



PANTLIND HOTEL, GRAND RAPIDS, JUNE 3-6, 1942

Following the joint opening with our Allied Orders in the Black and Silver room, Civic Auditorium, the first session of the sixty-fourth annual Encampment was called to order by Sr. Vice Commander, Orlando Le Valley, who expressed regret that the continued illness of Department Commander, John M. Park, prevented his meeting with us; a sentiment echoed by every Comrade.

Commander Le Valley: We meet in Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, may nothing occur to mar the happiness of this week. I ask your cooperation as I take up the duties before me. I will appoint Comrade Warner to act as Officer of the Day.

Comrade Warner: I will do my best.

Commander Le Valley: Officer of the Day, you will present Comrade George A. Gay, Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Commander Le Valley: Commander in Chief, it is a very great honor that is mine, to welcome you to our Encampment; that you and Mrs. Gay have made the long trip from New Hampshire to be with us will always be the happy memory of this Encampment.

There is no other country in the world where such a meeting could be held. We claim Michigan as one of our best Departments—the only one having a gain in membership last year, almost 100%, I understand only two Comrades living in the state, not members of your Department; I tell you that is a marvelous record, and all this by the effort of your splendid Secretary, I wonder do you appreciate her?

Comrades Killeen and Warner: Don't leave us out of that. We voted her "life Secretary" just to show every one we wanted to keep her till the last Comrade is gone.

ADDRESS OF THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

COMRADES:

Again we gather in the hospitable city of Grand Rapids, to hold our Annual Encampment; eight times Grand Rapids has opened its heart and homes to honor our organization and the Comrades of the Civil War. A record held by no other city, which deserves and receives our deepest thanks.

One year ago you elected me to this highest office in our Department; as I pass this honor to another, I deeply regret that months of illness prevented my accepting the many calls to mingle with you and our Allied Orders. My thanks to our Department Secretary who so ably represented me on these occasions.



The year has been saddened by the passing of four from my staff: Comrades J. A. Hamilton, Quartermaster General; A. F. Chappell, Past Department Commander; Dennis McGonigal, chief of Staff; Truman O. Webber, Administrative Board, and ten faithful members.

My first official duty was to accept the parade Flag presented us by the Michigan Department Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War. This Flag now graces Headquarters in the Capitol.

Before leaving Lansing was guest of the Ladies of the G. A. R. at luncheon.

Many honors have been bestowed on me by my home town. I am specially indebted to the Daughters who have entertained me many times.

I attended the Father and Sons banquet and observance of Washington's birthday, receiving every courtesy and recognition of the part the Grand Army has had in building our Country since the Civil War.

In September I anticipated joining our delegation at National Encampment in Columbus, but was taken ill, the doctor forbade the trip—regretfully I put away my traveling bag. Have since left my home on few occasions.

My thanks to Sr. Vice Le Valley who represented me. That Michigan was again honored in the appointment of Comrade Hamilton as Quartermaster General, was soon shadowed by his death in December. Again we were honored in the appointment of Comrade Owen and Miss Simpson retained as his Secretary.

MEMBERSHIP: With deep pride I note the fact that while our ranks grow thinner and every state shows a loss, Michigan is the only state showing a GAIN. This is entirely due to our Secretary whose countless letters clearing records and hours spent searching old files in Headquarters, brought the enrollment of 18 Comrades at Large, all glad to again be in the Grand Army fold.

In August accompanied by Comrade Owen and Miss Simpson I made my only official visit to the Soldiers' Home, where we were received by Col. Baker and presented to the members of the Board, then in session. A pleasant hour was spent at the home of Comrade and Mrs. Ives, where we were joined by Comrade Warner. I regret Comrade Hurd was out of the city. A long ride to places of interest closed the day. I express our thanks to Miss Eleanor Giradot who furnished her car and accompanied us.

