





The Sixty-fifth Annual Encampment of the Michigan Department Grand Army of the Republic, convened in Suite 801 Hotel Olds, Saturday, June 18, 1943.

Department Commander Orlando Le Valley, presiding.

Commander Le Valley: Comrades you will please come to order. It is now nine o'clock and we plan to finish all business before luncheon. While only four of us meet today I trust we have a fine Encampment; we miss several who were with us last year; our faithful Assistant Adjutant Owen has been ill several days and not allowed to make the trip. A message this morning says he is slightly improved. Comrade Killeen reminds us he is with us in thought but too weak to leave his home. We deeply regret our Commander in Chief, John Dumser, because of the distance from California, could not be with us.

The Chaplain will lead us in prayer.

Department Chaplain, Warner: I think we should use the Grand Army prayer and I ask our Secretary to help me in reading it.

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PRAYER.

Chaplain: Almighty Father! humbly we bow before Thee, our Creator, Preserver, Guide and Protector. We thank Thee for our lives; for Thy mercy which has kept us until this hour; for Thy guidance on land and sea, by day and by night; for Thy constant care in our hours of danger; and for the preservation of our national integrity and unity. Bless our Country; grant that the memory of our noble dead, who freely gave their lives for the land they loved, may dwell ever in our hearts. Bless our Order; make it an instrument of great good; keep our names on the roll of Thy servants, and at last receive us into that Grand Army above, where Thou, O God, art the Supreme Commander. Amen.

Comrade Ferguson; That's a grand prayer.

Department Commander LeValley: All greetings and gifts were exchanged at the banquet last night; we will be undisturbed in this session and will not need the appointment of Guard and Officer of the Day.

Roll call by the Secretary disclosed the loss by death of three Staff officers—Past Dept. Commander, John M. Park, Nelson R. Wood and Wesley J. West. Our Sr. Vice Commander Cyrus Perrigo not equal to the journey and the Jr. Vice Commander has not returned from California where he went soon after his one hundredth birthday in January.

Commander Le Valley: I will ask Comrade Warner to take the chair while the Secretary reads my report.

ADDRESS OF THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER WITH RECOMMENDATIONS.

Comrades:

The severe illness of Commander John M. Park made it necessary for me to preside at the 64th Annual Encampment held in Grand Rapids. The Commander in Chief, George A. Gay and Mrs. Gay were our guests the entire week before leaving for other official visits in the West, other National guests were the National Secretary of the Woman's Relief Corps, National President of the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans and National representative of the Ladies of the G.A.R. making the Encampment an outstanding one.

At this Encampment you placed in my hands the command of the Michigan Department: I can truthfully say I have done all my strength allowed to keep faith with my predecessors whose efforts have caused the Grand Army to be known and respected in our State, but without the service of our Secretary Simpson I could have done little.

Returning to my home after the busy days of Encampment duties I was the recipient of many courtesies, greetings and good wishes from many Departments for all of these I am grateful.



The summer months the warm passed pleasantly; gas was not so closely rationed permitting me to make several visits to our Comrades in Tuscola County—George Heusted, our youngest veteran, and Cyrus Perrigo, only surviving member of the famous First Michigan Sharpshooters.

In August fourteen members of the Grand Rapids Circle, Ladies of the G.A.R. surprised me with a Pot Luck picnic on the lawn, this was much enjoyed.

September 11, accompanied by my daughter found me enroute to Indianapolis to attend the event of the year—the National Encampment. A long tiring trip with several changes. I attended every session and all social affairs thru the week. If every Comrade realized the pleasure of again mingling with Comrades from other states I am sure you would be repaid for the extra effort made to attend our National Encampments. I rode in the parade with Comrades Owen, Warner and Ferguson.

Comrade Owen was again appointed Quartermaster General, and Miss Simpson retained as his Secretary to continue the keeping of the National books and have charge of all supplies. We greatly appreciate this honor bestowed on Michigan Department.

