

MEZZANINE FLOOR, PANTLIND HOTEL.

The sixtieth annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was called to order by Commander S. H. Carlton, who extended greetings to the Comrades and declared the meeting opened.

Commander Carlton: The first business is to appoint the Officer of the Day and Officer of the Guard which we will have to combine, as there is only one man among us who is capable of making and doing the traveling necessary. That person is Comrade Stewart.

Volunteers were then asked for the appointment of Chaplain. As there were no volunteers, Commander Carlton appointed A. F. Chappelle.

Thus, the following officers were then appointed to serve during the session:

Commander Carlton: Will the Chaplain please open this sixtieth encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic by giving us a prayer?

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER

To the Officers and Members:

Dear Comrades:

This is more of a fireside chat than a report. The Department Commander has done so little during the past year, I almost wonder he has escaped impeachment. Realizing human limitations we had misgivings, on assuming command although appreciating the high honor and at no time would exchange titles with the Chief Executive of our State. Due to the efficiency, and activity, and good will of the Department staff and apparent support of every member of the Department, the duties of the Commander have been light and pleasant, and congenial in all respects. I have had courtesy transportation in most cases. I didn't ask "will you take me?" I was asked "will you go?" Much of my transportation was by the courtesy of Department Commander of the Sons of Union Veterans, Lynn Tiffany, as escort and attendant.

The only sad experience was noting the passing of nearly one-half of our members who have answered the last Roll Call during the past year. The most impressive gatherings I have attended were the last Rites for Comrades of which I have been able to attend, and I have attended all of which I have had notice, conducted by Sons of Veterans, Spanish War Veterans and World War Veterans. All efficient, willing and impressive. I have seen strong men weep at the ritual service at the grave of departed comrades. I have affiliated with and have been honored by nearly all ex-service organizations, and their auxilaries, all in the name of the Grand Army. Without detail I want to repeat and emphasize

all the appreciation ever expressed or recorded of the services and cooperation of our allied organizations, too numerous to mention.

In conclusion I have two recommendations to offer. First, our members are vanishing, we see the "handwriting on the wall", and should put our house in order. We may leave some assets to be disposed of when we are gone. We all know of the faithful services of our Department Secretary, Ida Davidson. I hope a substantial recognition of her devotion to this Department will be provided for at this encampment, and be made a legal record, as the last will and testament of the Department. I would also recommend that future encampments be held after the schools close for the benefit of the Junior League of America, who are now in school. This is a worthy auxiliary calculated to promote patriotism in school life.


Again I thank the Comrades and allied organizations for all their kindness during the past year.

It seems to me that you have such a large crowd. There must be one or two who did not get here. It looks like a healthy growth. In Kalamazoo last year we ran a race with the boys in No. 79, G. A. R. to see who had the most deaths during the year. It was a tie—one apiece.

Comrade Carleton's grandson was here looking after him; now he has returned to Kalamazoo. I have been closely associated with him a number of years. He is still on the Relief Commission. While Comrade Carlton is only Secretary, I am the Chairman. He will have to look up to me.

Comrade Carlton has never yet cast an assenting vote. He keeps to his office daily, from nine until twelve o'clock; then he goes over to the Burdick House and sneaks out a little lunch, and plays cards with the fellows until the last man is asleep in his chair. Then he wakes them up and goes home.



We have all experienced quite a heartbreak in Kalamazoo. Mr. Farley came to Kalamazoo and looked the ground over. He saw the G. A. R. Hall had a wonderful location and decided to kick the props out of the remaining members and build a one-story postoffice on a two-story building lot. Old glory is still over that home, although a week ago the Grand Army was dispossessed. They were told to get out, because the next day the roof was coming down. The boys got together and made an iron-clad agreement to house and take care of the boys of No. 79, as long as there was a member left.

A couple of boys, Carlton, 91, and Sergent, 94, are the only two left. The Legion did not know what they were getting into. Carlton had a brother who is also very old. They would have to keep the Legion open for Comrade Carlton to catch up with his brother.

Carlton always has something nice to say at the other meetings, nicer than with the Civil War Veterans. Maybe we will have to make him behave better.

He is entitled to all the rights and privileges of our encampment. We will fix him a place to sleep, if necessary.

A year ago I was honored to be made an honorary member of Orcutt Post No. 79. I have tried to live up to taking care of the remaining members of the Civil War, and keep their building for them as their home. Now we have lowered the Flag, and their home will be but a mess of dust by the time we get back to Kalamazoo.