MEMORIAL DAY: May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, then our Commander in Chief, designated May 30th, as Memorial Day, in the now famous General Orders No. 11. Through all the years the Grand Army has held this day sacred. While no longer able to actively assist, many Comrades attend services and pause to remember their Comrades. Let us protest every effort to change to any other date.

ENCAMPMENTS: Unable to leave my home in January, I delegated Miss Simpson to represent the Department and preside at the PRELIMINARY meeting held in Owosso to plan for this Encampment;



the result of this and four subsequent meetings, you are familiar with. I offer a recommendation pertaining to this subject.

DEFENSE: Comrades it is not necessary for me to go into this subject; I do urge a careful consideration of the recommendation. In reviewing the year, I find our Secretary has never been granted a day's vacation and on many occasions has made no charge for travel expense when on official duty; on the meager salary allowed from our appropriation I believe this also should be considered.

Comrades, the record of this Administration is nearly finished; I pray God, I may be given strength to be with you at this Encampment; I have done my best to serve you; as I again take my place in the ranks, in all truth I can record that every officer has been loyal, every Comrade and member of Allied Orders, kind. Our Secretary has given every day of the year to our service visiting me, conferring on every problem, the records show hundreds visit our Headquarters—groups of pupils seeking items for Special essay work on Civil War history; all graciously received and much gained from the "talks" given by Miss Simpson; Comrade Owen made the trip to visit me; for all these and every kindness shown, I am profoundly grateful.

We are under renewed obligation to the Legislature and State, for the annual renewal of the appropriation to maintain the Headquarters in the Capitol, and for the many courtesies shown our Department Secretary.

My last appeal as your Commander, let no shadow of dissension ever enter our ranks; let the light of FRATERNITY, CHARITY and LOYAL-TY encircle us as we clasp hands and enter the "Sunset Trail."

I accompanied Secretary Simpson to Coopersville to visit our Commander, who has been confined to his home many weeks; attended Mother's Day service with the Daughters; was present at every session of the National Encampment in Columbus, Ohio; was guest of Department President, W. Comrade Owen: Commander, I made the other motion which did not get over, I now move the Secretary be allowed her expenses. Seconded by Comrade Ferguson and carried.

Secretary thanks the Comrades and continues the reading of reports.

Comrade Warner: Commander, I would like to ask what is to be done about our buying a Defense Bond. I promised that if the ladies of Custer Corps would buy one I would buy them one also, and we are doing it today. Uncle Sam has been good to every one of us and now is our chance to do something in return.

Comrade Owen: Commander, the Committee favor the Department Commander's recommendations, but I think it will be best to have open discussion; our Secretary can read so all may hear before voting them.

Acting Commander Le Valley: If there is no objection I will ask the Secretary to read each one separately.

RECOMMENDATIONS

No. 1-

That the Secretary be authorized to confer with city officers and Committees extending invitations for future Encampments, BEFORE such invitations are presented for acceptance by Grand Army; the date and place of next Encampment to be left in hands of Secretary and Council of Administration.

Comrade Owen: Approved by Committee, I move the adoption of Recommendation. Seconded by Comrade Loop and Carried.

No. 2-

Realizing our inability for active service in the war in which America is now engaged—That the Department of Michigan purchase one Defense Bond; the amount, beneficiary, and disposition of said Bond to be decided by vote of this or some future Encampment.

Comrade Owen: Approved by Committee but there seems a question about the beneficiary or disposition as it will be some years before ma-



turity and Michigan Department may not be functioning. Perhaps the Commander in Chief can help us.

Commander in Chief Gay: You understand in time of need you can cash in on these Bonds before maturity but by looks of this Department with 45 members some Comrades will still be carrying on. You all know the National Law, that whatever property or money in possession of a Department at time of dissolution, is taken over by the National organization, same as all property in possession of a Post belongs to your Department, when Post disbands so I see no reason for this part of Recommendation to bother you.

Comrade Owen: Department Commander I move the Department of Michigan purchase one Defense Bond (of first group) the vote to be recorded by Secretary. Seconded by Comrade Warner and declared Carried. Recorded vote—in favor, seven—opposed one.