Comrades, you know the call made by President Roosevelt for old canon and statues to be dismantled and turned to Salvage Committees; after much hesitancy I released the two brass canon which had been given Whiteside Post No. 143 in 1917, coming from the government arsenal at Watervilet, N. Y. For twenty-five years we had treasured these relics of the Civil War and had hoped these relics dear to the men of 61-65 would not be needed and would be left to inspire the youth of this and future generations, but the need seemed great and I released them to again be in the service of our Country. I was honor guest at the ceremony on Armistice Day when representatives of the Government accepted them.

The unusually severe winter and depth of snow banks made it impossible for me to accept any invitations from our Allied Orders, but always my heart has been with you in your great work. I delegated Miss Simpson, to represent the Department at all social affairs; these have been many as our Allied Orders and patriotic societies never fail to remember our Department. Miss Simpson never failed me, whatever the weather, with no complaint adding these trips to Headquarters duties. The success of Michigan Department is safe in her hands.

I regret I could not attend the most unusual party in Adrain when Martin A. Loop celebrated his one hundredth birthday January 14. Miss Simpson reported all Adrian tried to pay him honor.

On the 19th our greetings were carried to Grand Rapids, Secretary attending the banquet sponsored by the Eva Grey Tent of Daughters honoring Quartermaster General Owen on his 94th birthday. You will remember the blizzard of the year on that day made travel a hardship but some way our Secretary managed to carry out my wishes, tho busses and trains, hours late.

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VISITATIONS

I have made five visits to Comrades. In May came the invitation from Vassar Corps to be their guest with Comrades Perrigo and Heusted at dinner and regular meeting; This I was delighted to attend as our Secretary was to be present. It was a great day; I speak for Comrade Heusted their Pot Luck dinner was a banquet. We regret Comrade Perrigo could not attend.

Secretary Simpson accompanied me home to review the work of the year and prepare this report.

Memorial Day in Caro was under direction of the American Legion; The address by Rev. E. Ray Williams was attended by all patriotic societies. At 2 P.M. the parade formed and marched to cemetery where graves of all soldiers were decorated by Boy and Girl Scouts. That the day saw an outpouring of the citizens is attested by the representatives from the Legion and Auxiliary of World War I, the Army and Navy, and Boy and Girl Scouts. I shall long remember the day.

MEMBERSHIP

Death has entered our thinning ranks many times the past year, calling three from my staff officers, Past Department Commander Park, Patriotic Instructor Nelson J. Wood and Color Sergeant Wesley J. West: the loss of 12 members saw the disbanding of 5 Posts. No new members can be mustered in the Grand Army of the Republic. We must now urge our Sons and Daughters and Allied Orders to carry on the patriotic work so needed in our Country, in harmony with the organizations all doing a splendid work. "In Union there is Strength."

Every effort is being made to collect the Charters and relics of Posts long since disbanded. Any comrade knowing where such property may be is requested to notify the Secretary—Box 433, Lansing 2 Michigan that these now priceless records of the Michigan Department may be secured. I suggest Secretary Simpson be instructed to carry on this work and allowed any expense in this connection.

I offer the following recommendations for your approval:

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Comrades, we are personally unable to work for the bills now before Congress but our interest is none the less keen.

No. 1—

That this Encampment record its approval of H. Bill No. 505 granting a pension of fifty dollars a month to all widows of Civil War veterans upon attaining the age of 65 years.

No. 2-

That we record our approval of Senate Bill 157 to acquire the Temple Heights property in Washington D. C. to be used after the present war, for the erection of a Memorial Building "to the DEFENDERS of the UNION during the Civil War."

No. 3—

That we express our approval of legislation that the 30th of May be made Memorial Day in every state in the Union.

The Secretary to inform our Senators and Representatives of the action taken.

No. 4-

That we continue support of the war efforts of our government and this Encampment allow a sum not to exceed twenty-five dollars for some remembrance for Michigan soldiers returned to Percy Jones Hospital. Discretionery power given our Secretary.

