



#### WEDNESDAY, JUNE 19, 1940

#### TERRACE ROOM, UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN UNION.

Promptly at 2:00 p. m., the Sixty-Second Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, was called to order.

Commander Chappell: The Encampment will please come to order. Once more we assemble for the transaction of such business as may properly come before us. May every thought and action be in a spirit of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty. The Chaplain will ask the Divine blessing.

Chaplain Owen: Almighty Father, humbly we bow before Thee, our Creator, Preserver, Guide and Protector. We thank Thee for our lives, for Thy mercy which has kept us until this hour and for Thy constant care in our hours of danger, and for the preservation of our national integrity and unity. Bless our Country and our Order, make it an instrument of great good; keep our names on the roll of Thy servants and at last receive us into that Grand Army above where Thou art the Supreme Commander. Amen.

#### DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS TO THE OFFICERS AND COMRADES OF MICHIGAN GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

#### Comrades:

Today we meet to open the 62nd Annual Encampment of the Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic. We have once before been entertained by the patriotic citizens of Ann Arbor. In 1892 with Charles L. Eaton Commander we enjoyed the hospitality of this beautiful University city. Many and great are the changes we see but the same warm welcome greeted us.

#### FRATERNAL VISITS.

It is with every increasing difficulty the Commander may accept the many invitations received. I did what I was able to, but many times our Secretary has been delegated to represent me. My first official visit was to Fairbanks Corps on the observance of Independence Day. During the summer months I made calls on Comrades in the southern part of the State.

In September dedicated and lighted the Perpetual Torch in the Michigan State Fair grounds honoring the veterans of all wars. One large stone bears the inscription for "Department of Michigan G. A. R." and was placed by members of Pingree Camp No. 5, Spanish War Veterans.

Accompanied by Adjt. General Estabrook and our Secretary, journeyed to Pittsburgh, Pa., to attend National Encampment, arriving on Sunday we found Department Chaplain Owen and Delegate Warner waiting us, making four in attendance at every session and taking part in the parade.

Was honor guest at five receptions—three by Woman's Relief Corps, the Sterling Tent No. 3, Daughters of Union Veterans of Civil War and the Ladies of the G. A. R.

Attended one District Convention and the Institution of a Junior Club Corps given my name, an honor I deeply appreciate.

Severe illness prevented my accepting all but one, Installation service, in January. This also prevented my attending the preliminary meeting in Ann Arbor. To arrange for this Encampment, however, our interests were ably looked after by Miss Simpson.

The 58th anniversary of Pomeroy Post and 56th of Pomeroy Corps in Jackson was one of the pleasant events of my year. Though the serious illness of Judge Advocate Killeen prevented him making the trip from Portland.

I spent two days at Headquarters where I was joined by Adjutant Estabrook. The books were examined, finances discussed and details of the work given by the Secretary. Miss Simpson has begun much valuable research work. Through her efforts nine Comrades have been re-instated and others may soon be again in the Department.

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#### GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

I am grateful to Elizabeth Colliau, Past Dept. Secretary W. R. C., who has been my "official chauffeur" times without number and to our Secretary who arranged and accompanied me on these visits.

#### FINANCE.

The report of A. A. General needs careful attention as indicating the decline in membership (despite the efforts of the Secretary) and no receipts from per Capita Tax. On recommendation of Adjt. Estabrook it was decided to keep Michigan on the honor roll of National, sending the dollar tax for every member we claimed, the Secretary, to write every Comrade explaining the need for this tax, reports nearly every Comrade has now responded. I recommend this Encampment take action on this.

The State appropriation cut to one-half the usual amount, necessitates the strictest economy; for this reason General Orders No. 3 was not issued.

#### PENSIONS.

House Resolution 7981 passed the house without one dissenting vote and is now before the Senate Committee on Pensions. Our appeal has gone out to our Senators and received most favorable replies.

#### MEMORIAL DAY.

More and more the placing of the Flag and flowers must be given to the tender care of our Auxiliary, the Allied Orders and Veterans of the late wars. To every one, my sincere thanks.

Memorial Sunday with 3 Comrades, attended service in St. Paul's Cathedral and on the day preceding Memorial, with five Comrades and several Sons took part in service in Woodmere Cemetery Soldiers plat. Here 400 school children placed the Flags. Following this with Department Secretary left for Grand Rapids to be with our six "boys" and officially visit the Home as guest of Col. Walter Baker, who this year inaugurated a service along the lines of that held in Arlington; this to be recognized as the tribute paid by the State, my duty as Commander was to be present.