No. 3—

That we protest changing date of Memorial Day, to any date other than May 30.

Commander Le Valley: All in favor, "Aye", declared unanimously Carried.

No. 4-

That we protest calling the Civil War the "WAR between the States." Commander Le Valley: All in favor, "Aye", opposed—It is Carried.

Comrade Owen: I think we all understand now and we may safely leave the details to be carried out by our Secretary.

Commander Le Valley: This finishes the Recommendations offered by Department Commander Park, anything further to be done?

Comrade Owen: The Committee on Department Commander's report approved both report and recommendations offered; we regret the continued illness of the Commander. Motion made, seconded and carried report be filed and printed in Journal.

Acting Department Commander Le Valley: It is now 12:30 I declare a recess for luncheon. We re-convene at 1:30.

Called to order at 1:40 P. M.

At this time the Flag presented by Department Michigan Daughters of Union Veterans is advanced to position at right of Commander and all join in giving Pledge of Allegiance.

Officer of the Day, Warner: Department Commander you can see the room is filled with happy Daughters and overflow in the halls.

Commander Le Valley: Secretary will you present these Daughters?



Secretary Simpson: I am indeed glad to present this group of nine Past Department Presidents, Mrs. Hecht of Indiana who represents the National President and the Chairman, Sister Tressa Bowmaster. These Past Department Presidents are old friends who never miss an opportunity to visit us.

Tressa Bowmaster: Commander in Chief, Department Commander and Comrades: The happiest hour of the week is when we Daughters visit our Fathers, to greet old friends and today, these Comrades, new to us tho we Daughters have adopted several this year as our special care. We know you were all comrades with our Fathers and Grandfathers; we are proud of our eligibility that allows us to belong to you a tie nothing can sever. INSPECTION OF SOLDIERS' HOME.

COMRADES:

As Chairman of your committee to report on condition at Soldiers' Home, I submit the following: The Commandant received us graciously and provided a guide who accompanied us through the buildings. It happened to be the day the ladies of the Corps were giving a party; we entered a large parlor, furnished with all things necessary for entertainment; the bright sunshine gives this room a most cheerful appearance.

Adjoining the parlor is the dining room, always an attraction. We found it neat, orderly and equipped with everything necessary, for the useful purpose for which it is intended. The cooking is done by steam,



the bread cutting, potato peeling and dishwashing, all done mechanically saves much labor. Three kinds of bread are served and on the shelves were long rows of pies—it requires from 70 to 90 pies for a meal.

The O. T. is a busy place. It is now fitted with a band saw, circle saw and a jig saw, a drill press, wood lathe and sander, there is also a glue and paint room. Six or seven men find employment in this department. The laundry is furnished with modern machinery. The average amount of laundry passing through this department is eight tons each month.

The second floor of the main building houses the women; the number varies from 56 to 79 as many request furloughs during the hot weather. Since our last inspection, new furniture has been added, making the ladies' parlor a very attractive place, the only complaint I heard was the lack of awnings to keep out the hot afternoon sun, this lack was also evident in the office. The linoleum covered floors are well kept and the ladies in their bright colored house dresses appeared happy and contented.

On this floor is the concert hall where church service is held Sunday morning. Catholic service is held each Sunday morning in the Chapel proper, on the grounds. A moving picture furnishes entertainment one night a week.

The third floor houses the soldiers. Comfortable looking beds, rocking chairs, very much in evidence; the general appearance orderly and comfortable.

The Hospital well supervised and very neat; the patients happy and contented as one could expect; doctors, nurses and orderlies flit busily about; a trained dietitian attends to the better health part and the food looked appetizing. The equipment is modern and I feel everything possible is being done for the longevity of the soldiers and their kin.