No. 5-

That the final decision as to 1944 Encampment be left with Council of Administration and Secretary; Department Commander to issue the call for Preliminery Meeting early in the new year.

No. 6—

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That this Encampment record the decision to carry on as a Department so long as one Comrade survives.

I take this opportunity to congratulate Comrade Ira Stormes of Utah who has served his Department seven years as Commander and for the past three years the only Grand Army Man in Utah, held his Annual Encampment, appointed himself Department Commander and pledged the Allied Orders to go on the coming year as he had done in the past. He with his Secretary Mrs. Schnell who has served the Department twelve years are familiar faces at our National Encampments.

Comrades as I say "good bye" as your Commander while no actual work has been mine, the honor of serving even in a small way is deeply appreciated and I treasure the memory of a happy year, I only wish I could have done more to advance our honored Order.

The many good wishes, letters and greetings will not be forgotten. Our Asst. Adjt. Owen and our Secretary have my sincere thanks for their loyal support; as I pass the honor of Commander to another I know the same true comradship of every member and loyalty to the Grand Army of the Republic will be given as has been mine.

I have the honor to again report the membership and financial standing of the Department of Michigan for the year ending June 1, 1943.

Showing a loss by DEATH of eighteen members and six Posts DIS-BANDED. We can report no GAIN in membership as it is believed every veteran now living in Michigan is a member of the Department. Our Secretary by personal visits and correspondence has succeeded in enrolling as Comrade at Large, every veteran whose name appeared on the Pension roll.

We take pride in the work of our Secretary as it places Michigan with 39 members on Dec. 31 report, the second largest Department in the National organization. The winter was trying for our comrades and during the spring months many of our Boys slipped away.

By order of the Encampment we purchased one Defense Bond. In the final pay off of the Capitol National Bank we suffered the loss of 71.69. While these items are not large they materially increased our disbursements for the year.



DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN

The Department of Michigan, Grand Army of the Republic, was organized as a Provisional Department, May 8th, 1867, in the City of Detroit, by General R. A. Alger, who become the first Commander. He was followed by William A. Throop—William Humphreys.

In March of 1878 the Department of Michigan barely existed. Only two of the four Posts showing any signs of life.

Commander in Chief, John C. Robinson, by Special Order No. 8, issued from National Headquarters April 12, 1878, appointed Comrade C. V. R. Pond, Provisional Commander of Michigan Department, vice Comrade Puriton relieved at his own request. Dan W. Sawyer was appointed Assistant Adjutant and Headquarters established at Quincy.

Ending June 1878, the Department showed seven Posts. Petersburg No. 5, and Muncie No. 6 were dropped; Custer Post was organized at Grand Rapids on Sept. 27, 1878, with eighteen members and given the number 6.

January 6, 1879, the Commander in Chief issued Orders giving Provisonal Commander Pond authority to call a State Encampment for the purpose of organizing a Permanent Department and for election of Department officers. This first Encampment was held at Custer Hall, Grand Rapids; four active Posts were reported with a membership of 127; Posts were re-numbered placing Custer No. 5; this number it holds to this day with its surviving members our Quartermaster General Owen as Commander and Martin J. Warner, Chaplain.

In 1880 Custer Post was host to the second Department Encampment; with 9 active Posts and 231 members, the success of the Michigan Department was assured. Organization of Posts continued through the next 15 years with a varying membership in the older Posts, the peak being reached in 1889 with 21,418 members on Department roll.

Since 1928 a steady lessening of Posts and members brings the realization the Grand Army has entered the Sunset Trail.

The report of Dec. 31, 1942, with 39 members placed Michigan second on the National Roll; lovingly we say, "Our Vanishing Army."

The following numbers show the gain and loss of Posts and members in the Department of Michigan after it was re-organized—year by year from January, 1879, to January, 1943:

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT SECRETARY.