I hope we meet every year, and I hope you will honor us by your presence at our annual convention. I want to thank you.

Comrade Kilstrom: Commander Carlton and the rest of your Comrades, I feel that I know you to some extent. As Chairman of the Convention Committee, I have, with the co-operation of Comrade Estabrook, tried to plan everything for your comfort. If there were only Comrade Estabrook to consider in this, it would be very, very easy, because he is very easy and pliable. But he has so many allied ladies' organizations that, he, being a young man, they're all jealous of him. Gentlemen, you ought to come and serve on the committee, instead of sending him alone.

A pleasant time so far, I hope you have had. There was a splendid Memorial Service last evening, which started off our own convention with a splendid start.

We have provided transportation throughout the city, including the Soldiers' Home.

As to your quarters, they were selected by Comrade Estabrook. As to everything else in the general order of doing business, all were left to Estabrook. I know he is giving his best efforts to make this a pleasant reunion for you.

I wish you a happy encampment, and I wish you many more years of happiness to enjoy with your families. I think that will conclude my remarks. I hope you will be over and see us. We will be at Elk's Temple, at Ottawa and Lyon.



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Comrade Estabrook responded to the greetings, thanking the comrades of the U. S. W. V. for sentiments expressed and presented badges to each of the committee.

Commander Carlton: We thank you ever so much for your expressions to the Grand Army. We can always cooperate with each other. I thank you sincerely for your visit, and I hope we will all meet again next year.

Mr. Kilstrom: We contemplate an encampment next year. We have an implied invitation from the Travelers' Union. I'm on the convention committee, and there is a question of where we can go so that we can take care of you and your affiliates.

Comrade Estabrook: When we do get an invitation, we shall have a little committee to fix it up.

A box of candy and a box of cigars were then given to Commander Carlton for all of the Comrades.

Commander Carlton: Ladies of the G. A. R., welcome. We would have been disappointed sorely if you had not come. Thank you for these gifts. If you'll step forward, we will present you with badges.

The badges were then presented, and the ladies were escorted out.

Comrade Estabrook: Comrades, the routine business having been finished of our encampment, and as usual in these encampments, our routine business has to be finished before election of officers, I now move that we proceed to the election of officers for the ensuing year, and we have some other matters to take up regarding the Commander's report.

The Commander has made some good recommendations here in his report, and, as there is no committee to come before the encampment, we will act upon his recommendations as a committee of the whole. I move we proceed to election of officers.

The motion is seconded and carried. Supported by Comrade LaCroix.

Comrade Owen: 'I move we nominate the same Commander as last year.

Commander Carlton: I would like a few words to say to this. I have by mere fortunate circumstances got through the year with more honor than I deserve, and I am perfectly satisfied and desirous of quitting while my record is good. There has been an agreement, if it is all right with all of you, between Comrade Estabrook and myself that we change positions next year. My wish is that he be Commander. Are there any other nominations.

Comrade Owen: I withdraw my previous motion and move that Comrade Estabrook be elected. Seconded and carried. Comrade Estabrook: We will take a standing vote instead of a ballot.

Commander Carlton: You have heard the nomination, and we, as a committee of the whole are ready for a vote. I move that we elect Comrade Estabrook as Commander. Motion seconded and carried.

Comrade Estabrook: For Senior Vice Commander, I nominate Captain Gilbert LaCroix. Seconded.

Commander Carlton: Are there any other nominations? If not, I declare Comrade LaCroix duly elected.

Comrade Owen: I nominate Comrade Parker for Junior Vice Commander. Seconded.

Commander Carlton: Any other nominations? I declare him elected.

Comrade Chappelle: I nominate Comrade Owen for Chaplain. Seconded and carried.

Commander Carlton: I declare him elected.

Comrade Estabrook: I nominate David Plumadore for Medical Director. Seconded.

Commander Carlton: Comrade Plumadore is nominated for M. D. I declare him elected.

Comrade Estabrook: The matter of the Commander's report has not been committed. Of course it is our duty to take up this matter and act upon his recommendations. We will approve them by vote. The first recommendation in his report: We believe there will be some assets to be disposed of when we are gone. This will take effect when we disband. I hope a substantial recognition of our secretary's devotion will be provided for in this encampment and be made a legal record as our last will and testament of the department.

Second: I would recommend that a future encampment be had after the schools close for the benefit of the Junior League of America, who are now in school. This is a worthy auxiliary to promote patriotism in school life.

These are the recommendations that were made. We will take up the first recommendation.

