

# PROCEEDINGS OF THE FIFTY-THIRD ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN

#### GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

HELD AT GRAND RAPIDS, MICHIGAN, JUNE 17-18-19, 1931

#### WEDNESDAY, JUNE 17, 1931

The fifty-third annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was called to order in the Italian Room of the Pantlind Hotel at 2:00 o'clock.

Department Commander appointed J. J. Reiser, of Post 395, Grand Rapids, Officer of the Day.

Officers of the Guard—E. Owens and E. E. Child, of Post 5, Grand Rapids.

Department Commander—Officer of the Day, are the approaches to this encampment properly guarded, and all present in possession of the countersign?

Officer of the Day-"Commander, they are."

Department Commander—"We are assembled in another annual encampment, for the purpose of transacting such business as may properly come before us. We meet in fraternity, charity and loyalty. The Chaplain will invoke the Divine Blessing. Parade Rest."

Chaplain Riddick-"Our heavenly Father, we thank Thee for this privilege. Again we have assembled; again we look at each other's faces and grasp each other's hands. Thy watchful eye has looked upon us, and Thy hand has guided our footsteps and has brought us safely to this room. Grant us, through the deliberations of this day, that we may realize that we are in Thy presence and that Thou art now, as in the past, our helper, our caretaker, our friend and our father. Bless this organization, we pray Thee, and grant that it may continue as it has in the past. And to those who are not permitted to be with us today, those who have not the strength necessary for their coming, grant comfort in the hour of distress. And may all of us so live that we may glorify Thee and glorify the country in which we live. We pray for Thy blessing upon this great land, upon its rulers and upon all in authority in this land. Lead us on by Thy spirit and grant us the grace to be united together in that land of eternal blessedness. We ask in the name of our Blessed Redeemer, Jesus Christ. Amen."

Department Commander—The Assistant Adjutant General will call the roll of officers.

Isaac Grant moves to dispense with the calling of the roll of posts.



Department Commander—The motion is made that we dispense with the calling of the roll. All in favor indicate their approval by saying "Aye".

Motion carried.

Department Commander—"We have with us today, the Mayor of Grand Rapids, Mr. Karel."

Mayor—Commander and officers, Members of the G. A. R.: I just had the pleasure of talking to the women. I suppose they boss you around, so I had to talk to them first.

"Grand Rapids welcomes you to our city. We hope that you are going to have a good time. If there is anything we can do to help you to have a good time, we will be only too glad to do so. Call at the City Hall if there is anything you want.

"This organization stands for something; it means something; it has accomplished things. Because you are organized, you are a community investment. Any organization today that does things is a community investment, because it has accomplished things. These organizations have helped the country. They have made our city a better place in which to live. It is only through the fact of organization that this city is a better city than it was years ago. Organization has helped to do this.

"We hope you will come again. Any time you come to the city, we will be mighty glad to give you our attention and try to give you anything you want. We are awfully glad you are here, and hope you come again."

#### RESPONSE TO ADDRESS OF WELCOME

Department Commander—

#### Mr. Mayor:

On behalf of the G. A. R. and our affiliated societies, I thank you for your cordial words of welcome, and for your expression of regard for the men of the Grand Army. Also for the proffered hospitality of your city.

These few men present are just a remnant of that great army in blue, who went forth in their youth to put down one of the greatest rebellions that ever existed. They have shown their courage and loyalty on the field of battle, and have saved our country in unity, and our Flag in its honor and beauty. But one of the grandest distinctions that these comrades claim, is, that after four long years of warfare, they came back like loyal and true men, to their homes,—returned to private life—became exemplary citizens—and took part in administering the government of their state, and of the United States, showing that they were able, both to defend and govern their country.

You have turned over your city to these men and their associates. I can assure you that this is duly appreciated. #### ADDRESS OF COMMANDER

#### Comrades:

We have assembled in this beautiful city of Grand Rapids, so called the "Furniture City", to hold our 53rd annual encampment of the Department of Michigan Grand Army of the Republic. The unbounded hospitality of its people has already caused us to feel that it is good for us to be here. These encampments renew the ties of fraternity with which we were cemented together on the field of battle in defense of our country and Flag.