HEADQUARTERS MICHIGAN GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

ORLANDO LEVALLEY, Department Commander:

August—Began happily with a "Wedding Pageant" sponsored by Tent No. 14; official dinner with Department President and Secretary in Williamston; a happy day in Detroit with your gift and greetings to Comrade Haines, celebrating his one hundredth birthday. Mail out G. O. No. 1; close National books and prepare the year report as Secretary to Quartermaster General.

On the 24th word received of the passing of Comrade Ives, Commander of John A. Logan Post No. 1; sadly we record the disbanding of another Post. I attended the funeral at Soldiers' Home and assist officers of the Corps in the service at the grave.

Attend one Flag presentation and one Red Cross meeting. Collect contribution for Safety Patrol project. Proof read Journal.

SEPTEMBER 10th, close Headquarters to open in Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, to spend the week with our four Comrades in National Encampment. Comrade Owen again brings the honor of Quartermaster General to Michigan Department. I continue as Secretary and bookkeeper.

I have tried to carry out your expressed wish and that of Commanders preceding you, to keep the Grand Army before the public and our Allied Orders. Anticipating many social calls on my time, the closing quarter I worked long hours into the night that no routine work at Headquarters be neglected. In the closing three months I visted Detroit twice officially; reception to Department officers sponsored by Tent No. 3; Encampment conference; inspected two Corps in Saginaw; visited Bay City; Attended District Convention and Inspected Dimondale Corps; visited Comrades Warner, Porritt and Hurd who are ill at Soldiers' Home; issue National Journal; two sessions with Daughters of Veterans; inspect Mason Corps; two early Christmas parties; prepare and mail G. O. 2-3; greetings to every Comrade, to Department "heads" and exchange with Departments through the states, 149 received at Department; Christmas trees and dinners with Corps 7 and 32; close Headquarters on the 24th and with a song of thankfulness deep in my heart that so many dear Comrades I may serve, have been spared to us, I greet the Christmas morn.

JANUARY, 1943—The month of blizzards and deep snow, piled everywhere making travel a hardship, I returned to Lansing and opened Headquarters for the New Year. Install officers of Tent 14; attend Red Cross; on 14th though only three above zero, carry greetings and gift to Comrade Loop in Adrian—all day reception and banquet in evening as he celebrates his one hundredth birthday; on the 19th through the blizzard of the year and hours late I reach Grand Rapids to extend your good wishes to Comrade Owen on his 94th birthday. No bus service available, I remain over night and visit our three Comrades at Soldiers' Home.

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Never will I forget the note of joy in Comrade Hurd's voice as he whispered "you did not forget me" while his trembling hands clung to mine, silently I renewed my pledge to never fail our Comrades—"My Boys".

Close of the month, visit a city suggesting Encampment, appear before Ways and Means Committee at Capitol; mail General Orders; entertain Department President of Woman's Relief Corps; Somewhere in my travels I picked up the pneumonia germ and was confined to my home until well into February, all Department work continued with help of typist and forwarding mail. Returning to Capitol, by appointment presided at Preliminary Meeting on the 27th at Hotel Olds and was elected General Chairman for the June Encampment.

MARCH—Visit School for the Blind; attend Regional meeting of the Sons of Veterans held in Otsego Hotel, Jackson; Compile G. O. No. 4 with its long Memorial Roll of loved Comrades; with Comrades Owen and Warner attend the funeral of Past Department John M. Park in Coopersville, assist in reading the service. Visit Soldiers' Home.

APRIL—brought sadness in the passing of friends of many years, Comrades Alonzo Dibble and Charles Hurd. I attended the service for Comrade Dibble in Detroit and Comrade Hurd at Soldiers' Home, have a part in the service in Chapel and at the grave.

Prepare two feature articles on "The Grand Army of Today"; a trip to Battle Creek to secure Charter and property of Farragut Post No. 32, disbanded with the passing of Commander Howland; was entertained by the President and Patriotic Instructor.