The question is first, I would recommend that at the time of our closing of our business, that Mrs. Davidson be allotted a year's salary how much, will be up to you. The Junior League Business is a fine idea. It is something that could be drawn upon and be placed in the hands of trustees. If a girl wanted to go to a school outside of a district, the girl could borrow money out of this fund. That is one part of it. The other part is something for you to settle.

Comrade LaCroix: It is a very nice thing that Mrs. Davidson be taken care of.

Commander Carlton: I think the Junior League is a grand idea. Do as you please with what I have in mind. Arrange the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, as you wish regarding dissolution. Be it resolved that by the unanimous will of the encampment, that the officers of the official staff of the department make a legal will to dispose of the assets of the department when it is finally dissolved; namely, that the amount of one year's salary, \$600, be bequeathed to department secretary, Ida Davidson, and that the residue be equally divided between the Women's Relief Corps and the Sons of the Union Veterans. That is all. Such will will be made part of the records of this meeting. Here is a tentative form I think would satisfy the situation for the will: The Department of Michigan does hereby will and bequeath all property of which it shall be seized on dissolution. First, to Department Secretary, Ida Davidson, be given \$600—according to Estabrook's recommendation—and the residue to be divided equally between—whatever orders you see fit to divide it among. If you want to do this, it will meet with my approval.

Comrade LaCroix: I think it is very nice indeed.

Mrs. Davidson: I have the report of the Resolution Committee.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

Resolved, That we, Comrades of the Department of Michigan here assembled, extend our sincere thanks to the management of the Pantlind Hotel for all courtesies extended, to the Daily Press, and our Allied Organizations for banquets, luncheons, floral gifts and cigars. We deeply appreciate your many acts of kindness. Especially would we extend our thanks to Mrs. DeRider for manifest interest in our behalf.

Comrade Estabrook: I move the adoption of the report. Seconded.

Commander Carlton: It is moved and seconded that the report be adopted. Carried.

Comrade Estabrook: Now, to take up the first recommendation of the Commander, I move that our Secretary, Ida Davidson, be allowed a year's salary after we close the department. Seconded.

Commander Carlton: It is the unanimous vote of the committee. Moved and carried.

Comrade Estabrook: I would also recommend that future encampment be held after the schools close for the benefit of the Junior League of America, who are now in school.

Commander Carlton: What shall we do with the residue? We may not have more than \$600 when the encampment closes. I hope we will have a small residue to be disposed of after we have advanced the one year's salary to our secretary. I recommend that the residue be equally divided between the W. R. C. and S. of U. V.; a portion of it to the Junior League. Now what is your wish?

Comrade LaCroix: The recommendation is all right.



Comrade Stewart: What does this Junior League amount to? What is it intended for?

Commander Carlton: It is organized as auxiliary to the W. R. C. and bears the same relations to the Relief Corps as the Sunday school to the church. They graduate from the Junior League into the Relief Corps. Besides this, patriotism is introduced into the schools. The patriotic spirit will be carried into the schools, which, it seems to me, is somewhat lacking now. I don't really see the necessity of willing property to them after we are gone. If they go forward as they have gone, they will be on their feet. My mind is that they will be just as wealthy if we leave them out.

Comrade Stewart: After the Relief Corps and the S. of U. V. are taken care of, we can go on with them if we have any left. I am in favor of having it just as it is—to go to Mrs. Davidson, to go to the W. R. C. and the S. of U. V.—they will be our legal heirs. If they have anything to dispose of when they are gone, let them leave it to the Junior League, if they wish.

Commander Carlton: It is recommended that the official staff of the department execute a deed that will be legal to become part of the record of this meeting. That is a very simple matter. It will now have to be drawn up and witnessed.

Officer of the Guard: Mr. Kilstrom to see you.

Mr. Kilstrom: We wish to report that we have accepted the invitation of Traverse City as our next encampment place. I have with me a representative from Traverse City, Lieutenant Clausom, who is a supervisor on that committee and, not knowing all of these organizations and every one's name, they haven't sent an invitation to each.

I appreciate the dignity and courtesy that is your due. We would not wish you to think that we would not do a thing you would not be pleased with.

We hope you have had a pleasant time. We are glad, from the reports of the Allied organizations, that they have had a pleasant time. When we contract the business, I hope you will stay in Grand Rapids and feel at home, throwing away the fact that you are a delegate, and assuming a state of happiness, going where you please, feeling that you are welcome at all times to our city.