These annual gatherings, to those of us who have been attending them, have, as the years pass by, become more and more precious. They bring us thoughts of joy and of sorrow. Joy, because we were instrumental in saving the Union and making our nation what it is to-day. Sorrow, when we think of the many thousands of our comrades who gave their lives to accomplish this great work. The men of the Grand Army discharged their duty to their country as soldiers many years ago. And it rests with him in the future, as in the past, to keep true step to the call of Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty, until he takes the long trail into the land "beyond the shadows; Where taps never sound, nor the lights go out."

The world is better for his services. Much was accomplished by his sacrifices, and it can be said of him, as was said of old, "His good works live after him". It is fitting that the men in the sear and yellow leaf of life should meet and keep alive the spirit of patriotism, with the hope that the youth of our land may emulate the example set by the Grand Army of the Republic.

Comrades,—I am proud of the record made by the soldiers of the Civil war. I am equally proud of the record made by the men who followed the Flag and stood behind the guns in the Spanish American and the World war. The product of the American home and the pupil of our free schools, is a safe man to guard a nations honor. On all occasions, he has shown his steadfastness in battle, his willingness and ability to endure hardships, and above all, he has shown himself a gentleman—May He ever be found as such.

The duties of the Department Commander have been a source of delight to me, as I have enjoyed the society of so many noble characters, the memory of which I will ever cherish.

As a member of the Board of Managers, I will leave this report to the committee appointed for this purpose. I will say, however, that Michigan has a home for its ex-soldiers, and their widows, of which we may all feel proud.

#### AUXILIARIES AND ALLIED ORDERS

My address would be incomplete were I to fail to mention that noble body of loyal women who compose our own auxiliary—the Women's Relief Corps. They have given us much help and encouragement during the past year. I hereby gratefully acknowledge the many kind acts rendered us by Mrs. Effie B. Murray, Department President of Michigan Woman's Relief Corp—her secretary, Mrs. Ella Rice, and others of her official staff. All are efficient and worthy representatives of our blessed auxiliary.

To the Daughters and Sons of Union Veterans, and their auxiliary, we owe much. Through you, and your associates, our work must be perpetuated, and I have an abiding faith that you will be faithful to the trust. I also desire to express my thanks to May Laurencelle, Department President of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic and to the National Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic for their faithful, patriotic devotion to our noble work.

To the United Spanish War Veterans—our comrades of later days, the Veterans of the World war, and all allied societies, many thanks are due for the interest you have manifested in the cause of liberty during the past year, and I hope that these fraternal ties will ever remain as close as they have in the past.

#### NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT

With our Department, I attended the 63rd National Encampment at Cincinnati, Ohio, August 24th to 29th, 1930. Michigan made a fine showing in the parade and we had sixteen voting delegates in the sessions. The callers at Department headquarters, at the Gibson Hotel, were unanimous in their verdict that a fine time was being enjoyed.

I have served the Department with the best I could give and be-speak for the comrade who will soon take my place, the same loyal support that you have accorded me.

Again, I thank you for the honor that has been mine. The Lord guard and guide you. May you be spared to do good for many years to come. May your bearing be upright, your conscience pure, your garments stainless, as befits those who wear the insignia of the Grand Army of the Republic.


Mrs. Hoeflinger--"Commander and Comrades:

Mr. William Bateman, Lansing—"Commander and Comrades: Being sent here by the Sons of Veterans to greet you, I assure you that words cannot express what we have in our hearts. But we have a depth of feeling for you that is so great that it simply drowns the words.

"My father is still living, but is unable to be here today, much to my regret.

"As Sons of Veterans, we bring you the heartiest greetings we have. If there is anything you have in your minds that we can do for you, give us your suggestions and we will do the very best we can for you as long as we can. Thank you very much for your attention, and I want to present you with this token of flowers from our organization."

Mr. Finch, Grand Rapids—Comrades, we appreciate very much the honor bestowed upon us in being sent to offer greetings to you. My father was an old Comrade, but has passed on. We wish to extend to you our help in any way that we can. All you need to do is to call upon us."

(Response by Commander) We thank you for your visit and flowers. Convey to your encampment our very best wishes.

Department Commander—"We extended an invitation to the Commander-in-chief to be with us and expected he would be until a few days ago I had a letter from him stating that he could not be here and asking me to represent or have him represented at this convention. I have detailed Comrade Kanitz to represent the commander-in-chief, if he will."