As if to compensate for the sadness of the past month Max was busy and happy. Entertain Department President of Daughters and with her attend a delightful reception and evening with Tent No. 14, Lansing, hostess; With officers of Sons of Veterans, motor to Ann Arbor banquet and initiation; attend 9th birthday party of A. L. Bryant Corps No. 32; prepare three articles on Memorial Day; mail all invitations for Encampment; three committee meetings; visit Comrade Killeen in Portland; Pot Luck and regular meeting of Camp Blair; Mail 300 G. O. No. 4; prepare all programs for Encampment and Banquet.

On 24th leave for Saginaw enroute to Vassar, Mayville and Caro. Received in Vassar by Corps President, together we visit Comrade Heusted who accompanies us to Vassar to join Department Commander Le Valley and daughter, Ivah, to enjoy a banquet dinner and regular session of the Corps, following this my long anticipated visit to our Commander Le Valley became a reality; two days spent in reviewing the work of the year preparatory to compiling his report were indeed happy and well spent; all delays in travel through lakes of water and flooded detours, soon forgotten; in contented mind I reached the Capitol to find the notice that an increase in our budget would be allowed the coming year. I express our sincere thanks to the Ways and Means Committee with special thought of Representative Epsie, the Chairman, for the kindly reception given me and the real interest shown to the needs of the Department. Following Memorial Day I return to Capitol to prepare all reports for Encampment and close books for the Audit.

I have traveled 6,008 miles by bus during the year in carrying on our work.

Some of our work is sheer routine, some is joyous fun But one must be completed, e'er the other is begun. Each little item is a step toward a shining goal Each tiny trifle goes to make a finer whole.

It may seem I could have done more—but, the routine work of the office must go on each day; more than two hundred visitors have been received; the research work involved in tracing records in answer to requests received from many states demands many hours of delving into boxes and files before typing and mailing out; these this year number 291; four General Orders and the Journal must be compiled, typed for the printer, and mailed to the hundreds on our mailing lists; many times these duties prevent my accepting invitations though my aim has been to meet with our Allied Orders whenever possible—to bring something to keep the ideals and service of the Men of 61-65 before them. If words of mine can do this, I too, am serving.

- I. The 76th National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic came to its close, Thursday, September 17, 1942, following the election of Comrade John S. Dumser of California as Commander in Chief. A week long to be remembered; for the sixth time Indianapolis opened her doors to the comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic; President Roosevelt sent his own band, the United States Marine, under direction of Capt. William F. Santelman, to furnish music for every occasion; Governor and Mrs. Schricker tendered a reception in honor of our Commander-in-Chief and Staff in the Governor's parlors, State Capitol; Brigadier-General Frank T. Hines, Administrator of Veterans' Affairs, and Senator Ludlow, addressed us at the Camp Fire.
- II. WEDNESDAY, PARADE DAY—Indianapolis crowded its streets to again pay homage to our leaders and Comrades; a hush descended as they rode slowly along in open automobiles and tears dimmed the eyes as thoughts turned to other years when the Men of 61-65 marched gayly through these same streets.
- III. Quartermaster General Eugene Owen, Department Commander Orlando Le Valley, Chaplain M. J. Warner and Delegate at Large, Wm. H. Ferguson, our voting delegation, attended every Encampment session. To Commander-in-Chief Dumser and entire staff we tender our good wishes and pledge the co-operation and loyalty of the Michigan Department.
 For the signal honor shown the Department, in the re-appointment of Comrade Eugene Owen as Quartermaster General, we express our appreciation. The work of our Secretary, Leah M. Simpson, in keeping the books of the National and reports made, received the fullest approval of the Council of Administration. She was retained as Secretary to Quartermaster General and will continue the National work at Dept. Headquarters, Box 433, Lansing.
- IV. This is the last General Orders for 1942; report blanks are enclosed, which should be carefully filled and returned with the one dollar National Per Capita Tax to Secretary, Box 433, Lansing, by January 5th, 1943.
- V. Sponsors of Comrades at Large: Last year through your cooperation Michigan Department stood third in membership in the National organization; the privilege of serving our Comrades cannot long be ours; the Per Capita Tax of one dollar for your Comrade should reach the Secretary by January 5th. Please be

on time that no Comrade be dropped from the Michigan Department. The Secretary will appreciate any item about "your Comrade" as from these reports the records are made. Let us broadcast the fact that the Department of Michigan Grand Army of the Republic still lives to carry on.