The outside of buildings has been painted; the grounds with the great spaces of green sod, beautiful trees, flower gardens and urns are rarely beautiful. About the rooms, offices, and particularly in the hospital flowers are displayed and sent their sweet fragrance through the buildings. A visit to the greenhouses makes one wonder at the possibility of producing so much beauty as the buildings are in a very dilapidated contion—look as though a heavy storm might blow them away.

Other than this condition and the lack of awnings I would report that the Michigan Soldiers' Home is excellently furnished and efficiently managed. Michigan has reason to be proud of its home for soldiers.

DEFENSE.

As evidence of the esteem in which Michigan Department is held in the National Organization, our Commander-in-Chief, George A. Gay, appointed Comrade Eugene Owen to succeed our late Comrade Hamilton as Quartermaster General; Miss Simpson is retained as Secretary. This is the third Michigan Comrade to receive this high honor and Michigan Department appreciates this expression of confidence and heartily congratulates Comrade Owen on having been chosen. The week of February 3, accompanied by Miss Simpson, Comrade attended the meeting in Indianapolis, of the Executive Board, when plans were made for the 76th National Encampment which will be held in Indianapolis the week of Sept. 13. Headquarters in Claypool Hotel. Make your plans with our Secretary, that we may all be together, and sure of rooms in Headquarters Hotel.

MEMORIAM:

Again the shadow of DEATH falls across our pathway, hiding for awhile the faces of these loved Comrades.

James A. Hamilton, Quartermaster General and Commander of Post No. 42, Lansing, died December 23, 1941, aged 94 years. At the age of 17 he enlisted in Co. G. Twelfth Michigan Infantry and served 'till close of the war.

Following the death of our honored Department Commander A. C. Estabrook who was serving the National as Quartermaster General, Comrade Hamilton received this appointment and at the 75th National Encampment was re-appointed by Commander in Chief George A. Gay, serving 'till his death, faithful to the end.

Though ill, Comrade Hamilton headed the MEMORIAL DAY parade and attended church service with Allied Orders but was able to attend only one session of Department Encampment. His last public appearance was in September as guest of Governor Van Wagoner at the ceremonies incident to the return of the captured Confederate Flags, to Southern states.

We who loved him felt the shadows closing about him and knew he soon would be welcomed to that land where wars never rage and peace reigns, forever.

Comrade Hamilton held a unique place in the civic life of Lansing filling various positions with distinction. The services held in his honor saw an outpouring of citizens seeking to pay tribute to one whose honorable life closed an "era in the history of Lansing"—the last Civil War Veteran.

A. F. Chappell, Past Department Commander and Commander of Post No. 17, Detroit, enlisted in the 6th Ohio Cavalry at the age of 15 and fought in 32 battles and major skirmishes; three times his horse was shot from under him and though wounded at Gettysburg, miraculously escaped death.

Following the close of war Comrade Chappell came to Michigan where for more than a quarter century he has been identified with the patriotic life of Detroit, serving as Honorary President of the Joint Memorial Association, President of the Trustees of the G. A. R. Building and Commander of the largest Post in Michigan for years.

In 1939 he was elected Department Commander, filling the office with distinction. He delighted in visiting his Comrades throughout the state. A brave soldier, a generous and warm hearted friend, his passing is a loss to the Department of Michigan that can never be filled.

David Plumadore, Company D. 18th. Michigan Infantry.

Comrade Plumadore had served the Department in many offices and was one of our best known Comrades at Encampments. After a year of suffering, at the age of 93, he joined his Comrades on that other shore.



An honorary member of Post No. 1494 V. F. W., he was accorded full military honors at the service conducted by twenty members of that Post as he was laid to rest, 'till the Great Awakening Day.

Lemuel Tingley, Commander of Post No. 211 of Ionia enlisted in Buffalo and served three years and four months with the Army in Virginia, a record of which he was justly proud.

The same spirit of service that caused him to enlist in his early manhood followed him through life; he was devoted to the Grand Army of the Republic. His passing records the closing of Post 211.