Louie Kanitz—"I will gladly do so. I thank you for the confidence you place in me, and my want of ability to fill the very exalted position



of the commander-in-chief. I will do my best, however, and will convey your and his greetings to the various organizations. I thank you."

Department Commander—"We will now listen to the report of the Junior Vice Commander."

A. F. Chappell—"As a past commander of Fairbanks post, it was my duty the past year to bury 17 comrades. I did the best I could.

"I am a little hard of hearing, and this year over at Pontiac I was nominated Junior Vice Commander and really elected before I knew very much about it. Well, I am one of those army men who were instructed to do their duty, and as far as I could see I did that, and fulfilled all obligations just by obeying orders. So I accepted the Junior Vice Commandership.

"Now in Detroit this year, we elected as our commander a man by the name of Stone. He is a fine old boy but in such shape that he was unable to take charge of any of our memorial services. I carried them through to the best of my ability. Further than that I do not know as I have much to say. We are dropping away very fast. In a few years you won't see anything of the old G. A. R. It is something to think about. I have sat in Fairbanks post when we had 600 members, and I have sat in that post when we have had only 9. I went through the roster in Fairbanks post while I was commander. I found 1502 names on that roster. Today you will find 28. I don't know that there is anything more that I can say. I thank you."

Department Commander—"And now we will listen to a report from our Department Chaplain."

Department Chaplain—"I greet you again today—glad to see your faces, glad that God has spared you through the year, has been merciful to you, has spared you and clothed you and given you strength sufficient to come into this gathering with us. My feeling is one of mingled emotions

"The reports that have come in have been very few in number, largely because we are so disorganized in a certain sense. The years as they have passed on have weakened us and have diminished our number and have made our meetings of such an uncertain character. And so many have not reported because there was nobody there capable of reporting. But a few have reported, Adrian, Lansing, Port Huron, Mt. Clemens, Allegan, Kalamazoo, Otsego and some others, and they report that they are very few in number. Others have two members and some have three and four. The largest is 10. They report that memorial services and Decoration Day services are rare. In some instances sermons were preached and some addresses were given, but they have been given by members of the Legion. These things make us think. They bring to our minds and thoughts that every year shows a diminishing of strength and shows us that we are on the road to our final resting place.

"And so it becomes us, Comrades, as men of experience, having seen much of the world and known many experiences, it becomes us to keep our eyes on our great Father. Show to the world how happy an old soldier can be and how we can enjoy the remaining days of our lives.

"God bless you, Comrades. Keep your minds upon things divine. Fix your minds upon things that are essential, and may we at last meet together in that land where all struggles are over—that beautiful land of everlasting peace. God bless you."

"When you think of what you did, and then they talk about the wonderful world war! What was more wonderful, what was grander, than making this the great United States, which you did?"



# REMARKS BY HENRY BROWN AND CHAPLAIN RIDDICK

Comrade, Henry H. Brown—"I want to say that I want to honor the W. R. C. They have done a great deal for our post and for all posts, and for the comrades in general. I think that you all feel the same as I do. They have stayed by us, and if any one of you has ever had any graybacks on you, you know how close. We were hard up many times, and they stood right by us. We always appreciated it, and we do today.

"In Vermontville we have put up a monument for the G. A. R. and the W. R. C. It is 6 ft. 2 in. in circumference, with two tiers of large stone. On one side of the monument is the W. R. C. Flag, and on the other the G. A. R. We have had quite an active corp in our town. The only evidence now that we ever had a civil war stands in the park. That is the only evidence from that town that we had a civil war, but there is plenty of evidence in the cemetery. There are over 200 buried there. We have had on our roster a little over 300 names, and while I am one of three remaining members of that post, I am the only one who lives in that city from the civil war, a town of about 5,000 population. It seems to be a



little unevenly divided some way. Coopersville, a town of about 1,000 population, has 10 ex-soldiers left. It seems strange to have it work out that way."