VI. Appeals for decision relative to dismantling cannon and Civil War relics at this time, have come to Headquarters from Allied Orders and individual owners throughout the state, with the thought of the RESOLUTION and PROTEST voiced at our last Encampment we reprint the closing lines of that resolution: "We protest the dismantling of any such war relics now scattered over the State for the small amount of metal made available for war use--UNTIL such time as OUR GOVERNMENT declares this to be ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY."

- Newspaper clippings under date October 12 received at Head-VII. quarters state: "The Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army has issued a special order directing Posts and owners of Civil War relics to turn them in to the collectors of scrap". Comrades and members of Allied Orders, our Secretary informs me no National General Order has been received at Headquarters and no Special Order from our Commander-in-Chief, issued. I would urge we suppress and correct these mistaken impressions until any such decision is promulgated through the proper channels a National General Order. As your Department Commander I can give no decision as to your individual duty, confident every American will do his part in the hour of his Country's need. In our YOUTH, we men of 61-65 answered the call of President Lincoln to preserve the freedom and ideals of our Country-today we can do little. Again YOUTH must answer the call, even now in far away lands and on the high seas thousands have given their lives for US; we who love our Country and Flag will not hesitate to part with treasured relics should our President call for this or any sacrifice though in our hearts we pray-"May they be the last to go."
- VIII. As ordered by vote of Department, one Defense Bond has been purchased and filed with the records of the Department.
 - IX. Members are requested to send notice of the passing of any Comrade known to them to the Dept. Secretary that our records may be kept correct.

Jacob H. Perrine—Co. E., 4th Michigan Inft. and Commander of Post 210 in Albion, became a member of the Albion Post in 1886 and held his membership till the day of his death; in all these years never out of active service as an officer; was elected Commander three times and in 1938 as only surviving member again was given that honor, to carry till his passing, disbanded E. W. Hollingsworth Post No. 210, August 10, 1942. Comrade Perrine was 102 years old January 29, 1942.

James F. Ives—Co. K., 11th Michigan Inft. Became a member of John A. Logan Post No. 1, Soldiers' Home, by transfer, in 1935, and was elected Commander the following year. One by one he saw his Comrades laid to rest till on August 26 he, too, answered the summons. He was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery at Soldiers' Home, Chaplain Cornelius Swart preaching the sermon. The ritual service of the Grand Army read by our Department Secretary, assisted by Commander of the Sons of Union Veterans and President of John A. Logan Woman's Relief Corps and members. Taps were sounded by Comrades of the Spanish War.

John C. Hain—104th Ohio Inft. celebrated his one hundredth birthday on August 15th. He became a member of the Grand Army of the Republic in 1926. In 1929, elected Junior Vice Commander of Gen. O. M. Poe Post No. 433, Detroit, was advanced to the office of Commander the following year and faithfully served his Post till the day of his passing. Two years ago he paid tribute to his only member and continued sadly to carry on, answering every call his strength would permit. The Department sadly marks the Disbanding of Post No. 433.

Series 1942-43.