Governor Dickinson gave the Memorial Address and with him I placed the wreath on the monument, surrounded by Adjt. Estabrook, Chaplain Owen, Commander Ives and Comrades Warner, Hurd, and Russell. A great throng filled the grove where Commanders of all Organizations paid tributes. I spoke for the Grand Army. Before returning to Detroit was guest in the home of our Chaplain, making a trip to Holland, guest of Chamber of Commerce, whose representative guided us through the miles of tulips. Our thanks to Miss Giradot who arranged this treat.

#### SIXTY-SECOND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

#### IN MEMORIAM.

Sadly I record the passing of two from my staff, Sr. Vice Commander John F. Beaumont and Samuel Spencer Serg't Dept. Colors.

Our records show 25 Comrades have left us since last Encampment.

"The toil, the suffering all past, Safely returned to THEE, at last."

As I close my last message to you, while war clouds hover over half the earth, we, who have known the horrors of war think with sad hearts of the innocent who must suffer. Let us remember GOD was with US in those dread years long past. Let us give thanks for the blessings of a free united Country—keeping ever the thought, I have faith in God, faith in my Country and under God's guidance peace will again reign.

I wish to thank all who have assisted my administration. For our A. A. General and our Secretary words fail to express all they have meant to me and to the Department. I marvel at the work accomplished by Miss Simpson as I realize the responsibilities that fall on her.

4. That no change be made in Secretary so long as Headquarters is maintained and the present Secretary, Leah M. Simpson be retained from year to year, that the work of caring for our records be left to her care.

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Comrade Estabrook: What is your pleasure regarding this report?


Comrade Le Valley: I move the report be accepted and the recommendations be given the committee to report on at next session. Seconded and carried.



#### **REPORT OF DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN**

#### A. F. Chappell, Department Commander:

Reports would indicate that more and more the observance of Memorial Day is recognized by patriotic organizations and citizens and that in the sunset of the life of the Department, our Comrades are making supreme effort to do their part.

Reports were received from 15 Posts. Memorial Sunday services were attended by sixteen Comrades and Memorial Day by twenty-three. These services show that all would pay honor to our soldier dead, as sermons were delivered by ministers of every faith. One Canadian Legion veteran, two World War, one Spanish War veteran and one son of a veteran.

In 64 cemeteries flags and flowers were placed on 8,528 graves. Parades and exercises are now arranged by our younger orders, the W. R. C., the Allied Orders, Veterans Council and Veterans of all wars. 94 orders in all, 1,175 school pupils taking part.

An outstanding observance was carried out by Col. Baker at the Soldiers Home, the Memorial address being given by Governor Dickinson, at which Posts 1, 5, 17, 56 and 294 were represented. Department Commander Chappell paid tribute to the Grand Army.

10 Posts own their burial plats. 18 graves reported unmarked.

Commander Wood spoke over the radio. Our 98-year-old Comrade in Adrian gave the Gettysburg Address at the Soldiers monument.

I urge upon all, especially the school teachers, to impress on the minds of their pupils the importance of being patriotic.


#### REPORT OF DEPARTMENT PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR

This month the home will operate on an inadequate budget, so will end up in the red, unless the state financiers furnish more money.

To your dear mothers, wives and sisters who sacrificed their men that their Country might endure, we pledge our fidelity. Seven Past Dept. Presidents joined in greetings. Two large cartons of tobacco were left for the Comrades. A rarely beautiful basket of flowers was presented in memory of Comrade Theodore Metzger, father of Past Department President Genevieve Viets.

Comrade Estabrook: We thank you for the good wishes and for your flowers and gifts. We will always welcome you. Our Secretary will present the badges. I see she is a dear friend of all of you. Thank you also for the invitation to your luncheon, we will be with you.

No other nominations, rules are suspended and Secretary casts unanimous ballot. Commander Chappell declares A. C. Estabrook elected Department Commander.

Comrade Estabrook: I place in nomination for Sr. Vice Commander, Martin Warner. Seconded by Eugene Owen. No other nominations. Secretary casts unanimous ballot and Martin Warner declared elected.



Eugene Owen: For Jr. Vice Commander I nominate Orlanda Le Valley, seconded by Comrade Plumadore. No other nominations, the unanimous ballot is cast and Orlanda Le Valley declared elected.

Comrade Estabrook: For Chaplain, David Plumadore, seconded by Martin Warner. Same procedure and David Plumadore declared elected.

Commander Chappell: This completes our election, a most harmonious one. Not a cloud has disturbed this Encampment or our deliberations. May we all be together in Lansing. I wish success to our new officers.

Comrade Owen: Commander, the hall is filled with Sons and in the other room a distinguished greeting committee waits.

