room amid great applause.

The committees appointed to carry greetings to the allied organizations reported that they were cordially received by all and presented the Commander with the various badges from the several organizations.

Guide and direct us each moment that we may do Thy will, and finally enter into that Haven of rest prepared for those who love and serve Thee. Hear us in this, our closing prayer, we ask in Jesus Name. Amen.

Department Commander: We will now have the report of the Soldiers Home committee.

REPORT OF SOLDIERS HOME COMMITTEE

Dept. Commander and Comrades: Your Committee upon whom devolved the duty of visiting and inspecting the Soldiers Home, beg leave to submit the following report:

On February 26th we visited the home where the officers gave us a very gracious welcome and extended to us the most courteous treatment. We were first conducted to the dining room by Col. Campbell where we were served with a meal such as the members of the home had just partaken and found it well cooked and plenty of it. This, without the usual notice of our contemplated visit.

We were conducted through the main building by the Quartermaster, Captain John Stronach, and then through the Womans Annex by the Chaplain, Isaac H. Riddick. And we hereby aver, that it would be difficult to find a private home kept cleaner or more tidy than we found this whole institution to be. Of course, you all know the condition of the buildings from the report of legislative committee.

Col. Campbell should be commended for his zeal in the interest of the Civil War Vets particularly, by giving them every comfort available, in such an institution. Upon close inquiry, we found no complaint with regard to management. But all, in each group of Veterans seemed contented and comfortable.

Greeting:

And a hearty welcome to Michigan's veterans of three wars, with all their women's auxiliaries, relatives and guests, to Bay City, my family home for more than half a century, WELCOME.

Then to present to you a brief and partial synopsis of veterans legislation, past and present, which should aid your several organizations especially in the relief legislation to come before you during this 1929 reunion in Bay City. Information helps much.



The Secretary of State issued at Lansing, Michigan, in 1924, a fine booklet on laws then pertaining to soldiers, sailors and marines, giving the following detailed information:

- 1. Michigan Soldiers Home (Act 152 P. A. 1885) C. P. 1667-1691-1915. Provides for women's annex; preservation of property; discipline and government; providing guardians in certain cases; taking care of "post" and "posthumous" funds; care of inmates adjudged insane; providing maintenance and improvement appropriations.
- 2. Grand Army of the Republic (Act 37 P. A. 1883) C. P. 10191-98-1915. Provides for incorporation in Michigan; provides permanent headquarters in the state capitol building, Lansing; Post rooms in public buildings rent free; monumental memorial buildings.
- 3. Burial of our deceased soldiers and sailors; erection of soldiers' monumental buildings; by cities and townships; providing for grave markers; providing for burial allowance for veterans.
- 4. Certain tax exemptions for certain veterans (P. A. 1915) (C. P. 4001) Amended (1923) provides \$2,000 exemption on \$5,000 valuation.
- 5. Soldiers' preference in public employment (224 P. A. 1919) (88-P. A. 1923) Hawkers' license preference; county clerks register soldiers' discharge papers; care of soldiers' estates; minor privileges.
- 6. Soldier relief by counties (214 P. A. 1899); (370 P. A. 1919); protecting soldiers' rights; protecting G. A. R., S. W. V., V. F. W. and American Legion buttons and insignia; public funds for Memorial Day expenses; providing rooms for "S. W. V." in state office building.
- 7. Incorporating the American Legion (408 P. A. 1919) bar examination preference for World War veterans; providing for the welfare of sick and disabled World War veterans; creating American Legion Billet at Otter Lake (247 P. A. 1923); providing disposition of the county war funds; creating military museum in capitol building (106 P. A. 1921); making June 14 the official flag day; providing Michigan flag code (222 P. A. 1923); law against desertion (128 P. A. 1863).

Since 1924 Michigan's Legislature has convened in 1925, 1927 and 1929. Each session has voted large amounts of money for Michigan's veterans and the several state institutions devoted to their care and aid for their dependents and their disabled comrades.

Michigan has always extended every aid and encouragement for the national defense through Michigan National Guard, State Naval Reserve and Aeronautics. The veterans of all wars have aided the various training preparations through the C. M. T. C. and R. O. T. C., the officers' reserve corps and regular army; the naval reserve, active navy and general naval preparedness.



This peace time service also finds expression in the veterans' constant efforts with Congress for proper national defense and for care of comrades and his dependents commensurate with the wealth and generosity of our great nation. In these years our Michigan efforts in Congress have produced some results:

- 1. Secured U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 100 at Camp Custer, for mental cases. Has 670 patients now. Needs 300 more beds now.
- 2. Secured large appropriations for Selfridge Flying Field near Mt. Clemens, and improvements are being made constantly.
- 3. Saved Fort Wayne for Detroit and Michigan as a historic center and a public park on Detroit river. Had been up for sale.
- 4. Secured large funds for building new U. S. Marine Hospital on beautiful Lake St. Clair, near Windmill Point. For general use.
- 5. Helped secure Congress action for developing our commercial air service; developing our national military highways; encouraging an American merchant marine and aiding education always.

Our Civil War veterans are receiving liberal old age pensions, and the comrades of '98 and the World War are constantly striving to improve these aids for their dependents. The men of '98 are receiving similar co-operation from the World War veterans. The adjusted compensation for World War veterans averages about \$1,450, and is payable at death or in 20 years. Over 1,000,000 disability claims have been filed by Americans with the "USVB." The cost of all wars, past, present and future should be a potent deterrent for any future Armageddon among Christian nations.

Michigan has been most generous with her veterans. Immediately followed the Civil War, came the homestead grants by state and nation. In 1920 Michigan voted a bonus of \$32,000,000 for our World War veterans, payments on which are still going forward. The war camp community house at Camp Custer became the American Legion Hospital at Camp Custer for tuberculosis patients and is now open for state and county patients, as well as veterans.

- 1. Michigan monument at Santiago, Cuba (Richardson—S. B. 157; File 160). Finance Committee failed to provide funds (1929).
- 2. Opening American Legion Hospital for general state patients. (S. B. 194; File 200); passed. Given immediate effect.
- 3. Secured Veterans' Preference in Architects' Code (S. B. 214; File 221.)
- 4. Guardianship Act (U. S. Veterans' Bureau); (S. B. 274; File 287); P. A. 156. Protects minors and mental incompetents. Given immediate effect.

Its doors open only on the presentation of the bit of parchment, worn, torn, and begrimed as it may be, which certifies to an honorable discharge from the armies or navies of the Nation during the war against the rebellion, and, unlike any other organization, no new blood can come in. There are no growing ranks from which recruits can be drawn into the Grand Army of the Republic. With the consummation of peace through victory its ranks were closed forever; its lines are steadily growing thinner, and the ceaseless tramp of its columns is with ever-lessening tread. The gaps in the picket lines grow wider ever day.