- I. A meeting of the heads of the Allied Orders, was held February 27th., at the Hotel Olds to consider the possibility of holding our Annual Encampment in June. Realizing that war clouds hang heavy about us, that transportation is almost impossible and hundreds of our members are giving every day to Defense work, months ago, our Secretary was delegated to make every effort to interest some city in this encampment; by correspondence and visits this has been done and the result presented to our members at the Preliminary meeting.
- II. It was not possible for your Department Commander to go to Lansing and our Secretary was appointed to preside and present the wishes of the Grand Army, for a short business Encampment omitting many of the social activities; to this our Allied Orders heartily agreed.
- III. After careful consideration, despite the ever present thought that all conventions may at any time, be cancelled by the Government it was decided to convene the 65th Annual Encampment in Lansing June 18-19, 1943. Our Secretary was appointed General Chairman.
- IV. Headquarters will be established Friday June 18th in Hotel Olds. Comrades are requested to arrive in time for luncheon with Department Commander. The only joint social activity will take place in the Hotel, at six o'clock that evening, Reception and Banquet, every Comrade the honored guest.

- XII. In response to inquiry, "why are Credentials no longer issued" we quote the ruling of the 49th Annual Encampment: "every member of the Department of Michigan Grand Army of the Republic, in good standing, be and is hereby made a member of the Department Encampment; such to be entitled to the National Countersign. Comrades at Large are also entitled to this privilege. The Secretary assures me that every Comrade in Michigan is in good standing.
- XIII. Will the family or friends of any Comrade, knowing of his sickness or death please send such notice to Headquarters, Box 433, Lansing.

Because of misunderstanding and wrong information given out, about charters, books and property of a disbanded Post, the Department deems it necessary to repeat the National LAW and quote—

"In case of surrender or forfeiture of a charter, the charter, books of record and Post papers shall be immediately sent to the Assistant Adjutant-General at Department Headquarters and shall be subject to the disposition of the Department Encampment. However, any Post surrendering its charter, may, if it shall so vote, deposit charter, books of record and papers with the nearest historical society, public library or managers of a memorial building, to be kept and preserved by such society, library or managers of such memorial building. The receipt of such historical society, public library or managers of a memorial building, deposited with the Assistant Adjutant-General, shall be evidence that the Rules and Regulations have been complied with."

The incorporation by an organization as Auxiliary to a Grand Army Post or Department, does not thereby make that organization heir to the property of the Post or Department. The Grand Army of the Republic has no heirs. Posts and Departments may however make a WILL disposing of all property—except CHARTERS and BOOKS of RECORD and MINUTES.

- XIV. Plans for the National Encampment will be promulgated in next General Orders.
- XV. Comrade Nelson Porritt is now enrolled at the Soldiers' Home; Comrade Hurd is still confined to his room. I express my thanks to our Chaplain Martin Warner who so gladly visits them almost daily.

I take this opportunity to thank our efficient Secretary who has taken the burden from my shoulders in solving the many problems that have been ours this year, leaving me only happy memories of my year of service as Department Commander: January 14th., Miss Simpson represented Department at the 100th birthday of our Jr. Vice Commander Martin A. Loop in Adrian and on the 17th in the blizzard of the year carried our greetings to Quartermaster General Eugene Owen in Grand Rapids at the banquet sponsored by the Eva Gray Tent of Daughters. May the years bring continued happiness and activity to these Comrades.

 - XIX. In nearing the close of my official year I can truthfully say I have done my best to show my appreciation of the honor bestowed on me by my Comrades; the honor and dignity of the Grand Army of the Republic has been my first thought.

To my successor I pledge my loyalty and bespeak for him the same co-operation so gladly given me by every officer and Comrade and every member of our Allied Orders, all have been splendid.

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IN MEMORIAM

It is with profound sorrow we record the passing of another beloved Past Department Commander, one whose love of life and the good he could bring to others made him an outstanding figure in the home town where he spent more than a half century.

JOHN M. PARK, was born in Ashland County, Ohio and at the age of 16 followed his father and three brothers by enlisting in Co. H, Second Ohio Cavalry, serving till close of the war.

In 1872 he moved to Ottawa county, Michigan making his home in Coopersville where he died Mar. 16, 1943.