Miss Simpson enters with Mrs. Elfie Carroll, National President of the Woman's Relief Corps and Mrs. Lizetta Coady, Past National President.

Comrade Estabrook to Commander Chappell: I am honored in presenting these ladies to you and to our Comrades.

Commander Chappell: This is a great pleasure to bid you welcome to the 62nd Encampment of the Michigan Department. The Sons were then admitted, eleven Past Department Commanders and twenty-nine members led by their Department Commander, Cloy V. Smith.

Commander Chappell: It is good to see so many Sons. The Grand Army Boys are going fast, keep us in mind and visit us whenever you can, as Comrade Estabrook says you make things lively for us. We are glad you came while the National President of our only Auxiliary is with us we know it has been our Womans Relief Corps that has stood by our side these many years. Mrs. Elfie Carroll, National President.

Department Commander, Adjutant General and Comrades: I am happy indeed to be with you today. I am honored coming into the presence of Veterans of the Civil War. My father was a veteran and I am the wife of one who served his country. To our Sons I appreciate your interest in the welfare and the love and attention you give to our Comrades—I wish for you every success in your work. Commander Chappell just as long as the United States needs patriotic women your Relief Corps will function. We are here to do your bidding and to perpetuate your memory when only the spirit of the Grand Army remains as our inspiration. I assure you we will never die out—certainly with the ideals of the Grand Army as our guide nothing too serious can happen to these—our United States. Presents gift from the Department President.

Mrs. Coady: My words will be few. To my Comrades I want to say I enjoy knowing you. You have come to see me and I have enjoyed your visits.

Miss Simpson responded for the Comrades.

Cloy V. Smith, Commander of the Sons: Commander, it has been a great honor to work with you this year. I thank you for your interest in our Order and pledge continued loyalty to the Grand Army. I claim the privilege of pinning this badge on you and also I have one for Miss Simpson, your secretary, who has never failed in loyalty to our organization.

Frederick McMurtie: I speak from 50 years' actual experience with this organization. You have shown you appreciate our work, our aims. The memory of the years of association with the Grand Army of the Republic, is pleasing to us and we feel that the privilege is especially ours over that of our sons and grandsons who will continue on in this work after the last Grand Army man has gone. With this gift we wish you God-speed and a safe return to your homes. Long life to each and every one of you.

Commander Chappell: This has become such a jolly good meeting I think we will recess and visit, but before we do I will ask Miss Simpson to present the officers for next year. We had just finished our election when you entered.

Miss Simpson: I present as Department Commander one who has served us many times and well, Comrade A. C. Estabrook; Senior Vice Commander, Martin J. Warner; Junior Vice Commander, Orlando Le Valley, and Chaplain, David Plumadore. Our visitors gather 'round in hearty congratulations.

During intermission Commander suggested the Sons act as installing officer. This honor fell to brother Ray Kaywood, Past Department Commander, who appointed Glen Wigent, Officer of the Day.

This I know will be yours with the loyal Sons and your splendid Commander and the Secretary you are so fortunate to have, our Past Department President, Miss Simpson. Good by and God bless you.

Commander Estabrook: Mrs. Caroll and Sons. Words of thanks fail me. This has been a most unusual closing of our Encampment and a very happy one. It seems like a real homecoming to have you with us.

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We want you to carry on the work and uphold the ideals inaugurated by the Grand Army in 1886. May we all meet again.

Another ten minutes spent in friendly good byes and our guests reluctantly retire.

Commander Estabrook: It is now 12:30 and we have accepted an invitation to lunch. We will adjourn to re-convene at 2:30 for formal closing.

#### THURSDAY, JUNE 20-2:30 P. M.

Commander Estabrook: Comrades please come to order.

Our last hour together this morning left only one thing unfinished. I wish to thank our retiring Commander for the fine manner in which he conducted the business of this Encampment and our Secretary for her graciousness in receiving our many visitors and for her wonderful year's work.

I pledge my earnest effort to uphold the traditions of the Grand Army.

Comrade Chappell: It is now my pleasure to pin over a heart that beats true for the Grand Army, this Past Department Commanders jewel. We know you will wear it with honor to yourself and our Department.

Comrade Chappell: This is a proud moment for me. I thank you.

Commander Estabrook: All business being finished I declare the 62nd Annual Encampment adjourned—sine die.

Wednesday morning, citizens and hundreds of delegates of the Allied Orders gathered in the Rackham Auditorium to enjoy a program befitting the dignity and splendor of this great building. Simpson, arrived in Pittsburgh Sunday and found Delegate at Large Martin Warner and Chaplain Eugene Owen comfortably established in Wm. Penn Hotel, The Michigan Headquarters.