Commander Carlton: We will be glad to hear the representative. I would like to take expression of our little group. All who are favorable to go to Traverse City rise to your feet. Unanimously carried.

Lieutenant Clausom: I surely am pleased, and I want to extend at this time a high vote of thanks to you for accepting our invitation. I represent Traverse City, the Chamber of Commerce, and our camp. And we thank you and the committee that did this work of inviting this department here. When we invited you to our city, we invited all. However, I want to give you a personal invitation. I am glad you accepted. Thank you. We will show you a royal time. God bless you until that time.

Commander Carlton: We want to thank you in advance.

Mrs. Davidson: From the bottom of my heart. I just can't seem to find words to thank you comrades, every one of you, for your kind expression of my services.

Mr. Neir, the gentleman to draw up the will, came in. Directions were given his secretary, and they left to make out the will in legal form.

Mrs. Davidson: You will remember this little lady who did everything for the comfort and happiness of the comrades while they were in Detroit. --Mrs. Stables.

Eleanor Stables: I just wanted to say "Hello!" and tell you how happy I am to see you again, and to thank Colonel Estabrook for all of the nice things he has done this year. I couldn't let you have your convention without coming and saying "Hello!" Thank you very much.

Mrs. Davidson: We deeply appreciate your services.

A recess is called for a short time while waiting for the will.

Officer of the Guard: Commander, a committee of greetings.

Commander Carlton: Present them.

Comrade Stewart presented Elizabeth Carlson, Betty Cherrett, Mayme Bockhouse, members of A. Lyman Gilbert W. R. C. No. 59 of Detroit.

The ladies extended greetings to the Comrades and presented them with flowers. Commander Carlton thanked them, and they retired.

Comrade Stewart: Now I am going to give every one of you Comrades an invitation to come to Petoskey on the evening of April 4th, 1939, to attend my birthday dinner, given by the Veterans. I want you to see what the people up there think of me.

Mr. Neir and Mrs. DeRuiter came in. The will is signed by the Commander and Adjt. General and witnessed by Mrs. DeRuiter.

Commander Carlton: We shall now proceed to the installation of officers. We shall install them right in their seats. You have all been elected to Officers in the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic. The officers were then installed by the Commander.

Is there any other business to come before this meeting?

Birds will sing and flowers grow o'er their silent sacred dust; While the ivy twines the cannon and the old sword gathers rust. They'll be held in sacred mem'ry, through the ages yet to be, By the coming countless millions of this nation great and free. They have saved this great republic, kept our Starry Flag o'erhead, So we love our gray-haired Veterans, love the living and the dead."

RESUME

The Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, was organized as a Provisional Department, May 8th, 1867, in the City of Detroit, by General R. A. Alger, who became the first Commander. He was followed by William A. Throop—William Humphreys.

In March of 1878 the Department of Michigan barely existed. There were supposed to be four Posts but in reality there were but two that showed any signs of life.

January 22nd, 1879, the Department of Michigan was re-organized with the following Officers, Posts and Members:

So there's nothing holds a candle To the old Grand Army Boys.

Why, they fought and bled together, And they shared the prison pen, And they faced the front in battle

With the touch of men. Then the compact was cemented

'Mid the conflict's crash and noise; So there's nothing holds a candle To the old Grand Army Boys.

They fraternal! Well I reckon; And their charity's all right. Are they loyal? They have proved it, For they left their homes to fight; And the Nation owes them homage, For the peace it now enjoys; For there's nothing holds a candle To the old Grand Army Boys.

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"Heritage of the Grand Army of the Republic."

"The Grand Army of the Republic is a unique organization. No child can be born into it. No proclamation of President, edict of King or Czar can command admission. No university or institution of learning can issue a diploma authorizing its holder to entrance. No act of Parliament or Congress secures recognition. The wealth of a Vanderbilt cannot purchase the position. Its doors open only on the presentation of a bit of parchment, worn, torn, and begrimed as it may be, which certifies to an honorable discharge from the armies or navies of the Nation during the war against the rebellion, and, unlike any other organization, no new blood can come in. There are no growing ranks from which recruits can be drawn into the Grand Army of the Republic. With the consummation of peace through victory its ranks were closed forever; its lines are steadily growing thinner, and the ceaseless tramp of its columns is with ever-lessening tread. The gaps in the picket lines grow wider every day. Details are made for the reserve summoned into the shadowy regions until by and by only a solitary sentinel will stand guard, waiting until the bugle call from beyond shall muster out the last comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic."

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