Department Chaplain Riddick—I just want to remind all of you that you are loyal men who know what it is to sacrifice to save this land. We have a great enemy that is doing all in its power, with great energy, to overthrow your sacrifice and to overcome this land. I refer to Communism. It is doing more than we possibly can imagine. It is emphatically against the government, opposing all government, opposing religion, opposing everything that is good, and they introduce every conceivable measure to turn the people from the principles you have sacrificed for, for the things that will be destructive to humankind. And so I say we must be wide awake and when opportunity offers, we must meet it, we must stand up for the right, we must be opposed to everything of this character. Our churches must stand, our children must attend Sunday school. This land must be preserved. You said so in the days of rebellion when you marched against the foe. This land must continue as it has in the past, the land of freedom, the home of the brave, the home of every patriotic citizen."

Officer of the Guards announced the Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, Effie B. Murray and Past Department Presidents. Comrade Reiser, Officer of the Day, escorted the ladies in and presented

them to the Department Commander.

Department Commander—Comrades, it is a very great pleasure to me to have the opportunity not only to present to you the Department President of the Woman's Relief Corps, Effie B. Murray, but also the Past Department Presidents, who have not only stood back of their organization, but have been our main stay also:

Department Commander—Comrades salute.

Department Commander—We will now listen to Mrs. Murray.

Mrs. Murray—"Commander Estabrook, I think the first thing we have to offer our comrades is our regrets in coming so late. I see by my watch that it is now 4:30, and we were to be here at 3:30, and I beg your pardon. It was something over which I had no control and I could not have come any sooner.

### REPORT OF SOLDIERS HOME COMMITTEE

Department Commander and Comrades—The committee upon whom devolved the duty of inspecting the Michigan Soldiers Home, beg leave to report as follows:

On February 6th, 1931, we visited the home where the Quartermaster Captain John Stronach and Major Don C. Ingraham, the Adjutant, gave us welcome and extended to us the most courteous treatment.

We were first conducted to the dining room by the Quartermaster, Captain John Stronach. There, we were served with dinner such as the members of the home receive (a-la-cafeteria style). We found everything well cooked and plenty of it. The food was first class. This was without any notice of our visit.

The Menu consisted of:

Pumpkin pie

Soup—Salmon chowder. Lettuce and tomato salad Fish—Fried Haddock Baked macaroni and cheese

White and rye bread

Milk, tea and coffee

I questioned several inmates of the home in regard to the meals that they are served and they all said they get the best the market affords and they have no complaint to make whatever.

We were then conducted through the Main Building by Captain Stronach, visiting the kitchen. In the basement, the bakery and the storeroom, we found a large stock of meats, vegetables, fruits and canned goods on hand. Everything was in first class condition.

We were then conducted through the Woman's Annex by the Matron, Mrs. Kuhn. We found all the rooms in first class condition, neat and clean, and everything in good order. There were no complaints by the women as they always receive the kindest attention from the Matron and there is nothing lacking for the comfort and welfare of the women.

Isaac Riddick, Committee to Daughters of Civil War Veterans—"I told them I have the pleasure of having a daughter. They greeted us very kindly. I told them that they were very handsome and they were delighted. They offered me a choice among them and said they would give me as many as 25. We found them a very happy and joyful company. We recommended the great land that we dwell in and they certainly gave assent thereto, and they gave us badges."

Comrade Finch—"I want to say that I failed so far to find my organization. I haven't yet found them."

Department Commander—Any other reports?

Comrade George W. Howe—"Department Commander, you appointed me to convey greetings to the ladies of the G. A. R. from the department of Michigan, and I had the pleasure of doing so and certainly was given a reception that I shall never forget. They are a wonderful body of women. You cannot find anywhere any nicer place, more healthful and suggestive of comfort than there. And if ever you look forward to a home in the Soldiers' Home, you will not regret it. I wish every one of you could make a visit there so that you could carry home a picture of it. I thank you."

Frank D. Keeler, Department Commander and Comrades: Your Committee on Resolutions begs to submit for your consideration and action the following:

Resolved: That the 53rd Annual Encampment of the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, held in the city of Grand Rapids June 1931 equals if not surpases previous events of this kind in the success and enjoyment of the Annual Get-Together of Civil War Veterans and Allied Organizations. The strong bond of loving brotherhood, so peculiar among veterans who have shared dangers and toils on battle fields, grows stronger and deeper as the years go by and the event is looked forward to more eagerly each year.