Memorial services, Semi-Official meeting and Camp Fire were held in the new Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall; Music furnished by the U. S. Band, addresses by the Governor and prominent citizens with Col. Robert G. Woodside presiding, called thousands to pay tribute to the soldiers of the Civil War.

Monday a meeting of Michigan delegates in Headquarters, called by Commander Chappelle, to consider legislation proposed by National.

Wednesday, Aug. 30—The blare of bugles and ruffle of drums early in the morning heralded the outstanding feature of the Encampment the parade of the Grand Army. Departments were assigned to a position in line in order of seniority of date of Charter, Michigan being the 18th. Sessions of the Grand Army were held in the Wm. Penn hotel;

VIII. National General Orders No. 2 carried the call for one dollar per capita tax each member, ending Dec. 1939. This seemed to be not understood, necessitating much correspondence by our Secretary, tho gladly sent upon receipt of her letter; only ten not responding. Please remember this is a National law, when making 1940 reports.

IX. Your Commander is not unmindful of the many good wishes, flowers and cards received during his illness and would express a deep sense of gratitude for these messages.

X. Comrades, a short year ago you bestowed on me the proud title of Department Commander, fully realizing the real work and responsibility falls on the Secretary. Miss Simpson has been equal to every call. Assistant Adjutant Estabrook joins me in appreciation of the fine work instituted by Miss Simpson in locating every Civil War soldier in Michigan, and re-instating Comrades who once were members of the Grand Army; in no other way may the life of the Department be prolonged. We are glad to again extend the hand of Comradeship to Nelson J. Dunn, R. M. Teeter, Charles Hurd, Cyrus Perrigo, George Waffle, and W. R. Howland.

XI. With deep sorrow I am called to record the passing of two in my Official family; Department Sr. Vice Commander John F. Beaumont, joined his Comrades on that other Shore April 7, 1940. A true soldier in peace as in war. His faithful service to the Grand Army has left a loving Memory with us who remain. Samuel Spencer, Sergeant Department Colors, crossed the river to be again with his Comrades; Faithful to the end.

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#### A SHORT HISTORY OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The Grand Army of the Republic was organized at Decatur, Illinois, April 6th, 1866, by Dr. B. F. Stephenson of Springfield, who had served as surgeon of the 14th Illinois Infantry. At the close of the Civil War he returned to his practice as a physician in Springfield, where in February, 1866, he first suggested the idea of the organization and made the draft of the ritual.

The first ritual was printed in the office of The Tribune at Decatur, the proprietors of which, with their compositors, had been Union soldiers.

The organization of Post No. 1 at Decatur was followed by the organization of Post No. 2 at Springfield, Illinois, and posts were thereafter rapidly established throughout Illinois.

The membership of the order was at its highest stage in 1890, when it stood at 458,230.

#### MICHIGAN

The Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, was organized as a Provisional Department, May 8th, 1867, in the City of Detroit, by General R. A. Alger, who became the first Commander. He was followed by William A. Throop—William Humphreys.

In March of 1878 the Department of Michigan barely existed. There were supposed to be four Posts but in reality there were but two that showed any signs of life.

January 22nd, 1879, the Department of Michigan was re-organized with the following Officers, Posts and Members:

The records of the War Department, Sept., 1865, show the total number of men furnished by the State, from April 17, 1861 to April 30, 1865 was 90,048, without reference to periods of service. Not all of these were ever members of the Grand Army. The peak of membership being reached in 1889 with 21,418 on the rolls.

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# "Heritage of the Grand Army of the Republic."

"The Grand Army of the Republic is a unique organization. No child can be born into it. No proclamation of President, edict of King or Czar can command admission. No university or institution of learning can issue a diploma authorizing its holder to entrance. No act of Parliament or Congress secures recognition. The wealth of a Vanderbilt cannot purchase the position. Its doors open only on the presentation of a bit of parchment, worn, torn, and begrimed as it may be, which certifies to an honorable discharge from the armies or navies of the Nation during the war against the rebellion, and, unlike any other organization, no new blood can come in. There are no growing ranks from which recruits can be drawn into the Grand Army of the Republic. With the consummation of peace through victory its ranks were closed forever; its lines are steadily growing thinner, and the ceaseless tramp of its columns is with ever-lessening tread. The gaps in the picket lines grow wider every day. Details are made for the reserve summoned into the shadowy regions until by and by only a solitary sentinel will stand guard, waiting until the bugle call from beyond shall muster out the last comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic."

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