Comrade Ira Mason, sponsored by the Daughters of Union Veterans Tent No. 9, Pontiac, as Comrade at Large was the last Civil War veteran in the county; Died Oct. 1, 1941.

Comrade Joseph H. Pangburn—died Aug. 15, 1941. He enlisted in Co. B. 47th Ohio Inft., June 15, 1861, serving 'till close of war. For many years a member of Adrian Post No. 45.

Oh God, forbid that we should count for naught Those wounds to flesh and soul, of these, who fought.

The following numbers show the gain and loss of Posts and members in the Department of Michigan after it was re-organized—year by year from January, 1879, to June, 1942:

THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

Seventy-six years ago April 6, 1866, thirteen men, only a picket post of the nearly three million, who had worn the Blue of the Union soldier, met in Decatur, Ill., at the call of Dr. B. F. Stephenson, a surgeon of the 14th Ill. Infantry and organized the first Post of the Grand Army.

The name derived from Napoleon's "Grand Army of France".

Only on the presentation of a bit of parchment—tattered and torn as it may have been, has the door ever opened for membership. The honorable discharge of a Union soldier, sailor or marine is the magic key. The Grand Army is unique among organizations. It had no predecessors; it can have no successors.

The peak of membership in Michigan Grand Army of the Republic was reached in 1889 with 21,418 on the rolls.

458,230

The Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, was organized as a Provisional Department, May 8th, 1867, in the City of Detroit, by General R. A. Alger, who become the first Commander. He was followed by William A Throop—William Humphreys.

In March of 1878 the Department of Michigan barely existed. Only two of the four Posts showed any sign of life.

January 22nd, 1879, the Department was re-organized, reached a membership of 21,418 during the next ten years. Today the Michigan Department holds third place in membership on the roll of the National Organization.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT SECRETARY.

Comrade, John M. Park, Department Commander: It is my privilege to present a partial account of my work as Department Secretary for the year.

Following the 63rd Encampment I returned to Headquarters to close all outstanding business and open the new year. Prepare and issue General Orders No. 1, the request for the appropriation, and begin compiling the 1941 Journal. Despite the extreme heat I kept Headquarters open the entire summer. Every day found callers and newspaper reporters from this and other states, seeking information regarding the Southern Flags captured by Michigan men of 61-65 the return to Southern states having been sponsored by the Governor and Legislature. It was found these Flags were not the property of the Department of Michigan Grand Army of the Republic; many Comrades wrote expressing approval of the plan as emphasizing the UNITY of our Country—a Nation UNDIVIDED, with one FLAG.

July; a trip to Detroit to visit Comrade Chappelle reported ill, and Comrade Dibble who fell, breaking his wrist. Visit Commander Park in Coopersville and remain over night in Grand Rapids to confer with our Asst. Adjt., Comrade Owen. Prepare articles for magazine and paper issues—"Grand Army and Its Special Interests." Make 12 calls on Comrades.

September 11th, close Headquarters and with Comrade Chappelle leave Detroit for the National Encampment in Columbus, Ohio. Quartermaster General Hamilton and Department Commander Park too ill to attend. Comrades Owen, Warner, Le Valley and Chappelle enjoy every session and all social affairs, and I the happiness of looking after them.

Michigan was honored in the re-appointment of Comrade Hamilton as Quartermaster General and I retained as Secretary; I continue the work and bookkeeping for the National from Headquarters. I returned



from Columbus just in time to greet Comrades Howland, Killeen, Hamilton and Carlton who were guests of Governor Van Wagoner, and witness the return of the captured Southern Flags, in this most unusual ceremony, on the steps of the Capitol.

The week following, Department Jr. Vice Commander Perrigo made his annual visit to hold the memory meeting of First Michigan Sharpshooters; luncheon with the Secretary, Miss Saxton, daughter of his comrade. Comrade Perrigo is the only surviving member of the First Michigan Sharpshooters.