We may freely congratulate ourselves on having chosen one of the fairest metropolises in our land for this as well as former meetings.

Grand Rapids has taken a warm place in our hearts and earned our lasting gratitude for the open arms extended to us many times.

I do not believe I have to tell you of the marvelous air we have in northern Michigan or its wonderful drinking water. On behalf of the city of Petoskey and northern Michigan, because we love you, and because we are a convention town, we want you up there in 1932. I have here an invitation from our mayor and the Chamber of Commerce of Petoskey."

(Invitation read).

Delegation from Auxiliary of the V. of F. W., represented by Mrs. Lee, Mrs. Bennett and Mrs. Jacobs were introduced at this time by the Department Commander.

Mrs. Lee—"It gives me great pleasure at this time to present the greetings from our auxiliary."

Mrs. Jacobs—"Our state president sends her love and greetings for herself and also from our auxiliary, and I present these to you with all the love and esteem of a woman who belongs to it. Long may you all live and Old Glory wave forever. Presents flowers.

Department Commander—"Ladies, I would like to have Comrade Riddick say a few words to you."

Department Chaplain—"We thank you, ladies, for this visit and we are very glad to meet you upon this pleasant occasion. We are having a very harmonious time and one thing that contributes to that is the coming and greetings of these kind hearted ladies bringing their expressions of love. Comrade Keeler—"Department Commander, I am fearful that Saginaw has fallen down on getting their invitation in. For some reason we haven't heard from our city authorities or Chamber of Commerce. I rather imagine there is a hitch somewhere and I therefore withdraw everything I said with reference to our going to Saginaw next year."

Department Commander—"Are there any more invitations?"



Comrade Reed—"Commander, we have for years been holding this encampment in the southern part of the state. The fartherest north has been Bay City. I think it would be well to give the comrades in the upper peninsula the same privileges we have. We have held it in the lower peninsula for 50 years—at least 30 years. I am in favor of accepting the Petoskey invitation and I would like to have it put to a vote."

Comrade Howard—"It gives me a great deal of pleasure today in giving you greetings from the state department of Michigan and the local chapter, William Alden Smith Chapter No. 2 of Grand Rapids, and I wish you in this convention here assembled the very best convention you have ever had, and God speed you in the most wonderful year. I thank you and offer our services in doing everything we can in bettering conditions for you gentlemen while you are with us. Thank you very kindly."

Mrs. Davidson—"Comrades of the G. A. R., the Commander has given me this opportunity of thanking you for the privilege of presenting this check to the W. R. C. I want to thank you and want you to know that it pleases me more than I can tell you. (Mrs. Davidson retires).

Department Commander—"Is there any more business to come before the encampment? If not we will proceed to the election of officers for the ensuing year. Will someone make a nomination for Department Commander?"

Comrade Bryant—"I wish to present to this encampment a comrade who has the full endorsement of his post. He is commander of his post at the present time. His name is Orestus Blake of Jackson.

Department Commander—"Now for nominations for Senior Vice Commander."

Comrade Finch nominates J. J. Reiser and moves to suspend the rules and elect by acclamation—carried.



Comrade Reiser—"Comrades, this is certainly an unexpected honor for me to be elected here as Senior Vice Commander of this department. I will do my best and I thank you very much."

Department Commander—Nominations for Junior Vice Commander.

Comrade Finch nominates S. S. Puckett of Petoskey.

Comrade Dunham moves that rules be suspended and he be elected by acclamation. Motion carried.

Comrade Puckett—"Thank you very much. I will do all that I can to make the next meeting a success."

Mr. Beecher—"I just want to say this. I possibly was as much instrumental in bringing your convention to Grand Rapids this year as any one person. Since the 29th of January I have endeavored to give most



of my time for your encampment. It has been a great pleasure to be able to work for you and with you. I have had the hearty cooperation of your Department Commander—in fact he has left most everything to me with the exception of a few suggestions. I have had the cooperation of Mr. Geo. M. Reed, General Chairman of the United Spanish War Veterans and General Chairman of Foreign Wars, J. B. Semeyn. I sincerely thank you for this gift which expresses your love and confidence in me, and as I said in the beginning of this meeting that I would soon relinquish my office as Department Commander but my interest in the Department will never cease and I still

General Orders No. 3. Series of 1930-1931.