He became a member of the Grand Army of the Republic in the early nineties serving in many offices; in 1941 was elected Department Commander. In the early months of this year giving cheerful service in public appearances and visits to Soldiers' Home, to comrades in Grand Rapids and those living in nearby towns, re-instating three as Comrades at Large.

The winter of 1941 saw his health beginning to fail, confining him to his home many months and depriving him of the happiness of presiding at the 64th Annual Department Encampment.

The body of our Commander lay in state in the Methodist Church in Coopersville. The Department was represented by Quartermaster General Eugene Owen, Department Chaplain Martin Warner and our Department Secretary; the last ritualistic tribute of the Grand Army was given. Full military honors at the grave were under auspices of the Coopersville American Legion.

NELSON R. WOOD: Department Patriotic Instructor, Commander of Post No. 35 and only surviving veteran of the Civil War in South Haven died at the home of his son in Coloma, March 23, 1943.

Born in Auburn, Ohio Nov. 26, 1846, he served in U. S. Navy before enlisting in Co. E 196 Ohio Vol. Inft. He became a member of Post No. 35, Zach Chandler of South Haven, in 1886 transferring to Benton Harbor in 1905 but re-joining Post No. 35 in 1925 and elected Post Commander in 1936 holding the office till death claimed him.

Always a leader in patriotic work on Memorial Day in South Haven and speaking at services in Cemetery at Covert, he will be sadly missed. For years the report of his patriotic activities has been first to reach Department after Memorial Day.

WESLEY J. WEST—died at his home in Colon, August 13, 1942, aged 94 years. The only veteran of the Civil War in St. Joseph County, of him a neighbor writes: "This community can never have another like "our Comrade"; keen, lovable, alert to the events of the times and active as few are at such an age, we shall miss his familiar figure as almost daily he walked the mile from his home to town". He gave fine service to his Country in Peace as he did in War.

At the time of his passing Comrade West was serving the Department as Sergeant of Department Colors.

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WILLIAM R. HOWLAND—Commander of Post No. 32, and only surviving member died at his home in Battle Creek January 14, 1943. Comrade Howland enlisted in Co. L 8th New York Heavy Artillery. His passing disbands Post No. 32.

REV. ISAAC HODGKINS enlisted in Co. F 59th Mass. Inft. before his 15th birthday, serving 13 months during this service; was wounded in the famous Spotsylvania, Va. Court House battle and taken prisoner. His passing disbands Post No. 205.

JOHN A. DUNN; Died at the home of his daughter in Clinton, August 14, 1942, age 95. Leaving High School he enlisted in Co. F, 4th Michigan Inft. serving for two years. Comrade Dunn was one of the best known veterans in Lenawee county and a member of the Grand Army many years.

WILLIAM PARKER; 99, Ionia county's last Civil War veteran died Jan. 25. Comrade Parker was bugler and drummer in the 17th Ohio -Inft. enlisting when 17 years of age. He served the Department as Junior Vice Commander in 1938-1939.

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"Heritage of the Grand Army of the Republic"

"The Grand Army of the Republic is a unique organization. No child can be born into it. No proclamation of President, edict of King or Czar can command admission. No university or institution of learning can issue a diploma authorizing its holder to entrance. No act of Parliament or Congress secures recognition. The wealth of a Vanderbilt cannot purchase the position. Its doors open only on the presentation of a bit of parchment, worn, torn, and begrimed as it may be, which certifies to an honorable discharge from the armies or navies of the Nation during the war against the rebellion, and, unlike any other organization, no new blood can come in. There are no growing ranks from which recruits can be drawn into the Grand Army of the Republic. With the consummation of peace through victory its ranks were closed forever; its lines are steadily growing thinner, and the ceaseless tramp of its columns is with ever-lessening tread. The gaps in the picket lines grow wider every day. Details are made for the reserve summoned into the shadowy regions until by and by only a solitary sentinel will stand guard, waiting until the bugle call from beyond shall muster out the last comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic."