Represent the Department Commander at the reception tendered National Patriotic Instructor, Theo Penland of Oregon, by the Ladies of the G. A. R. in Detroit. Issue the Department Journal; call on Comrade McGonigal in Leslie and the Mayor in Owosso.

In October, guest of District No. 1 in Detroit giving paper "The Grand Army of Today," which brought about the realization of my ambition to enroll every comrade now living in Michigan as a Comrade at Large. I have made every effort with voice and pen ably assisted by the Sons and Auxiliary, and the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War who have sponsored the membership of any Comrade whose consent to re-instatement I secure. Today Michigan Department has 27 Comrades at Large on the rolls: Two in the state have not responded. Issue National General Orders. Attend banquet of Camp No. 8 and Auxiliary in Detroit; reception for Department officers, the Robert Finch Camp host, in Grand Rapids, continue on to Coopersville to visit Department Commander; issue General Orders No. 2.

November, three Red Cross meetings; banquet and inspection Auxiliary No. 4; present Flag to new Camp No. 7; have part in Armistice Day observance; visit Comrade now very ill, almost daily. Preside at Preliminary meeting in Owosso; a second meeting in Owosso and trips to three cities regarding Encampment. December, greetings to every Comrade and exchange with many Departments. Several pre-Christmas invitations accepted as our Commander cannot leave his home. Close Headquarters on the 21st, anticipating Christmas day. Again sadness enshrouds us in the passing of Quartermaster General Hamilton on the 23rd. Return to Lansing to spend Christmas Day at the funeral home where hundreds call to pay their tribute of respect to one they called FRIEND. The year has gone out with this tragic climax, yet bravely we must face the NEW Year.

January, four installations; a trip to Coopersville with Comrade Owen and on his 93rd birthday an all day "at home" in Grand Rapids and in the evening his installation as Quartermaster General by Department Commander, Urion M. Mackey, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. Miss Giradot, the gracious hostess to the many Women's Relief Corps, Sons and Auxiliary, the Daughters of Union Veterans and the many friends who call to greet and congratulate him. Again sadness is ours in the passing on the 23rd, of Past Department Commander Chappelle. I return to Detroit to have a part with Tent No. 3 in giving the burial service. Have visited the Soldiers Home, twice.



February. Accompany Quartermaster General Owen to Indianapolis. A meeting of National officers.

Attend Sons Regional in Jackson; decision made to hold Encampment in Grand Rapids; call and preside at meeting in Pantlind Hotel; two later meetings complete arrangements.

Formulate and issue General Orders Nos. 3 and 4. Issue National order.

The closing quarter of our year is filled; the callers to Headquarters during Wolverine Boy State numbered 106 showing keen interest in the Grand Army. Prepare reports for encampment; close books for the audit. Represent our Commander at W. R. C. No. 32 Anniversary and Daughters District meeting. Memoral Day in Almont.

June 1st, leave for Grand Rapids to receive the Commander in Chief George A. Gay and Mrs. Gay and open Headquarters in Pantlind Hotel.

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"Heritage of the Grand Army of the Republic"

"The Grand Army of the Republic is a unique organization. No child can be born into it. No proclamation of President, edict of King or Czar can command admission. No university or institution of learning can issue a diploma authorizing its holder to entrance. No act of Parliament or Congress secures recognition. The wealth of a Vanderbilt cannot purchase the position. Its doors open only on the presentation of a bit of parchment, worn, torn, and begrimed as it may be, which certifies to an honorable discharge from the armies or navies of the Nation during the war against the rebellion, and, unlike any other organization, no new blood can come in. There are no growing ranks from which recruits can be drawn into the Grand Army of the Republic. With the consummation of peace through victory its ranks were closed forever; its lines are steadily growing thinner, and the ceaseless tramp of its columns is with ever-lessening tread. The gaps in the picket lines grow wider every day. Details are made for the reserve summoned into the shadowy regions until by and by only a solitary sentinel will stand guard, waiting until the bugle call from beyond shall muster out the last comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic."
